Boughton Malherbe Parish Council

As you may be aware the Parish Council is granted devolved funds from Maidstone Council that are for use by the Parish Council to support and encourage community activities and worthy projects within the Parish. These funds are allocated on an annual basis (April to April) and should be spent within the allocation year, otherwise funds for subsequent years may be reduced or withheld. In previous years these funds have gone to support the Village Hall, cutting the grass on the village green, the Gardening Club, Christmas Trees and Planters on the green, etc. Also in the recent past the path between Church Road and Headcorn Road by the side of the Kings Head has been resurfaced and repairs made to gates by St Nicholas Church.

Currently the Parish Council has approximately £5,100 that has yet to be allocated to specific projects or activities. That said, it is envisaged that some of these funds will be spent on some of the above, but it is clear that there may well be surplus funds that are available for allocation to causes within the Parish.

If anyone has any suggestions of how these funds can be allocated, please could they contact any member of the Parish Council (listed below) by 1st March 2010. It should be pointed out that these funds have to be spent on activities or projects within the parish boundary and they must be of benefit to the general public within the parish.



NEWS FROM YOUR VILLAGE SCHOOL

One thing seems to have dominated January – snow! The middle of the month saw some of the worst snow in south-east England for several years, bringing with it lots of fun and lots of disruption. For some school staff it created a new addiction to weather web-sites. Trying to keep the school open, whilst keeping everyone safe, proved an impossible balancing act. Weather and, in particular, the poor conditions of roads and pavements in and around Ulcombe, resulted in the school having to close for two days. Even the Friends of Ulcombe School (FUS) coffee afternoon, on Tuesday 12th January, had to be postponed unfortunately. We hope that we will be able to rearrange this sometime soon. Thank you to all of the parents for their tolerance and patience, especially on the first day of closure, when it proved difficult to get the message through to everyone.

That problem leads on to one of the main changes being introduced this term. We are currently trialling a new system which allows us to text parents if we need to contact a group of parents at the same time. The trial proved successful on the second day of closure, with a lot of positive feedback from parents. The system, when fully developed, will also enable us to email letters, instead of sending out paper copies. This will be more environmentally friendly, as well as saving us time and money in school. Many parents have reported that letters do not always make it from school to home, but this will now be done much more reliably.

Clubs

Clubs have now re-started, though a week later than planned in most cases. As always, it is fantastic to offer a wide range of clubs, including drama, football, chess, choir and ICT. As ever, we are extremely grateful to all of the adults who give up their time to offer the children something extra.

Into The Future

On Saturday 6th February FUS are holding a Beetle Drive at the school. Tickets are available from the School Office and include sausage and chips. An advance notice for all of our friends in the community is that our next Ulcombe School Friends' Dinner will be taking place on Wednesday 10th March. As usual, after a wonderful roast pork dinner prepared by our

own School Cook, with children waiting at tables, the children will then provide short pieces of entertainment based on work they are completing in class. We are especially keen to welcome the ladies of the village, including mothers and grandmothers of children at school, as this is in the week before Mothering Sunday. We look forward to seeing you there!

An introduction to touring by motor car

(from page 1 of "Newnes motorists touring guide")

"One need not be of more than middle-age to remember the first automobile or "horseless carriage" being driven to the City of London at five miles an hour, with a man hurrying along in front bearing a red flag as was then proscribed by law. Yet now, only thirty years later, we have more than 1,600,000 licensed motor vehicles (including tramcars), of which some 600,000 are private cars. In addition there are almost as many motorcycles, whilst some 1,900,000 people hold driving licences. Nothing has ever revolutionised our normal life's routine so completely as the development of mechanical transport.

Enormous sums of money have become available through motor taxation, and the highways of Great Britain are now unequalled anywhere in the world. In England and Wales there are at least 153,000 miles of roads and in Scotland some 25,000 miles. Of these 24,552 are Class I and 15,624 miles are class II. For the maintenance of our roads in a single year upwards of 44 million sterling are expended."

Our edition of the guide published in the late 1920's was sold at The Great Leeds Book Sale but, in response to popular request, the facility to publish extracts has been allowed to continue for the time being, subject to the editor's approval.

Jenny Whittle - News from County Hall



The heavy snow fall just before Christmas and in the New Year tested the resilience of all of us as well as Kent Highways Services! The main primary and secondary routes were gritted, but many people, especially the elderly, were stranded in their homes until the snow melted. KHS had gritters, JCBs and hand salting crews operating around the clock to kept the main roads open. Local farmers also played a vital part in helping to clear the snow with their ploughs. Salt bins were continually replenished, but in the borough of Maidstone alone, we had up to 50 bins that were either stolen or vandalised. There were also many cases of householders using the grit to clear their driveways, rather use it to clear the pavements.

There were many examples of residents helping each other. My car got stuck in the snow on my lane, but thankfully I have helpful neighbours who came to help push it back onto my driveway. We also took turns to walk to the shops and get essential supplies in for each other.

Later on this year KCC will be undertaking a review of our Winter Service policy. I am working with the Parish Council to look at whether we have adequate provision of salt bins and if the appropriate routes were sufficiently gritted during the snow. If you would like to share your views with me, I would welcome hearing from you.

In the meantime, KCC will undertake a $\pm 1m$ "pothole blitz" to repair some of the damage caused by the snow. I will be going around the area for a day with the potholes crew to see this work being undertaken. If you would like to advise me of particular potholes that need repairing, please let me know (although the Parish Council are excellent at keeping me up to speed!).

Wandering and Wondering in the Heaths

The Heaths Countryside Corridor will be holding a free launch event for the Wandering and Wondering project at Charing Heath and Lenham Heath Memorial Hall on Sunday, February 28th between 3pm and 7pm. This drop-in event will have a range of activities for all ages from bat walks and moth trapping through to hunts for archaeological artefacts and displays of the work that the group has already completed. Plans for the three year project will also be on display and refreshments will be provided.

This Heritage Lottery funded project will provide a range of opportunities for local people to get involved in all aspects of the Heaths Countryside Corridor project. It will provide opportunities for people to explore the natural heritage in the Charing Heath and Lenham Heath area as well as unearthing the heritage features on the three sites owned and managed by Heaths Countryside Corridor.

There will also be the chance to get involved in the project. The group will be running a series of events that will be open to all including guided walks, wildlife events, archaeological digs, talks and practical conservation activities. Benches, sculptures and panels explaining what can be seen on the sites will be installed and restoration work to ponds and the Ice House at Chilston Park will also take place. The public will be invited to get involved and influence all of the activities and work that the group does.



Unlike a College course, which has to follow a curriculum to get you a qualification, learning about computers with the Telecottage can be tailored to what you want to cover.

The Grafty Gourmet

This is a take on Steak Diane, the famous tableside dish served for eons in fancy French and "Continental" restaurants. Instead of the traditional pounded steaks for Steak Diane, I prefer using 1-inch-thick beef fillet.

Filet Steaks with Brandy Cream Sauce

Ingredients (Serves 2)

2 x 1- to 1-1/4-inch-thick pieces fillet beef (about 7-1/2 ounces each) salt and freshly ground black pepper
1 tablespoon vegetable oil (if not using a cast-iron pan)
1 tablespoon unsalted butter
3 tablespoons finely chopped shallots
1/4 cup brandy
1/2 cup beef stock
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
1/2 cup double cream
1/2 to 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice

- 1. Season each steak generously with salt and pepper. Heat a heavy-based (preferably cast-iron) frying pan on a high heat. (Add the 1 tablespoon vegetable oil if not using cast iron.) Test by touching the edge of one steak to the pan surface; it will sizzle briskly when ready. Immediately drop in the steaks and sear one side for 2 minutes. Sneak a peek to see if the first side is nicely browned. If not, continue to sear that side for another minute or so. Flip the steaks and sear the other side for 2 to 3 minutes. Reduce the heat to medium, cook for another 2 minutes, flip, and cook for another 1 to 2 minutes (for medium rare). Cook for longer if you prefer your steaks more "well done". Transfer the steaks to a warmed oven (not on, but pre-warmed) and let them rest, covered loosely with foil, while you make the sauce.
- 2. To make the pan sauce: Return the unwashed pan to medium heat. Add the butter and let it melt. Add the shallots and cook, stirring, until tender, 1 to 2 minutes. Add the brandy and stir with a wooden spoon, scraping up any browned bits stuck to the pan. Add the stock and Worcestershire sauce, raise the heat to medium high, and bring to a boil. Whisk in the mustard and then the cream. Continue to cook at a boil, stirring, until reduced to a saucy consistency, 3 to 5 minutes. Taste the sauce and season with salt, pepper, and lemon juice. Serve the steaks with the sauce.

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The February Night Sky

At the start of February the Sun is in the constellation of Capricornus and is moving into Aquarius on the 16^{th} .

New Moon occurs on Sunday 14th February, and will be visible in the southwestern sky after sunset. Full Moon occurs on Sunday 28th February, in the non-Zodiacal constellation of Sextans, just below Leo. At this phase the Moon is on the opposite side of the sky to the Sun, and rises in the east and sets in the west at sunrise.

At the start of February, Mercury is rising about an hour before the Sun, but it will be very hard to see this elusive planet in the dawn sky. By the end of the month it disappears behind the Sun.

Venus was behind the Sun last month, and is now starting to emerge into the evening sky. By the end of the month you will see this brilliant planet in the west just after sunset. We will get better views later in the year.

Mars was at its closest to the Earth last month, and is clearly visible in the east at dusk, and high in the southern sky by late evening. Mars shines with a steady orange light and is considerably brighter than the stars around it.

It will not be possible to see Jupiter this month as it is hidden behind the Sun.

Saturn rises mid evening in the east, and crosses the southern sky in the early hours. It is not at its best for viewing, and the famous rings can only be seen through a telescope.

Now on a more topical point after the recent prolonged cold spell. NASA's scientists have said that the past decade has been the warmest on record, and therefore global warming has continued unabated. Apparently the average global temperature has increased by 1.5° F (0.8° C) since 1880, when records began. An analysis of global surface temperatures carried out by NASA's Goddard Institute for Space Studies, found that last year was only a fraction cooler than 2005, the warmest on record. But generally in the Southern Hemisphere, 2009 was the warmest on record. They said that there is a substantial year-to-year variation of global temperature caused by the tropical El Nino-La Nina cycle, but taking it over a ten-year period the trend is upwards.
