Draft Parish Notes

Meeting of the Parish Council held at the Pavilion on Monday 20th June 2022 at 7.30pm. The meeting was attended by Cllrs S Harrod (Chair) W Fox (Vice-Chair), P Allen, G Bennet, D Harms and M Horsley. Apologies were received in advance from Cllr C Deacon, Cllr Caroline Newton (SODC) and Cllr Freddie Van Mierlo (OCC). Tim Darch (Clerk) was in attendance, along with 1 member of the public. No declarations of interest were received in matters on the agenda, given the council's decision not to comment on the planning application affecting The Bull public house.

The County Councillor's monthly report was received and reviewed, and is available on the Parish Council website. No report had been received from the District Councillor at the time of the meeting. No correspondence has been received in matters not otherwise covered on the agenda.

Planning applications

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered:

P22/S1395/HH (1 Colletts Cottages Thame Road Great Milton). As amended by drwgno SIP 001 A received on 27/05/22. This application is merely for a small amendment to access arrangements and will have no impact on neighbouring properties: as such the Parish Council will respond to SODC supporting the application and with a note to this effect.

P22/S1895/FUL (The Bull The Green Great Milton). Erection of a wooden serving bar in the garden of the public house. The Parish Council will not be commenting on this application, given the role of the Chair and Vice-Chair on the pub committee and the shareholder status of the majority of councillors. However, residents have been advised to submit their own views to SODC.

P22/S2023/LB (The Priory Church Road Great Milton OX44 7PB). Replacement of dormer window frame. Replacement of render finish with tile hanging. The position of the dormer window under consideration is such that it will impact no neighbouring properties: the Parish Council will respond to SODC supporting the application and with a note to this effect.

P22/S1778/FUL (Grooms Farm Thame Road Wheatley OX33 1JP). Erection of a 17m x 26m Cruyff Court Multi-Use Gaming Area (MUGA) with associated works. The location of the area under consideration for development is such that it will impact no neighbouring properties: the Parish Council will respond to SODC supporting the application and with a note to this effect.

P22/S1948/FUL (Milton Pools Fishery Milton Common Great Milton Oxon). Retention of building used ancillary to fishery (shop/store). The location of the area

under consideration for development is such that it will impact no neighbouring properties other than those owned and operated by the applicant: the Parish Council will respond to SODC supporting the application and with a note to this effect.

P22/S2129/LB (The Old Stores The Green Great Milton OX44 7NT). Removal of mid/late C19 sash windows with plate glass to be replaced with new sash windows with original details and heritage 8mm vacuum sealed glazing to the front facade.

Councillor Harms reviewed this application. Local consultation revealed no objections to the proposed development and as such the Parish Council agreed to support the application.

The following planning decisions received and outstanding planning matters were reviewed.

P22/S1189/HH (7 Thame Road Great Milton OX44 7HY). Replacement of existing single storey rear extension with single storey rear extension. (as amended by plans received 22 April 2022 illustrating first floor window). Permission GRANTED.

To note that the amended planning application for development at Le Manoir Aux Quat'Saisons is currently understood to be being considered at SODC's Planning Committee on Wed 29th June. Invitations to attend will be sent to those who have commented 5 working days before the meeting. You must have already made a comment in response to the planning application. All those who responded to the consultation will be sent a letter with more information about this before the meeting. If you did not respond to a consultation about a planning application on the agenda, you will not be able to speak to the committee.

If you want to speak, you must register with planning services by noon on the last working day before the meeting. Each category of speaker (parish council, objectors, supporters) is allowed a maximum of five minutes to address the committee. If several people register in a category, they have to share the time. The planning officer's recommendation is to grant permission for the development.

The minutes of May's Annual Meeting of the Parish Council, held on Monday 16th May 2022, were received, reviewed, agreed and signed as a true and accurate record of proceedings.

The monthly bank reconciliation, accounts and bank statement were received, reviewed and approved. The reconciled bank balance as at 13th June was £45,422.20.

The internal audit report and signed Internal Audit Certificate were received from Matthew Hale, Internal Auditor. The report raised no issues or items of concern and the Clerk was thanked for his contribution to a clean financial bill of health.

Annual Governance and Accountability Return Part 2 for the year ending 31st March 2022.

Section 1 (Annual Governance Statement) and subsequently Section 2 (Accounting Statements) were received and approved by the Parish Council, and the documents signed by the chairman of the meeting and the Parish Clerk/RFO as required.

The start of the Exercise of Public Rights period, during which the Parish Council's accounts can be freely examined, was announced. This period begins on Tuesday 21 June and concludes on Monday 1 August.

The 2022 revision of the Parish Council's Risk Management document was reviewed and approved.

Revised Councillors' Code of Conduct

The revised Code of Conduct as recommended by SODC's Monitoring Officer was reviewed and considered. After discussion it was AGREED to adopt the revised Code, and for Cllrs Harrod and Fox to submit revised Declarations of Interest given their shareholdings in and non-executive directorships of the Great Milton Community Pub Limited.

Dispensation Policy

The potential adoption of a dispensation policy (enabling councillors with a declarable interest to participate in the discussion of matters relating to those interests) was discussed. It was agreed that a dispensation policy was not necessary at the present time, and that such a policy would therefore not be adopted.

Employment Policies

A range of employment policies were considered for potential adoption, as follows:

- Equal Opportunities policy
- Pensions policy
- Sickness Absence policy
- Health and Safety policy
- Disciplinary and grievance procedure

Further discussion of this item was deferred until the July meeting to enable additional consideration by councillors.

Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

A number of cars were 'keyed' on Lower End overnight on 30/31 May. The advice from Thames Valley Police is to report any damage to them so that a crime reference number can be allocated, which if nothing else will be required for an insurance claim. Anyone with any evidence from security or dashboard cameras is advised to contact TVP as this could be crucial in finding the perpetrator.

COVID-19: update on village response/impacts

There are no significant issues to report other than those which are receiving national coverage.

20mph zone

Great Milton is in the first 'tranche' of areas to be covered by the 20mph scheme. The indicative timing is that the 70 areas in the first tranche will be completed by the end of 2022. Officers are working out the most efficient way of rolling out the scheme based on the geography of the 70 areas, meaning that the order is as yet unknown.

Village gateway features

Proposals from Oxfordshire County Council for 'gateway' features at Lower End, Church Road (close to Neighbours' Hall) and Thame Road as a speed reduction measure were discussed. After discussion it was AGREED to advise Oxfordshire County Council to proceed with initial design work.

Security in the village

Great Milton village is now an 'official' Neighbourhood Watch village, affiliated with the Oxfordshire South and Vale and national schemes. New signs will be erected around the village to create awareness. Please contact Rod Snowdon (details in The Bulletin) if you would like to sign up for the Neighbourhood Watch scheme and/or WhatsApp group and to receive a window sticker.

New Bus Service

The new daily, hourly bus service linking Le Manoir and Great Milton village with Wheatley, Horspath, Cowley, Florence Park and Oxford begins on Monday 20th June 2022. Residents are urged to support the service to help to secure its long-term future. The Parish Council once again wishes to thank Belmond/LMQS and the Oxford Bus Company for ensuring the restoration of regular public transport provision to Great Milton.

Vacancy for Clerk/RFO

The Rector's Pint

There was a certain comic element - at least to me – in early June, when I attended three jubilee lunches, all happening at the same time! On the day, we had also accepted an invitation to a celebration tea that afternoon, so I was given strict instructions by Cath not to eat anything before then! It was a form of mild torture, but I managed to arrive at the tea intact, and it was well worth the wait! It was also a delight to see people coming together in such a joyful manner.

Times of celebration are so important, and there will be a significant marker in my own life on July 5th, as thirty years ago, on that date, I was ordained as a deacon, in Gloucester Cathedral. The following year I was ordained as a priest, but it is the ordination as deacon that stands out for me. In the Church of England, as well as in the Catholic Church (the Church of England was once Roman Catholic!) all those who become priests are first ordained as deacons. It is a serving role, and a reminder that

whatever comes afterwards, that calling never stops. The best advice I was ever given about the role was 'never stop moving chairs'.

Much has happened in the Church over those thirty years. Most significantly, when I was ordained, women could not become priests. That happened the following year and then it took another twenty-one years until the first woman, Libby Lane was consecrated as bishop in 2015. Personally, I found it hard to comprehend why it took so long.

I first served as a curate in Cheltenham, and then as a vicar in Cinderford in the Forest of Dean before moving in 2002 to Hughenden in Buckinghamshire where I was vicar until moving here in 2015. I have acted as a vocations advisor and have had two spells as an Area Dean. For me though, the thing that has remained constant is parish ministry, in all its variety.

There have been plenty of challenges, and there have been some particularly difficult and dark times, but there also remains much to celebrate, and I am still here! My faith has had its ups and downs, but I remain convinced of the central realities of what I try to proclaim every week, of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, and the grace, mercy, justice, hope, and love of God we see fully revealed in him. There is so much more I could say, but space does not permit, so I'm including a prayer for all those who are at the start of their journey with the Church. This is the ordination collect that will be said by the bishops across the land in ordination services at the beginning of July:

God our Father, Lord of all the world, through your Son, you have called us into the fellowship of your universal Church:
hear our prayer for your faithful people that in their vocation and ministry each may be an instrument of your love, and give to your servants now to be ordained the needful gifts of grace; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Amen.

Thank You for Your Support

View from Views

Still very few swallows and swifts but we do hear at least 2 cuckoos on or around the river, plus suspected reed warblers whose nest will be invaded by said cuckoos. Heartened recently to have witnessed yellow-hammers in different parts of the farm. A jay has been a frequent visitor to our bird feeders just for a few



days, a beautiful bird but very aggressive and killer for little birds. Only with us for those few days and has since taken him/herself off as quickly as it appeared. It would be interesting what attracted it in the first place and why he /her suddenly was not here anymore; that's wildlife for you.

The very welcome rain, as far as we are concerned, may well have saved our crops from dying from drought and even, with a bit of luck, fill the grain. How they survived so long is a mystery that I can only explain by the fact that, as it has been dry since crops started to grow, the roots have followed the moisture down, As the ground was so damp in the winter/spring in spite of the fact that, on the whole, it was not a wet winter, I can only assume they were able to get enough to survive. What is noticeable, not just on our farm, is that most crops are showing longer ears than normal, something I cannot explain. Good news, as 2 extra grains per head amounts to something like 7% increase in yield, which could equate to .25 tonne to the acre. Don't ask me how I arrived at that figure!

So far my worry about pigeon damage on the lupins seems to have been unfounded, in spite of the fact that, from the middle of May they had done practically no damage and, at the time of writing, they are not in the hoards that normally attack the Rape, so fingers crossed. The big concern over the whole crop is that, due to very dry conditions since they were planted, the germination has, at a guess, only been about 56-69%, How this will affect the outcome remains to be seen; we can only hope that each plant will yield that bit more by not having so much competition.

The Government have just announced that they are going to encourage more productivity from farmland, as if that was not our aim anyway. There is no mention of the other developments that are taking up good land and do not mention the other pressures on our precious land; development of all different shapes and sizes, solar farms, tree planting, etc. With the new support scheme for farmers, which is to encourage us to produce for the public goods without a caveat that rates will be commensurate with the current market trends. These rates I doubt will encourage uptake, with the wheat and fertilizer at the current prices, government support will have to be double the rate talked about at the moment, for us to be interested.

On the other hand, we now learn that the vertical farming, a term we have become accustomed to as a new technology, has been adapted to grow cereals; a project that suggests a 4 acre building would be capable of producing roughly the same tonnage as 1,000 acres. This will allow for even more houses to be built on our Green and Pleasant land. The wheels of progress never seem to stand still; also recently developed is a solar powered robot with the ability not only to sow seeds with such precision that it can then hoe, not only between the plants, but also over the plant pre emergence, followed by down the row throughout the growing season. With the capacity to cover 40-50 acres a year, this means that all you have to do is to fill the seed hopper with seed and the robot/machine will then look after the crop until harvest. At the moment this is only applicable to vegetable crops.

Just to comment on points made by our County & District Councillor Freddie Van Meirlo, states that the CC wish to plant 2 trees to every one removed from CC land. If these are planted on farmland will they actually sequester more carbon than the land is already? He also mentions that if we are concerned about the noise level created by motor bikes we must write to our MP, as this is a growing problem. Caroline Newton our District Councillor also makes some good points and gives me confidence in the Council, and that she shares our concerns over Chalgrove Airfield, I was horrified to note she says some buildings were to be 6 stories high. Of course also she is right to question solar panels on good agricultural land. As she says in this area something like 800 acres (3,500 tonnes wheat) of land is up for planning. These panels should be on roofs and we should be insisting that all new builds should have these, and more encouragement to owners to retrofit.

Point of information for residents of Gt Milton regarding the cutting of the Manor meadow; May is not the time for the control of ragwort as it will have hardly started to grow by then, a point I missed at said meeting as I could not hear clearly what the Belmond representative said. The worrying point is that I am sure this would not be the wishes of M. Blanc, as he has always had thoughts for our village. This puts into question their environmental credentials for the future and this is what is worrying most of us.

Great Milton Athletics Club (GMAC)

Oxfordshire Athletics Association Track & Field Championships 2022

These championships took place over two days in May and, whilst they are normally held annually, due to the Pandemic the last Championships were held in 2019. Therefore, it was a new and somewhat nervous experience for the young GMAC athletes who participated. Collectively the children entered 28 events between them, obtained 22 personal bests, broke 5 club records, and won 9 medals, four of them gold. A gold medal means the winner is an Oxfordshire County Champion.



The medal winners are all current or former Great Milton Primary School pupils. Fleur Wilson is the county champion for Under 13 girls in hurdles, and William

Kirkman is the Under 13 boys high-jump county champion with his 1.25m jump. (U13s are school years 6 and 7). Fleur also won silver medals in the 200m and long jump (3.80m), and bronze in javelin (15.53m). Two other U13 medals were won by Grace Mosely and Leo Adiri, both in hurdles. In the U15 girls (years 8 and 9), Gracie Wilson won gold in javelin (16.44m) and shot (7.86m). Other children may have just been pipped for the medals, but still impressed with their own personal bests. These were recorded by Dora Twycross (100m and long jump), George Mosely (100m, 200m, hurdles and high jump) and Rufus Blanche (long jump and 1500m). It was a great pleasure to see so many local children competing in GMAC colours, and a real thrill to share their successes and achievements.

Leading up to the county championships, the club attended events at Bracknell, Winchester, Horspath, Abingdon and Little Marlow. At some of these meetings the younger children have been able to participate in Quadkids events. These events consist of a 75m sprint, the long jump, a vortex howler throw and a 600m run. Congratulations go to Livi Wilson in Year 4 and to Charlie Brown and Abby Kirkman in Year 5 for their performances. A call out goes to Abby who picked up a bronze medal at the Abingdon meet. In the U17 category, Paris Jane has set club records in the 100m and 200m sprints, and U15 Kitty Barulis has achieved personal bests in 100m, long jump and the 800m.

Many of these athletes have also competed in other athletics events for their schools, and produced successful performances. Our congratulations go to Gracie Wilson who has been asked to represent Oxfordshire Schools in the Midlands Pentathlon Championships in June.

GMAC was founded in 2012 specifically to cater for local children, and currently

John Howell MP writes...

When I wrote last month we were anticipating the Jubilee Weekend and the celebrations that were planned. Whilst the weather wasn't quite what we might have hoped, from what I hear celebrations around the constituency went well. The national celebrations were certainly a credit to all of the planning, and it was lovely to see the Her Majesty the Queen at her public appearances. I think tea with Paddington Bear was one of the favourite events and shows that even in her 90th decade Her Majesty still has a great sense of humour. The Jubilee weekend was a great opportunity for community events and a chance to get together after so much separation in recent times.

Sometimes it good to do something different and in May I did something else that I have not done before - I joined thousands of other people across the country in the Big Plastic Count. It was an interesting exercise where you have to

count the single use plastic you throw away over a 7-day period. Some of the time I was at home at others I was in the office or away. Overall I was quite shocked at just how much single-use plastic I get through in the different settings. The office is pretty good with glass replacing plastic water bottles and corn-starch wrapping use for many documents that are sent to me. But I was quite taken aback at just how much single use plastic there still for food products. Clearly some of this is avoidable and the exercise certainly raised the profile of the need for us to cut back further. The Government Resources and Waste Strategy set out plans to reduce, reuse and recycle and was a step in the right direction. A promising start on which we are now building.

For some people the half term break was an opportunity to get away and I know that many people have been caught up in the backlog of passport applications. During the pandemic, around five million people delayed applying for or renewing their passports which has led to huge demand now that international travel has opened up. My team has been helping as best we are able and where the need to travel cannot have been anticipated, or where the delay in an application being processed has been longer than the advertised time, we have been able to assist some people. The Home Office has been doing all that it can to increase output and it does seem that the situation is beginning to ease. Staff have been working 7 days a week and additional staff have been recruited. I understand that between January and March 2022, over 90 per cent of cases were completed within six weeks. However it you are planning to travel and need to apply for or renew a passport please do so as soon as possible and do not rely on being able to get a fast-track appointment as these are like gold dust. The official guidance is still to allow up to 10 weeks to get a passport. There is little that my team can do with late applications.

Another thing to watch out for are the new barcoded postage stamps. Royal Mail has introduced these new stamps as part of their drive to improve operational efficiencies and security. If you have bought stamps recently you may have noticed the change with the addition of a barcode alongside the image of the Queen's head. If you have a stock of stamps you can still use them until the end of January 2023. If you cannot use your stock before the you can swap then for new ones. Full details are available on the Royal Mail website under the heading 'Reinventing stamps for the next generations.' The change only applies to the regular stamps with the profile of the Queen's head on and not the special stamps such as Christmas

stamps.

In any month a wide range of issues are raised with me from things in the general media to specialist issues. With the help of my team I do my best to respond to all polite correspondence but sometimes it may take a while, especially is an issue needs research.
