We hope you can join us for our final market this year – we have a wonderful choir leading us in carol singing and mulled wine, mince pies and sausage rolls for all our customers!





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Stockbridge Football Club - The Robins About Us

The last article I wrote for the magazine was about our 130th anniversary and the history of the Club, so this time I thought you would be interested to find out about the Club today.

We play in the Hampshire Premier League Senior Division and travel all over Hampshire for our away games including Fareham, Portsmouth and Liss. Our local derby game this season will be against Andover Town which, like most of the clubs, has a much bigger population than Stockbridge.

At the time of writing, we are mid table in the League. We have progressed to the second round of the Hampshire League Trophy competition and we are also in the quarter final of the George Mason Memorial Shield where we will travel to play Overton.

Our nine-man committee consists of eight pensioners (normal for Stockbridge!) and one mere 29 year old - our new manager, Kieran Wilson.

The committee is headed by Chairman, Trevor Dance with Kieran, our Hon. Sec., ably assisted by Mavis Savage as minutes secretary. I run our website with the help of my better half Jill, who is Treasurer and also does the match reports.

We have a small club room run by Stuart Mawson, our local ex-postman John Standfield and his wife Annette. Apart from selling tea, coffee, soup and snacks, we sell beer, lager, cider and wine. This is the main regular money-earner for the Football Club.

If you look through our history and at the photographs in our Clubroom you will find the names Dance, Savage, Mawson and Webb going back for three or more generations.

I am often asked whether the manager and/or the players get paid? Nobody in the club gets paid.

The club maintains the Recreation Ground in lieu of a commercial rent.

Most of this considerable work falls to Peter Savage and Stuart Mawson. Peter has been keeping the pitch in great condition since the ground opened in 1978, an amazing achievement, I think you will all agree.

The cost of running the club for a year is about a daunting £8,500. We get income from the clubroom

and have fund-raising events but we also rely on sponsorship and donations to survive. This year we have had had tremendous support with sponsorship and donations from local businesses, organisations and a number of individuals. I won't list them all here, I would hate to miss anyone out but they can all be seen listed on our sponsorship page on our website: https://stockbridgefc.wordpress.com. Without this wonderful support we would not survive, thank you all of you.

Our match day spectators are a mixed bunch. We have our own 'barmy army' of ex-Robins who were all born in Stockbridge or Longstock but now live elsewhere. In our small stand, sitting next to Jill doing the match report, can be seen our next door neighbour 94 year-old Doris who loves to see goals scored, she does not care if they are for us or the opposition. At half time our oldest ex-Robin, 94 year-old Len Smith, arrives with his wife Joan. Of course we also have the players' families and we also have families from Stockbridge and visitors whose children head to the play area. Why not give us a visit? You will get a warm welcome.

Resilience Plan

At its November meeting, Stockbridge Parish Council agreed to work with members of the community to develop a Resilience Plan. The Plan will be focused on contacting vulnerable members of the community, ensuring they are safe and have everything they need. The recent events in Spain have shown why it is important for the community to be able to do this, although the Plan does need to cover all eventualities not just flooding. TVBC has held a number of workshops to help facilitate these plans and HCC has provided templates and information for residents about what to do in an emergency. These are published on the Parish Council's website Flooding Issues - Stockbridge. Please sign up for flood alert warnings on the Parish Council website. Any information from the Houghton Fishing Club staff, who manage Stockbridge's defences, will be posted there. These News alerts will come direct to your inbox.

Safety on Icy Roads and Pavements

As the weather gets colder, it is worth making yourself aware of where the nearest salt bins are. The County's blue and yellow community salt bins have been recently refilled to be ready for the coming winter months. The salt and grit is made freely available for anyone to spread on local roads and pavements. A little salt goes a long way and you only need one tablespoon to treat up to a square metre of road or pavement. If you're able to, it will be helpful to salt Stockbridge's pavements and side roads when it's forecast to be icy. This can be a big help to the community, reducing the risk of incident and injury, especially for those who are less mobile. If you would like a salt bin installed you can request one via the HCC website at *Using salt bins/* Transport and roads/Hampshire County Council.

HCC's Highways are geared up to keep you moving through through winter and are ready, 24/7, to deal with emergency incidents including fallen trees, flooded roads and icy surfaces. Earlier this year, HCC accelerated its work to strengthen roads via its two-year additional investment programme that has ploughed an extra £22.5 million into repairs. More resources have now been put into fixing road defects including potholes and HCC carried out almost 181,000 repairs in the 12 months to April 2024 and over 80,000 repairs during April to September. However, HCC can't repair a pothole unless they know it is there. Please report any pothole you see on HCC's *Stronger Roads Today* webpage.

HCC Highways teams has now readied their fleet of gritters to be available day and night, to keep Hampshire's main routes clear of ice and snow. The gritters are fitted with up-to-date technology to ensure they are salting in the right place and at the right time, including full satellite navigation and

even dedicated snow plough equipment. 'Priority one' routes, which carry most of Hampshire's traffic, are always treated first, and include A-roads, some B-roads, access roads to hospitals and other key emergency hubs, large schools and colleges, and major bus routes. When icy or snowy weather is predicted to last, 'priority two' routes - the remaining B roads and single access roads to villages - may also be treated. Every year, HCC's gritter drivers take refresher training, such as test drives and speed awareness, so they can operate safely as they salt Hampshire's priority routes. Gritters are not permitted to drive faster than 30mph, so please be patient if you find yourself travelling behind one this winter.

Local Cycling and Walking Plan Consultation

The Parish Council has responded to HCC's Local Cycling and Walking plans consultation explaining that the walking route through Stockbridge would benefit some improvement if the footfall was to be increased. The Council brought to HCC's attention: the tendency of cars to park on the Test Bridge with two wheels on the pavement thereby narrowing the pavement and making it difficult for more than one person or wheelchairs and mobility scooters to get through; the uneven surface of the pavement, especially where tree roots have come through the tarmac; the width of the pavement in many areas which makes using a wheelchair impossible; the difficulties with car bumper overhang. Funding for this project comes from Government so we can hope some of these problems may be addressed.

Stockbridge Parish Council will next meet on 12th December and again on 16th January at the Town Hall at 7:15pm.

On Saturday 9 November Trout 'n' About held their annual awards evening at the Town Hall. The well-attended event celebrated the success of Trout 'n About 2024 with the volunteers, sponsors, committee members and local MP Caroline Nokes.

The awards are allocated based on the nominations and votes by the voluntary helpers at Trout 'n' About on the day.

The awards were as follows:-

Stockbridge Recreation Ground Trust £1,000 to help with the upkeep.

Stockbridge Football Club £500 to help continue the running of the club in this their 130th year.

Stockbridge Primary School £1,250 to assist in purchasing induction stoves for the children to learn cooking skills.

Christmas is almost upon us! Christmas adverts are out and the supermarkets are tempting us with the most amazing treats all ready for eating. However, I have not seen my favourite.

So, I am sending you this recipe and hope you give it a go. It's simply delicious, especially if you get fed up with pastry Mince Pies, or are not so keen on Christmas Pud!

Festive Frangipane Layer Cake

Serves 8 -10

Ingredients

150g unsalted butter

3 eggs

30g self-raising flour

150g sugar, caster is best

150g ground almonds

75q flaked almonds

300g mincemeat

Option of redcurrants to decorate

Icing sugar to decorate

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C. Grease a 36x12cm tin.

Cream the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy; then slowly add the eggs one at a time. This can all be done in a food processor.

Add the flour and ground almonds and mix to form a batter.

Spread two thirds of the mixture on the bottom and up the sides of the tin. Place in the fridge for approximately 30 minutes to firm up.

Add a layer of mincemeat, then another layer (the remaining) frangipane and smooth to the edges with a knife.

Sprinkle with the flaked almonds and bake for approximately 40 – 45 minutes ensuring the top does not get too brown.

Once baked, leave to cool slightly before taking out of the tin and serve with the redcurrants and a sprinkle of icing sugar.

This is easily made in advance and lightly reheated but is also nice cold.

Much as I (and the children!) love Christmas, I don't wish away this half term and we really do try to withhold festive preparations until December actually arrives; this year is brilliant timing for us as we try to combine our start to the festive season with the switching on of the High Street lights event which this year is on 6th December. On that day, we devote some of the afternoon to decorating our classrooms and the tree outside the school entrance. We wear festive jumpers and this year, festive hats - more on that later - turn the Christmas hits on loud and enjoy carols around the tree both at school and later on that evening, at St Peter's Church. What is always lovely about all of these events is the way that we come together as a community; both in school and on the High Street with the wider community.

Whilst so many are getting themselves ready for the break, it's always a time of year when we are so grateful to others who go out of their way to support people outside of their families, often in their own spare time. For us in school, we are indebted to the Stockbridge community who donate prizes and display things in their windows for our Christmas trail and to those organising events that our children can enjoy. In school, we have our own great example of this magnanimous spirit in Miss Hatt.

Miss Hatt (Jess) is our very beloved Learning Support Assistant working with the 4 and 5 year olds in their first year of school. In her early 20's, she really is remarkable. Her brother George, was, out of the blue, diagnosed with a grade 4 brain tumour and, although devastated, Jess turned her worries and fears into determined fundraising and established a charity ('Hatt's off to George') to help raise money to give George great experiences he'd love and something to look forward to through the long days of chemo- and radio-therapy. George and Jess recently switched on Winchester's Christmas lights, voted to do this by 80% of all voters for the event, and the scale of their ambitions and fundraising has resulted in over £20k being raised, half of which will support George and half goes to the Brain Tumour Charity. Jess proves that ordinary people can do remarkable things and she's a great example of the grit and determination we try to instil in our children.

Our curriculum is rooted in the support of ordinary people doing remarkable things and each topic is linked to a specialist; someone who brings their unique knowledge and skills to enrich what our children know about the world around them and the possibilities of jobs and hobbies that might also spark their interest. We have worked with engineers, architects, artists, designers and authors

so support our children's learning. They visit us (or we visit them) and learn about their jobs. They usually set the children a challenge to create or learn something and then revisit us to offer feedback about the children's work and plans. This results in really rich learning opportunities which are valued by the children and mean significantly more to them than feedback from their teachers! 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

Eco Tips from Lisa Trailor

In November, we had a really interesting service for creation care at St Mary's Longstock. Thanks in particular to Rev'd Sam Scott, the Diocesan Environment Officer, who helped us put that service together and preached for us.

You couldn't make it? Don't worry. We'll aim to do something similar next year. But in the meantime here are a few key thoughts:

Sam took us back to the early chapters of Genesis and reminded us that, not only had God made us uniquely in His image, but at the same time He gave us a mission – to look after everything that He had made. And Sam left us with a small challenge – what one thing could each of us do differently to help with the environment?

I'm still pondering my choice but, having been given the opportunity to meet with my local MP to discuss rewilding, it may be around what lobbying I can do.

Are you also pondering? If so, the advent calendar that Chelmsford Diocese have put together might give you a few ideas. So when you unwrap your daily chocolate (fairly-traded?) advent calendar, how about checking out their inspirational ideas too at https://www.chelmsford.anglican.org/uploads/files/EnviroAdventCalendar2024_final.pdf and when you come to make your New Year resolution, how about making it one that will help creation?

Before we get to New Year, there's Christmas to look forward to so I thought I'd share A Rocha's tips for a more eco-friendly Christmas:

- 1) Fairtrade advent calendars (see above)
- 2) Make sure your Christmas tree is organic, FSC-certified and locally grown. There is a new concept of renting trees but unfortunately I couldn't find anyone in our area who does it. Maybe next year?
- 3) Go for a natural wreath and decorations.
- 4) Re-use cards and wrapping.
- 5) Create homemade gifts or buy second-hand.
- 6) Make sure any beauty products or food gifts are palm oil free
- 7) Make a 'gift of time (eg for a monthly cook/ coffee outing/baby sitting...) gift voucher'. So many unwanted gifts end up in landfill but this won't!
- 8) LED Christmas lights help to save energy and money.
- 9) Invite someone who'd otherwise be on their own to join you on Christmas Day. It's also a way of reducing energy consumption as they'll share your heating and cooking!
- 10) And I know this one is a challenge (or it is for us!) but try a meat-free Christmas meal. If you do eat meat and this is affordable, make sure it's free-

range or organic, and buy it from a local farmer.

- 11) Recycle right. Most wrapping paper is not recyclable. You can test it by doing the 'scrunch' test. If it springs back, it isn't recyclable. And always remove the sellotape before recycling.
- 12) Carry on caring for God's earth throughout the year. How about making a regular donation to an environmental charity as your Christmas gift?

Stockbridge Music Concert Paul Turner - 8 November

To misquote Oscar Wilde 'To lose one performer is unfortunate; to lose two is doubly unfortunate'. Two days before the concert, a heavy cold conspired to prevent the singer Claire Rutter from replacing Nadine Benjamin who herself had recently withdrawn due to illness. Fortunately for Stockbridge Music (and us), Paul Turner, who was due to accompany Claire on the piano, stepped in to fill the gap. Although the baby grand in St Peter's was fine for the originally planned concert, it was necessary to hire in a grand piano more fitting a recital. Full credit to Music Director Paul Wing for locating a suitable instrument on the day before the concert and managing to have it delivered to St Peter's Church at 1.30am on Friday morning, after being in use the night before at a concert in Hackney!



The concert itself was warmly appreciated by the audience who, as well as enjoying Paul's virtuoso playing, were entertained with background stories about the composers and the pieces being performed. The programme began with 3 pieces by Edvard Grieg, the first being *The Wedding Day at Troldhaugen* - Grieg's house and now a museum and concert hall (well worth a detour if you are visiting Norway). This was followed by Grieg's *Nocturne and Lyric Pieces Op 43*. The first half of the concert concluded with two pieces by Chopin - the familiar *Fantasie-Impromptu in C# minor*, which allowed Paul to display his keyboard mastery to the full, and the beautiful *Nocturne in C# minor*.

The second half of the programme was entirely taken up by Moussorgsky's *Pictures at an Exhibition* suite which, Paul explained in his introduction, is a musical depiction of 10 paintings by painter Viktor Hartmann. Each movement is based on an individual work, many of which are now lost, and there is a familiar recurring and varied Promenade theme, as the viewer walks from painting to painting at the exhibition. An excellent rendering of this great work.

The performance left the audience wanting more and Paul did not disappoint with a wonderful rendering of Debussy's *Clair de Lune* as an encore.

Well done to the team at Stockbridge Music for keeping calm and carrying on and thanks are also due to the concert's sponsors, Guy and Jean Boney Paul Kidd

Songs of Solace The Amici Singers



The Amici Singers are a group of 20 or so experienced singers who came together, on Saturday 16 November at St Peter's Church, to perform a short programme of beautiful, reflective choral music in loving memory of three friends. The concert was conducted by Mark Williams and covered a wide variety of pieces from 16th to the 20th Century - starting with *O Nata Lux* by Thomas Tallis and ending with a version of a song made famous by Elvis Presley (*Can't Help Falling in Love*). 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Reflections . . . from a (Retired) Bookseller

First the good news:

I'm writing this from a gorgeous spot overlooking St Austell Bay in Cornwall. For the first time ever, I can travel with my husband as he goes on a work visit, and we can even bring our dogs to a 'pet friendly' hotel and take an extra day or two before heading back home.


It's a strange feeling not to have to BE anywhere or DO anything in particular. After sixty years of working, it's the first time I've experienced this freedom but, as I'm sure any of my contemporaries could tell you, it's a mixed blessing. How many times, on a dull and uninspiring morning, has the wish to stay in bed and pull up the duvet kicked in? Quickly followed by that internal nagging alarm clock which says 'Get up and get going!' Sometimes it's hard not to ask 'Why?'

Yes, there are loads of things to be doing, but finding a way to structure one's days to make all those new-found hours feel gratifying can be challenging. Why is it that things which used to be simple and obvious now seem complicated and exhausting? Wrestling with computer-based activity, for example. When did it all get so complex? Spending more time on exercise seems to take a lot more energy than I had imagined. Even personal interactions with friends can be wearying!

I'm sure the world still needs the enthusiasm and skills we retirees have to offer – but finding the right combination of how and where to apply them is, for me, proving to be quite a new world.

In the meantime, falling back on something I love doing, which is reading, still feels like a wonderful luxury on a quiet morning or afternoon. Being in Cornwall for a few days reminded me that one of Britain's best and most successful novelists, the late John Le Carré, made it his home base for many years before his death.

In the last few weeks, KARLA'S CHOICE a 'John Le Carré novel', which was in fact written by his son Nick Harkaway, has come out, and it's really very good. Perhaps not quite as brilliant as his father's other spy novels - but, as Mr Harkaway is himself an accomplished novelist, quite good indeed. It's got the same wonderfully sharp observation about the state of the world's great powers, sharp dialogue,



wonderful description, and best of all, it brings back George Smiley, perhaps Le Carré's greatest character. The story bridges the gap between Smiley's first appearance in THE SPY WHO CAME IN FROM THE COLD, and both TINKER TAILOR SOLDIER SPY and SMILEY'S PEOPLE, which followed. It also introduces the mysterious Russian spy master Karla, although there is clearly more than enough left unexplained -so that being teased about this character's early days just leaves us hoping for more.

I managed to whip through KARLA'S CHOICE in about two days. And I couldn't put it down, which says a lot. It's one of those books which pulls you completely into another world, and keeps you deeply engrossed there.

So engrossed that as soon as I finished, I searched the house madly for an old copy of TINKER TAILOR SOLDIER SPY which I finally unearthed and gobbled up in the following two days. The dogs were lucky to get fed and walked!

Just before going to Cornwall, I tried to get a copy of SMILEY'S PEOPLE to take with me, but no luck. So now that we're back I'll be heading out to track one down so I can revisit those wonderful characters again as soon as possible.

Definitely worth getting out of bed for!




Editors' Note

Quarter Pealrung to celebrate the institution, induction and installation of the Revd Joe Sweetnam to the Mid Test Benefice

What exactly IS a Quarter Peal?

A peal is defined by the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers which was founded in 1891 to represent ringing in the English tradition with rope and wheel.

A quarter peal is a performance of numerical sequences ('changes') of specifed composition, set length and with the same person ringing the same bell throughout. It takes around 45 minutes to complete (a full peal is about 3 hours) depending on several factors including the number of changes and the weight of the bells which affects the speed of ringing. A full peal on up to seven bells features at least 5,040 different changes, while a quarter peal has at least 1,260. For a performance to be officially recognised, details must be published in The Ringing World, as seen above. **Editors**

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Remembrance in Stockbridge

This year at St Peter's we were lucky enough to have the Bishop of Winchester, the Rt Rev'd Philip Mounstephen leading our worship and his wisdom shone through as he reminded us that wars were occasionally necessary if it meant stepping up and doing the right thing by opposing evil.



During the first hymn, the Royal British Legion standard and other banners were received at the altar. In attendance were service men and women from the 2nd Regiment Army Air Corps and a large contingent of all ages from our local Scout Group. Children from Year 6 of the Primary School had composed, and movingly read out, their own thoughts when considering what 'one minute's silence' means. Then two pupils from Danebury School read the haunting poem 'The Crosses' by Bill Minton. Later in the service the prayers were read by the Scout Group and Explorers.



When the service was over, the Crucifer led the Bishop from the church followed by the RBL Standard held by Rory Christopherson, Youth Organisation banners and wreath layers. The Army Air Corps contingent led them and the congregation in

procession down the High Street to the War Memorial where a further Act of Remembrance was led by the Bishop. The Rolls of Honour were read out by Robin Colenso, the Exhortation read by Brigadier David Williams and, after the two minute

silence, the Kohima Epitaph was read by Bob Powell of Stockbridge Parish Council:

When you go home, tell them of us and say, "For your tomorrow, we gave our today".

This was followed by the laying of wreaths by representatives of relevant organisations (including the police and firemen) and the past Mayor of the Test Valley.





The following day, Armistice Day, the Rev'd Joe Sweetnam led the short Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial which was very well attended and included children from the Primary School who laid their wreath.

St Peter's and Old St Peter's Stockbridge





November has been a busy but brilliant month in St Peter's, and the mainly dry weather with orange, red and yellow leaves provided a fitting background to all the activities. We started with All Souls' Day on November 2nd, a commemoration of the faithful departed. Matthew Grayshon led the simple but moving service with his usual compassion and empathy. As the names of those we have lost were read out at the lectern, the congregation quietly came to the front to light candles for those they had lost. Sarah played suitable sacred music on the organ. This annual service is a valuable opportunity to step away from busy lives and sit quietly with our memories, be they distant or very recent.

And then on the 6th November, the event we have all been waiting for (and for which a lot of people had worked tirelessly to make the church sparkling clean) - the Institution and Induction of The Rev'd Joe Sweetnam as our new rector. The magnificent service, which included hymns chosen by Joe himself, was led by the Rt Rev'd Philip Mounstephen, Bishop of Winchester supported by The Ven Jean Burgess, Archdeacon of Bournemouth. In attendance were all the Team Ministry, the Benefice Church Wardens, the clergy who have supported us during the interregnum, and some others with whom Joe has been working, the PCC's and a full choir. Before the service, the bellringers gave us a Quarter Peal (45 minutes) followed by 15 minutes of ringing. St Peter's was completely full of friends and family of the new incumbent together with members of congregations from across the Benefice. There are formalities to be observed, such as the the archdeacon leading Joe to the church door where she laid his hand on the door to symbolise his ownership of the churches now, followed by the church wardens handing over to Joe all the relevant keys to the benefice churches. The Bishop's sermon was strong and uplifting and reminded us that we should accept that Joe will have his own stamp to put on the rôle he is undertaking, and we should support him in his choices and his ways of leading us on our Christian journey. The service ended with the choir singing the beautiful version of The Lord's Prayer by Joseph Lees. On behalf of

everyone who worships in St Peter's and Old St Peter's, we welcome Joe and his family to Stockbridge.

The Remembrance Sunday Service took place on 10th November, led by the Bishop of Winchester. You will find a full report of the service and ceremony on page 31 together with the Armistice Day ceremony on the following day.

Earlier in the day, in a beautifully poppy-decorated Old St Peter's, Joe had led the first communion service of his incumbency here. Everything augurs well for a new era in our parish and we are here to support Joe and his ministry in whatever ways we can.



For those of you, like myself, who from time to time like to sit and find peace on

one of the benches outside Old St Peter's, you



would have noticed last year that the old cross which stood proudly on the nearby grass had rotted and finally split. It had been placed there after being used in the Millennium Passion Play. It has now been replaced, thanks to the generosity of those who participated in the Passion Play and has taken up its guardian role again over those who rest on the benches below in that sacred garden.

Now we are approaching the beginning of the Liturgical Year. Advent, which falls this year on December 1st will be celebrated with a Eucharist Service in St Peter's Church, led by Joe, during which the choir will start singing hymns foreseeing the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. Our Carol Service this year, which we share with the Roman Catholic community, is very close to Christmas on the evening of December 22nd. In the meantime we can look forward to Joe turning on the Christmas lights on Friday, December 6th accompanied by Primary School children singing carols on the church lawn. Afterwards, there will be mince pies and mulled wine in the church.

To finish on a personal note: I have been writing this column of our church news for well over two years now and I think it is time for me to pass it on to someone else, before I start repeating myself! I have enormously enjoyed being involved in this way and it has also taught me quite a lot that I didn't know before. You may find me occasionally

writing elsewhere in the magazine, but for the moment I am very grateful to Chrissie Quayle, who has kindly agreed to take on the rôle from the February 2025 issue. I just end by thanking all of you who've been reading the column and wishing you a very happy and blessed Christmas.

December can feel like chaos – lots of social events, services, Christmas presents to buy, neverending to-do lists and the pressure to create the perfect Christmas. But, in the midst of this chaos, our churches can offer an opportunity to find peace during this busy time.

The Church of England's theme for Advent and Christmas 2024, 'Follow the Star: Calm and Bright', draws on the world-famous carol, *Silent Night*: "Silent Night! Holy Night! All is calm, all is bright...'

One of the reasons that this carol is so universally loved is the way it invites us into the still centre of the Christmas story, to contemplate Mary holding the new-born Jesus, the Light of the World.

The angelic messages we encounter in the biblical story of Jesus' birth typically hold together the need for calm in the present ('Do not be afraid' ... 'Fear not') with the hope of a bright future ('for you have found favour with God' ... 'for behold I bring you tidings of great joy').
