So everyone is back to school or work after the wonderful summer weather and suddenly the daylight hours seem to have shrunk rapidly. The rain has finally arrived and the gardens are starting to recover after such a long, hot, dry spell – just in time for them to start being put to bed for the winter!

The Parish Council are still working hard on your behalf to improve the environment in which you live, as much as possible, with progress being made on a new grass cutting contract for next year and Parish Council elections in May 2019. I will keep talking about the elections over the next few editions, as being on the Parish Council is a great way of representing your community and understanding how both local government and national government works. Whilst sometimes it feels as though the Parish Council has little power, your Parish Council currently has more power than many, as a direct result of the majority of its current councillors having been elected to office. To maintain these powers it is necessary for 8 people to put themselves forward for election next May. Is this your time to get involved in your community? Why not come along to the next Parish Council meeting and see what may be involved?

Grass Cutting

We are nearly at the end of the grass cutting season and the tender for the new contract is to be discussed at the October meeting before being sent out to contractors, both local and regional. I will keep you informed as this process progresses.

Best Kept Village

The entry was submitted again this year, but it appears to be a very competitive category with 13 entrants, only 4 of which go through to the 2nd round. This year we didn't make it to that stage, but the comments from the judges were all positive. If everyone does their little bit to make sure their frontages are neat and tidy, I am hopeful we will be able to progress further next time. When did you last cast an eye over your front garden and see if there were any small improvements you could make? If you do this now, you have until next May to make the changes as every little will help.

Allotments

I know everyone was on holiday when the last edition was published so this is a repeated request.

Do you like the thought of growing your own fruit and vegetables, but are a little daunted by the commitment of taking on a full plot? One of the existing allotment holders is seeking someone to share their organic plot. If you may be interested, please contact the clerk.

Our Outdoor Bowling Season has come to close yet again. We have done well this year managing to move up a little in our league positions. Our plan next year is to have several roll up sessions to include positive coaching for all members experienced and new to the game. These dates when organised will be advertised so if anyone out there would like to join us you would be very welcome.

Meanwhile this year's last task is to refurbish the green after its long hot Summer. Earlier this month a weekend was spent scarifying and cutting in preparation for coring, reseeding and spreading 10 tons of fresh top soil. Quite a task if done by hand, the cost and management will be discussed at the AGM. This heavy task needs doing every 3 -4 years to maintain a lovely 'green' Green for both us, and visiting clubs. There are some lovely Bowling Greens out there and it is all down to the Grounds man's hard work and dedication. A problem we have is watering. Some clubs have rain water storage facility, others have a stream near to tap into, others a sprinkler system and their own water supply. It can take a lot of water to keep Greens green and if any one out there has any ideas for next year's Summer drought please let me know. Ours, like other clubs went very dry and fast, presenting quite a challenge to bowlers, who used to slower grassy greens, had to practise the 'gentle' sending of one's wood.

We are looking forward to our Annual Dinner and presentation of the Club Trophies and Cups. One set had to be cancelled as the weather changed but also because our grounds men were working on the green. Last year's winner can keep his prize for another year, must remind him to keep it polished.

So keep an eye on the Village Notice Boards for the Club's rollup sessions in the Spring and it will be lovely to see a new face or two.


THE ALLOTMENTEERS – Carol Dallamore

Autumn has arrived with some cooling of the nights, leaves starting to change colour and apples ripening on the bough. The late raspberries are doing very well and the promise of apple and raspberry crumble with custard sets the taste buds crackling.

There is a lot of satisfaction when after the hard work of Summer on the Allotment it slows towards September. It is the time to start clearing away the leafy growth and preparing the beds for their Winter rest. We have been amazed at how quickly the weeds have grown after the rain came, it seems there are more than at this time last year! The hedges have been cut and the bags of trimmings are heading towards our Village Bonfire this year. My large bed has Winter vegetables in so unable to have its annual bonfire on.

The smell of wood smoke in Autumn as the smoke gently lifts into the air evokes ideas of myths and magic. This is helped along by the evenings drawing in and the Tawny Owls calling to each other in the woods. The larger logs from the Fir that was taken down earlier this year have been stacked under the hedge around the plot. I have covered them with compost and clippings to create small animal refuges. Hedgehogs, voles, mice and toads welcome these shelters, as do the larger beetles. All of these eat slower moving plant damaging insects and help the Allotmenteer to use less aggressive management.

Hazel's little plum tree has fruited well and she has delighted in sharing the produce. As I have said before, sharing is something Allotmenteers love to do. It helps with the times when there is a glut of produce and a chance to try something new and may even grow next year! Having an allotment encourages experimentation amongst the regular produce. We even learnt how to keep produce going during the drought and we found many plants actually behaved better. The squashes and low growing plants did very well without too much watering while the taller plants got quite stressed, something to think about for next year.



HARBY PLAYING FIELD – Steve Hogg

It has been a busy few months at the playing field as the car boot season continued but despite being the hottest summer on record, we have lost three to bad weather and two badly affected by bad weather so income will be down. We have undergone some maintenance and repair work around the field and are planning to resurface the junior play area, possibly replacing the bark with gravel like the other areas as this provides a long term solution to fall injury prevention.

The over 50's fitness club have been using the tennis court over summer and I would like to put on record my thanks to them for the hard work they have undertaken to clear the tennis court of weeds and moss. They have made a considerable difference to the court and saved the committee a lot of work so thank you very much all to the ladies involved.

You may have noticed that the football pitch is in use again after many years of inactivity with the return of youth football. At the moment Collingham under 11's are using it due to lack of pitches for all the teams that are playing out of their club. Despite being unused for many years our constant cutting, mole clearing and the heavy use by car booters has maintained a good playing surface.

Finally November the 5th is fast approaching and we will once again be holding our annual firework and bonfire. As always this is a large undertaking so we are asking if anyone can assist on the night. We require a lot of help on the night so if anyone can give up a few hours to help us collect admission and park cars we would be very grateful, please contact me on 07799110430. This is a fantastic event enjoyed by hundreds of people so all help is appreciated.

We are looking at opening the playing field between now and the bonfire night to allow people to bring any wooden based rubbish to burn. Can I please ask that everyone keeps clear of the footy pitch and only bring wood,paper etc,not metal,plastics,rubber. As well as producing awful smoke it also leaves us a big pile to clear up afterwards which costs a lot of money.

CLP THORNEY – Andrew Barber

Elsewhere in this edition of the Trio an article outlines the progress to date on the issues affecting all three communities. This piece will report on progress on matters specific to the parish of Thorney.

The major item for the respondents to the Thorney questionnaire concerned a public meeting space for the village. The church building was identified as the only feasible option, but only after exhaustive discussion of the alternatives. To achieve the objective, plans are being drawn up to make the nave of the church into a more flexible space for community use including the installation of a small servery and multi-use toilet at the west end. Permission from the diocesan authorities will need to be obtained for the removal of the pews in the nave and the installation of a new heating system and the servery and toilet. There will be an opportunity for everyone to comment on the plans before they are adopted formally and funding is sought. Improvements to the lighting of the building have been achieved already.

The revival of the Voluntary Car Scheme has been a great success. After virtually petering out a few years ago, new momentum has been offered by the Community Led Plan. The scheme has 16 drivers on its books now and over 100 journeys have been undertaken since April this year. Clare Welfare reports in greater detail in a separate article.

A Neighbourhood Watch Group has been set up in the village co-ordinated by Helen Lye. Residents have been positive in their response with a large percentage of households signed-up to the scheme.

Anne and Anna have been tireless in organising social events for the village – the last was a highly successful picnic for the royal wedding in June – as requested in responses to the questionnaire. Even greater numbers supporting future events would be wonderful.

The signpost at Thorney Cross has been renewed, but that at the end of Home Farm Lane still requires attention.

Pressure is being applied to Newark and Sherwood District Council to get glass recycling facilities provided in the parish – they manage it across the border in West Lindsey! - without success as yet. Equally progress is slow but steady in bringing about the plans for the change of use from a telephone box to a defibrilator house.

Harby Thorney Wigsley Community Led Plan Monitoring Group

Your CLP Turns 3!

Amazingly, it's three years since the Community Led Plan for Harby, Thorney & Wigsley was published setting out the issues you felt were important to your village.

The Steering Group behind the Community Led Plan became the Monitoring Group with the objective of overseeing the 22 joint issues set out on page 4 of your Community Led Plan booklet.

Made up of representatives from the three villages, the Monitoring Group has met every three months since then, focusing on those issues that could easily slip down the priority list. The good news is that much has been achieved:

- ✓ Poor broadband speed a contentious issue that many of you will remember. Now almost every property in our area can access Superfast fibre broadband.
- ✓ Remove the 'bump' on Thorney/Wigsley bridge a huge problem at the time needing urgent attention, the CLP and the Parish representatives helped raise the profile of the issue and with the help of our County Councillor Maureen Dobson, lobbied Notts County Council to expedite work costing almost £50,000.
- ✓ Improve transport options born out of a lack of public transport to our local GP surgeries, we now have the TH&W Voluntary Car Scheme providing cost-effective transport to the local area, Lincoln and Newark.

Other issues currently being worked on include mobile phone signal coverage and the informal access path to the Sustrans cycle track at Wigsley bridge. With **4G** now available in our area, how happy are you with your mobile signal? Evidence gathered recenty suggests it's generally poor so we'll shortly be reaching out to residents for your thoughts, ideas and help in developing solutions to this issue.

As our work continues, it's time to **thank everyone** who has supported the CLP Monitoring Group either directly or through the village working groups and your Parish representatives. Without your time and dedication, none of this would have been possible.


