

From the Rectory

My mother Audrey died peacefully on 24 February in the nursing home where she had been looked after for two and a half years. I took her funeral on 7th March, a simple but moving service at Reading Crematorium. We had no hymns but included music she loved and some pieces she had written, she was a wonderful writer both of prose and poetry.

Like an increasing number of people, my mother had suffered with Alzheimer's. Cath's mother Daphne has been in a nursing home for many years now with vascular dementia. Cath's brother Marty, whose death I wrote about a couple of months ago we think also had Alzeimhers. Dementia of all kinds is common, and as a family we have experienced out fair share of it.

In 2014 Cath and I attended a very moving conference in Ely about the spirituality of Dementia 'Is anyone there?'. As we entered the venue some words were displayed, I wrote them down: 'After Descartes.'

As mind and memory long since said goodbye,

'I think therefore I am' does not apply.

But there are days when I take heart, because

I think I thought, therefore perhaps I was.

It has been quite a journey, it continues to be in the case of Cath's mum. It hasn't all been bad. For both Daphne and my mother the earlier stages of their journey into dementia went through what could be called a return to a childlike joy. I know this is not the case with all but we have largely been spared the aggressive behaviour which dementia can bring and which is particularly painful to witness. I remember a family walk on the Thames near Marlow and Daphne took it upon herself to climb out on a branch to swing joyously over the river, she is ninety now, she must have been in her late seventies! In the last years of her life, at times my mother possessed a beautiful serenity which in truth I had never seen in her before. Although she had lost the ability to talk coherently, until a couple of months ago she could break into the most wonderful smile. Just after Christmas when Cath and I visited her at her nursing home, I tuned the TV in the Lounge to classic FM and then danced round the room conducting an imaginary orchestra. My mother beamed and started to join in, conducting away. It was the last time I saw her really animated and enjoying herself. After that she became more and more distant, like a light being slowly dimmed.

I don't think there had been recognition of who anyone actually was for quite some time. However, with my father I think that there was a memory of someone who made her feel safe as she obviously reacted to him more strongly than to anyone else.

Watching people we love leave us in this slow tragic way is not easy. There is a verse in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians which says, 'we walk by faith not by sight' (2 Cor 5:7). The truth is things happen to us which we cannot explain and I would be dishonest to say that at times my faith has been tested as I have asked 'what's the point of this?' It certainly teaches patience and opens up wells of love, but it is a high price to pay that my mother, or Cath's mother has had to diminish in this way so that we might grow. There is much I do not understand, 'we walk by faith not by sight'.

And this faith is a choice, it has been so with me as we have journeyed alongside my mother, and alongside Daphne and Marty, to believe that God is there and is doing something, even though we cannot understand it. One of my favourite Psalms is Psalm 139, it speaks to me of those losing themselves in the darkness of Alzheimer's and Dementia.

'If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, Even there your hand shall lead me, your right hand hood me fast.

If I say, "Surely the darkness will cover me and the light around me turn to night," Even darkness is no darkness with you; the night is as clear as the day;

darkness and light to you are both alike'. (Psalm 139, vss 8-11).

God knows us even at those times when we might no longer know ourselves. I find these verses helpful and comforting and I offer them to those who might be faced with a similar circumstance in the hope that they will find them helpful as well.





Jean and Her Trees

Tree Number 3 – The Chile Pines (Monkey Puzzle)

These, unusually, were growing in front of Garden Close when we moved here at the end of 1961 and soon we came to realise that Garden Close was not the name known to many people because nearly everyone described the house as the 'monkey puzzle' house.

Two monkey puzzle trees planted in front of a house and nothing else is quite unusual. On the minus side they were so close to the house that they were brushing up against the old cast iron guttering and as soon as there was any wind created a horrible noise which transmitted to the inside of the house and frightened the children. We then took the drastic decision to cut them down early one Sunday morning. Jean felt quite



guilty about this and planted a miniature monkey puzzle in a pot and grew it on until it was big enough to plant out in the garden. After several years growing very slowly it suddenly started to grow rapidly and as you can see from the photograph it now adorns the entrance to Jean's Copse. She could not see it from the house but was always interested in its progress.

Tree Number 4 – The Gingko

I told this story to the Neighbour's Club but I am sure they won't mind me repeating it here.

One day when the children were young we went to the Kensington Museums and I drew attention to a fossil in a glass case which was described as a 2.5million year old fossil of a gingko tree. It is thought that the gingko trees in China and elsewhere in the world are probably all descended from this tree.

A few years later Jean and I were buying a eucalyptus tree from a nursery in Sussex when Jean said, look there's a gingko tree. I said 'how do you know?' to which she replied 'because that's what the label says'! So we bought it and planted it in what would become a prominent position in the middle of Jean's rose bed. It grew very slowly for a few years then suddenly decided it liked living in Great Milton and shot up very quickly.

In the meantime we had an extensive tour of China including some afternoon visits to courtyard gardens which were fantastically tidy and well cared for by the head of the family, usually an elderly lady who made sure every dead leaf was picked off the plants and nothing was left untidy. On the third visit of this type we realised that the elderly lady spoke extremely good English. She volunteered that she had been a Professor of English at the local university. This meant that we could easily converse so I asked her why every garden we had been to had a well grown and carefully tended gingko tree. Her reply was simply if you wanted to live a long time you planted a gingko tree.

A few years later I sat at our back door early one winter's morning to see that the gingko tree was changing colour from green to gold. The very next day we had bright early morning sun which happened to shine right behind this tree and it was a fantastic sight of a golden spear trying to pierce the sky. That night we had a frost and by next morning every leaf was on the ground. Our daughter pointed out that, by coincidence, on page 3 of The Times that day there was a picture of an enormous gingko with about two feet of golden leaves on the ground and a family wading through it. The caption said this tree is believed to be about 2,500 years old in Eastern China and this huge heap of leaves fell off the night before.

How lucky we are.

Malawi's one of the most beautiful countries in the world. Tucked away in the south east of Africa, its 45,000 square miles is home to a population of over 13 million. 

View From Views

The weather does not seem to have improved a great deal as yet, although everything is now looking like spring is on its way after a rather mild but dreary winter even though we are now well into official spring. The daffodils are still flowering, having been in flower since November, the Snowdrops as I mentioned before seem to be about in cinque, as are the Crocuses, let's just hope everything else follows more



normally now, which it does seem to. The wild bird feeding we are now doing regularly seems to have had the desired effect, as there is a wealth of small farmland birds in the area that we are feeding, I cannot be specific as to the actual species present the impression is that there are, Buntings, Greenfinches, Yellow Hammers, Linnets, & certainly Goldfinches. I was very pleased to see bathing in a stream not many feet away what I think was a Goldcrest. The Pigeons are still decimating the Oil Seed Rape, if only we could get a period of warmer weather which would give the crops a chance to push ahead of this pest.

The question of Brexit is gathering momentum but still I haven't a clue which way I would vote, there is still no clear guidance as to what affect it would have on us leave alone farming, it really seems a situation of heads you win tails you loose. No one can give any clue as to what the effect will be on any one aspect of life/business/support or anything else for that matter. One thing I do know that with the number of nations involved it has proved almost impossible to get any sensible decision on any issues a, quickly or b, agreed, on the other hand it is a powerful organisation when it comes down to influencing other counties. To add to the uncertainty is that all the politicians can say that if we go either way we will be able to do this or that, without actually committing to any one issue for definite, so how they can expect us to vote with any confidence or knowledge of the effect.

Some very worrying issues regarding that are rearing their heads at the moment, some dairy farmers are likely to be told that their milk is no longer required. I also read that a dairy processing plant in Essex is going to close, that the milk from there will now be processed in Aylesbury, not that that affects us in this area but it does involve extra transport, more traffic on the roads, extra pollution etc. Another nail in the coffin for British/European farming is that it is likely that the growing of Oil Seed Rape will become unviable due to the importation of Palm Oil, which is by far more damaging to the environment. (I was somewhat depressed the other day, to learn from a recent TV programme that Olive Oil is healthier that Rape Seed Oil, inspite

of the fact I always understood it was the other way round.) I have just read an article in the farming press that after some 40 to 50 years of use, Glyphosate, better known as Round Up, is thought to be carcinogenic, so its use is becoming questionable. This is particularly worrying in that we were always lead to believe this was a very benign chemical, being that it is of great use and consequently a widely used and a very useful tool in our armoury, is now under threat of restriction.

Of course there is still downward pressure on the price of all our produce whilst the cost of production, as in everything else is rising. In the farming press every week there is a market report for most of our produce, giving weekly updates on price movements, and in most cases they all show a minus and have done so in the case of cereals, being the one I watch most, ever since harvest, except for the one week when the price of the pound fell, this was very short lived. This makes me so thankful that sometime ago we decided to look for some alternative ways to earn a living, this is something that not all our colleagues can do!

On a slightly more positive side we managed to get our spring planting finished by the evening of March 8th, plus all other work that needed to be done, before that terrible wet day of the 9th. Interestingly on that particular day I had to go up the M40, and as soon as I got to between Stokenchurch and High Wycombe the rain stopped, with the road appearing not to have had any or at least not much rain, whilst we were away it turned out to be quite a respectable day even with a little sun, but on our return almost to the line we ran into rain again, it had been I gather wet almost all day.

It seems by all reports in the press that dog worrying amongst farm animals is becoming a more common occurrence, recently there was a case where 116 sheep had been on killed on one farm overnight, assumed to be dogs or a group of dogs. The Police are reporting that this sort of incident is very much on the increase, add to this the cases of dog fouling, which is also very dangerous to cattle and sheep health. This is all part of the story behind why Farmers have an anxiety over public access and has been behind some of the antagonism between Ramblers and Farmers.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

Yesterday was definitely spring and, although there was a nip in the air, the sun was warm and it was delicious working in the greenhouse. I'm afraid I have been somewhat reluctant to get outside in recent weeks as it has been so cold and dark, but yesterday gave me renewed enthusiasm and so I started the task of clearing out

the greenhouse in which I have been overwintering a variety of tender plants. I heat the greenhouse only a little to keep the temperature above zero (the electricity bills are horrific if I try to do more than that!).

Most plants in the greenhouse have survived, but sadly not a beautiful Pelargonium called Splendide; this looks very dead, but I have cut it back and won't give up on it yet as it is a very attractive plant with silvery leaves and bicoloured flowers (dark and light pink). I also cut back my Physalis which I grew from seed last year. The fruits are better known as cape gooseberry and are delicious so I ate the final few remaining on the bush. This plant is easy to grow and provide fruit so are fun; it is, however a member of the Solanaceae family and not all the varieties have edible fruit so care is required that the variety you are growing is edible. Tomatoes and potatoes are members of the same family and while tomatoes are obviously edible, the similar looking fruits which develop on potato plants are poisonous.

I planted in the greenhouse border late last summer two Salvias which I wished to overwinter; the result has been a greenhouse jungle full of flowers in deep purple blue and light violet along with bright red pineapple sage flowers. Pineapple sage is also a salvia with leaves that smell of pineapple when crushed; it is tender and flowers very late in October and, as I have found, right through the winter. The time had come to cut these plants hard back if only to help clear the rampant aphid infestation. I now need to clean down the glass and frame to try to remove as much of the residue left behind as possible. I am a rather slovenly greenhouse gardener and usually fail to complete this task, but it really is a good plan as is thoroughly cleaning all pots. The residents now all need a good feed now temperatures and light levels in the greenhouse are rising.

April is a good time for splitting clumps of perennials to increase their vigour and also produce new plants for friends and for the fete. Replant healthy looking pieces in soil which you have enriched with your choice of compost and fertiliser; I use home produced compost and pelleted chicken manure, but commercial composts and a handful of granular fertiliser will also do. I also add a sprinkling of mycorrhyzal fungi which boosts growth. It is much harder to establish plants later in the year when the soil has dried out; in early spring the ground is still damp and often all you need is an initial watering to eliminate air pockets and settle the soil around the roots.

Keep on top of the weeding especially annual weeds which mustn't seed – the old adage of one year's seed seven year's weeds certainly seems to be true. It is also important to spot seedling perennial weeds such as dandelions bindweed and ground elder (very common in this neighbourhood). These weeds are easy to remove when small and I tend to keep plants I have newly acquired in quarantine until I'm sure they are not infested.

The weather today is not helping matters as it is again bitterly cold and winter appears to have returned. Perusing the BBC weather website really does not help my spirits. I am grateful for the primroses and flowering bulbs, but I really, really need some sun and warmth now!

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

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

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
