Hastingleigh with Elmsted WI


his month I looked at the W.I. pages from the Community News of 1994. The subject for the first speaker of the year was Aromatherapy, and a member, Mrs. D. Mose, was the model for a relaxing face massage. Strong feelings were expressed regarding the future of parts of Lyminge Forest and a letter was to be sent to the Council voicing our disquiet. The Council's reply did nothing to allay members' anxieties. The winning entry for April's competition - a hand-made garment - was an almost 100 year old baby gown brought by Mrs. Lilley. May's meeting covered a lot of business for the upcoming Triennial General Meeting, and afterwards members went to a local hostelry for a meal and chat, celebrating the Institute's 69th birthday. In July, the speaker made use of the new screen in the Hall, to show slides of renovations of her country cottage. August's speaker was a glass engraver. Members were interested to see the tools he used to make the finished items, but 'no-one was brave enough to try them'. In September, members were given a talk about Denman College, and the courses that were on offer there. Sadly, Covid-19 has forced the sale of Denman. Members had a 'Cookery and Preservation Show' at the November meeting, giving a 'tantalising display'. Reports were read out, and Mrs. Gunn handed over the role of President to Mrs. Lorraine Russell. At the Christmas meeting, it was asked if we could have a W.I. notice board in the Hall. After dealing with business, members retired to a 'local inn, where good food wine and conversation were enjoyed by all'.



Floor plans for Elmsted and Hastingleigh churches





The Sweet Chestnuts In Our Valley

Christmas and all of its traditions, but sweet chestnuts were part of our history long before 20th century festivities and are, in fact, thought to have been one of the first foods ever eaten by humans.

We are surrounded by sweet chestnut trees in the woods around Hastingleigh, many of them coppiced, originally used in the hop pole industry and later for chestnut fencing but, left to grow un-coppiced, they can grow into beautiful and majestic trees: we have some fine examples of these in the Evington Park valley.

During the 18th century, sweet chestnuts were a popular choice for parkland planting and were an iconic part of the British landscape. If you drive down the hill from Hastingleigh towards the old Evington estate, at the sharp bend look over to your right: there were originally 9 standing in a clump (4 fell in the 1987 storm). They were planted by the Honywood family around 1800 after the sad loss of their 9 year-old child, who was thrown from a cart as the horses rounded the tight bend. There were other horse accidents on that bend, and the Honywoods had the road changed to flatten out the curve. If you look across, you can see the ridge-line of the original road running down towards the old house.

Our history of sweet chestnuts go back long before the 18th century: they have been a staple food in Southern Europe for millennia, and were an abundant substitute for cereals, consumed especially in areas where cereals may not grow well or when the harvest failed. As they have a high starch content (twice as much as a potato) and rich in vitamins and minerals, communities relied on them, gaining sweet chestnuts the reputation of the bread tree (l'arbre à pain). As one mountain woman put it: "A chestnut grove is a better provider than a man; easier to manage, too."

It is likely the Romans introduced the sweet chestnut to Britain and planted wherever they conquered. The Roman armies marched on a diet of chestnut porridge. In Italy, the Roman love affair with the sweet chestnut continues as they make the most of this versatile nut by roasting, boiling and puréeing them into both sweet and savory dishes; grinding them into flour; and, in Modena, soaking them in red wine before roasting. The French make marrons glacé - a candied chestnut involving 16 different processes; or simply roast them on an open fire. But the Roman porridge, I have yet to try. Rose Robus.

In The Garden

ith December underway when you receive this, and January to come, we used to be able to say that we are in the depths of winter. Well, that may be but, as I write this in mid-November, the weather is unseasonably mild. A mere touch of frost has appeared once or, at most, twice on our flat roof only to have disappeared once daylight and a bit of sun appeared.

The flowers just cannot stop blooming. The Jasmine just outside our back door is in full flower and queen bumblebees are finding it a daily attraction with their heavy lumbering buzzing. Butterflies are still not hibernating and ladybirds are flying on many days. Christmas Box looks as though it is about to burst into flower and although the Michaelmas daisies have at last died down, the honeybees are finding plenty of other flowers to feast upon in the fine, warm days - ivy in particular. And, of course, the grass keeps growing but is difficult to mow for, with the shorter days, there is not time to dry out before the sun dips down again. I'm beginning to wonder if our climate is becoming more like New Zealand which, in some ways, might be quite nice; but when it is accompanied by a lack of Arctic ice, we don't need much reminding of the dangers arising from rising sea levels and the havoc that it will bring to low-lying coastal shores, and flooding elsewhere from the spells of very heavy rainfall.

This late flowering interferes with what we used to expect in cutting back perennial flowers so they can have a proper rest for the winter months. We just have to be adaptable in the face of climate change.

So what jobs are good to get on top of? The greenhouse is now clear of tomatoes (good crop this year if you refer back to my earlier articles) and cucumbers. This is a moot point, I know, but I still dislike the modern fumigating 'bombs' to clear the greenhouse of overwintering pests so I use the age-old sulphur candle. These are no longer sold in garden centres so I obtained some flowers of sulphur from eBay and filled an old tin I keep for the purpose and part-bury a paper wick in the sulphur which lights readily on the greenhouse floor

while I back out rapidly and close the door to escape the poisonous fumes. It can then be left for a day or two before opening the door and window vents to clear the remaining taint of the chemical. I usually have a pot or two of parsley for overwintering and these are removed while this operation is carried out and then returned to the warmer environment inside.

Aqua Dulce broad bean seeds are pot-sown at this time of year in the greenhouse and, once safely germinated, are transplanted outside into their permanent bed; they are the first beans of the spring to be harvested. They are slow to germinate and the process can be speeded up by soaking the seeds in water for 36 hours before sowing.

We are harvesting leeks and I'm afraid to say that it is a disappointment that in the mild autumn weather they suffer a degree of rust on their outer leaves, which have to be discarded. Our carrots and parsnips have a tendency to fork — our soil is too fertile for them to behave themselves and tunnel straight down to produce show-shaped roots.

For years I have grown Groninger Brussels Sprouts as it was the only open-pollinated seed I could obtain, and I favour the open-pollination to naturally foster biodiversity as they will breed true, whereas the F1 hybrids cannot. However, this year we now have another variety called 7 Hills, a so-called dwarf type that appealed to me, for the Groninger grow so tall they push the protective nets up. Well, 7 Hills clearly don't read the same books as me for they have ambition and have grown almost to the same height!

Clearing fallen leaves is a useful task and, if you are patient, storing them in a ring of wire netting can eventually produce useful leaf mould to augment your compost, all of which can be spread on top of the vegetable and flower beds in the winter months to save having to do it in the spring.

With the Covid lock-downs many more people have taken to gardening, which I hope has benefitted both their physical and mental health. Another result has been a boom in seed sales, so make sure you order yours early for 2021 so you don't miss out.

'Sir' 1927 - 2020

enry John Nancollas MBE, head of Bodsham C of E primary school from 1954 to 1986, died earlier this year from COVID-19. Born in Llanelli, South Wales in 1927, his enthusiasm for rugby, cycling and dogs developed at an early age. His happiest memories from his youth included playing rugby for Llanelli grammar school at Stradey Park and acquiring a Russian Borzoi called Boris.

After training as a teacher at Trinity College, Carmarthen he completed his military service from 1946 to 1948 and joined Hurst Primary School in Bexley. He quickly came to the attention of Freda Weal, another young teacher at the school. A tandem bicycle was bought, and they married in 1950.

After a few years teaching in Canterbury, aged 26 John was appointed as the head of Bodsham School and 'Sir and Mrs Sir' moved to School House. Here he got to grips with the challenges of running a rural school with ancient plumbing, a school kitchen in the old vicarage stables, and a home without electricity. Bodsham School became his life's work, here he could invest in the development of young minds, in glorious surroundings, without the constraints that a larger school might bring.

Although appointed an Inspector of Schools in the 1960s, he chose to spend the rest of his career at Bodsham. Many former students will recall his creative approach to learning, not least through major projects such as Bodsham New Town and the Round the World Yacht race. He was frequently asked to lecture at conferences about his work.

Outside school John was an enthusiastic member of the Evington Players, clerk to the Parish Council, and was involved in the building of Evington Hall. However, his main passion was the school and the young people he taught. Right to the end of his life he talked about his wonderful boys and girls and what they meant to him.

On his retirement from Bodsham, John was awarded an MBE for services to education though he maintained that it was for services to rural plumbing. He and Freda moved to Kennington, where one of his greatest joys was past students calling in. He continued to ride his bicycle into his late 80s. The deaths of Freda in 2015 and his son Tim in 2018 hit him hard and his memories of Bodsham became even more important. He is survived by his daughter Sarah and granddaughter Bryony.

John Nancollas, a proud Welshman who gave his life to Bodsham School will be remembered fondly by the hundreds of children he inspired.

More items of interest from Elmsted Parish Council meetings 1917-1926

1917: One councillor vacancy vice T Nickolls being elected chairman vice Rev T Hill who had moved to the rectory at Little Chart; W Birch elected clerk vice F Naylor; Edward Tappenden, chairman of Hastingleigh and Elmsted gardening society, was appointed distributor of seed potatoes for the parishes; buildings' rates 2s 4d in £. T Nickolls and S Hopkins elected overseers.

1918: J May no longer a councillor, councillor vacancies now two; buildings' rates now 3s 0d in £.

1919: T Goldup, S Hopkins and T File elected councillors vice W Spillett, E Young and one vacancy; still one vacancy; it was decided that the peace celebrations should not be paid out of the rates - Rev Curtis and Mr Taylor were in attendance it was also agreed to accept the county council's offer of 2d per tail for rats - Mr Lucas to keep account.

1920: Little recorded.

1921: Mr Long of Court Lodge was elected councillor vice a vacancy.

1922: Rev H Hammond, D Argar and R Turner elected councillors vice Mr Long, T Goldup and R Pilcher; one vacancy vice T File; tithe map to be inspected to gather more information about the footpath from Bodsham farm to Evington Place, right away to Mr Mills's farm and query over the ownership of the water tank at Bodsham Green.

1923: Water tank to be cleared out by owner; protest to Kent education committee over the expense the parish is required to meet; District Surveyor to be advised of dangerous corner leading from Hill Street.

1924: W Twynham elected counsellor vice a vacancy; every effort should be made to keep rates as low as possible.

1925: Little recorded.

1926: Meeting held at The George Inn; agreement reached with Mr George Hands owner of land at Six Mile to widen the road at Six Mile Corner; Messrs Back Bros have offered land at top of Dean Hill to

overcome dangerous corner; overseer posts to cease and be replaced by two representatives on the new rating authority and W Brice of Spong Farm and S Hopkins of Pett Bottom Farm were elected. (To be continued) History Enthusiast
