The Legend of St. Nicholas: The Real Santa Claus

The legend of Santa Claus can be traced back hundreds of years to a monk named St. Nicholas. It is believed that Nicholas was born sometime around 280 A.D. in Patara, near Myra in modern-day Turkey. Much admired for his piety and kindness, St. Nicholas became the subject of many legends. It is said that he gave away all of his inherited wealth and traveled the countryside helping the poor and sick. One of the best-known St. Nicholas stories is the time he saved three poor sisters from being sold into slavery or prostitution by their father by providing them with a dowry so that they could be married. Over the course of many years, Nicholas's popularity spread and he became known as the protector of children and sailors. His feast day is celebrated on the anniversary of his death, December 6. This was traditionally considered a lucky day to make large purchases or to get married. By

the Renaissance, St. Nicholas was the most popular saint in Europe. Even after the Protestant Reformation, when the veneration of saints began to be discouraged, St. Nicholas maintained a positive reputation, especially in Holland.

Perhaps the most iconic department store Santa is Kris Kringle in the 1947 classic

Santa Claus movie "Miracle on 34 Street." A young Natalie Wood played a little girl who believes Kris Kringle (played by Edmund Gwenn, who won an Oscar for the role) when he says he is the real Santa Claus. "Miracle on 34 Street" was remade in 1994 and starred Lord Richard Attenborough and Mara Wilson.



The Macy's Santa has appeared at almost every Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade since it began in1924, and fans of all ages still line up to meet the Macy's Santa in New York City and at stores around the country.

The Ninth Reindeer, Rudolph

Rudolph, "the most famous reindeer of all," was born over a hundred years after his eight flying counterparts. The red-nosed wonder was the creation of Robert L. May, a copywriter at the Montgomery Ward department store. In 1939, May wrote a Christmas-themed story-poem to help bring holiday

traffic into his store. Using a similar rhyme pattern to Moore's "Twas the Night Before Christmas," May told the story of Rudolph, a young reindeer who was teased by the other deer because of his large, glowing, red nose. But, When Christmas Eve turned foggy and Santa worried that he wouldn't be able to deliver gifts that night, the former outcast saved Christmas by leading the sleigh by the light of his red



Nose. Rudolph's message - that given the opportunity, a liability can be turned into an asset - proved popular. Montgomery Ward sold almost two and a half million copies of the story in 1939. When it was reissued in 1946, the book sold over three and a half million copies. Several years later, one of

May's friends, Johnny Marks, wrote a short song based on Rudolph's story. It was recorded by Gene Autry and sold over two million copies. Since then the story has been translated into 25 languages and been made into a television movie, narrated by Burl Ives, which has charmed audiences every year since 1964.

Mulled Wine Recipe

Making mulled wine couldn't be easier. Combine a bottle of red with some orange slices, spices, honey, and brandy, and let it simmer for 10 minutes. THAT'S IT. We like using a dry variety of wine like a merlot. But really, any kind that you like should work! If you don't like brandy, or don't want to buy a bottle, skip it

MAKES: 6 SERVINGS PREP TIME: 5 MINS TOTAL TIME: 15 MINS

INGREDIENTS

1 (750-ml.) bottle red wine
1 orange, sliced into rounds, plus more for garnish
6 whole cloves
3 cinnamon sticks, plus more for garnish
3 star anise
90 g honey
120 ml brandy



DIRECTIONS

- In a medium saucepan over medium heat, combine all ingredients. Bring to a simmer not a boil, then reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer gently over low heat for 10 minutes.
- Serve warm and garnish with more citrus slices and cinnamon sticks.



















I was born in Brighton and grew up in rural Sussex but in 1969 moved to Loughborough to join the then Brush Electrical Engineering Company as a student apprentice. I signed a 6 year contract during which time the company sponsored me on a sandwich course at Bradford University. One of my motivations to join Brush was their involvement in the rail industry but this had largely

ceased by the time I arrived. Luckily, by the time I graduated this side had picked up again and my first appointment was as an electronic design engineer in the Traction Division where I was fortunate to work on the iconic High Speed Train Project.

A life long railway enthusiast it was probably inevitable that I would eventually work for

BR and so in 1975 I joined them at the Railway Technical Centre in Derby. Despite being offered relocation expenses to move house I decided that I wanted to remain living in Loughborough. I held various roles in BR, finally as MD of a self standing design consultancy business. This was privatised in 1996, purchased by the WS Atkins consultancy as part of their rapidly developing railway engineering business. With both employers I was able to travel extensively around the world undertaking engineering consultancy work including several years as part of the



tri-national team approving the design of the original Eurostar trains and as a UK repre-

sentative on a number of EU committees developing the railway design standards that have now been adopted around the world.



I was fortunate to have the opportunity to retire early in 2008 and the following year, thanks to Phil Beaken, started bowling with the Brush Club. I have been Treasurer since Jan 2010.

Outside bowls, when time permits, I am heavily involved in the running of the Derby Railway Engineering Society and enjoy walking, gardening and travelling the world.
