Letter from Vanessa

Dear Friends

I know. It's January. It's dark and cold and you feel like Christmas is over. You may be about to take the decorations and the twinkly lights down, and you are walking the dog through the mud in the dark mornings, wondering what there is to look forward to.

But, do not fear! Because there is more feasting to be done! We stay in the Christmas season until the Feast of the Epiphany, and then Epiphany lasts until February. I think that's definitely an excuse for topping up the tub of chocolates and leaving the twinkly lights up for quite some while yet.

Epiphany means, of course, a sudden revelation of something important, and this feast celebrates the time when the Magi arrived from the East to visit the infant Jesus (having had a close call with Herod on the way). The Magi are likely to have been Zoroastrian priests from what was then Persia and is now Iran, astrologers who followed the star until the found the King they had been searching for. Dear friends,

fter four and a half months of intensive meetings, hundreds of people consulted, and lots of prayer, our Vacancy in See Committee met for the last time on 5 December. Supported by the Archbishops' Appointment Secretary, the Committee



unanimously approved the final version of our Diocesan Statement of Needs and elected the six Diocesan Representatives who will join the Crown Nominations Committee (CNC) in the next stage of the discernment process for the Bishop of Winchester.

Details of our six reps and the Statement of Needs here.

Please do keep the reps firmly in your prayers over the coming months as they carry this significant responsibility forwards on our behalf.

The <u>Statement of Needs</u> is an important document within the discernment process. It helps candidates and the wider CNC understand our diocesan community and the qualities we seek in our next Bishop. The Committee have been deeply grateful to all of you who have supported their work through prayer and engagement with the consultation process. Trying to capture the hopes, prayers, priorities and needs of our diverse diocese in a single document is a significant challenge! I am sure you will all join with me in offering our heartfelt thanks to each of the 21 members of the Vacancy in See Committee for the manner in which they have approached this task. Finally, I would like to add my personal thanks to Charles Stewart for the huge care and dedication he has shown in chairing the committee.

The process of course does not end here. The first meeting of the CNC will be on 5 January, with shortlisting in March and interviews late in April. In the meantime, the life and ministry of our diocese continues so our usual updates, resources, and support for our parishes, ministers and worshipping communities is offered below.

Castaway of The Month



In my case, as perhaps for others, music came to me via the church. As a choirboy I had the honour to sing solos from Handel, Mozart, Watts and others.

It was not however, my early experiences of church music which set my musical heart pounding. That came later when introduced to the power and beauty of classical orchestral music. Faced with a plethora of choice and little inspiration, I have opted for pieces of music which made a significant impact upon my life. I hope my choices resonate with you.

1 Ludwig Von Beethoven - Symphony No 9

This powerful choral symphony, backed by a full choir and orchestra came to me at the age of a twelve. Listened to on a proper gramophone at school where we all had to sit still, keep quiet and listen, this was no problem for me. I was enthralled by its power and beauty, and still am.

2 The Beatles - Please, Please Me

I heard this song on a small transistor radio on a school trip to Germany. Instantly transfixed, I became a fan of all Beatles music, turning to pop music as a teenager and still feeling like one whenever I hear their music, even now almost 70 years on.

3 Nina Simone – My Baby Just Cares for Me While living in as a volunteer at my local Boys Club and Adventure Centre, a course leader played me several jazz numbers, one of which was Nina Simone's soulful voice. Her phrasing and vulnerability

transcended other jazz I had heard, and she remains a firm favourite.



4 The Beach Boys - Good Vibrations

As a would-be surf bum back in the late 60s I fell into the Beach Boys and Pet Sounds. It was however Good Vibrations, written by Brian Wilson, with its harmonies & symphonic approach which grabbed my attention & respect. I shall always remember it.

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5 Simon & Garfunkel – Bridge Over Troubled Water

I met my wife in 1969 and promptly fell hopelessly in love. Simon & Garfunkel provided our soundtrack, and the title song will forever be in my heart. I can almost feel the love sickness as I write this, proving I am both an incurable romantic and incredibly blessed.

6 Pink Floyd - Dark Side of the Moon

On an extended holiday to Canada in 1974, my friend from childhood and our days trying to surf in Cornwall, introduced me to this album. A year later at Knebworth Park, Marilyn & I experienced a live performance of Dark Side of The Moon, preceded by a debut performance of Wish You Were Here. How I wish I could go back.

7 Rimsky Korsakov – Scheherazade



Classical music was never far away. I knew some classical music and composers, although could rarely name pieces of music or who had composed them. That all changed with the emergence of Classic FM who produced a monthly magazine with a free CD. One of which was Scheherazade, recorded by the Radio Symphony Orchestra Ljubljana and conducted by Anton Nanut. Why is this important? Because the orchestra & conductor captured perfectly the gypsy

soul and rhythms of the music, making this my go to recording.

8 Gregory Porter - Liquid Spirit

I knew Gregory Porter's rich, silky voice from the radio, but it was not until I listened to this album, enroute to Singapore, that I appreciated his amazing talent. That led to a re-engagement with the world of Jazz and a quest to seek out live musical performances of all types.

Favourite Recording – Scheherazade Favourite Book – Endurance, Shackleton's Incredible Voyage by Alfred Lancing Luxury – a warm duyet.

Mermaids and Mermen in Church

nother of the unexpected images which are very common in old churches are mermaids and mermen. They can be found both near the sea and also inland. I had not realised how many there are until I started looking for them.

I had always heard about the famous mermaid at Zennor, near Land's End. She is on a very old, old bench end and the local legend tells how a young man from the village was lured away by a beautiful woman who

was really a mermaid, and he was never seen again.

This tale is typical of the thinking behind the image used in so many churches. Mermaids are famous for their beautiful voices, enticing everyone, especially sailors, with their songs. They were closely

linked with sirens who were a deadly danger. Sirens were sometimes shown as birds with human faces, and it was later that they were shown with fish tails. They represented the Devil and the dangers of being attracted to evil. The fish, the symbol of Christianity, has been perverted by the Evil One.

ermaids therefore appear often in church carvings. In the examples here they are on misericords, a pulpit, a bench end and a roof boss. But they are everywhere. A delicate wall painting at Bramley in Hampshire has two mermaids in an amazing sea scene with ships and fish, and the font at Anstey, Cambs., had a splendid merman (would they have been to lure women?) in high relief on each of the four corners. The Anstev mermen have two tails, as can be seen sometimes with mermaids too (think of Starbucks). Mermaids are usually carrying a mirror and a comb, seducing by their beauty as well as by their singing.

From the Archives The Messenger January 1967

Mr & Mrs J. White In March 1934 Mr and Mrs White opened their Village Stores and nine years later they took over the Post Office. Now they have retired and we wish them every happiness in the years to come. I have enjoyed talking to them about the Ampfield of many years ago - back to the time when Mr White baked his own bread and delivered it by horse and cart. Mrs White was brought to the village by her parents when she was two years old and she has a fund of interesting stories about the Church and the school from the time just before World War I. Her father was a very keen Church worker and was a Churchwarden for many years.
