## Harby Parish Council Update

### Clerk

I do hope that everyone had a safe and happy Christmas and New Year! I know this will have been very difficult for many this year without seeing friends and family. There is now hope and the vaccination programme is on its way so we may start to return to a more normal situation by the summer.

Following a lot of hard work by various people a vaccination centre has now opened at Newark Showground and appointments are able to be booked. If you receive a letter, please don't share this information via social media etc with anyone, unless they are assisting you to book your appointment, however well-intentioned this sharing of information may be – this is already creating problems with those over 80's and those in clinical need being unable to access the vaccination service as quickly as they might otherwise do. Everyone will in time receive their vaccination, please be patient and don't try to jump the queue. We know that everyone is eager to return to some sort of normal, but jumping the queue will not enable this to happen any quicker. Your consideration will be greatly appreciated. If you do receive a letter, we do know that the phone lines are struggling and so if you are able to, please make your booking via the website link in your letter. You will receive both your 1<sup>st</sup> appointment and your 2<sup>nd</sup> appointment (approximately 10 weeks later). Please remember the vaccination is only 60-70% effective after the first dose and up to 95% after the second dose. Social distancing still needs to be maintained.

The Parish Council has already started planning for the new financial year and the precept request has been submitted to Newark and Sherwood Council and will be included in your Council Tax bill in the very near future. The Council have been careful to ensure that the precept has not been increased too much, whilst trying to maintain the services it provides and also properly maintain the assets for which it is responsible. Historically the Parish Council has relied on its reserves to provide services, but as these reserves have dwindled in recent years, the Parish Council has been forced to increase the precept to ensure that it could continue to operate. It is hoped that this year will not require reserves to be used for the Council to carry out its functions and legal obligations on your behalf.

#### Allotments

The allotment rents will be collected at the end of March this year and it is at that time that the Parish Council is generally made aware of vacant plots, if you are interested, please contact the Parish Clerk to be added to the waiting list, should any vacancies arise. There may be some half plots as well as full plots, if you would like to have a go, but don't wish to commit to a full plot.

NEWS FROM ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, HARBY WITH SWINETHORPE – Bridget Wells

Due to the lockdowns, there have been very few services last year or this, but it was possible to have the Harvest Thanksgiving, the Remembrance service which was held outside, and the service on 20 December for Christmas with readings and carols. The congregation were not allowed to sing (some hummed behind their masks) but there was a small choir. As usual, the church was beautifully decorated by volunteers and included a Christmas tree.

With the restrictions, it was not possible to have the Harvest Lunch in the village hall, or the mince pies and mulled wine after the carols. Also missing were the children from school at Harvest and Christmas. Rev. ## THORNEY CELEBRATES HARVEST TIME!!

On a gloriously sunny August afternoon, a small group met in the Park, opposite St Helen's church in Thorney, to discuss two events in particular: Harvest and Christmas! First a date was agreed for the Harvest Celebration and it was agreed that if we couldn't sing in church then we would hold an outdoor service, similar to our VE Day celebration, when Thorney Singers had walked the length of West Road and Main Street, stopping in three places to sing war time songs. People came out to sing with us and had picnics in their gardens. We thought that something along these lines should be tried.

Prior to this meeting I had e mailed people, asking for ideas, so these were discussed, before settling on a SCARECROW competition and having a TRACTOR to drive slowly through the village, with a trailer to carry donated gifts for the Charity FRAMEWORK. It was also agreed to have a Raffle, proceeds to go to the Community Space project. Flyers and posters went out and weather forecasts and Covid Announcements/Restrictions were watched nervously.

SUNDAY 4<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER dawned and the first three scarecrows went into place along the park fence before 11am. By 2pm there were 14 in place! All shapes and sizes! Wonderful!

Soon after 2.45pm Mick and his tractor arrived at Edgeways, ready for the procession. People started to arrive carrying bags of gifts for Framework and song sheets were distributed. After singing three harvest hymns outside Edgeways, keeping socially distanced, we walked to the Post Box to sing again. I walked ahead of the crowd, to show Mick where to stop his tractor, and as I got to the Post Box I turned around and there was Mandy, in the middle of the road, leading a huge crowd towards us!! It was MAGICAL!! Wonderful! More people joined us to sing, bringing more bags of goodies and then we walked on to church. People came out to see the tractor and chat to Mick. Opposite church a row of scarecrows greeted us and people stood and chatted while the trailer was emptied and bags taken into church. Many more gifts have been received than usual!

Once we were able to shepherd people into the park space, keeping in family bubbles, some remaining outside, our short service began. Mandy welcomed everyone and we prayed. Andrew read the lovely Deuteronomy reading, his strong voice carrying well to the crowd both near and further away. Token gifts in baskets were brought up to our park 'altar' and we gave thanks. A family read The Byfield Hymn, sharing the verses between them and after more prayers we sang Guide me O Thou Great Redeemer, because it mentions Bread of Heaven and because it's a firm favourite! And all the time, the sun shone!! Hallelujah! An answer to fervent prayer!!?

The winners of the scarecrow competition were announced, the family receiving an Amazon voucher for £20. Then Lucky Names were drawn (in place of a Raffle, a Covid-friendly version of a Raffle took place) First prize was a hamper full of delicious fruit and veg donated by our local farmer and greengrocer. There followed quite a few more prizes. And then people stayed and chatted some more, because we were out in the fresh air, on a beautiful day. Thanks to Mandy and thanks to Clare and so many others who helped. This was truly a Community event! Phil counted 55 adults, 15 children and 9 dogs! If we'd gone into church many of these families wouldn't have come.

EVEN IF YOU HAVE ALREADY BEEN VACCINATED PASSENGERS / DRIVERS WILL BE REQUIRED TO WEAR A MASK.

Trips are charged at 45p per mile & must be booked in advance through the Co-ordinator & will be dependent on driver availability.
