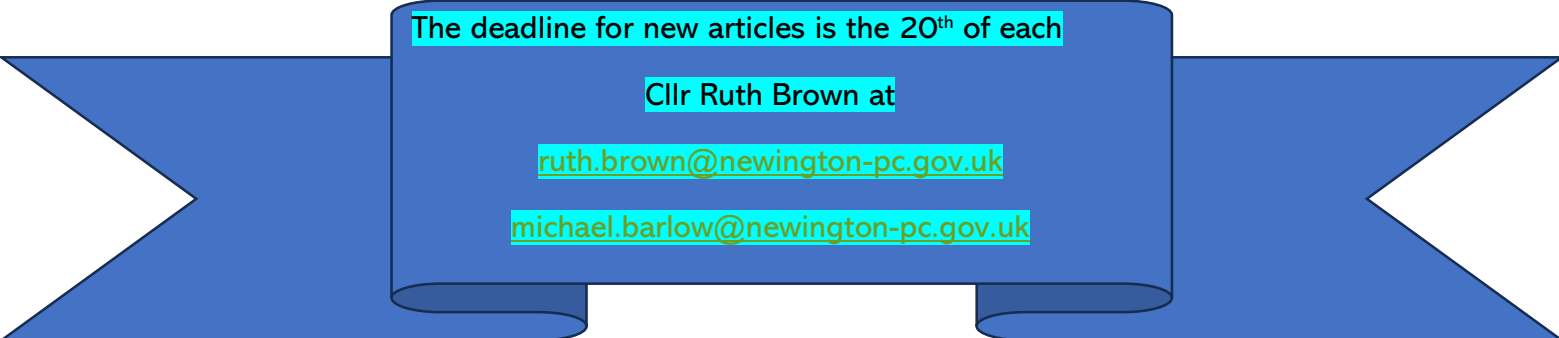

We are aware that some affected residents have had notices posted through their letterboxes. The message received from Fernham Homes states:

“Following consultations with KCC Highways in respect of road improvement works at Church Lane, Hasted Road and Denham Road at Newington in Kent, please find enclosed the proposals for new Double Yellow Line parking restrictions. The works are proposed to commence this Summer and complete by the end of this year (2026).”

We don't think anyone in Swale should have to face going hungry. That's why we provide three days' nutritionally balanced emergency food and support to local people who are referred to us in crisis. We are part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK.

Locations

Here are the opening times and locations for our foodbank centres.

Everyone who comes to the foodbank for emergency food needs to have a valid foodbank voucher.

They can help address your crises and provide support to maximise your income, help you navigate the benefits system, and identify any additional grants you could be entitled to. If needed, they'll issue you with a voucher so you can get an emergency food parcel from your local food bank.

We have 4 centres currently open – each centre runs at a different time and a different location.

Newington History Group

Defending the Swale: The history group's public talk in the Village Hall on Thursday, July 23 (7.30pm) looks at how the north Kent coast around the Swale and estuary marshes has been protected across the centuries by defences on the land, at sea and in the air.

Adam Taylor returns to share his extensive local knowledge and visitors are very welcome, £4 at the door (members free) including free light refreshments. Free parking at the hall or opp. in Callaways Lane.

Free for all: There's no talk in August but on Sunday, September 6 (3pm) in the Village Hall there's a free public event, *An Introduction to Newington's History and Heritage*.

A guide and exploration of how the village developed and continues to expand historically, the afternoon will be of particular interest to people who've moved to Newington in recent years.

But whether you've lived here for 12 months or 12 years, you're sure to come away saying 'I never knew that!'. And it's free, so note the date: Sunday, September 6 at 3pm.

The group meets monthly (except Jan. and Aug) at 7.30pm on the fourth Thursday. Membership is available for £18pa.

What Is the UK Digital Landline Switchover?

The UK digital landline switchover is the nationwide retirement of the Public Switched Telephone Network (PSTN). Every traditional copper landline must be replaced with a digital home phone or other landline replacement that runs over broadband by January 2027.

In practical terms, this is an analogue landline replacement programme across the UK. If you currently rely on a traditional home line, you will move to a digital telephone UK service before the deadline.

When Do I Need to Replace My Landline in the UK?

You should plan to replace your landline before January 2027, but your exact migration date depends on your provider and region. Some homes will be moved earlier in staged rollout waves.

The best approach is to plan early, confirm your provider timeline, and choose a digital home phone setup that fits your household before last-minute changes reduce your options.

Is the UK Digital Landline Switchover Mandatory?

Yes. The PSTN shutdown is a national infrastructure change, so keeping a traditional copper line in its current form is not an option after the switchover period.

What is optional is the provider and setup you choose. You can select the digital voice telephone service that best matches your needs for reliability, support and scam protection. See our [digital landline service](#) and [compare providers](#).

What Is a Digital Home Phone and How Is It Different From a Landline?

A digital home phone is a landline replacement that uses your internet connection instead of copper telephone wires. A traditional landline uses the PSTN: physical copper lines connected to a local exchange. A digital home phone uses Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP); your voice is converted into data and transmitted over broadband.

In practice, most homes will: plug their existing handset into the broadband router; use a small adapter that connects the handset to the router; or use a digital IP or WiFi handset. Your number usually stays the same. For a deeper explanation: [digital home phone explained](#).

The PSTN Switch-Off Checklist

The UK's landline network is being switched off. Don't wait to be contacted. Here's what to do now, in plain English.

- ☐ **STEP 01 Don't wait. Start planning now**
Your provider should write to you before your line is switched, but letters can come late, get missed, or not arrive at all. We've heard from people whose lines stopped working with no warning. Acting early gives you choice and avoids the rush.
- ☐ **STEP 02 Ask your provider when your area is scheduled**
The switch-off is rolling out area by area across the UK. Call your provider and ask directly. Don't wait for a letter. Knowing your date helps you sort everything else in good time.
- ☐ **STEP 03 Check if your home phone will still work**
Most older corded phones that plug directly into the wall socket will not work on the new digital network without an adapter. Check with your provider. Many will supply one free of charge, or replace your handset.
- ☐ **STEP 04 Check any personal or medical alarm**
If you or someone in your home uses a telecare device, such as a lifeline pendant alarm, fall detector, or emergency call button, contact the alarm provider before anything changes. These devices often rely on the phone line and may need replacing or reconfiguring.
- ☐ **STEP 05 Check your home burglar alarm**
Many home alarm systems use the phone line to contact a monitoring centre if they're triggered. Contact your alarm company to ask if your system is switch-off ready.
- ☐ **STEP 06 Know what happens if the power or internet goes down**
Unlike a traditional landline, your new digital phone needs your broadband router switched on and working. If the power goes out or your internet drops, it won't work. **The Phonely app** means you can still make and receive calls from your mobile using mobile data, so you're never left without a phone.
- ☐ **STEP 07 Ask your broadband provider about emergency call backup**
Your broadband provider is required by Ofcom to offer you a way to call 999 during a power cut, usually a battery backup unit for your router, free of charge if you rely on your landline and don't have another device, such as a mobile phone. Contact them directly to find out more about battery backups.
- ☐ **STEP 08 Write down your key phone numbers today**
In case of any disruption during the switch, keep a few important numbers written down somewhere easy to find: your doctor's surgery, a family member, and your provider's customer service number.
- ☐ **STEP 09 Ask for help, sooner rather than later**
You don't have to figure this out alone. Your provider must offer assisted migration support, and charities like Age UK can help. The earlier you ask, the more time there is to get it right.

Updates from Citizens Advice North East Kent **June 2026**

Are you claiming the benefits you're entitled to?

To get started, you can use an online benefits calculator. For the most accurate answer, you'll need information about your savings, income, pension, childcare payments and any existing benefits for you and your partner, if you have one. The Turn2us online tool can provide a quick idea of what benefits and other financial help you might be eligible for.

You may be able to claim Universal Credit if you're over 18 and under State Pension age, and if you have less than £16,000 in savings or other investments.

If you're finding it difficult to work because of a health condition, you might get more Universal Credit or not have to look for work. You'll need to inform the Department for Work and Pensions that you have a health condition when you claim Universal Credit and, if possible, submit a fit note. You may also be entitled to the new-style Employment and Support Allowance (ESA).

You might be entitled to other benefits depending on your situation, for example if you're disabled or if you have a child. Some people are able to claim more than one benefit - for example, disability benefits such as Personal Independence Payment (if you're under pension age) or Attendance Allowance (if you're over pension age) and Universal Credit. These disability benefits aren't means-tested.

If you pay council tax, you might be able to get a reduction in your bill.

There is also help available if you don't have enough money to live on. You might be able to get extra money from the government, your local council or a charity.

If you're still not sure, or you'd like further information about any of the above, our advisers can help to check what benefits and financial support you might be entitled to, and help you find a way forward.

Updates from Citizens Advice North East Kent June 2026

Are you claiming the benefits you’re entitled to?

To get started, you can use an online benefits calculator. For the most accurate answer, you’ll need information about your savings, income, pension, childcare payments and any existing benefits for you and your partner, if you have one. The Turn2us online tool can provide a quick idea of what benefits and other financial help you might be eligible for.

You may be able to claim Universal Credit if you’re over 18 and under State Pension age, and if you have less than £16,000 in savings or other investments.

If you’re finding it difficult to work because of a health condition, you might get more Universal Credit or not have to look for work. You’ll need to inform the Department for Work and Pensions that you have a health condition when you claim Universal Credit and, if possible, submit a fit note. You may also be entitled to the new-style Employment and Support Allowance (ESA).

You might be entitled to other benefits depending on your situation, for example if you’re disabled or if you have a child. Some people are able to claim more than one benefit - for example, disability benefits such as Personal Independence Payment (if you’re under pension age) or Attendance Allowance (if you’re over pension age) and Universal Credit. These disability benefits aren’t means-tested.

If you pay council tax, you might be able to get a reduction in your bill.

There is also help available if you don’t have enough money to live on. You might be able to get extra money from the government, your local council or a charity.

If you’re still not sure, or you’d like further information about any of the above, our advisers can help to check what benefits and financial support you might be entitled to, and help you find a way forward.
