

Welcome!

Hello and welcome to November's bulletin!

Some interesting facts and dates for this month begin on the 2nd November 1936, when the world's first regular TV service was started by the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) and just an estimated 100 TV owners tuned in! In 1843 on 4th November, the 5.5 metre statue of Lord Nelson was hauled to the top of its 60 metre column in Trafalgar Square, London. Heavy work!

Remember, remember the fifth of November...gunpowder, treason and plot! Guy Fawkes... a 17th century terrorist, was arrested in 1605. His plot was to blow up England's King James I from beneath the houses of parliament.

The 9th November is remembrance Sunday, a national opportunity to remember the service and sacrifice of all those that have defended our freedoms and protected our way of life.

On 11th November 1918, after four years and 97 days the guns finally fell silent as the Great War ended. Around 9 million lives were lost with a further 27 million injured. On 14th November 1940, in one air raid, 449 German Luftwaffe bombers dropped 503 tons of bombs, plus 881 incendiaries onto the City of Coventry, known as the Coventry blitz.

The 15th November 1968 saw Cunard's famous flagship Queen Elizabeth, dock in Southampton at the end of her last transatlantic voyage.

On 17th November 1558, Elizabeth I became Queen of England.

On 20th November 1947, Princess Elizabeth (future Queen Elizabeth II) married her third cousin Lieutenant Philip Mountbatten at Westminster Abbey. A year later, they had their first child, Prince Charles, now our King of England.

20th November is our lovely Vikki Fords birthday.

On November 22nd in 1963, the world mourned as the news that President John F. Kennedy was shot and killed in Dallas, Texas. 24th November 1859, was when Charles Darwin published his book "On the Origin

of Species" - ground-breaking scientific work and considered to be the foundation of all evolutionary biology. Plus, the rock legend and Queen Frontman, Freddie Mercury, lost his battle with pneumonia on that date in 1991. And also sharing the date of the 24th November, is our own Simon Martin, celebrating his birthday. On 25th November 1984, Band Aid rock stars gather at Sarm Studios in London to record "Do They Know It's Christmas", with all proceeds going to Ethiopian famine relief. The 29th November back in 1641 marks England's first newspaper being published and lastly, the 30th November is St Andrews day celebrating the patron saint of Scotland.


All in all, a very poignant month! I think that it is also worth knowing that the two flowers for the month are the Chrysanthemum & Peony, representing joy and good luck.

Thought for the Month

As autumn deepens and the year begins to turn, we enter a season of reflection and remembrance. The falling leaves, the shortening days, and the glow of firelight all seem to invite us to pause - to think back over the lives and moments that have shaped us, and to bring those memories forward into the life of our village today.

This time of year holds several special occasions of remembrance. On All Saints' Day (1st November), we honour those whose faith and goodness continue to inspire us. The following day is All Souls' Day (2nd November), when we remember those who have died. A special Service of Light will take place at St Mary's Winterborne Stickland (2nd Nov at 3pm), offering a gentle and reflective space to light candles for those we have loved and lost.

MA Street Fair - Update

Well, weren't we lucky with the weather for this year's Street Fair? Apart from a few spots of rain in the morning, the weather gods shone favourably upon us and what a difference it made to the day's experience for everyone.

Organising the bi-annual Street Fair is a significant, but extremely rewarding undertaking, and for those unaware of how the management of the Street Fair is structured; The Fair is a registered Charity for which there is a Board of Trustees.

The Trustees are legally responsible for all aspects of the Street Fair and appoint a Chair of the Organising Committee, who with his/her team, are responsible for all details of managing the detailed running of the Street Fair.

Planning for the Street Fair starts around 18 months before the event due to the sheer amount of work required to organise such an occasion. All Trustees and Organising Committee members are volunteers who give of their time freely.

We had wonderful feedback from our stall holders and visitors this year, but must never forget that the Street Fair only exists because of the large number of volunteers who give freely of their time. I am not going to name individuals because I will inevitably forget someone and there are well over 100 volunteers who we need to run such a successful event. In advance of the Street Fair the detailed planning is undertaken by the Organising Committee.

Leading up to the day itself are those who make all the tasty cakes for the refreshments tent, those helping to put up the infrastructure such as the bunting over the street, laying out the Lake Field, co-ordinating the entertainers and stalls, setting up the car parks, collecting and delivering hundreds of essentials such as waste bins, chairs and tables, recruiting and co-ordinating the volunteers, preparing cash boxes and card machines, putting up all the in-Street and event direction signage.

There are also many additional unseen volunteers who give much of their time, for example designing the new signage designs for the Fair, setting up the History Exhibition etc.

We must also not forget all those volunteers who give up their time during the day such as the refreshment and bar teams, our announcement team, those who get up at a very unsociable hour to direct traffic and our stall holders setting up their wares, those who look after the entrance gates and car parks, the list goes on and on.

Finally, of course, those who give up their time on the day after the event to clearing everything up. We must also say a massive thank-you to those living in The Street, allowing the Fair to use their lawns and others who kindly allow us to use their land for the day including car parks and the Lake Field.

MA Street Fair - Update

A MASSIVE thanks to you all for helping make the Street Fair such a wonderful day.

We must not of course forget the primary aim of the Street Fair, and that is to make money for the Fair's Beneficiaries. Several months before the event, the Trustees advertise for local organisations to make bids for funds from the Street Fair. The quid pro quo is that they are required to provide volunteers for the event. The Trustees review all bids and allocate provisional funds accordingly. The Trustees also include one external charity. The final amounts that each approved beneficiary receives is dependant of the profit made by the event, considering that a significant seed fund is required for the following event.

The organisations benefitting from this year's Street Fair include: Chalk Valley WI, Cheselbourne School Friends, Community Transport Group, Flower Power, Friends of Dunbury, Friends of Milborne School, Milton Abbas Art Group, St James's Church Milton Abbas, Milton Abbas Lunch Club, Milton Abbas Play Park, Milton Abbas Reading Rooms, Milton Abbas Sports Club, Old Brewery Hall, Riding for the Disabled, St Mary's School Association, St Martin's Cheselbourne, Tregonwell Almshouse Trust, Hilton & Ansty PCC, Winterborne Scouts.

What of the future; well, that is ultimately the responsibility of the Trustees who will think carefully about whether we should continue with the Fair and what format it ultimately takes. We should never rest on our laurels; the environment within which we find ourselves is constantly changing and the number of local fairs seems to multiply significantly every year. Are we still competitive, can we afford to run the Fair (costs have been increasing significantly, the insurance alone is enough to make one's eyes water, whilst we try to hold the entry fee to one which is family friendly), do we have enough of a differentiator compared to up and coming fairs in mid Dorset, have we got the balance right between stall holders and entertainment?

A million and one questions the Trustees and Organising team need to consider before starting the detailed planning for the next Street Fair.

And finally, The Chair of the Trustees and the Chair of the Organising Committee are standing down this year and are looking for enthusiastic volunteers to take their place. If you are interested in driving the direction of the Fair and continue the success which it has been to the benefit of local organisations, please do contact the Board of Trustees at masftrust@gmail.com.

And absolutely finally, thank you to everyone who played a part in the 2025 Milton Abbas Street Fair.

Change from eConsults to SystmConnect

For queries or help regarding an existing medical condition or admin requests, please can we ask that you complete a SystmConnect form online as the GP's do not take questions via our surgery email address. This would also include requests for sick notes.

To access the service, please click on the button on the front page of our website called "Contact Us Online". It works the same way as before – just fill in the form as you used to. You don't need online access to use it; we'll match your form to your medical records. However, you can access the form through SystmOnline or the NHS app if you would prefer. We aim to reply within 2 working days.

This service is not for urgent issues which may need a same day appointment. If you think you need a face-to-face appointment, the fastest way is to call the surgery.

Carers Rights Day plays a crucial role in increasing awareness about the challenges faced by carers and to help carers get the support they need. The theme for this year is "Know your rights, use your rights".

You might not see yourself as a carer – often we just help family or friends without thinking twice.
