A member of the team can then discuss the findings with the householder. It's amazing what savings can be made with some simple and modest solutions.

Would you like to have your home surveyed to see if you can have a warmer home and save a bit of money?

According to Citizen's Advice, homes lose on average £350 a year from draughts and poor insulation and for the least efficient houses that figure almost trebles!

Money we don't have as a parish church.

Maintaining the fabric of the church to keep it as an open 365 day-a-year facility, is an ongoing task.

One action that we can take ourselves is to re-start the SpeedWatch team.



The next walk is on Friday 17th October, meeting at 11am at the car park opposite The Griffin PH.






It's a 5 mile easy and flat-ish circuit.

Ward Councillor's Report

Caroline Gladwin was unable to attend our monthly Parish Council meeting but provided a report. Here is a summary.

As a Reform UK Councillor, I have joined Independent Councillor Adams in forming the ABC Group in order to access valuable Committee seats beneficial to Central Rural.

I am now a Member of the Children's Services, Education and Skills Committee and I attended the meeting on 2nd October when 'school place planning' was discussed. I registered my objection to any school closures at all on the Island. I am committed to securing more funding for schools and education, particularly rural schools.

At the Extraordinary Meeting of Full Council, in the vote on whether to accept Devolution and the Mayoral Combined County Authority, I voted in favour and the result was 26 for and 9 against. At this meeting it was announced that as ABC Group Leader I would have a say in the process.

I also met with Parish Councillors Donoclift and Mansell at Lily Cross and committed to looking into the hold-up that is taking place in the Isle of Wight legal department that is preventing work from starting on the new footpaths and road crossing in West Street and Newport Road.

Are Working Groups a new idea?

Working Groups have been operating in Parish Councils for quite some time. They are a way for residents to have a real impact on what goes on in their community.

Working Groups enable more people to have a direct say in what goes on in the parish and how the money raised through local council tax is spent.

The Parish Council benefits enormously from having much more input from those it is meant to serve. The Parish Council can then make much better decisions, decisions which benefit more of the community.

What does a Working Group do?

The main responsibilities are:

- Make recommendations to the Parish Council
- Propose and manage budgets supporting the group's needs
- Provide appropriate training for its Councillors and volunteers
- Organise and resource the working groups projects/activities
- Keep residents informed of its activities by publishing in the Godshill Gazette
- Provide updates at meetings of the Parish Council

What Working Group are there?

There are six:

- Amenities & Environment
- Communications & Community Engagement
- Emergency & Resilience
- Finance and General Purposes

- Planning, Roads & Byways
- Strategy & Parish Plan

If I join a Working Group, what will I have to do?

A working group has one or more Councillors assigned to it. You would be part of the group as a volunteer. This means that you commit whatever time and effort you are able, to the group. This could be bringing your knowledge to the group in a meeting once a month through to spending several days on some specific task. If you join a group to help make something happen, afterwards, you are then free to leave the group if you wish.

So, what should I do?

If you think you might be interested in joining one of the working groups, either chat to one of the parish councillors or email the clerk at clerk@godshill-iow-parish.gov.uk. We will then listen to what you have to say. It is as much you interviewing us as the other way around. We will do what we can to enable you to become involved.

The Latest from your PC

This month, the Parish Council has started to organize its activities into the six working groups and report progress under those six headings. Some Councillor activities will not fall within these six headings and those will be reported separately.

Here is a summary of the main activity that has been going on in each of the Working Groups.

Amenities & Environment

Arrangements have been made to tackle the hedge between the free car park and the main road.

Goal posts moved in Central Mead.

Much work done in the Memorial Garden.

Public Conveniences – looking at several ways of cutting the costs.

A number of meetings related to the Greening Campaign.

Warmer Homes – several have already volunteered for training to do surveys.

Communications & Community Engagement

The main focus here is getting the website running efficiently and including all of the information it should.

A certain amount of time has been spent collecting information for the Gazette and then, in the week before publication, assembling and editing that information.

There is scope for a few volunteers to assist on the website, the Gazette and social media.

Emergency & Resilience

Flooding – The Parish Council is looking into having a supply of sandbags in the village. We need residents to report, as soon as possible, any and all drains that are currently blocked. This should be done on FixMyStreet https://fms.islandroads.com/

Finance and General Purposes

The position of Parish Clerk has been advertised, and we are dealing with a significant number of applicants. Applications close on 17 October.

The process of building a budget for 2026-27 is about to start.

Planning, Roads & Byways

Replacement of solar 30mph warning at eastern end of village – ongoing.

A number of TROs have been submitted.

IoW Council legal department are the hold up in getting the new paths, access road and crossing on West Street and Newport Road.

Legal and ownership issues are preventing IoW Council giving the go ahead on any action related to the Church path alongside the Bats Wing.

All parties are in agreement that there should be double yellow lines along the first part of Yarborough Close where it joins Newport Road.

Speedwatch – need another 8 volunteers in order to re-start the programme in Godshill.

Strategy & Parish Plan

No activity here. Whilst the Parish Council does not officially have to have a 5 year Parish Plan, it makes sense for us to have at least some stated long term objectives set out in the form of a plan.

Why no Bus Shelters?

The two busiest bus stops in the village, the two in the High Street, have never had bus shelters.

Pat, one of those in the public gallery at the Parish Council meeting earlier this week, highlighted the fact that despite her best efforts in the past, it has never been possible to persuade the powers that be, to install bus shelters on the High Street.

The Parish Council agreed to take another look at it.
