Speeding: the big topic this month

Stanton Harcourt with Sutton Parish Council receives numerous concerns about speeding through and around our village. We are approaching this issue as a Parish Council priority via several initiatives:

1) Road Gates

A pair of road gates have been installed on the road from Standlake to Stanton Harcourt – they have been placed on the roadside by Oxfordshire County Council, between the entrance to the cricket club and the entrance of the new Airfield housing estate. With the aim of slowing down vehicles as they enter the village from the Standlake/Northmoor direction. We look forward to seeing how effective a speeding deterrent these gates are.

2) Speedwatch

Our community Speedwatch team has reformed and as always more volunteers are always welcome. Before community teams can be deployed to the roadside, they undergo training sessions, to ensure risk assessments have been completed and protocols have been adhered to. Speedwatch has proven in the past to be a deterrent, people drive slower through areas where there is Speedwatch activity. We appreciate that the police cannot be everywhere all the time, but the public can and that is exactly where the strength of well-organised Community Speedwatch steps in to play a vital role providing the police with the data they need to enforce speed limits effectively.

3) 20mph Zone

Reducing vehicle speed and increasing safety on our village roads is something that Stanton Harcourt Parish Council has been investigating for many years. In December 2020, Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) unanimously agreed that all new residential streets will be restricted to 20mph. Other villages have already made the switch more broadly: Charlbury reduced their speeds in April 2020. Eynsham has initiated the process with the view of reducing the speed of all traffic on residential streets to 20mph. Nationally, Wales is preparing to make 20mph the default speed limit across the country by 2023. The benefits from such schemes are now widely recognised.

The Stanton Harcourt Parish Council would like to see all residential areas within Stanton Harcourt and Sutton cover by a 20mph zone. We recognise that this won't be a welcome prospect for everyone. There are concerns about how to enforce these new limits and the ongoing risk of anti-social driving, plus the financial investment. There are others who feel passionately that the speed limit reduction is the right step for our village. Many residents like to walk or cycle around the village, take, or send children to school on foot. Such activity brings many benefits. It keeps people physically active, both young and old. For example, did you know that only 21.2% of young people in Oxfordshire are getting the daily recommended amount of exercise? We want everyone to feel safe and able to walk around the village and enjoy the facilities provided and maintain the community spirit - and for some, simply being able to leave the house can reduce isolation and loneliness. Cyclists will feel more comfortable sharing the roads if the traffic is moving more slowly, with the choice of bike over car serving our environment by reducing emissions.

The safety statistics are compelling: casualties from road accidents fall by 20% if the speed limit is reduced to 20mph. Evidence also shows that less fuel is burnt when a car moves more slowly. It's not the great inconvenience that many drives fear, either: it takes just 60 seconds longer to drive through the village at 20mph rather than 30mph. Unfortunately, whatever the speed limit there is there will always be some anti-social individuals who think they know better and ignore speed limits, but the vast majority comply with these speed limits for the benefit of their communities.

This is a longer-term project, there are several steps we need to go through that will lead up to a public consultation on speed limit reductions – and we are dependent on the busy OCC Communities Department for technical support to get started.

4) B4449

We recognise that we may not be able to include the B4449 in the initial 20mph zone project as this road is an authorised HGV route, so we are working with our County and District councillors to establish what options are available to make this road safe for the residents of the village and reduce the issue of noise and vibration caused by poorly inset services hatches for BT Openreach and Thames water as well as the speeding issue.

Beware the Ragwort plant

I would like to draw attention to a plant that might look pretty but is toxic. In gardens it is fine when you do not have pets that could eat it. Touching it will not kill you but over time it can cause liver damage. When ingested by animals it kills, although animals and horses especially do not eat it when flowering, when it has died back they will. It causes irreparable liver damage and usually the poor animal has to be put down. The plant is tall and covered in yellow flowers. You can, if early



enough spray it and kill it. Please be aware and destroy it as each plant has around 50,000 seeds and it's a constant battle to annihilate. So, although at first it may not be harmful, overtime it spreads and becomes very harmful to livestock.

Page 3 Bird: Song Thrush

Meet Steve the Song Thrush, he's a smashing little fellow. Steve is easily recognisable with his brown back and spotted breast

You'll know Steve's about because of two very distinctive sounds. The first is his song: a series of notes repeated three or four times, drawn from an impressive repertoire of around 100 phrases – he's not been signed by Virgin Records yet, but it's only a matter of time. The second is the smashing of snail shells against his favourite rock. Steve claims this is to get at the juicy treat inside, but we suspect he's taking the opportunity to experiment with percussion.

Sadly, we don't hear either very often now as numbers of this once familiar garden resident have declined dramatically. When the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch began in 1979, the song thrush was the 10th most seen bird in gardens across the country. By last year it had fallen to number 26 in the results charts.

Don't worry, there's some good news for Steve and his friends. Recent records show that the birds may be recovering, partly thanks to the rise of nature friendly farming and gardening.

What can you do to help?

Provide dense hedges for birds to make their home, and avoiding the use of slug pellets. By tolerating a few slugs and snails, or using ways to remove them that are less harmful to other wildlife, you'll be making life a lot easier for this much loved songbird.

Kelsey is hoping to go home with ideas that can alter this situation.

Kelsey has been unlucky enough to be here throughout the pandemic so her time in the UK has been somewhat different from what we would all have hoped. As soon as we were allowed, we arranged a visit for her and another Rotary scholar to come and explore a little of the English countryside.

Bluebell woodland is special in the UK, but rare to nonexistent in other parts of the world, so we thought they would enjoy seeing this spectacular sight at its peak. We walked through Pinsley Wood to take tea in an English country garden. I think they were suitably awed by the carpet of blue

and hopefully enjoyed the tea almost as much.

Kelsea returns to the US next month, but we are intending to keep in touch to hear how her plans unfold and to offer any help we can.



Squash and ricotta pasta bake

We're heading into squash season, so what better way to use up your extra yield this autumn? Great served with crispy kale and roasted tomatoes.

Ingredients (serves 4)

- 1 butternut squash, chopped olive oil
- 2 cloves of garlic, peeled and finely sliced
- 1 bunch of fresh basil , leaves picked, stalks finely chopped
- 1 x 400 g tins of chopped tomatoes
- sea salt
- 500 g dried penne pasta
- 3 tablespoons ricotta
- -750 ml vegetable stock
- 150 g mozzarella ball
- 1 handful Parmesan cheese , grated
- 2 sprigs fresh sage
- 1 fresh chilli (optional)

Method

1. Preheat your oven to 200°C/400°F/gas

Place the squash on a baking tray, drizzle with olive oil and pop in the hot oven for around 15 minutes, or until tender.

- 2. Pour a couple of lugs of olive oil into a large frying pan, fry the garlic and basil stalks for a couple of minutes. Add tomatoes to the pan, and bring to the boil. Drop in the roasted squash, bring to the boil, then simmer for 10 minutes.
- 3. Bring a large pot of salted water to the boil, add the penne and cook for a couple of minutes less than it says on the packet. Drain, then toss with the sauce.
- 4. Tear up the basil leaves and sprinkle into the pan with some salt and pepper. Stir in the ricotta and the stock, then bring back to the boil.
- 5. Rub a large baking tray, ovenproof pan or earthenware dish with olive oil and spoon in all the pasta and sauce. Tear over the ball of mozzarella and top with the Parmesan. Rub the sage leaves with a little olive oil and put on top.
- 6. Pop it into the preheated oven and bake for 15 minutes or until golden and bubbling. Serve with a crisp green salad.
- TIP: Try adding a chopped fresh chilli to your tomato sauce.

Handy Hints for Horticulturalists

- Plant spring flowering bulbs
- * Leave sunflower seedheads in place for birds to feed on
- Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- Keep summer bedding flowering until the first frost by deadheading and feeding regularly
- * Plant wallflowers, pansies, forget-me-nots and other spring bedding in pots and borders

Who Do You Think You Are?



Are you someone who enjoys investigating your family history? Could you help others find out about their ancestry?

Looking into family history is easier than ever with lots of records online. Nigel Tomsett and his wife visited the village in early July to help understand what they had investigated about his ancestry during lockdown.

Nigel's mother was Sylvia Winifred Akers. She lived in the house called Akers in Sutton until she went into service in the late 1920s. Sylvia got married in Stanton Harcourt church in 1932. She was in service with Miss Arnatt at Parsonage House before leaving the village for service elsewhere

Nigel's grandfather, great grandfather and great, great grandfather ran the Harcourt Arms from the early 1800s until about 1910. His great great grandfather also ran the Masons Arms at Brize Norton.

Nigel also credited Ellie and Sean at the Harcourt Arms saying "they were extremely helpful to us" and commented that "we found everyone we met in the villages friendly and charming. Your community is a credit to you all and your publication is a good example."
