

We plan to introduce a training programme covering pruning, grafting, hedge laying - maybe even scything and wildflower meadow management. But first, let's plant the stuff!

#### Stockbury Book Club

As there was no January Stockbury Observer, we have two book reports this month.

#### I am Malala:

## The Girl Who Stood Up For Education and was Shot by the Taliban

By Malala Yousafzai and Christina Lamb

We read the abridged version of Malala's account of how her life was drastically changed; the Taliban invaded the area of Pakistan where she lived and went to school. She was bought up in the peaceful and beautiful Swat valley in Northern Pakistan but the Taliban decided to ban the education of girls which led to her having to leave school. She fought against this ruling but paid the price for her opposition. Malala was shot in the head and faced many

operations together with leaving her beloved Pakistan and moving to England. She continued to campaign for the education of girls and her work led to her being awarded The Nobel Peace Prize; the youngest ever winner.

We all enjoyed the book, especially because it enlightened us about an area of Pakistan and its history, but realised that the longer, more detailed version would give us a greater insight. We admired teenage Malala's confidence and bravery which, we thought, was aided and influenced by her father's personality and career.

We gave the book a score of 7.

majority of us experienced.

Two of our members were unwell and whilst one of these felt that their ailment may have impacted on their enjoyment of the book the other felt that their impaired concentration was the only reason they were able to read it. The infamous mustard story, as it has become known amongst us, left us speechless and has discouraged some to ever read Trollope again! (and I mean the author).

Discussion around the group did relate to individual stories which were quite enjoyed by different members. It was clear that some of the stories were light-hearted which was wanted and enjoyed, but others were certainly not. Comments followed about the stories being "of their time", "enjoyed the old-fashioned phraseology", and "an opportunity to read short stories from some very famous authors". They reminded one member of stories that might have been found in the "Women's Own" magazine, and another member compared one to a Brian Rix farce.

Needless to say, that the scores by most of the group were not very high and overall, the book achieved a generous 4/10

#### A249 weekend closures

Thank you for your patience and understanding while we've been carrying out drainage and safety barrier work on the A249. We'll be continuing with these closures into the new year to allow us to complete work on the northbound carriageway. The A249 northbound between the Stockbury roundabout and Bobbing will be a fully closed at weekends from Friday 13 January, with the last closure finishing on Monday 6 March. During these closures, there will also be a lane closed on the southbound carriageway, with a lane remaining open.

#### Eastbound slip roads update

We're making good progress with the construction of the new eastbound (coastbound) slip roads. Unfortunately, due to the recent weather, we'll need to keep the slip roads closed for a little longer than we thought. We're now planning to reopen the slip roads by Monday 30 January, subject to weather conditions.

#### Westbound slip roads update

We understand there has been some rumours about us closing the westbound slip roads early next year for a solid block of time, as we have with the eastbound slips. This is not the case. We're able to complete most of our work on these slips away from the carriageway, and you may have seen this work has started.

#### Stockbury Gardeners

I hope that you are all coping with the cold weather. I know that I have a few horticultural losses as a direct result of the freezing temperature. In particular dahlias that we have been accustomed to leaving in the ground have been frozen, and these will need to be replaced. The cold reminds me of when I was at school, the weather was always cold because that was the winter!! Never the less, Mother packed us off to school dressed in woolly gloves, a knitted balaclava, and wait for it ...SHORTS!! Let's hope it warms up soon.

For those of you who are looking forward to the Gardeners 2023 programme, we have a number interesting speakers booked already, including the famous Rodney Gibson presenting an introduction to maintaining your garden implements. This will be in March, followed later in the year by BBC Radio Kent's own Jean Griffin. Other speakers are being arranged.

This month we have a change of the normal date and we are in the Village Hall on the 9th, 19:30 for 20:00 start. As there are a number of new members joining us this year, we have a presentation of trophies and then a Q&A session, so if you have any questions that you are dying to ask about all things growing come along.

I have been fortunate over the last weeks, to have been visiting seed suppliers in the UK. This was as a result of me being appointed by the NVS to head up their sponsorship team. The seed producers are major players in putting up the prize money for competition awards. I can say that the seed producers have a lot of things in common; for instance a couple of 'big names' have multiple companies owned by each one. Marshalls Seeds owns Unwins Seeds, who are in turn owned by Westland. D T Brown owns Fothergill Seeds and Johnsons Seeds. So as a result, there are some seed producers all purchasing seed form one source!!

If you have wondered whether you are receiving 'fresh' seeds I can assure you that none of the seeds that you acquire are fresh. They will be the previous seasons seeds, simply because they have to have been proven "viable", that is to have been batch sampled, to ensure that a certain number of seeds will germinate given the correct growing conditions. This is EU and UK rules.

#### Tasks for Now

It's not too late to prune top fruit, with the exception of stone fruit (cherry ,plumb, peach), so hurry up, as this weather is holding back growth.

I am just about to split a couple of rhubarb crowns up and take indoors to force some pink stems, so easy to do. There are videos online on how to produce these sweet and tasty fruits.

Don't forget to feed the wild birds too!

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

#### **Countryside Matters**

A long while ago, do you remember the time at Junior School when every class had a nature table Very good they were too, especially when the boys came into class with a matchbox concealing a creepy crawly, more to make the girls scream than for the teacher to identify! Anyway, I digress. What I want to say is that now we are back out traversing the lanes and enjoying our unique bit of countryside, I thought it appropriate to write about some of our native country creatures.

This month's subject is the little field vole, or if you are being totally accurate, Microtus Agrestis. It is grey-brown and has a rounded snout, less prominent eyes than a mouse and its ears are completely covered in fur. Overall it is about 100mm long, its tail representing roughly 40% of the length of its body. It doesn't weigh much either, 30 - 40gms, not much more than a fat letter! Amazingly remains of this creature have been found dating back to before the last ice age, around 9,000 years ago. They are, however, not to be found on the Isle of Man, the Isles of Scilly, Shetland, Lundy or Ireland.

Grass is this little creature's only food source and shredded grass leaves are used to make their nests, which are about 10cm in diameter and are often built at the base of grass tussocks or in underground burrows or perhaps under a sheet of discarded corrugated iron or similar material.

Voles are not very often seen but their runs may be detected in the grass where they feed and leave piles of shredded grass and leaves, evidence of their presence in the area. These small mammals communicate principally by sound and smell, sight being less important for an animal that spends most of its time underground.

The vole is host to a few parasites, carrying fleas and ticks. Its enemies include kestrels, owls, foxes and stoats. Breeding takes place during two thirds of the year and life expectancy for these small creatures is about twelve months, so population turnover is rapid! Mind you it is estimated that there are about 75 million of them in Britain ...!

#### Patrik Says ...

It's along time ago since my last newsletter! Because there was no Stockbury Observer in January, my collection of news bits grew enormously!

Happy New Year and let's quickly recap what has happened since the last Editor deadline:

The Boundary Commission published its final report Its findings are very disappointing, as they did not take heed of my concerns for the effective representation of voters in the sparsely-populated areas vs. the urban service centres. In doing so, the Commission ignored my recommendation, which was supported by a full Council vote.

The Commission did not deviate from their initial proposals to join North Downs with Harrietsham and Lenham to form a super-ward. However, they have now cut Stockbury from the North Downs Ward and attached it to a revised Boxley Downs Ward. Their latest report is final and will be laid before Parliament. The new boundaries will come into effect at the May 2024 elections.

#### **Waste Collections**

The cold spell in December hit waste collections very badly and quite a few brave, hard-working operatives were injured in the line of duty due to the icy conditions. The situation became a game of hit and miss, especially since many collection routes in the North Downs were affected by emergency road closures in Hollingbourne. My email inbox was crammed with complaints and I spent my Advent sorting all issues, and indeed, I believe that we succeeded to clear all backlogs before Christmas.

Garden waste collections unfortunately suffered, as their vehicles were utilised in the big catch-up. Garden waste is a non-statutory service which MBC does not have to provide by law. This service is covered by Civil Contract Law because residents pay an additional fee for it and you obviously did not receive the service which you paid for.

To keep things simple, MBC will not give you a monetary refund but will add extra free collections when your contract is due for renewal in April; this will make up for the missed collections. If you reported all missed collections via the website, things should be easy to compute and so will be the time when collections were suspended across the whole borough. If you think that lost collections are not correctly recalculated when you get your next bill in April please get in touch with me.

Mid Kent Waste Partnership Announces New Contractor Three Kent councils have signed a new Waste and Recycling Contract with SUEZ Recycling and Recovery UK Ltd.

Ashford, Maidstone and Swale councils – which work together as the Mid Kent Waste Partnership, have awarded the eight-year contract to SUEZ after a detailed joint tender process. The new waste contract, which will begin in March 2024, will introduce new technology and industry improvements, whilst retaining large parts of the existing service.

The three partner councils have worked hard over the last two years to get this new contract in place. Suez provided a strong bid, showing enthusiasm to deliver the service and bringing their considerable industry experience to Mid Kent.

A new fleet of vehicles will be purchased including more smaller and narrow access vehicles. With it comes improved

technology for vehicle tracking and the management of customer service requests, allowing the Waste Management Team to have full visibility of the service and to lower the services' carbon footprint.

The new contract will also offer the chance to increase recycling rates across the three boroughs, provide improved efficiency of the collection routes, lower emissions vehicles and better technology to keep our residents up to date. The new contract includes proposed improvements to the level of cleansing in rural and residential areas, as well as quicker response times to the removal of fly-tipping.

In short, we expect a huge improvement of service from March 2024. I accept that this will be little consolation for residents affected by missed bins for the next 14 months, but there is light at the end of the tunnel. Please continue to report missed bins via the MBC website:

#### **Hollingbourne Road Closures**

I have already mentioned above the effects of the emergency road closures. This was also an email inbox filler for me as the fire at The Dirty Habit pub was an event which took everybody by surprise. So it took a while for Engineers, Conservation Officers and Insurance Assessors to draw up a rescue and rebuild plan for the listed building, and available cranes for hire are as rare as gold dust. So after weeks of apparent still-standing, people were pleasantly surprised when the road reopened at the beginning of December. The still-standing was only apparent to the lay observer, there was a lot of work done in the background and I thank Maidstone's Conservation Officer for the sensible and speedy solutions at the time.

There will be the need to close the road again for a very short period in late spring. I was assured that the community will be given plenty of warning and that the closure will be as short as possible, and will commence once the specialist equipment is booked and in place. At the moment I cannot say how long this closure may be as we will have to rely upon the engineers' expertise but I hope it will be a case of days rather than weeks. The safety of the public and the site workers is obviously our main concern.

#### **Local Plan**

Levelling Up Secretary, Michael Gove has announced that compulsory house-building targets in the Government's Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill are to be scrapped after dozens of Conservative MPs threatened to vote against the Bill. Mr Gove said that under the revised plans, central targets will be 'advisory' and councils will be able to set lower targets where they can show 'genuine constraints' on building. Mr Gove is also understood to have agreed to higher infrastructure levies on green-field development, to stronger action against land banking by developers, and to consult on requiring planning permission before residential properties can be used as short-term lets. These are all sensible proposals and we will act upon them once they become law, hopefully soon. Many changes can happen in the land of Westminster Politics, and Local Authorities are well advised not to drop tools on account of Westminster proposals before they pass all hurdles of Parliament. For this reason we will continue and get on with the review of our Local Plan. Nothing would be more of a carte-blanche for developers than a Local Authority which finds itself without a Local Plan.

As I previously reported, the examination into Maidstone's Local Plan Review has been underway, and Stage 1 concluded at the end of November last year. Progression to Stage 2 in this process is dependent upon navigating Stage 1 successfully, and is by no means guaranteed – as we have seen with the many plans by other District Councils in the South East, which have stalled at this stage in the last few years.

I am delighted to be able to tell you that we have now received confirmation from the Government Inspector examining the plan, that our plan will progress to Stage 2 later this year.

#### Condensation-Damp-And-Mould

Golding Homes, Maidstone's biggest social housing supplier, started a Condensation-Damp-And-Mould campaign. They received 733 enquires from their customers which equates to about 10% of their homes. The figures are indeed concerning in that 10% of homes seem to be affected and only one of the reported cases in my Ward has been resolved to satisfaction so far. In September Golding's Board agreed additional funding to resolve Condensation-Damp-And-Mould cases. Customers are encouraged to report damp and mould problems here:

#### And finally ...

Motorists face double-digit rises in parking charges in a number of council areas as officials look for ways to boost their finances. Southend, York, Rutland, Thanet and the London Borough of Waltham Forest are among the local authorities that have announced they will increase parking fees by about 10% from April. In Cornwall, charges will rise by 29% at the most popular tourist spots. Jack Cousens, head of Roads Policy for the AA, warned: 'Residents could soon 'vote with their wheels' and decide it's easier to avoid the town centre and shop online.'
