

Kathleen always supported him in all he did for St. Nicholas - they were a great team helping with the cleaning of the Church, delivering the magazines, joining in fund raising at the bazaar and village fete. They completed the electoral roll for many years walking the whole of the parish. Frank and Kathleen took part in the walks on the North Downs raising money for the Funds at St. Nicholas Church.

They were a very devoted couple and could always be seen walking the lanes around Grafty Green in their early years here. Although, they were from different sides of the Christian Faith, they were a shining example of how a partnership should be. Kathleen attended the Services at St. Nicholas when she couldn't get to Headcorn for Mass. Kathleen and Frank were the founders of a large and happy family, 5 children and 9 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren. Now they are re-united, I'm sure after a long and happy life together.

Speedwatch in Grafty Green

Speedwatch as you will know is established in the village, and whilst revealing too many 'speeders' especially those travelling at 40mph or more, it has also shown an improvement in drivers co-operating and being more aware of their speed.

Kent Police have recently advised we can do the checks with two instead of three volunteers. Also in answer to a number of queries we have to operate to strict guidelines including the place and visibility of the check, and only operate in daylight hours and in reasonable weather conditions.

We have not been active recently due to non availability of equipment, non practicality of doing checks whilst the two major sets of road works were on and the road closures, volunteer holidays, and lastly but most important an acute shortage of volunteers. The checks currently predominantly fall on just three volunteers.

More checks are in hand, and if you can spare the odd couple of hours we would like to hear from you, there is some basic training, then you could help make a difference to 'speed' in Grafty Green.

BUS SERVICE 59

Grafty Green – Maidstone via Ulcombe and Kingswood

At a recent meeting of the Service 59 Working Group, the Nu-Venture bus company representative commented that little use of the Saturday buses is being made by passengers on the section of route between Kingswood and Grafty Green. The Saturday service as a whole is operating well within the subsidy limit set by KCC and the current contract is due to run until April 2014 so it is not under any imminent threat, but there is a clear need for more use to be made of the service on Saturdays to help ensure that it carries on running in the future.

The Monday to Friday service continues to be operated commercially by Arriva and no changes are currently planned. However, the same need for more passengers still applies, particularly on the 09.15 from Grafty Green and the 12.27 back from Maidstone.

As with many rural services, bus routes are always under review, even those which are subsidised, so the message continues to be **USE IT OR POSSIBLY LOSE IT**!

It doesn't matter if you personally don't pay to use the bus as bus companies do obtain some financial reimbursement from local authorities for concessionary travel, so every little really does help. It's all about usage.

Service 59 over Christmas and New Year

Because of the extra Bank Holidays, there will be no service on December 25th, 26th, 27th, and 28th, or on January 1st, 2nd, and 3rd.

Nu-Venture will be operating a Saturday timetable on December 29th, 30th, and 31st.

Normal services, including the Service 66 to Cornwallis Academy, will resume on January $4^{\text{th}}.$

Pet's Corner!

Pets in Focus - Buying A Puppy!

Before buying a puppy, it is worth doing a little homework to avoid problems later. Many people choose a breed on 'looks' alone, whereas you should ask yourself honestly if you want an energetic walking companion, or a lap dog? Are you willing to supervise your puppy during its first few weeks so that you can teach it where to toilet and what to chew? Can you afford vaccinations, insurance, flea and worm treatments?

Where do I start?

Find a Breed Society contact on the internet, and speak to them about the breed's good and bad points. They often have lists of pups for sale, too.

is the breed predisposed to any hereditary diseases? Many of these can be tested for.



What makes a 'good' breeder?

A good breeder will ...

- Raise the litter in the home.
- Have the dam present, and possibly the sire, too.
- Breed to improve the breed, not because they thought their dog would make a 'good mum'
- Provide four-weeks insurance cover, details about diet and exercise, a contract of sale, and a pedigree certificate at the time of purchase.
- Screen the parents for hereditary diseases and show you the certificates.

Do NOT buy from a puppy farm, which breed many different breeds for profit, usually in outside kennels or barns. The dams are often un-socialised, exhausted, unwell and unvaccinated. These farms often pass pupples on to pet shops. They usually become ill, have heavy flea and worm burdens, and are more likely to develop behavioural and medical problems.

There are a few breeders who are experts in their field, and have a good knowledge of nutrition, behaviour and genetics. They adore the breed, breeding to simply share the pleasure of these wonderful dogs with new owners!

Neighbourhood Watch Messages

VAT will be increased on 4th January 2011: Kent Trading Standards are advising consumers to be wary of companies advertising 'pay now and save on the VAT increase'. Consumers should carry out some checks to ensure they are not getting involved in a potential scam, a company that could go bust or finding they will have to pay the VAT increase at the end.

Before being tempted consumers should take some steps to protect themselves by carrying out research on any trader offering great deals, particularly if they are advertising on the internet. If consumers do decide to pay now, then we would advise them to pay using a credit card if the goods or service cost more than £100. This means the credit card provider shares liability if the trader fails to fulfil the contract.

Consumers are also advised that:

- if they pay the full amount for a product or service **before** 4 January 2011, then they will be charged VAT at **17.5%**
- ٠
- if they pay a deposit before 4 January 2011, and then the balance after that date, they will be charged the 17.5% on the deposit but the 20% VAT on the balance

If you are considering work in or on your property it is always best to get at least a couple of quotes from traders. You can find reputable traders on the "Buy With Confidence" good trader scheme run by us. Our officers vet all traders on the scheme for trustworthiness and to ensure they comply with consumer protection laws. Or, ask for recommendations from friends or family.

NOT A JOKE JUST ANOTHER SCAM WORTH WATCHING OUT FOR. QUITE CLEVER REALLY CHECK YOUR RECEIPTS BEFORE LEAVING THE CHECK-OUT

I bought a bunch of stuff, over £150, & I glanced at my receipt as the cashier was handing me the bags. I saw a cash-back of £40. I told her I didn't request a cash back & to delete it. She said I'd have to take the £40 because she couldn't delete it. I told Her to call a supervisor. Supervisor came & said I'd have to take it.. I said NO! Taking the £40 would be a cash advance against my Credit card & I wasn't paying interest on a cash advance!. If they couldn't delete it then they would have to delete the whole order. So the supervisor had the cashier delete the whole order & re-scan everything! The second time I looked at the electronic pad before I signed & a cash-back of £20 popped up. At that point I told the cashier & she deleted it. The total came out right. The cashier agreed that the Electronic Pad must be defective.

Obviously the cashier knew the electronic pad was defective because she NEVER offered me the \pounds 40 at the beginning. Can you imagine how many people went through before me & at the end of her shift how much money she pocketed?

Just to alert everyone. My co worker went to Milford , Sainsbury's last week. She had her items rung up by the cashier. The cashier hurried her along and didn't give her a receipt. She asked the cashier for a receipt and the cashier was annoyed and gave it to her. My co worker didn't look at her receipt until later that night. The receipt showed that she asked for £20 cash back. SHE DID NOT ASK FOR CASH BACK!


My co-worker called Sainsbury's who investigated but could not see the cashier pocket the money. She then called her niece who works for the bank and her niece told her this. This is a new scam going on. The cashier will key in that you asked for cash back and then hand it to her friend who is the next person in the queue.

Please, please, please check your receipts right away when using credit or debit cards! This is NOT limited to Sainsbury's; they are one of the largest retailers so they have the most incidents. I am adding to this. My husband and I were in Sainsbury's and paying with credit card when my husband went to sign the credit card signer he just happen to notice there was a \pounds 20 cash back added. He told the cashier that he did not ask nor want cash back and she said this machine has been messing up and she cancelled it. We really didn't think anything of it until we read this email.

To make matters worse ...THIS SCAM CAN BE DONE ANYWHERE, AT ANY RETAIL OR WHOLESALE LOCATION!!!.

Jenny Whittle - News from County Hall



HGVs

I am very aware of the ongoing problems caused by the number and speed of HGVs travelling through the village. I am therefore especially pleased to advise that Kent County Council has embarked upon a major programme to help tackle the problem of lorries causing disruption and traffic chaos in narrow rural

roads and town centres. The work is expected to take between 12-18 months and will involve a complete overhaul of Kent's current lorry-route map, a county-wide review of lorry directional and regulatory signs and a review of Traffic Regulation Orders such as weight, height and width restrictions. Also as part of this work KCC will work with satellite navigation firms to ensure that lorry drivers are provided with the best routes for commercial traffic, rather than cheaper car satellite navigation information that leads to roads totally unsuitable for heavy lorries. As part of this exercise KCC is consulting with the two leading industry bodies, the Freight Transport Association and the Road Haulage Association.

Reducing the speed limit on Liverton Street

As part of the process to halve the speed limit on Liverton Street from 60mph to 30mph, Kent Highways Services commissioned surveys to back up the case that most traffic already goes at the lower speed and as such a reduction in the speed limit is justified. I am pleased to say that the surveys confirmed what we already know - most motorists consider a 30mph limit to be much more sensible than the current national limit that is in place. The next stage is for a Traffic Regulation Order to be advertised allowing motorists and residents to express their views and it will take a further period of several months to go through the statutory decision making process at Kent County Council. Please be assured that I am doing everything I can to reduce the lengthy process, but it is not straightforward! The good news though is that the speed limit will be reduced and will be in place hopefully before too long. I am using my Member Highway Fund (an allocation given to County Councillors for highways improvements in their areas) to fund the costs of this process which, including the 8 30mph signs that will be needed and the Traffic Regulation Order process, will be in the region of some £3,000.

Tackling speeding

I also recently contributed £500 from my Member Highway Fund towards the Parish Council's Speedwatch equipment as I know that many residents are concerned about speeding through the village. I would like to thank the volunteers who are operating this equipment and working with Police to help protect the village against inconsiderate and dangerous drivers.

Better signage on Liverton Hill

The Parish Council has been pressing the case for better signage on Liverton Hill to warn drivers of the need to take care when proceeding down Liverton Street. I will also be funding the signage from my Member Highway Fund and this will be installed in the coming months.

The future of land in Thurnham and Hollingbourne that was threatened by the Kent International Gateway proposals

I had a good meeting recently with Hugh Robertson MP, Paul Carter (Leader of Kent County Council) and Chris Garland (Leader of Maidstone Borough Council) to discuss how we can protect the KIG site from future unwanted development. The Joint Parishes Group were also represented at this meeting and there was unanimous support to make an application for an extension of the Kent Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty boundary. I am now working with KCC and MBC officers to take this forward. The process will most likely involve a public inquiry to permit interested parties to put forward their points of view. There is sadly no guarantee of success, but I firmly believe that the quality of the landscape in this area warrants the highest possible degree of environmental protection.

Winter Service policy

I have met with officers to review KCC's policy concerning winter service and am hopeful that the measures that are being put in place will ensure that residents receive a better service than last Winter. KCC is working much more closely with Maidstone Borough Council and parish councils to ensure that all hands are on deck when Kent is hit in the future by heavy snowfalls. I am ready to assist the Parish Councils with getting additional salt bins placed where they may be required, and have been successful in achieving this in other parts of my Division.

And Finally...

I know and understand that the severe reductions in public spending are bound to have a major effect on a number of my residents. I wish these savings were not necessary but as a nation we are now paying £125 million per day in interest charges on the debt that the Coalition Government inherited.

The Grafty Gourmet

This is a dish that I made last night, with no recipe to follow, so I thought I would do this for the magazine now whilst it's still fresh on my mind. I kind of made it up as I went along, using spices and herbs to give an amazing aromatic flavour. This recipe requires no pre-cooking and is so simple. Simply put all the ingredients together and slow cook for a tasty alternative to a stew. The lamb will just melt in your mouth.

Aromatic Simple Lamb Tagine - Serves 4

Large Onion, chopped
tsp Ground Cloves
500g Diced Lamb, uncooked
tsp salt
to 20 Dried apricots
tsp Ground Coriander
to 20 Black olives, pitted
Cloves of Garlic, crushed
200ml Chicken Stock
Tbsp Fresh Grated Ginger
200ml Red Wine
1½ Tbsp Lemon Juice

tsp Ground Cinnamon
Tbsp Tomato Puree
tsp Paprika
Tbsp Clear Honey
tsp Turmeric
Tbsp Corn flour
tsp Cayenne Pepper
Small Handful of Fresh
Coriander leaves
tsp Ground Ginger
tsp ground cumin

1. Preheat the oven to 130 degrees centigrade. Whilst the oven is warming up, place all of the ingredients into a large sauce pan, stir and bring to the boil.

2. As soon as it comes to the boil, transfer into a Tagine or Casserole dish with the lid on. Cook in the oven at 130 degrees for 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours.


3. Go and watch T.V or something ! Read a book, or go down the Pub ! Job done, it's as simple as that.

The December Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Ophiuchus at beginning of December, and moves into Sagittarius on the 18^{th} . Believe it or not our days will be getting longer a last, as it is the Winter Solstice, the shortest day, on Tuesday, December 21^{st} .

New **Moon** occurs on Sunday 5th December, and Full Moon is on Tuesday 21st, close to the junction of three constellations: Taurus, Gemini and Orion. This month, as the Moon passes exactly through the Earth's shadow, there is a total lunar eclipse. It starts at 06:32 on Tuesday 21st, and the Moon is completely in shade just before it sets.

Mercury is to the east of the Sun at the start of December, and sets only an hour after the Sun. By December 20th it is almost directly in front of the Sun, however, we should get a view of this elusive planet in the dawn sky at the end of the month.

Venus is a brilliant "Morning Star" this month, low in the south-eastern sky just before sunrise, and is clearly visible well into dawn. **Mars** sets less than an hour after the Sun, so again we will not be able to see the "Red Planet" this month.

Again this month **Jupiter** can clearly be seen in the southern sky early in the evening, and sets around midnight. It appears as a very bright star with a steady light, and is moving eastwards out of Aquarius and into Pisces. Through a telescope the disc of Jupiter can clearly be seen, together with the dark and light cloud bands and some of the four major moons. **Saturn** is rising in the east in the early hours of the morning, and is well up in the southern sky at dawn. You will be able to see Venus to the left, which is very much brighter.

One of the most reliable meteors showers of the year is the **Geminid** shower, which occurs every December. These can be seen at any time between December 7^{th} and 16^{th} . They appear to radiate from the bright star Castor in the constellation of Gemini, and will be visible throughout the hours of darkness. This is also the best time of the year to see sporadic meteors. These can be seen at any time and in any part of the sky.

I thought I would briefly bring you up to date on what has been happening at the large Hadron Collider near Geneva. Scientists have found that an exotic soup at more than 10 trillion degrees Celsius was created immediately after the birth of the universe. They achieved these high temperatures and densities by firing lead ions (atoms stripped of their electrons) at almost the speed of light in opposite directions in the tunnel at CERN. They are hoping that this soup 'quark gluon plasma' will allow them to learn more about the 'Strong Force', one of the four fundamental forces of nature.


