Something Citrus This Way Comes Lemon Posset with Shortbread

It's National Shakespeare Day on 23rd April (also St George's Day in case you're wondering). We've scoured Shakespeare's works for Elizabethan inspiration for April's recipe and we think you'll enjoy this light dessert: the perfect accompaniment to your Easter feast.

Posset is mentioned four times in Shakespeare's works. Perhaps you can take inspiration from this invitation from Page in the Merry Wives of Windsor..."Yet be cheerful knight: thou shalt eat a posset to-night at my house..." Act V Scene 5

Ingredients: (serves 6, with extra biscuits for a rainy day)

600 ml double cream 140 g caster sugar

2 large lemons, juice and grated zest

1 large lemon, pared zest only

150g plain flour, plus extra for dusting

100g butter, chilled and cubed

50g caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling



The Posset:

- 1. Put the double cream in a large pan with the sugar. Bring slowly to the boil and simmer for 3 minutes. Take it off the heat, add the lemon iuice and zest and whisk well.
- 2. Pour into 6 ramekins and refrigerate for 2-3 hours. Sprinkle with the pared lemon zest before serving with shortbread.

The Shortbread:

- 1. Heat the oven 170C/150C fan/gas 3. Put the flour, butter and sugar into a mixing bowl. Use your hands to combine the ingredients until the mixture looks like breadcrumbs, then squeeze until it comes together as a dough.
- 2. On a lightly floured surface, use a rolling pin to roll out the dough to ½ cm thick. Cut the dough into fingers and place on a lined baking tray. Use a fork to create imprints, then sprinkle with the remaining caster sugar.
- 3. Chill the dough in the fridge for 20 mins, then bake for 15-20 mins until golden brown. Remove the shortbread fingers from the oven and leave to cool on the tray for 10 mins.

Etymological Chronicles

It's World Heritage Day on 18th April, so for this month's word lore ramblings we're exploring the origin of the village's appellation. The earliest record of the village name is in 1086, in the Doomsday Book, where it is called Stantone or Stone Town - "farmstead by the stones".

The stone part of the village's name is almost definitely from the standing stones nearby: The Devil's Quoits. These stones were once part of a Neolithic henge which, in the early Bronze Age, became a religious centre of importance. Over time the significance and importance of the stones changed, and until relatively recently there was hardly any trace of them at all. The Devil's Quoits were restored between 2002 and 2008.

How did the stones get here? There are rumours that the Devil hurled the stones from Wytham Hill, or maybe Beacon Hill during a game of quoits. What do you think...?

So, why isn't the village just called Stanton?

In 1066 the village belonged to Aethelnod of Kent, a pro-Harold figure during the Battle of Hastings. The lands were confiscated from him following William the Conqueror's success and given to William's half-brother, Bishop Odo of Bayeux.

In the late 12th Century, Queen Adeliza gifted the manor of Stantone to a relative, and that relative's daughter married Robert de Harcourt (Sheriff of Leicester and Warwickshire), and the manor in Stantone was part of

We could go into more detail about the origins of the Harcourt family, but that would take us back to Rollo the Viking in 876...

Around 1268-1281 the village became known as Stantone Harecurt. The name gradually evolved into Stauntone Harecurt (1285) then Stawnton Harcourt (1519), and eventually became Stanton Harcourt. Members of the Harcourt family still live at the manor today, although quite a lot has changed since the 12th Century!

If you don't know much about the beautiful place we live in we encourage you to pop your investigative hats on and explore the fascinating stories the village has to tell. Take your pick of era - you're bound to be treated to a host of historical happenings.
