Christians have worshipped God in Ladbroke for more than 1000 years.


Today, we invite people of all faiths or none to join us at one of our services, come inside to pray, contemplate or explore this fascinating place.

Ladbroke church is over 700 years old. Its unusual striped tower is made from local White Lias and iron-rich Hornton stone.

The interior was transformed in 1876 by the famous Victorian architect, Sir George Gilbert Scott, better known for the front of St Pancras Station, London.

The windows have wonderful stained glass from many different studios.




A warm welcome to All Saints Ladbroke,

with their prayers.






