## Background: Walter Hill

Walter Hill was born in 1884 in Hadstock near Linton, Cambridgeshire to Josiah and Abigail Hill. In 1891 the family lived in Linton where Josiah was a brewer's labourer. Before marriage Josiah had served in the army for 7 years, including a stint in India. The children were Walter (7) Alfred (4) Josiah (3) and Percy (1). The children had a settled, happy childhood:

'When they visited Snettisham and Dersingham , Norfolk, where their maternal grandparents lived, the older brothers used to go out in punts, wildfowling on the marshes and the children collected cockles and mussels for tea from the beach.'<sup>1</sup>

In 1901 the Hills were living in Little Oxcombe, Louth, Lincolnshire. Josiah and his three eldest sons (including 17-year old Walter) were farm labourers. There were 3 further siblings for Walter: Rowena, born in 1893, Florence (born 1897) and Enoch (1899). Percy died aged 4 in 1894. In 1910, Walter married Mabel Squires (1888-1971<sup>2</sup>) of Coleby, who already had a daughter, Mabel, who was one year old (b. Sleaford 1909).

In the census of 1911 they are living on Low Street, Collingham (near 'The Old Bakery') in a 4roomed house so probably moved to the village around 1910. As well as Mabel (2) they have a boy, Walter Jr, 9 months, baptised on 4<sup>th</sup> Sept 1910 in All Saints' church. Walter was a farm labourer.

There is another son, Henry (baptised in All Saints 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1912<sup>3</sup>). According to the Kirk Family research on Ancestry.co.uk, Mabel went on to have 5 more children with another partner after Walter was killed: (Herbert born 1921) (Stanley 1923), Leslie (1925) Melvi (1927-1929) and Vera (1930), all with surname Hill. Mabel remarried in 1941 (aged 57) to Navenby native Herbert Bellamy, born 1893 & likely to be the father of Mabel's subsequent children. Mabel is buried in Navenby. One of Walter's sisters, Florence, lived in Walesby, Notts.

## Military History: Sgt. Walter Hill

In WW1 Walter Hill served in the Royal Field Artillery which provided firepower in support of the cavalry. His medal index card indicates he enlisted (at Newark<sup>4</sup>) early in the war as he was awarded the 1914-15 Star.

## The Royal Regiment of Artillery (RRA)

At the time of the Great War the RRA had three elements:

- The *Royal Horse Artillery*: armed with light, mobile, horse-drawn guns that in theory provided firepower in support of the cavalry and in practice supplemented the Royal Field Artillery.
- The *Royal Field Artillery*: the most numerous arm of the artillery, the horse-drawn RFA was responsible for the medium calibre guns and howitzers deployed close to the front line and was reasonably mobile. It was organised into brigades.
- The Royal Garrison Artillery: developed from fortress-based artillery located on British coasts. From 1914 when the army possessed very little heavy artillery it grew into a very large component of the British forces. It was armed with heavy, large calibre guns and howitzers that were positioned some way behind the front line and had immense destructive power.'

extract from 'The Long, Long Trail'<sup>5</sup>:

The RFA (Royal Field Artillery) was in 'B' battery of the 110<sup>th</sup> Brigade, part of the 25<sup>th</sup> Division (under General Gough's 5<sup>th</sup> Army). Each battery consisted of six 13 pounder field guns, 228 horses, 5 officers and 200 men.

## 'The Capture of Westhoek.' (part of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Battle of Ypres)

'On 8 July 1917, Divisional HQ was established at Busseboom and came under orders of II Corps for the opening of the Third Ypres offensive. When the attack began on 31 July, 25th Division was in Corps Reserve, behind 24th, 30th and 8th Divisions which were in the front line. On 10 August, 74th Brigade took part in the renewal of the attack. In a successful action, Westhoek was captured, although at a severe cost: 47 officers and 1244 men killed, wounded or missing. This was mainly due to German aircraft sniping from overhead.'<sup>6</sup>

Sgt Walter Hill was one of the 1,244 casualties. He is buried in the Belgian Battery Corner Cemetery which is 2 km south of Ypres. His headstone is inscribed 'Gone but not forgotten'. Plot I.J.10

Mabel Hill's address at the time was given as Navenby, Lincs.

Sgt Walter Hill is also remembered on the North Collingham War Memorials at All Saints Church.
