WIDER CHURCH NEWS

ACTING ARCHDEACON OF CHELTENHAM

Katrina has been asked (and has agreed) to step up for a couple of months and support the wider Diocese, taking on the role of Acting Archdeacon. Our Archdeacon is on Sabbatical, and sadly the Archdeacon of Gloucester has had to step back for a period due to family ill health. So, Katrina wanted to help out and offer support. This means that from now until the middle of May, Katrina will largely be working in that Diocesan role – but you will still see her around the Benefice too.

SHARING COMMUNION

At our Joint PCC meeting in February, we agreed that from Easter onwards, we will begin to offer the common cup again within our communion services. This means that we will go back to the ancient (and pre-Covid) practice of taking bread, and then wine from the chalice at communion. If anyone would prefer just to take the bread, or to ask the priest to intinct the wafer for them, then we can do that too.

We will begin again on Maundy Thursday and then on Easter Sunday.

LET’S TALK ABOUT DYING, DEATH AND GRIEF

Talking about death and dying can be tough. It can be an uncomfortable conversation that many of us may want to avoid. It can be a time of great confusion and pain whether expected or unexpected and a time where you will need to make decisions and face difficult choices. The saying goes that it can take a village to raise a child but it can also take a village to look after someone who is dying and to support their family.

NEWS FROM THE PEWS AND VILLAGE EVENTS

UPPER SLAUGHTER

Spring heralds a period of renewal in Upper Slaughter, marked by significant projects including the restoration of the village church bells, the renovation of the Village Hall, and the recent repairs to the listed bridge and ford over the River Eye.

The church bells at St Peter's Church, an integral part of our village's heritage, have undergone a major restoration. We have 5 historic bells in the tower and are proud of their rare and historical value, two of the bells, incredibly dating from around 1490 and 1499, unsurprisingly have preservation orders on them. This restoration, was aimed at preserving the unique sound and heritage of each bell and the structures that support them. Completed in February, the restoration ensures that the bells continue to play a central role in village life, marking events and celebrations with their chimes for generations to come.

Over Easter, the bells will ring out on Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday, marking these important moments in our community calendar. The restoration was supported by the PCC and community contributions, in memory of Peter von Holzing, reflecting our collective commitment to preserving this important part of our village's identity.

In parallel, plans to renovate the Village Hall are underway. The aim is to create a space that is not only structurally sound, addressing issues like dampness and inadequate heating, but also welcoming. The vision is for the Hall to become a hub for various community activities, from workshops to social events, enhancing the village's social interactions. Fundraising efforts are crucial to realising this vision, and those wishing to contribute can reach out to our Village Hall Treasurer, Lisa Harvey, (lisamayharvey@me.com) for donation details.

In addition, the essential repairs to the bridge and ford over the River Eye have been nearly completed after months of closure and delicate negotiations with Council and Highways departments. Reopening is anticipated very soon.

These projects reflect the community's commitment to preserving our heritage and enhancing communal spaces. As we welcome the warmer

days of spring, they stand as examples of our collective effort to maintain and improve the facilities that serve as focal points for community life in our village.

It's been a very busy few weeks as always at school.

STEM (Science, technology, engineering and maths) **Project:**

We have been so privileged to take part in a project funded by Porterbrook. We have been creating locomotives from scratch and then designing and making engines to make them move independently. It has been an amazing project that the children have worked so hard on and learned a huge amount from. There are lots of pictures on the website showing the progress. We will be attending an award ceremony later in the term to celebrate all the hard work.



FOOD, GLORIOUS FOOD!

This term we have 2 classes who have been learning about food as part of their Geography and History learning. Class 2 had a topic all about China - they created dragons and learned dragon dances that were performed on the playground. They also learned how important food is in Chinese celebrations. They tasted an amazing array of food and discovered how delicious many Chinese dishes are. Class 3 have been studying food from around the World – this term with a European focus. The range of different foods from various countries and even the regions within these countries is huge. They went on a trip to Pizza Express in Witney where they created their own pizza and discovered the wide range of places where good ingredients come from. It was a great lesson in what food miles are and the choices we make to ensure our diet is balanced and healthy – they also reported the pizzas were delicious!

VALUES

Our core value this term has been Forgiveness – very apt for this time of year. We have been learning stories from the Bible that show forgiveness but we have also been looking at stories of how forgiveness has been so hard and yet it happens all around the world. This is a powerful lesson for our children to learn and as they grow older we hope the values they

Our British value this term has been Democracy – we are very conscious of all the elections that will happen across the world this year and how much can change due to the leaders chosen. We have our own democratic processes here in school when we choose House captains and School councillors. We also had a visit from a representative of the Houses of Parliament to show our older pupils how democracy works in our country.

This term our children have participated in Tag rugby, football and floor ball competitions against many other schools. We've done really well and are through to the finals in a few competitions in the coming weeks.
