POSSIBLE INCREASE IN COUNCIL TAX

You may or may not already be aware that your Parish Council receives money to spend in the Parish in two ways :-

- 1. **THE PRECEPT** This amount appears on your Council Tax statement as a separate item and is currently about £6.50 per annum per dwelling at Band D level. It is used for such Administration items i.e. Insurance, Clerk's Salary, Audits etc.
- 2. **CONCURRENT FUNCTIONS MONIES** A sum of money that is calculated on a pre-determined formula by the Borough Council . This money is used to support village functions and activities. Currently the Parish receives about £4000 per annum in concurrent function monies from Maidstone.

The Borough Council are proposing that the Concurrent Function monies be scrapped over a 3 year period. If you want to see the same level of support in the village as you now receive the Parish Council will have to raise the current Precept to four times the current amount which will mean a Council Tax increase bringing the amount to around £24.00 per annum at Band D.

What is unfair about this is that if you live within the town of Maidstone you do not pay the extra amount of Precept. This is why your Parish Council has probably the Borough lowest Precept .We are thrifty for your benefit in the If the Parish Council has to increase the Precept because of a loss of Concurrent Functions monies this is a further Council Tax increase but it does not apply to the dwellers of Maidstone. This is not fair on the rural community.

As a result we need your support to help your Parish Council appeal to Maidstone to re-think its actions

NEWS FROM ULCOMBE'S VILLAGE SCHOOL

TOP OF THE CLASS—ULCOMBE IN TOP 20% OF THE COUNTRY!

It is official—Ulcombe is in the top 20% of schools in the country! Unfortunately it takes a little explaining so please bear with me.

As you may know, there are various ways in which schools are measured, including league tables for SATs results among other things. In schools we have a measure called Contextual Value Added (CVA) scores. This uses the children's assessments at the end of Year 2 and the end of Year 6, and then takes into account levels of deprivation where the children live and more. Taking all of this into account a score is generated, with 100 being the 'average'.

For our school, based on last year's Year 6 children, progress made by children at this school was 101.2 overall. This may not seem far above 100, but the margins are fine. It does actually show that the progress made by children here was in the top 20% of the whole country.

We are incredibly proud to be able to show that our school is helping children move forwards, and that children make greater than expected progress through the school. This, of course, does not mean that we will rest on our laurels. We will take this information, along with everything else we know about our school and strive for each and every child to make excellent progress during their time with us.

Fantastic Footballers Hit Leeds for Six Report by Bradley

Before the match we were waiting for Leeds and Broomfield to arrive. We were all nervous, not knowing whether we were going to win or not. It was the first time we had all properly played together for Ulcombe School.

We started well and played good football. By half-time we had managed to score four goals thanks to Milly and Ethan who had both scored twice.

Then we came to the second half, and straight away scored another goal, but Mr Hampton disallowed it. Soon after, Bob hit the ball, which was going wide, but their defender scored an own goal. Library Project Update

Our Library project is still moving forward, if still slowly. The latest news is that Maidstone Borough Council have refused planning permission for the development proposed by Bailey Partnerships. This was outline planning permission for a small development of houses on the plot of land to the north of the school site, which is no longer used. Baileys are hopeful that they and KCC can enter discussions with MBC to make sure taxpayers money is not wasted submitting applications which planners already know would be refused.

We are still waiting to hear the outcome of the planning application submitted to Kent County Council by Baileys for our library and improved office areas. The library is the most important part of our project, and we will do our very best to bring this to fruition. We would be disappointed if the decision of MBC's planners had so great an impact on the sale value of the land that we could not also complete improvements to the office areas. This, though, is somewhat out of our hands and only time will tell.

Jenny Whittle - News from County Hall



Better rail services for the borough of Maidstone Kent County Council recently held a second Rail Summit which brought together more than 80 people representing rail user groups, parishes and councillors to put forward their concerns about rail links between the county and the capital. In particular, there was an impassioned plea to South Eastern for restoration

of services on the Maidstone East line to the City, which affects thousands of Kent commuters. Following the summit, KCC will produce a rail action plan by mid December. It will then be shared with passengers until the end of March, with a view to agreeing it by the third rail summit planned for next April.

I strongly believe that investment in transport infrastructure is fundamental to lifting the country out of recession and I want to see Kent lead the way. I have floated the idea of undertaking a quick feasibility study into dualling the railway track between Maidstone East and Bromley South, to enable fast rail services between these points which would lead to a significant reduction in journey times. I am advised that this could cost some £1m per kilometre - less than £50m to radically transform journey times for Maidstone's hard pressed commuters. £50m is of course a significant sum of cash - but in relation to large scale transport schemes, is relatively small (the Leeds Langley bypass would cost a similar sum). We are living in difficult financial times, but we mustn't lose sight of the need to bring our transport system up to 21st century standards. I wince every time somebody tells me that services from Maidstone were faster in the age of steam!

I will be pressing my view at the next rail summit. In the meantime, possible changes being considered for the action plan include investigating with Network Rail the feasibility of extending high-speed services from Ebbsfleet to **Maidstone West,** investigating the feasibility of introducing a through service between **Gatwick** and Kent after 2015 and including **Maidstone East** as the principal Kent terminus for Thameslink services from 2016. Liverton Hill speed reduction update

I am pushing for the statutory Traffic Regulation Order and consultation with the public on the proposed reduction on the speed limit on part of Liverton Hill from 60mph to 30mph to be undertaken as soon as possible. As this is being funded from my Member Highway Fund, it is in a backlog with a number of other applications that have been submitted by my 83 colleagues. Please be patient as this will be done, although not as quickly as I would like!

Update on Lenham Valley Business Association

The first meeting of The Lenham Valley Business Association was held on Tuesday 21 April 2009, support was strong, but despite this it took three months to start to build a membership. People have been slow to forget the past attempts to develop a business group in the area. Even today we still hear, too often, that the 'new' association 'won't last' and there is 'no point in joining'. Thankfully there are plenty of businesses that have realised that the LVBA is bringing benefits to members and that it isn't going to go away.

The **website** was constructed and uploaded at the end of July last year and immediately reached over 1,000 hits in its' first month. The site has been set up to assist the area, not just from a business point of view but also with other content and news. Members have up to 5 mentions on the site, one alphabetically and up to 4 under classifications, their own if necessary. Benefits of membership are important when it comes to recruiting new members. Online forms for joining and applying to attend a meeting for the first time both help the organisers to maintain accurate records. Members can offer one another special deals and discounts as well as sell unwanted items for free. There are pages providing details of local vacancies to promote to the general public too and regular poster/handouts can be downloaded and printed out to make sure members are given every opportunity to boost membership of their association.

Public relations has always featured high on the agenda to inform people in Kent about LVBA. Lenham Focus have been great supporters of the association even three months before it started. Kent Messenger, Wealden Ad, The Harrietsham Fish, Malherbe Monthly and Kent Business have all run regular information for LVBA. More recently we have been able to secure mentions within features on Lenham run by Downs Mail and Verve Magazine.

The first annual **Business Directory** scheduled for April/May was finally delivered in June. Delayed by a sudden influx of members the 40 page directory increased to 64 with content aimed at making the full colour A5 something worth keeping close by for home and business owners. Again, as on the website, members have the chance of up to 5 mentions within the pages of the directory as well as the chance to take an ad, without which the directory would not be financially viable.

Stickers now promote existing members so everyone can see just how many LVBA members there are. One for white van man, one for the windows of shops and premises and another for the car windscreen.

The Grafty Gourmet

Now that the early dark nights are setting in, one thing that most of us look forward to is good ole cosy winter comfort food. This recipe is no exception. It is quick to put together and is delicious on a cold night

Winter Fruit and Almond Crumble - Serves 4

4 small (or 2 giant) Granny Smith 6 tbsp flour

apples, peeled and sliced 6 tbsp dark brown sugar

8 tbsp cranberries (fresh or frozen) 6 tbsp cold unsalted butter, cut into

2 tsp almond extract small pieces

2 tbsp sugar 4 tbsp sliced almonds 2 tsp cinnamon, divided 1/2 cup whipping cream 6 tbsp quick cooking oats 1 tbsp Amaretto (optional)

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180 degrees centigrade. Whilst the oven is warming up, butter a large round oven proof dish. Then in a bowl, combine the apples, cranberries, almond extract, sugar, and 1 tsp of cinnamon. Then place the mixture in the buttered oven proof dish.
- 2. Combine the remaining cinnamon, oats, flour, and dark brown sugar. Cut in butter until mixture is crumbly. Then pat over the apple mixture in the oven proof dish. Bake for 50 minutes.
- 3. Sprinkle sliced almonds over the top and return to the oven for another 5 minutes to toast the almonds (don't let them burn).
- 4. Let cool for 15 minutes. Whip cream with Amaretto (or if you prefer to omit the alcohol, a dash of almond extract). Serve over crumble.

The November Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Libra for most of November, and moves into Ophiuchus at the end of the month.

New Moon occurs on Saturday 6th November, and Full Moon is on Sunday 21st when in the constellation of Taurus. I have a little more about the Moon at the end of this article.

Mercury is to the east of the Sun this month, and sets only minutes after the Sun. So again we are unlikely to see this elusive planet this month.

Venus is still in inferior conjunction (almost directly in front of the Sun), but by the middle of the month it will start to appear as the "Morning Star" low in the southeast just before sunrise.

Mars sets less than an hour after the Sun, so again we will not be able to see the "Red Planet" this month.

Jupiter is the one planet to be seen during the night this month. At dusk the giant planet is well up in the southeast, and is due south by the middle of the evening, almost stationary in the constellation of Aquarius. Through a telescope the disc of Jupiter can clearly be seen, together with the dark and light cloud bands and some of the four major moons.

Saturn is rising in the east in the early hours of the morning, and is well up in the south-eastern sky at dawn. Relative to the stars it is moving very slowly south-eastwards in the constellation of Virgo. You can just see the famous rings through a telescope.

During the second half of November we can see the Leonid meteor shower. They will be generally active between 15^{th} and 20^{th} November, and appear to radiate from a single point in the "Sickle" of the constellation of Leo, and will probably peak around 18^{th} November. The best time to view them is in the early hours of the morning. This is also the best time of the year to see sporadic meteors. These can be seen at any time and in any part of the sky.

Now back to the Moon. Apparently there is some truth in the famous song "in the Light of the Silvery Moon", as scientists have actually found deposits of silver on the lunar surface. The soil samples were taken from the Cabeus crater, which they found were much more complex than expected. Unfortunately the deposits were very small, and would not justify opening a lunar silver mine.

Christian Message November 2010

Memories are precious. When we lose one we search for it like someone with a pack of hounds following an elusive scent. My father has now been suffering from dementia for the last 12 years. I have observed the gradual loss of memories, and the erratic nature of his loss. His mind is now more like a sieve, where most memories seem to elude capture and slip away whilst the odd one lingers or remains. When he does recall something about the family, or a time long past, it causes him to become animated — as if that memory is present with him, and he lives out the joys or sorrows appropriate for such a memory.

As a Christian I have always been aware of the "remembrance" which Jesus spoke of,

when he gathered together his friends for what has come to be known as the Last Supper. On that occasion Luke, the historian & gospel writer, records how Jesus took some bread and gave it to his friends saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me." (Luke 22:19) The link between past and present conveyed by the word "remembrance" is about more than just remembering an event or situation. It is about the way in which that moment in the past, in our memory, becomes a living event in the present. The action of breaking bread, as Jesus did, in the course of a service of worship is to experience that moment in the present where Jesus Christ is alive and with us here and now. In the same way that my father's act of "remembrance" brings forth the response of laughter or tears, so Christians respond to that experience of Jesus present with us by the way in which we allow our lives to be shaped by his life and teaching in us.

During November we will again be marking Remembrance Day. It is an occasion which marks a particular moment in time where at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918 the Germans signed the Armistice, a military agreement marking the defeat of the German army and an end to the hostilities of World War One. Each year we mark that moment with 2 minutes of silence. In that silence we are invited to remember all those who sacrificed their lives, and at many local memorials particular names will be read out. Part of our remembrance is through helping those suffering as a result of current conflicts by supporting the British Legion and wearing a poppy. It is also a "remembrance" where we respond now and allow the pattern of our lives to bring about peace and reconciliation among families, friends, and even nations. Whether in the Church or in the world, the act of remembrance can be a moment when we make a difference in the world today.
