Catalytic Converter Thefts

There has been a big increase in catalytic converter thefts across Oxfordshire. Offences happen throughout the week, Saturdays and Tuesdays being the worst affected days, and are occurring mainly overnight

Vehicles targeted are: Honda Civics, Toyota Auris and Honda Jazz.

Thieves target vehicles in car parks, on the street and driveways at any time of the day or night; and will usually work in groups, some to be as look outs and another to remove the catalytic converter.

Local Elections

As the local elections approach on Thursday 6 May 2021, West Oxfordshire District Council is preparing to make sure all polling stations available for those who wish to vote in person are safe and Covid secure. Voting in person will be different this year with polling stations following the Covid secure rules seen across shops and other indoor locations during the pandemic. This will include voters wearing masks, using hand sanitiser, social distancing and making sure items touched in the polling booths are cleaned. Staff will also be taking the necessary precautions to keep safe and have received additional training to help advise and support voters.

Voters are encouraged to bring their own masks and pen or pencil on the day to reduce wastage on the day, however, for those that need them they will be available.



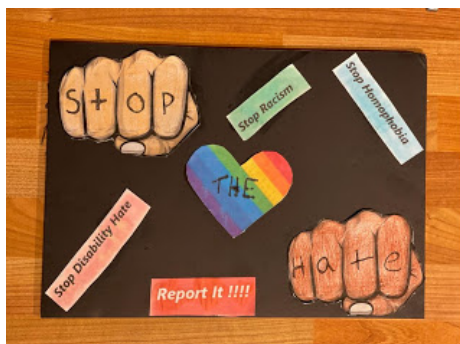
New West Oxfordshire symptom-free testing centre open

A new symptom-free testing centre has opened in Carterton to allow local residents to access testing, otherwise known as lateral flow testing. Any residents who work or volunteer in a role where they have close contact with people outside their home, including child minders, are eligible for these tests. It is recommended that they are tested regularly. The site in Carterton is hosted at Brownes Hall in the Town Centre and residents may book a symptom-free test as part of the county-wide testing programme. The site, which has been set up by WODC and OCC's Fire and Rescue Service, is open for six days a week with full details posted on the OCC website.

Anyone who is showing symptoms should book a different type of test, called a PCR test, through the Government website at <https://www.gov.uk/get-coronavirus-test>. These tests are done at different testing sites across the county.

Young people illustrate the power of art in the battle against hate crime

A special competition promoted by WODC designed to highlight and raise awareness of hate crime among young people has been voted a success. The 11-year-old winner produced a striking poster with the slogan 'Stop the Hate' urging people to report disability, racism and homophobia.



Oxfordshire libraries set to reopen in April

OCC planned a phased approach to the re-opening of libraries and will be maintaining safety measures including track and trace, use of face coverings and social distancing.

Think 111 First

As we enter new stages of lockdown Oxfordshire residents are asked to contact NHS 111, first via 111 online or telephone if they are thinking of attending an Emergency Department, Minor Injury or First Aid Unit. They will then be assessed and, if appropriate, booked into either a First Aid Unit, Minor Injury Unit or the John Radcliffe or Horton General Hospital Emergency Department for treatment.

However, if it would be more appropriate for them to receive clinical advice elsewhere, they will be advised on:

- How to self-care if required
- Visiting their local pharmacy, dentist, optician, or their own GP for help
- Visiting a local minor injuries unit



Witney cycling and pedestrian improvements

An enhanced cycling and walking connection between Tower Hill and Madley Park is being created, incorporating the town centre, shops, schools and businesses. Following consultation feedback, Holloway Road will remain open and the proposed bus lane on Corn Street has been deferred to be considered within the Witney transport strategy review. Shared paths will be widened to three metres wherever possible to create a safer environment to cycle and walk. The scheme is set to be completed in May.

Rail link Oxford to Carterton

The Witney Oxford Transport group is campaigning to re-establish a rail link between Oxford and Carterton. The group has made a bid to the government's Restoring Your Railway Fund to carry out a feasibility study to explore plans to build a new line between Oxford, Witney and Carterton.

They are currently lobbying OCC to protect land for a possible route in the future as part of the authority's plans to widen the A40 project. This would ensure that the line could be built in the future and utilise the park and ride facilities at Eynsham for a rail station. Without this protected land the project would be blocked.

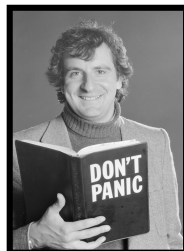

Page 3 Bird – Nightingale

12th May is International Nurses Day, which is on Florence Nightingale's Birthday; so it felt fitting to introduce you to Flo, the nightingale, this month.



The humble nightingale may not have a distinctive appearance, but its song is mesmerising: perfectly pitched, and most often heard in the dead of night. (but it's actually Laurence the

nightingale that we hear singing at night, not Flo). "Nightingale" is derived from "night", and the Old English *galan*, "to sing". Flo builds her nest on or just above ground level and feeds on insects, mainly through foraging on the ground – she is particularly partial to ants and beetles. The first ever live radio broadcast of birdsong was of a nightingale in 'concert' with the cellist, Beatrice Harrison, on 19 May 1924 in Oxted, Surrey.

Apidae is the largest family within the super family Apoidea, containing at least 5700 species of bees. Bees and other pollinators, such as butterflies, bats and hummingbirds, are increasingly under threat from human activities.

Grilled Apricots with Honey Mascarpone serves 6

It's apricot season in the UK from May – September.
 Make the most of these tasty fruits with this delicious dessert
 – perfect for evenings in the garden with a bbq.
 Switch the apricots for peaches later in the summer if you
 prefer.

Ingredients

6 apricots mostly ripe 3 tbsp olive oil
 1 tsp brown sugar 1 ½ cups mascarpone
 2 tsp vanilla extract Fresh thyme optional
 4 tbsp honey plus more for topping, optional

Method

1. Wash apricots and slice each lengthwise then remove the pit. Brush each apricot half with olive oil then sprinkle with brown sugar.
2. Heat a grill pan, outdoor grill or skillet and add apricots skin side up when warm. Cook until soft and slightly charred. While apricots are cooking prepare the honey mascarpone.
3. Combine mascarpone, vanilla extract and honey in a bowl and stir with a whisk until light and combined.
4. When apricots are cooked serve each warm with a spoonful of honey mascarpone. Drizzle each with additional honey and fresh thyme if desired. Enjoy!

Handy Hints for Horticulturalists

Jobs for your garden this May:

- * Watch out for late frosts
- * Train your sweet peas (tricks are optional)
- * Plant out summer bedding at the end of the month
- * Mow weekly and weed regularly (necessary evils)
- * Check for nesting birds before clipping hedges
- * Lift and divide daffodils and other spring flowering bulbs
- * Earth up potatoes, and plant any still remaining
- * Optimise your watering regime (watering early and late to get the most out of your water); and start collecting and recycling water whenever possible
