Dear Resident,

I thought it would be helpful to update you on two major developments.

Following the recent publication of the South East Plan, a major consultation is underway on the number of **gypsy and traveller pitches** that each county in the region should take. The former South East England Regional Assembly (SEERA) proposed that Kent and Medway should take 75% per cent of the additional pitches, a total of some 35. I argued at the last Gypsy and Traveller Board meeting that our county should take no more than 50% and that the pitches should be spread across the county more evenly. It is very difficult however for Members to consider such figures in isolation from knowing where these pitches will be. I am concerned that the good relations that have existed for many years between settled residents and the gypsy and traveller community could be adversely affected if too many pitches are sited closely together.

I have been in a series of meetings with KCC, MBC, the StopKig group, the Joint Parishes Group and the Campaign to Protect Rural England (CRPE) to ensure that our arguments are consistent, based upon strong evidence and meet the Inspector's request to avoid unnecessary duplication. The Public Inquiry will start on 13 October and will last 6-8 weeks. An evening session will be held to enable those who work in the day to air their views. I would urge as many of you as possible to attend the Public Inquiry whenever you can as this will give a resounding message to the Inspector of the strength of local feeling. If you can attend, please contact the Stop KIG group (secretary@stopkig.org) to advise of the dates you will be available and whether you can attend a morning or afternoon session. It will run Tuesday to Friday each week, normally 10am to 5pm, but will occasionally start at 9.30, with an early finish on a Friday. During the Half Term week in October, the Inquiry will only sit on the 29th and 30th. Please do come along.

Grafty Garden Cuttings – August

There are at least three fledgling thrushes, chasing mum around the garden, demanding to be fed. They are more successful than the blackbirds that made such an untidy nest near the back door. They only managed to raise one huge and ever hungry youngster. We heard it for days, deep in the border, voice constantly raised to its ever tattier father - mother seemed to have given up and ignored it. Three buzzards can now be seen circling above us, so they too must have reared a youngster successfully.

The year is also a good one for wasps and butterflies. The former are around in hordes, with a large and very active nest in our alpine beds (former coal bunkers), which we decided to deconstruct and reconstruct elsewhere. After various attempts to dislodge the lodgers, which only succeeded in making them terribly annoyed, Michael tugged at a plant to remove it and out came said hordes to chase him halfway through the village, stinging him several times. We called in professional help. The plant had removed their roof, so no wonder they were a little irked!

The butterflies are far more acceptable and rise in dozens every time we walk around the garden, more than we have seen for years. Peacocks and Painted Ladies predominate, with Cabbage White, Commas and Small Copper close behind, plus a few Red Admirals. The environmesh has worked well, keeping the cabbages caterpillar free and looking as healthy as any I have ever grown, although the weeds like it too.

Hedging is an on-going job. Beech hedges should be trimmed in late July and Yew in the third week of August, all others as needed. We cut our mixed hedges while growth is young, rake it out and mow it up so it can be composted. This may mean two or three cuts a year but is far easier and quicker and encourages bushy growth for the full height of the hedge, provided they are not taken back too close to the main stems/trunks/branches.

For the rest of the month, it is the usual weeding, trimming, lawn maintenance, fruit picking, et al. Weeding paths can be a time consuming task: rather like painting the Forth bridge, once finished, start again, so organic or not, I resort to a residual weedkiller, Doff Total Path Weedkiller which lasts up to a year, or Pathclear. Saves hours of fun with a knife, knee pads and back ache.

Visit of note: the World Garden at Lullingstone castle. We (the Garden Club), enjoyed a very pleasant afternoon there, as a follow-up to Tom Hart-Dyke's talk. Some of us managed to chat to him, which was a bonus and the garden is maturing nicely with lots of interest, in a fabulous setting.

Doorstep Callers

Doorstep Callers offering most goods or services valued at over £35.00 should provide you with a 7 day cancellation period in writing. A recent change to the law means that you will be able to cancel any contract made while in your home; this applies to both cold callers and businesses you invite to call. Always carefully consider any offer that is made to you at your door. If you are told work needs to be done on your property take extra care. There are very few jobs around the house that need to be done immediately. Do not be pressurised into making an instant decision.

Scam Mail

Scam mail could be mail order catalogues, letters asking for your assistance in transferring money, letters telling you that you have won a prize in a draw or offering to tell you your future. Never respond as it could increase the amount of scam mail that you will get. Dispose of it in your recycling bag remembering to remove any personal information.

Unwanted Mail

By registering with the Mail Preference Service it is possible to reduce the amount that is received. It is a free service. It is unlikely that this will stop any mailings from abroad.

The August Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Cancer at the start of the month, and moves into Leo in mid August.

Full Moon occurs on Thursday 6th August, when the Moon is in the constellation of Capricornus, and New Moon is on Thursday 20th August.

Again this month it will not be possible to see Mercury, as it is at its greatest elongation on 24th August, and sets only a few minutes after the Sun.

Venus is rising about three hours before the Sun, and by dawn it can be clearly seen just above the eastern horizon. Even in the twilight conditions its brightness dominates the eastern sky.

Mars is rising in the northeast around midnight, and by dawn it is high in the eastern sky. During the month it is moving eastward out of Taurus and into Gemini.

Jupiter is at opposition to the Sun on 14th August, so it rises as the Sun sets, and can be seen due south at midnight. Through a telescope it may be possible to see its two dark equatorial cloud-belts, together with some of Jupiter's four moons.

At the beginning of the month it may be possible to see Saturn in the western sky just after sunset, but by the end of the month we will have lost sight of the Ringed Planet.

Whilst still on the subject of Saturn, some of you may have read that gas jets, that could signify an underground water supply, have been spotted by scientists on one of Saturn's moons, suggesting it could be a home for extraterrestrial life.

A team from the Max Planck Institute in Heidelberg has identified seawater salt in ice grains forming Saturn's outermost ring. Scientists already know that the ring is replenished by plumes of water spurting into space by Saturn's sixth largest moon, Enceladus. Organic chemicals have also been detected in the plumes.

The Grafty Gourmet

I thought I would attempt fate, by suggesting a Barbecue recipe this month. Well it is supposed to be summer! These Kebabs are simple to make, and a delicious served with Mango Chutney. The kebabs can be made well in advance, and stored in the fridge. If you are using wooden skewers, soak them in water for 30 minutes first. This will prevent them burning when on the barbecue.

Spiced Chicken & Cashew Kebabs

Serves 4 to 6

500g chopped boneless and skinless chicken thighs.
50g blanched cashews chopped
2 spring onions, finely chopped
1 tbsp finely chopped coriander
Small knob of fresh root ginger, finely grated
½ tsp garam Marsalla
½ tsp turmeric
½ tsp ground coriander
½ tsp ground cumin
1 tsp hot chilli powder
Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
1 medium egg, beaten
Olive Oil, for basting
Mango chutney, to serve

- 1.** Put the chicken in the bowl of a food processor and pulse until coarsely minced. Transfer to a large mixing bowl and add the nuts, spring onions, coriander, ginger and dry spices. Season well with salt and pepper.
- 2.** Mix everything together, adding a little of the beaten egg to bind (don't add too much egg or the mixture will become too wet to handle).
- 3.** Scoop out a golf ball-sized portion of the mixture and wrap around the end of a skewer into a thick sausage shape. Repeat with the rest of the mixture to make 10-12 kebabs. Chill in the fridge for at least 1 hour to firm up.
- 5.** Wait for that rare moment of English sunshine and light the Barbecue. Brush the kebabs with a little oil, then grill on a hot barbecue or griddle for about 10 minutes, turning occasionally. Serve with mango chutney on the side.

HOW ARE YOUR REFLEXES?

Having moved into this benefice in April it is a privilege to be asked to contribute to the parish magazines.

My new role is Archbishops' Missioner. I am charged, by our Archbishops, with the task of helping the parishes and dioceses of the Church of England (together with our Methodist and United Reformed partners) reach out to the majority of our population, who have little or no contact with the church. The challenge is either to draw them into our churches, through our hospitality and Christian concern, or, as will often be the case, to create new forms (fresh expressions) of church appropriate for them.

At the heart of all this is the belief that church exists for others, before it exists for us. In fact it exists so that in every place there would be a community introducing others to the grace they themselves had found. Grace is the only source of mission. If we have encountered the extraordinary grace of God in Jesus Christ it is transformative. The grace we have received at such cost not only saves us, through Christ's death for our sins, it changes us. By that same grace we can become, little by little, more like Christ; in other words people who live for others before themselves.

A church is God's community of people becoming like his Son. The journey closer to Christ is simultaneously a journey closer to those in need of the love of Christ, or who do not yet know Christ. Every decision in a parish or benefice has to pass one ultimate test. Will it help us introduce others to the grace of Christ? Our personal level of giving, our shared decisions about our much loved church buildings, and every decision about liturgy, styles of music or coffee in church is to be made for others, not to suit us.

This makes mission a reflex. Being loved enables love. Mission does not happen because Christ tells us to do it (although he does!) Being told to sacrifice rarely goes down well, but sacrificial living happens in response to grace. Because we have been and are loved unconditionally, we begin to find ourselves doing the same.

Grace is the only thing that can change the Len Valley, so I want to ask you a church health question. How are your reflexes?
