

Dear Friends

As news can travel quickly through the villages, the announcement of my resignation will be widely known. Both Ann and I have been encouraged and moved by the letters and messages we have received.

It was not a hasty decision nor has it been taken without seeking proper help and advice but in the situation it seemed the only decision left to take. Both Ann and I have so appreciated the friendship that we have enjoyed over the years and at this moment we are both very sad. Over the past six months there has been such a willingness to find new ways of sharing together in the care and outreach to the community that the Church is called to serve. I know that my successor will have prayerful and loving support.

My recent experience has reawakened old questions about the Church, her ministry and her authority, which I now need to address. I will be spending the next few months reading, reflecting and praying and I have been fortunate in having the Franciscan Centre as a base. There is always much to learn and there will be ways that my life may need to change. My greatest blessing has been that faith in the ever present God has been deepened and provides me with a firm ground on which to stand.

This means however, that although Ann and I will continue to live at Stoney Ridge and value your continued friendship and prayers, I will not be licensed to take services or preach either in the Benefice or in the Diocese. It will be my personal loss not to celebrate the Eucharist, to preach and to minister as this has given me such joy. In the circumstances I believe that this is necessary if there is to be the time for reflection.

I would like to conclude with a prayer that has been constantly on my lips and in my heart, which has become familiar to many people.

Remember O Lord, what thou has wrought in us and not what we deserve and as thou hast called us to thy service, make us worthy of thy calling, though Jesus Christ our Lord.



MINUTES FOR MEETING OF HASTINGLEIGH PARISH COUNCIL ON THE 8TH OCTOBER 1998

1. Minutes of Last Meeting and Matters Arising

A reply had been received from Kent County Council explaining that the Road Watch was carried out with the intention of checking speeds through the village. A letter had been received from Wye Parish Council thanking Hastingleigh Parish Council for their support on the building of another bridge, a letter had also been received from the Parish Paths Partnership informing us that the map was now completed.

2. Footpaths

Clir Pell reported the following problems on the following footpaths

AE186 094 459 - Footpath is ploughed up to the hedgeline

AE226 089 458 - 089 455 - Footpath not re-instated and was ploughed 4 weeks ago and is now growing.

AE225 088 461 - 090 466 - Not in correct place

AE106 086 465 - 086 468 - Still blocked

AF228 102 445 - Blocked

AE228 090 452 - bend - Blocked

It was agreed that we should send a letter to Mr Tuson of the Public Rights of Way Office stating these details and also a copy of our letter should be sent to the landowners.

3. Private hedges in the area

It had been brought to the Council's attention that local residents are having trouble when pulling out of junctions where a hedge is overhanging their view.

4. Blocked Drain in Tamley Lane

The drain from the corner of Tamley Lane to the Pond is reported to be blocked and it was agreed that a letter would be sent to Kent Highways requesting that they unblock this drain.

5. Moving of the Parish Paths Map

It was agreed that, following complaints over the positioning of the Parish Paths Map, we would move the map to an alternative location.

6. Housing

Cllr Pell reported on the housing strategy meeting he had attended,

7. Police Forum

Cllr Gardener reported on the Police Forum meeting he had attended,

8. Any Other Business

Cllr Chapman reported on the Parish Forum meeting she had attended, items included that a suggestion had been made for an overall insurance to be paid which included each parish rather than the parishes paying their own, the cinema being built over in the Eureka Business Park and the appointment of 2 people to organise the transport for people to get to the cinema from the town areas. Cllr Pell reported that this Parish Forum would be changed and would have a Chairperson that is a member of a parish and the parishes themselves will be asked for their opinions, any items for the agenda should be handed in before 16 October for the meeting which will be possibly held on 9 November at Kinsnorth Hall. The items for the agenda are:

30mph speed limits in rural areas
Ashford Borough Council's Recycling Policy
The payment of Parish Clerks
Precepts changing to grants

Kent association of Parish Council's will be holding their AGM on 31 October, an all day event and each councillor had a copy of the Annual Report so that they could pass comment.

Cllr Pell reported that the Kent Festival had been a great success earlier this year so another Festival is to be held next year and the Council have been given a form that can be filled in for Hastingleigh's fund-raising events to be published in the Festival Guide.

Cllr Pell reported that Ashford has a Joint Transportation Committee that meets in Ashford, they are looking for another volunteer to become a member of this committee because of a member retiring from the committee.

Cllr Pell also reported that Ashford Borough Council is currently discussing introducing parking zones in and around Ashford.

It was agreed that a copy of the minutes from each Council meeting should be printed in the Parish Magazine.

The Next Meeting is planned for 10 December 1998

The meeting closed at 8.40pm.

ANTIBIOTICS

Antibiotics have attracted a lot of media attention recently. This autumn, there has been a Department of Health report which looked at the problem of bacterial resistance to antibiotics and what we, doctors and patients, can do to prevent it.

When asked what is the most important medical development this century, many people will answer antibiotics. These drugs, which kill or stop the reproduction of bacteria which cause infections, have been developed over the last 45 years. In fact, many infections were on the decrease before this time as the result of public health measures such as clean water, good hygiene and better housing. However, the success of antibiotics in certain infections has gradually led to the popular idea that they can cure any infection. Sadly this is not the case, they have no effect on viruses, the cause of the common cold, many sore throats and influenza or flu.

Bacteria are very cunning. They breed so fast that they can evolve or develop new characteristics in a matter of days or weeks, whereas for us humans it takes several thousand, possibly millions, of years. Unlike higher life forms, they can pass genetic material to one another enabling them to hand over information such as how to get around antibiotic X or Y. This means that after a course of antibiotics the friendly bugs that live in your gut may have the knowledge of how to resist that antibiotic which they can pass to less friendly bugs in the future. Gradually bacteria learn how to resist many of the available antibiotics, leaving us with super-bugs which are extremely difficult to treat. Developing a new antibiotic costs many millions of pounds and takes years.

What can we do to help? Most prescriptions for antibiotics are written in general practice. In the past, many have been for simple, non-life threatening infections and so, GPs have been asked to do the following: not to prescribe antibiotics for simple coughs, colds or viral sore throats; to limit the length of the courses of antibiotics and not to prescribe them over the telephone. Our drug prescribing habits are monitored every quarter and over the last year, the doctors at Wye surgery prescribed between 37% and 47% less antibiotics than the average Kent GP. This has been the pattern for many years but none of us can be complacent. However, this does mean that if you are given antibiotics you must take the whole course as prescribed and, of course, you should not give your antibiotics to other people.

And so, remember: "Antibiotics cure serious diseases
- not colds, coughs and wheezes..."

If you are unwell and are not sure, you should see your doctor but you may only receive advice on how to treat the symptoms while your body fights off the infection.


I have thoroughly enjoyed my 15 months in the area and have got to know a few of you.

Finally:- I completed the Three Peaks Challenge in 10 hours and the total amount raised for the Kent Air Ambulance was in excess of £4,000.






New Moonrise - end September 1998

HYMN WRITER OF THE MONTH

James Montgomery, b. Irvine, Ayrshire 4 November 1771. d 1854.

HYMN 196

Songs of Praise the angels sang Heaven with Alleluias rang when creation was begun, when God spake and it was done.

James Montgomery became an important link in the story of English hymnody whose contribution (400 hymns) followed in the tradition of Isaac Watts (also born in November and whose 250th anniversary of his death is celebrated this month) and the Wesleys. Indeed, it has been remarked upon that Montgomery is one of our greatest lay hymn writers – lay in the sense of not being ordained.

James' father was a minister in the Church of Scotland who with his wife spent a large part of their ministry as missionaries in the West Indies. The majority of James' school years were therefore spent apart from his parents at a school in Yorkshire run by the Moravians, a notable Christian influence in his life. From earliest years he displayed a gift for writing. However, his circumstances did not provide for any higher education, and after schooling he became a shop assistant at Mirfield before removal to Sheffield in 1792 to work for a Mr Gales, a bookseller, auctioneer and editor of the 'Sheffield Register'. Here Montgomery stayed for the rest of his life. A rather dull prospect, what? Yet this prosaic setting gave Montgomery his literary opportunity. The Sheffield Register was a Radical paper, so much so that Gales had to leave the country for fear of prosecution. Montgomery stepped in as editor, changed the name to the 'Sheffield Iris' but retained its radicalism and made the paper highly successful. As politically daring as his master he served two brief prison sentences, one through upholding the storming of the Bastille. Within a busy and far from dull life he devoted time to reflect and celebrate his firm Christian faith in poetry and hymns. Among the well known are 'Angels from the realms of glory' appearing in the 'Sheffield Iris' on December 24th, 1816; 'Hail to the Lord's anointed' (142); 'Stand up and bless the Lord' (201) and the one already quoted. In all, Hymns A & M New Standard retains seven.

Montgomery's place in the history of hymnody is coupled with Thomas Cotterill (1779-1823), vicar of St Paul's Sheffield. Cotterill was himself a hymn-writer, but became prominent in the public eye as a compiler of hymns. Throughout the second half of the eighteenth century and until the early part of the nineteenth century hymn singing in Anglican churches, apart from the metrical psalms, was much opposed since it was considered contrary to the spirit of the Book of Common Prayer, although the practice was tolerated with Wesley and the early evangelicals outside normal church services. When Cotterill introduced into his Church his 'Selection of Psalms and Hymns' it produced a furious upheaval. The then Archbishop of York, Vernon Harcourt, supported the use of hymns within Anglican worship and came to Cotterill's

aid by suggesting that the book be re-edited under his supervision and dedicated to him. Cotterill invited the aid of Montgomery in this task who contributed several of his own. When the revised book was published in 1819 bearing the approval of the Archbishop of York, it marked the gradual acceptance towards the inclusion of hymns within the Church of England.
