#### THE PARISH PUMP

The civil parish of Stockton, of which the village of Norton is the largest settlement includes Stockton and Higford, lies in the mixed farming belt of east Shropshire. It is to be found six miles to the north of Bridgnorth and five miles to the southwest of Shifnal.

Local affairs are dealt with by Stockton Parish Council, they meet every two months and during lockdown are meeting virtually; when allowed will start to meet at Norton Village Hall. One of the main areas of discussion continues to be issues relating to the roads. After an in depth discussion in terms of the A442 the Parish Council resolved a three point plan to be raised with Shropshire Council and the Police and Crime Commissioner that:

- 1. Continues to support the case for a by-pass for Norton.
- 2. Lobbies for resurfacing of the A442.
- 3. Introduces a better system of speed and traffic management.

If Parishioners have any comments or feedback on the issues raised above please contact the Parish Clerk.

The next 'virtual' Parish Council meetings will be held online from 7.30pm on the following Wednesdays 4/11/20, 6/1/21, & 3/3/21, then in May 2021 after the local Elections are held.

**Potholes:** potholes remain a general concern across the Parish and anyone with concerns should contact Shropshire Council to report any outstanding concerns related to highways.

Smartwater packs: Any new Parishioners are entitled to receive a free Smartwater pack to mark up their own household items. Just contact the Parish Clerk with your postal address and a pack will be put in the post to you.

Volunteering: The Parish Council is very keen to encourage as many Parishioners as possible to contribute back into rural life and has already secured grant aid to help develop volunteering in the environment through litter picking and bulb planting through to supporting people to come forward to help at the Village Hall and re-launch this newsletter.

## A NOTE FROM THE APLEY ESTATE OFFICE



This is the first of a regular contribution to the Norton Natter from the Estate Office, so firstly congratulations to the editorial team at the Parish Council for restarting the newsletter – we hope everyone appreciates the hard work and time that has been expended by them in getting this written & out to you all.

It's difficult to write this without talking about the pandemic. At the Estate Office we went into lockdown at the end of March like everyone else sending most of the staff home to work.

However because our business is classed as essential by the government – food production through farming, food retailing through the farm shop and housing provision to a lot of people some of whom are classed as vulnerable – within a week we were bringing staff back into the office to work.

In June we opened a temporary childcare facility which allowed us to get back to full strength – we ran this until the children went back to school in September. So, whilst we couldn't open the office doors we were operating at close to normal capacity.

At the Farm Shop we'd had to close the café & playbarn so we used the closure as an opportunity to re-vamp the café. One of our tenants has an interior design business, closed due to Coronavirus, and she offered her skills to help re-design the interior.

The Estate Yard team worked hard to get everything done in time to re-open in August and we're all really proud of the outcome.

So if you haven't been to the Farm Shop for a while, go and have a look and sample our new menu – Carmel and her front of house team would be delighted to welcome you back, David and his kitchen team would also be pleased to hear your feedback on the menu.

On the farming front, things have been going on as usual but like all farmers we've had a terrible year – very difficult planting season with all the rain in the autumn of 2019, wet winter, followed by a very hot & dry spring have meant that our yields are well down on a normal year. Definitely a year to forget!

We've finished the harvest now and are well into the autumn planting season and are hoping for a more normal year.

We'd like to invite you to pop into the Estate Office and meet our new team but that'll have to wait until things get closer to normal – which hopefully won't be too far away.

### NOTE FROM THE VILLAGE HALL

The postponed Annual General Meeting (AGM) for Norton Village Hall took place on the 9th September. Clearly there has been a great deal of uncertainty surrounding Covid and its effect on the Village Hall. It was therefore agreed to elect committee members to run the facility for what remains of this year. The next AGM will be in March 2021. This will hopefully allow time for clarity and to encourage people within the community to step forward for election.

In March there will be a number of these positions that will be open and the continuation of the facility will be under threat if they cannot be filled.

#### **AUTUMN RECIPE**

#### From PAULA's PANTRY Chicken & Broccoli in mayonnaise cream sauce

Serves 6

Ingredients:

A 4 lb chicken (whole)

1 x Onion roughly chopped

1 x Carrot roughly chopped

1 x Bouquet garni

Salt & whole black peppercorns

2llbs Broccoli (fresh or frozen)

The sauce
Butter & Flour for a roux
1 x rounded the curry powder
4 the mayonnaise
7oz tin of evaporated milk
4 x the lemon juice
2 oz cheddar cheese
Salt & pepper



The topping

4 x rounded tbsp of white breadcrumbs or 2 small packets of crisps crushed.

#### Method:

Put the whole chicken in a large saucepan together with the chopped onion, carrot, bouquet garni,salt & peppercorns.

Bring to the boil and then simmer gently for 1 hour, leave the chicken to cool in the stock. In another saucepan boil the broccoli in salted water till the stalks are tender, then drain and quickly refresh with cold water to keep the colour. Butter a large ovenproof dish and put the drained broccoli in it.

When the chicken is cold, remove the skin and strip the meat from the bones then place the meat ontop of the broccoli. Retain the stock.

#### The sauce

Melt a knob of butter, add flour and curry powder to make a roux, gradually add a pint of thechicken stock, and gently cook - stirring all the time until the sauce thickens.

Remove the sauce from the heat and add evaporated milk, mayonnaise, lemon juice and gratedcheese. Stir the sauce until the cheese has melted. Add salt and pepper to taste. Pour the sauce over the chicken and broccoli dish, sprinkle the breadcrumbs (or crushed crisps) overthe top. Bake in a moderate oven 375F, 190C, gas 5 for 30 mins

Serve with creamy mash, brightly coloured veg – perhaps lemon glazed carrots? ENJOY!

- Follow paths but give way to others where it's narrow


### **Protect** the natural environment

Sometimes whoever seeks abroad my find Thee sitting careless on a granary floor, Thy hair soft-lifted by the winnowing wind; Or on a half-reap'd furrow sound asleep, Drows'd with the fume of poppies, while thy hook Spares the next swath and all its twined flowers: And sometimes like a gleaner thou dost keep Steady thy laden head across a brook: Or by a cider-press, with patient look, Thou watchest the last oozings hours by hours.
