Here's what the RHS says about garden jobs in December:

Top 10 jobs in December

- 1 Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place
- 2 Check that greenhouse heaters are working
- 3 Insulate outdoor taps and prevent ponds from freezing
- 4 Prune open-grown apples and pears (but not those trained against walls)
- 5 Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- 6 Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining root crops
- 7 Deciduous trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted

- 8 Take hardwood cuttings
- 9 Keep mice away from stored produce
- 10 Reduce watering of houseplants

Top 10 jobs in January

- 1 Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2 Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring
- 3 Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4 Disperse worm casts in lawns
- 5 Inspect stored tubers of *Dahlia*, *Begonia* and *Canna* for rots or drying out
- 6 Prune apple and pear trees
- 7 Start forcing rhubarb
- 8 Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 9 Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 10 Make a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect against peach leaf curl

I have my own personal list for December and January (February & March too for that matter).

- 1: Look out the window
- 2: If it's sunny go out and do something
- 3: If it's snowing – go back to bed, hide under the covers, and don't come out until it's all gone away!



NOTES FROM LAST MEETING

Incident in Hackwood Lane
with damage to cars and windows. PC Reid confirmed a catapult was fired from a moving vehicle. Similar incidents were reported from North Warnborough and Greywell then onwards to Cliddesden (10pm - 2am).

Pond and drainage

The cost of clearing the pond – including manpower, machinery, road safety etc, and disposing of the silt – has been estimated at £22 to £25K which rather exceeds the Parish Council reserves.

A comprehensive drainage / flooding report (see Parish Council website) has been compiled by Simon Barker and submitted to HCC via our County Councillor.

- Trimming back trees around the pond and above the bus shelter
- cleaning road signs and clearing them of overhanging vegetation
- clearing the soakaway in Hackwood Lane.

Simon Barker has taken over the role of Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator from Tony Trown. Tony has been co-ordinator for many years and thanks go to him for his sterling service.

Dogs A complaint received – dog owners in some instances not picking up after their dogs, and dogs on occasion being walked in the Village off leads. Noting that S27 Road Traffic Act 1998 says: 'A person who causes or permits a dog to be on a designated road without that dog being held on a lead is guilty of an offence.'

Rear garden – clip annual growth all round of one Yew. Fell saplings on north east wall by office window; coppice Hazel by front (east) corner of house.

T/00382/19/TCA (granted 4 Oct) 12 Southlea. T1 Lime: crown lift to 6m above ground level. Shorten back lower branches on north east side of tree which overhangs garden to suitable live secondary growth to reshape lower canopy. Lightly thin crown density by approximately 15% and remove deadwood.

ENHANCING ROAD VERGES FOR NATURE

New national guidelines (27th September 2019) from Natural England, PlantLife, and Highways England describe how best to manage roadside verges, ideally cutting just twice a year, to encourage wild flowers and the wildlife they support to thrive.

The reduction in mowing would increase the number of wild flowers and replenish the seed bank, produce a cost saving for councils, and provide pollinator habitat equal to the size of London, Birmingham, Manchester, Cardiff and Edinburgh combined.

'A great multi-tasker, nature on the road verge cleans the air, stores carbon, pollinates crops and provides sustainable drainage.'

The report found that, with 97% of wildflower meadows lost in less than a century, grassland road verges have become a crucial wildlife habitat for more than 700 species of wild flowers – nearly 45% of our total flora.

Dear Residents

I begin this month with an appeal for any information in relation to a garage being broken into in Church Lane, Ellisfield between October 23rd and 30th. Thankfully that has been the only recorded crime within Ellisfield. Unfortunately your parish of Cliddesden did not fare so well with several reports of both vehicle and household windows being damaged after projectiles were fired at them from the road in Hackwood Lane. I understand this was between 10 pm on November 1st and 2am on November 2nd.

This has been a major problem across the area from North Warnborough, Upton Grey, Crondell, Tunworth all reporting similar incidents. I ask if anyone has any CCTV to please review it for this period and in the event of anything being seen please give me a call direct.

As Christmas approaches may I please remind residents to leave lights and radios etc. on when not at home. Consider using sensor lighting and alarms to protect your home and property.

May I take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy and crime free Christmas and New Year, also special wishes to my Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators. I encourage all residents to sign up, they do a fantastic job.

Cliddesden Primary School

The first half term of the school year has gone by in the blink of an eye. We have returned to a jam-packed schedule of learning, trips, sporting events, not to mention Christmas!

Chestnut Class visited Butser Hill Ancient Farm as part of their 'Digging in the Past' topic. They had a fantastic day learning about the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age. They learnt that there were three parts to the Stone Age - Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic. At the farm they were lucky enough to experience what it would have been like to

live as a Stone Age and Iron Age child. They sat in replica Stone Age and Iron Age houses and noticed how their shape changed through time, from rectangular to circular.

They took part in four different activities. They became archaeologists and dug up artefacts; made cordage bracelets; became a farmer and made a wattle fence and used clay to make Stone Age and Iron Age clay pots.

The trip was very hands on and the children had lots of fun learning new facts and experiencing life in Pre-historic Britain.



Some of our Year 2 pupils took part in a Basingstoke Schools skipping competition at Costello School. The children did individual speed skipping, freestyle and long rope. The competition was tough and we came 9th overall.

We braved the soggy weather to take part in our first inter-house competition of the year- dodgeball!



All of the children showed the skills they have learnt in PE this half term, with excellent evasion and aiming from all the teams.

As always the children also showed our sporting values, with their determination and

resilience shinning through.


STROKE IDENTIFICATION

During a BBQ, a woman stumbled and took a little fall – she assured everyone that she was fine (they offered to call paramedics) ... she said she had just tripped over a brick because of her new shoes.

They got her cleaned up and got her a new plate of food. While she appeared a bit shaken up, Jane went about enjoying herself the rest of the evening.

Jane's husband called later telling everyone that his wife had been taken to the hospital. At 6pm Jane passed away. She had suffered a stroke at the BBQ. Had they known how to identify the signs of a stroke, perhaps Jane would be with us today.

Some don't die. They end up in a helpless, hopeless condition instead.



A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within three hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke... totally. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed, and then getting the patient medically cared for within three hours, which is tough.

RECOGNISING A STROKE

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognise the symptoms of a stroke.

Doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- S** *Ask the individual to SMILE.
- T** *Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE COHERENTLY (ie 'Chicken Soup')
- R** *Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call 999 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

NEW SIGN OF A STROKE 'O'

Another 'sign' of a stroke is this: Ask the person to 'Stick' **O**ut his or her tongue. If the tongue is 'crooked', if it goes to one side or the other, that is also an indication of a stroke.

So... for every 10 people who see this, maybe at least one life will be saved.
