



### WEST FELTON VILLAGE HALL **Chairmans Report 2022-2023**



This is the 100th anniversary of our Village Hall, and it is a testament to the Committee, past and present, that the hall is still well used and valued by all in the Parish. We must also recognise the support we continue to receive from our Parish Magazine especially the information contained over the last few months leading up to the Anniversary. An opportunity to also thank Ann Hampson who is standing down following many years of excellent service.

As a Committee we have put on a variety of events during the last 12 months:

- The children's magic show, with over 60 very excited children enjoying a show just for them.
- Well attended Christmas bingo, with many new faces.
- Our first Craft Fair with over 20 stalls.
- Family magic show.
- Easter Bingo.
- 100th Anniversary Afternoon Tea.

All of which, I am happy to say, made a profit.

Then of course there were the regular and one-off events organised by Institutions/individuals, many of which attracted newcomers to our village. Yet again a packed hall for the Annual Poppy Concert.

On the cost side, we have redecorated the main hall, had all the ceiling lights replaced and changed some of the wall heater elements which had failed. We have further enhanced the sound system with new microphones. We are aiming to have new flooring in the rear meeting room this summer.

The outstanding issue of the defibrillator has been settled, with the Parish Council assuming ownership and responsibility for its maintenance.

Unfortunately Rainbows have ceased to meet. In respect of other hirings, the charges were increased at the beginning of the year – the first time for noncommercial since 2015, and for commercial since 2018. Mindful of pressures continually experienced by the Post Office we nevertheless continue to retain

# FINANCIAL HELP FOR THE ELLESMERE SISTERS

The Poor Clare Sisters in Ellesmere have asked for financial help with repairs to the convent. If you would like to help, please contact Mother Abbess.

The Colettines of Ellesmere are a contemplative, Roman Catholic



community of nuns. They wear the full habit and observe the Poor Clare way of life: Daily Mass; prayer; meditation; work; holy silence; and happy recreation are faithfully and joyfully observed.

As well as the upkeep of the convent and extensive gardens, many sisters enjoy craft work, including making rosaries for St. Winefride's Well in Holywell, Flintshire. However the sisters do not make things to sell for money for themselves or run any sort of commercial industry.

#### As true Poor Clare Colettines, they rely on donations and gifts to survive.

There are two traditional ways of living the Poor Clare Colettine life. A woman entering this monastery can choose to live as an Enclosed Colettine (not leaving the enclosure, except for health reasons) or as an Extern Colettine (who may go outside of the enclosure, on necessary duties for the community). The late, tiny, Sister Martha was famous for going around Ellesmere with her basket, doing the shopping and other chores. All the nuns take the three vows of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience. Enclosed nuns take an extra vow of Enclosure.

Op the Garden Path with Topiarius

Ithough it is a quiet month in terms of routine jobs (if you leave aside weeding and watering), I find I have to

concentrate to keep up my enthusiasm in August. It is simply a matter of both me and the garden getting just a bit tired, and particularly that the weeding can start to get to you. However, a couple of jobs worth mentioning are cutting back summer raspberries and (if you use them) ordering vine weevil nematodes.

We returned this year to the Cotswolds for our short garden visiting break for the first time since 2010, mainly because we had another event in the region. We visited Snowshill Manor for the first time and were delighted with both the house and garden. On the way back to our hotel, we looked at Cotswold Garden Flowers, primarily to be able to say that we had visited the Bob Brown nursery. The garden attached to the nursery looked to us like the jumble of a cottage garden on a small stately home scale, but I think serves to provide information and experience for the nursery.

We then did the traditional pairing of looking at Hidcote and Kiftsgate which we hadn't visited for a number of years. The visit confirmed that, despite all its qualities, Hidcote is not quite our cup of tea (now wait for the howls of protest from those who love it). First, the rooms type of design does not

greatly appeal to us, preferring the more open landscape approach. Second, we found some of the planting to be muddled, and in fact in places took a leaf out of Bob Brown's planting. That said, there was plenty of good things to see and we enjoyed the visit. We also confirmed that we like Kiftsgate and found the planting much better structured than at Hidcote. The garden has quite a lot of steps that might be called lethal due to their gross unevenness. We made a mental note that, if anyone complained about the steps in our garden, we would refer them to Kiftsgate. The famous rose was not yet in flower on our visit but we took more than usual interest when our own specimen showed its charms.

I was reminded by a column in The Garden of the perils of planting invasive species. I don't suppose there is a gardener who has not had the experience of over enthusiastic species but, by and large, we have got away fairly lightly over the years. It is of course partly a matter of size of garden. Although Acanthus mollis has to hacked back every year, it has not been the problem it would be in a very small garden. Similarly, large bamboos could cause havoc, but with space only need some attack on spurious offshoots from the clump. I think I can safely say that we have far greater problems with invasive weeds such as cleavers and herb Robert.

#### A day in the life of an oak tree

John Lewis-Stempel, Country Life Magazine Among their deceptively inert branches, trees shelter feathered Pavarottis, scuttling beetles, opportunistic fungi and fierce owls. John Lewis-Stempel recounts a day in the life of an oak and the creatures that call it home.

Our friends the trees have an unremarkable life, or so it seems to us. They come into leaf, their fruit drops, or is gorged on by birds and the winds of autumn strip them of their dressing to leave them as the cold, bare sentinels of winter. However, if we were to stand, tree-like ourselves, in a British copse and watch a single oak tree for an entire 24 hours say when spring hatches out of winter what would we see?

6.17am First light. The male mistle thrush flies to the top of the oak dome and sings: Pavarotti in feathers, the valley his auditorium. On a branch just below, the thrush is joined by the great tit, who similarly likes a high post to 'ring his bell'. The mistle thrush breeds early and, halfway down the 60ft tree, snug in a dim fork, is its bowl-nest with four speckled blue

**7.01am** The slanting rays of morning sun first catch the 1,000 leaf buds in the canopy, then the high untidy drey of the grey squirrel, before illuminating the ground beneath our 300-year-old oak. There, as Robert Bridges versed it: 'Thick on the woodland floor Gay company shall be,/ Primrose and Hyacinth And frail Anemone.' Hyacinth here is the bluebell, lying in a mauve pool.

The leaves of autumn, brought down by the screaming Halloween wind, still lie around the tree in a thick sodden copper mat; the mould is soft on the pads of the returning vixen as she slinks down into her den among the tree's roots, a rabbit clamped in her jaws from her night prowl. A present for her cubs.

In the brightening of the day, the birds and animals that have roosted in the tree emerge from their lairs; the pipistrelle bats from a hollow branch, the wren from under the ivy crawling up the immense trunk. Early morning is the great feeding time of diurnal birds and to the oak fly a great spotted woodpecker, nuthatch and a treecreeper. The latter climbs our venerable Quercus robur in a spiral, inspecting the multitudinous cracks in the bark of trunk and limbs for insects; she is immediately lucky and a Clubiona brevipes spider, which has overwintered under the tree's rough, hard skin, falls victim to her tweezer-precise bill. The fissures of the oak are, quite literally, crawling with creepy-crawlies; in total, 1,178 invertebrate species use it and 257 of them rely solely on this tree.

10.39am A waft of warm, light, spring wind brings the first of the summer migrants, the chiffchaff, who returns to his familiar bough, to sing his song of only two tones: chiff; then chaff. As did the pied flycatcher, together with the redstart that is hot on her tail, the chiffchaff has timed his arrival to meet warm days and insect hatching. From a twig in front of the chiffchaff hangs a wooden bauble, as if left over from some primitive Christmas display: an 'oak-apple gall' is the most conspicuous result of an insect attack on the oak, caused by tiny wasps (Biorhiza pallida, Andricus guercuscorticis, Andricus kollari) chemically provoking the tree's twigs to form a protective structure

— the marble-like gall — around their eggs. Throughout the morning, a green woodpecker chisels a nest hole in a decaying sky-striving branch of our common oak, as a nuthatch, a bird almost as colourful as a kingfisher, plasters up a hole in the noble trunk with mud to make the correct-sized entrance. If we step back from the tree, even if it is still only in leafbud, it glows green in the sunshine.

12.18pm It starts raining; on the lee side of the tree, a fallow-deer buck takes shel-

of the tree, a fallow-deer buck takes shelter, his back to the rain-blackened trunk. On the perennially wet west side, enough mossy, verdant vegetable matter has collected in the bark's fissures for a polypody fern to grow as readily as in soil. The oak is parasite paradise, opportunist opening; lichens, liver- wort, moss, algae and fungi all have their hold on the tree. A whip of wind brings down a rotten

Into the open socket wound on the tree, a floating spore of the bracket fungus Laetiporus sulphureus ('chicken of the woods') gains purchase. An oak supports 108 different types of fungi, above and below ground; the root system of the tree needs a network of mycorrhizal fungi to gather nutrients. The fruiting bodies of these mycorrhizae, among them oak orange bolete and oakbug milkcap, may poke up through the dense leaf carpet during summer and autumn.

**2.22pm** The rain stops and the buck ambles off to munch on the reachable leafbuds of a nearby oak sapling. In the ensuing sunshine, the oval leafbuds of our oak unfurl, to the joy of numerous species of hungry grub and caterpillar; no fewer than 100 different moth types have

been recorded as feasting on oak leaves, perhaps the commonest being the green oak tortrix. The fresh leaf growth of spring also attracts aphids, which then produce their sugary secretion, 'honeydew'; a black line of wood ants is ascending to the very top of the tree in search of this nectar. As the ants climb up, a grey squirrel is heading slowly down a 45° limb, alert and tense; it can hear the tiny cheeping of chicks in the hole-nest of the marsh tit, which despite its name favours trees for its home.

**4.44pm** In the circle of ground beneath the spreading oak tree, a jay is gulping down the last acorns from its winter larder, a crude hole in the earth at the base of the trunk; jays are particularly partial to acorns, hence the second part of the birds' scientific name, glandarius, meaning exactly that, 'eating acorns'. Inside some of the acorns is a protein bonus, the larva of the acorn weevil, an improbable long-nosed character more suited to a Disney cartoon than tooth-and-claw real Nature.

Oaks are 'monoecious', having both male and female flowers on the same tree; these 'catkins' are catnip to a visiting female bullfinch and to the emerged caterpillars of the purple hairstreak butterfly (an oak specialist, thus Favonius quercus, the adult of which floats about the canopy in summer). The pollen of the catkins is sweet on the proboscis of the oakmining bee, too.

**5.16pm** The ecology of the oak tree is a game of consequences: the newly emerged leaves of the oak are eaten by the pale-green caterpillar of the wintermoth, which, in turn, feeds the blue tit, whose brood has just hatched in yet an-

project progressed well, but two obstacles stopped the PCC in its tracks: ownership of the hall and General Sir Walter Congreve. There was a strong feeling that the new building should be non -denominational and not under the control of the church. Robert Lloyd Kenyon wrote to Sir Walter Congreve asking that he give a piece of land adjacent to the hall and that a new hall be built with a connection to the Haslehurst Hall. Sir Walter wrote back saying that he did not like the idea at all. He felt that the proposed building with a passage way connecting the two would be an eyesore. The tone of his letter favoured a building under parish management. He also thought that the Trustees of the Haslehurst would be unlikely to object to its being under the control of the parish. Lloyd Kenyon dis-

agreed and stated that the Haslehurst should remain under church control.

Other items included the appointment of a sexton to look after the graveyards at West Felton and Haughton at £1-10s per week. One of his duties was the cleaning of the bier at Haughton after use.

The PCC also gave its support to a new Diocese of Shrewsbury as suggested by the Committee on Sees (Dioceses) set up after First World War. Although a suffragan See of Shrewsbury had been established 1534, it had laid in abeyance, apart from 2 incumbents, since then. The new Diocese would have included the whole of Shropshire, thus removing south Shropshire from the Hereford Diocese. The measure was defeated in 1926 in the House of Lords and Shropshire had to wait until 1940 when the suffragan See of Shrewsbury was resurrected. ◆

other of the tree's cavities; the sparrowhawk, terror of the copse, flashes between the tangled branches, to catch and feed on the blue tit.

**7.59pm** In the white sunset, the mosses and lichens that clothe the bark of the trunk gain a subtle beauty; more than 700 different lichens inhabit the oak's rough tessellated bark; the most conspicuous of these strange symbiotic beings, part fungus, part alga, is Ramalina farinacea, which resembles the antlers of the fallow buck who used the tree as shelter earlier in the day.

**8.16pm** Under the darkening silhouette of the tree, a woodcock comes patrolling through the shadows, probing with its long bill down through the copper top of the leaf litter into the black mulch below; a stag beetle burrowing through the rotting leaves is luckless and gulped down. A flat-backed millipede suffers the same fate. 10.30pm Around the cupola of the moonlit tree, pipistrelle bats swirl in pursuit of moths. At the base of the tree, in the mouth of the fox den, two cubs play roly-poly. Midnight A shambling badger, almost invisible in the willow pattern of dark and light, stumbles on the last of the jay's acorn trove; Brock's clumsy, bear-like pawing dislodges an oak bracket fungus at the base of the tree. Meanwhile, on a low crooked branch, a tawny owl sits as still as a stump. She is listening to the patterings of the small mammals, the shrews and the mice, as they scour the floor beneath the oak for invertebrates and the acorns that the jays, the squirrels, the badgers and the wood pigeons have overlooked. A wood mouse holds up an acorn as a prize, then feels the talons of the owl on its neck. The wood mouse's death shriek is an old sound under the oak in the copse. ♦

#### From the PCC Archives

from Michael Davie

In the years 1922 and 1923 Parochial church councils (PCC) were being established and West Felton was no exception. Rev Frank Taylor was the Rector and David Hesketh Richards and George B Kempster churchwardens for the parish of West Felton with Haughton.. Elected PCC members included Albert Shaw and Robert Lloyd Kenyon. Rev Owen Fitzherbert Jacson of Tedsmore was co-opted. Four committees oversaw matters. The fabric committee purchased a new boiler for the church for £42 and some lights for the church. The cleaner retired and a new one engaged at £10 per year (£770 in today's money). The finance committee complained about the parish share of £22, equivalent to £1500 today. Sunday collections came to £80 per year. The largest payment was for the choir and organ at £22. Donations were made to the poor, to the Salop Infirmary and to the Eye Ear and Throat hospital. The Waifs and Strays society was given £6. St Chad's kept separate accounts and is reported to have its own endowment, but this does not appear in the parish accounts. Income from St Chad's collections was £43/yr. Payments were made to the Oswestry Hospital and to Waifs and Strays. An interesting payment listed is carbide. When water is added to carbide, acetylene is produced. On ignition a flame is generated. Such a system was used in the headlights of bicycles and cars, and in lighthouses as

well as in miners' lamps and houses.

Meanwhile the women's committee was busy with repairs to the altar cloths. The hassocks, of which there were 244, required considerable attention to keep them in repair. Alms bags were being acquired, and a green burse was in the process of being made. The burse is a case, made of fabric or leather, in which the pyx is carried. The pyx is a receptacle, often made of metal, in which the consecrated bread is stored. Usually kept in the church, it is placed in the burse when carried to those who are sick or otherwise unable to receive communion in church. The women's committee also took responsibility for the cassocks, 13 for men and 14 for boys. Out of this number only 9 were in good repair. One cassock was reported to have been eaten by mice, a situation that lead to an enquiry about whose remit it was for catching mice in church: was it a women's committee or a fabric committee responsibility? There are no further entries on the subject. The final committee looked after the library, though where this was housed is not stated. Possibly it was in the Haslehurst Hall. In 1922 and 1923 the PCC was much concerned about the inadequacy of the Haslehurst Hall as a place for recreation in the village and wished the hall to be enlarged. The hall was owned by the





#### Patients accused of NHS fraud healthwatch



**Healthwatch Shropshire**, the local health and social care champion, has heard from several

patients that have been fined for fraud after unintentionally using their prescription prepayment certificate after its expiry date. The certificates are bought in advance from the NHS and can save money for those people who have a lot of regular prescriptions but are not eligible for free prescriptions. (Get a prescription prepayment certificate: Get a prescription prepayment certificate - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)).

The patients assumed that the staff at pharmacies check the certificate when they present it to collect their medication however this did not happen and the staff accepted out of date certificates. The patients were then fined by the NHS Business Services Authority (NHS BSA). The NHS BSA has told the patients that pharmacists are not required to check that certificates are valid and that it is the patient's responsibility.

Lynn Cawley, Healthwatch Shropshire Chief Officer, told us "The expiry date is printed on the certificate but most people assume in this day and age that there is a system behind the prepayment scheme that will flag up if the certificate is out of date and they don't check. The fines charged can run in to hundreds of pounds and so we advise everybody using the certificates to check the date before they use it each time.

We know that this has happened across the country and would ask people to contact us if they have had problems around the certificates so we can feed the information back to Healthwatch England. People can contact us online at

#### GRIMPO


The hamlet of Grimpo was called Grimpool up to the 19th century. Poole field was the large field opposite the common, there was also a mosse (wetland, bog) there, which may originally have been a pool.

**CHURCH** - The Independents built a chapel in Grimpo in 1832. In the 1830s there were no nonconformist chapels in this part of Shropshire but some services were held in the open air at Wootton Lane. A meeting was held at

"The Wood" at Wootton, the home of Mr John Jones, and a branch of the Independent or Congregational Church was founded. Because there was no chapel, services were held at Mr Jones's home or sometimes at a house in Queens Head, later they were held at the home of Ambrose Johnson at Grimpo. Congregationalism gained considerable support in Grimpo and district. The services were so well attended that it was time to consider building a church. Ambrose Johnson presented a

piece of land to build a chapel; this was found to be unsuitable and was exchanged with Mr Mostyn-Owens for a better site. Grimpo chapel was built quickly, within a matter of months, and was opened on Easter Day 1832. The

chapel lasted about fifty years and in the 1880s it was replaced with a new and larger building which was opened for services in May 1885. It was demolished in 1975, and the gravestones moved to Weirbrook Chapel, a modern house now stands on the Grimpo site. ◆

#### Grimpo Chapel



In 1851 the chapel had seating for 200 worshippers. On Census Day 30 March 1851 there were 103 at their morning service and 89 at their evening service, together with 95 Sunday scholars. Due to structural decay the 1832 chapel was pulled down and replaced by a new chapel, built by Mr Griffiths of West Felton to a design by Mr Edward Bremner Smith of Oswestry and built of Ruabon red brick and stone from Shelvock guarry. The foundation stone was laid by Thomas Barnes of the Quinta and the chapel opened on 11 May 1885. The chapel had a hammerbeam roof and a small tower and spire and seated 200 worshippers. It cost £560. The chapel was licensed for the solemnization of marriages on 19th April 1888. This chapel closed in March 1970 & was de-registered as a place of religious worship on the 6th April 1971. It was demolished in 1975.♦

# GRIMPO where formal education in West Felton started - Who'd have thought it?

We are fortunate to have access to a thesis on West Felton education written in 1971 by E K (Ned) Millington, son of former Rector Millington 1956-74. Ned says, "Of the earliest times there are no records of any kind of learning taking place within the parish, nor was any concern expressed over the lack of it. A strictly rural population would be unlikely ever to want to know more than the basics of "agricultural mathematics" – how many eggs in a dozen, how many gallons, acres, perches and roods; and the peasant farmer certainly would find reading no advantage. Even in church he knew the hymns and prayers by heart, and the psalms were the speciality of the choir ...The half-dozen families of gentry of the parish, apart from the Rector ... were able to afford any education that might be found in Oswestry, (Oswestry School was founded in the 14th century) or further afield. The church occupied the centre of the parish in more ways than one ... The Rector was always a learned man and a Latin scholar, which made him a figure of respect and awe to the illiterate parishioners."

Down the years, with improved transport and communications, it became apparent that sons were not restricted to following in their fathers' footsteps – a variety of occupations was available to those who were educated. Millington noted in the parish marriage registers that some signatures

were still seen as "J\*\*\* J\*\*\*\*, his mark X", as late as the 1920s. Early in the nineteenth century the Church became aware of the need for formal education, "...if only to keep its people abreast of civilisation." It seems these concerns were shared in West Felton Church as well as the neighbouring villages as most founded their first church schools at around the same time. This was entirely a Church initiative. At the time of the first West Felton school there was no state legislation nor even promptings or incentives concerning education for all.

In 1810 a school was built, strangely at Grimpo, about two miles from the church and the main village. It was a single-roomed, probably no wider than 15 feet, stone building, cost £119, erected by subscriptions, with a house for the resident teacher. The site was given by William Mostyn Owen of Woodhouse. It was supported by a few benevolent individuals as trustees, and by a small quarterly charge from each scholar. The average attendance was about eighty scholars. A stove was initially fitted but proved inadequate, it was soon replaced by an open fireplace. Each scholar was expected to pay an additional sixpence annually at Michaelmas, " ... for Fireing in the win-

# THE QUEEN'S MONUMENT in West Felton

The Government, having decided in 1870 to share in the education of the children, a task carried out solely by the Church up to that time, it was decided to build a new school in West Felton. The Grimpo school accommodated 80 pupils. The population of the parish was 1,067. It was calculated that schools must be provided for 180 pupils, therefore a school for 100 pupils was built in West Felton with Grimpo school remaining open.

West Felton School opened for its first class in September 1871. There were just two rooms, a smaller one about 12ft x 16ft, probably for the infants, and a larger one, about 46ft x 16ft for all the rest, up to and apparently including secondary school age group.

However, by 1883 it was found to be too expensive to run two schools and Grimpo was closed, with additions built onto West Felton School.

Now we have a school built for little more than 100 pupils, educating up to 200 at one stage.

No mention of 'conveniences' indoors or outside.

Twenty-six years later this happened ...

In January 1897 West Felton parish council was directed, by the Chairman of the Joint Committee for the Queen's Commemoration (Open Spaces), as follows:

"... The Committee earnestly hopes that your Council may find it possible to promote the adoption of one or more of their suggestions for commemorating the long Reign of the Queen, in a manner which they venture to think is appropriate, beneficial and permanent."

Ned Millington writes, "Not having money to freely throw around on flashy and decorative monuments, the Parish Council, in practical Victorian style, decided to incorporate their gesture of commemoration into something they could use".

A new lavatory at the school was dedicated to the Queen, and the school had Her Majesty to thank for something for which they had waited 26 years!

A stone commemorating HM's 60 year reign and the building of the school lavatory remains to this day.

ter months". In 1827 a single room Sunday Schoolroom was added.

The main problem in the early years was absenteeism – pupils, some of whom were 18 or 21 years old, were still expected to work on the farm and at times up to 40% would be absent for hay-making, harvest, etc.

Can present day teachers imagine a single Teacher teaching up to 90 pupils from 5 to 21 years old in a single room not more than 15ft wide? We don't know how long the room was, but it must have been very snug indeed!

In 1840 this school was restored by the Rector Thomas Hunt 1817-60 (*43 years!*), John Morgan, Parish Clerk, was appointed schoolmaster.

In 1870 the State finally accepted its responsibility for educating children. The Elementary Education Act 1870 required elementary education to be provided for all children in the district. It was therefore decided to build a new school for 100 pupils nearer the centre

of the village on land given by Mr Bulkeley Owen. The Grimpo school remained for those living nearby. However, this proved to be too costly, so eventually Grimpo school was closed. Thereafter the Schoolroom was used only on Sundays and occasionally as a clubroom and for after-school classes.

A wooden shop was built onto the schoolhouse and was run for a number of years by the Windsor family. The Huxley family of Rose Cottage, Grimpo ran the shop in the 1940s. Private Harry Huxley is commemorated in Haughton churchyard by a War Memorial gravestone. Jack Huxley was a well-known butcher who would travel around the farms and cottages to kill the pigs. These would be salted down and cured to feed the families for months to come, nothing was wasted. As most country people were self-sufficient, they usually kept a pig, (everything but the squeal could be eaten!); the large gardens would supply the vegetables and the damsons were picked and sold to pay towards their rent. •

### GRIMPO HEROES

# It remarkable how many men on the West Felton War Memorial had Grimpo connections:

**Driver Albert SUDLOW** - Died 22 February 1917 in the Balkans, buried in Greece. **Albert was the fourth of 9 sons** born to Thomas Sudlow, a carpenter and Sarah Ann (nee Thomas) of 10 Grimpo, West Felton. The also had a sister, **Violet Ellen.** Albert's brother **George** served with KSLI, from 13th Sept 1914 until demobilisation on 6th March 1919. His brother **Henry** served with the RAMC from 29th July 1915 until demobilisation on 4th July 1919. A third brother, **Herbert**, joined the KSLI on 9th June 1915, transferred to the Royal Engineers, he also survived.

Lance Serjeant VICTOR JOHN HERRIMAN, 1st Batt Grenadier Guards. He worked in West Felton and lodged at Grimpo with George and Annie Evans. Victor died of his wounds on 20 August 1917, aged 30, during 3rd Battle of Ypres, known as Passchendaele. His younger brother George was killed in action in France on 30 July 1916.

**Private HARRY HUXLEY.** King's Shropshire Light Infantry, Remembered with Honour, St Chad's Haughton Churchyard, son of James Huxley and Elizabeth Huxley, (nee Bailey) Rose Cottage, Grimpo. Killed in action 23 July 1918, age 19.

Sapper AUSTIN LEDWITH, Royal Engineers, died in Gallipoli 1915, age 35. Austin was married to Lydia Fardoe, daughter of Charles & Eliza Fardoe of Grimpo Cottage. They had two children, Bernard and Kathleen. Lydia and the children returned to live in Grimpo Cottage. Their son, Bernard, joined the Royal Corps of Signals at the start of World War 2 and died whilst serving in North Africa. He is buried at Medjez el Bab Cemetery, Tunisia.

**Private FRED RALPHS**, King's Shropshire Light Infantry. Died during the Battle of the Somme in France 16 September 1916. **His brothers Richard** joined the Veterinary Corps, and **Thomas** joined the Lancashire regiment, they both survived.

Many more Grimpo men joined in both World Wars and lived to return home.
