WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

Pocket Park and the Regeneration of the Pond

Some of you may have noticed the work going on in the Pocket Park to improve the area around the pond. This space had been neglected for many years, the area had become overgrown, the pond had silted up and it had all become rather dark and dismal. After consulting with the Wildlife Trust, Froglife (a specialist company with expertise in pond management) and the River Nene Regional Park (an environmental specialist organisation), a plan was created to improve the area for the benefit of the community and wildlife alike.

The perimeter was cleared of small self-set trees and scrub to allow more light into the area and reduce the amount of leaves falling into the water, the pond was dredged to remove the silt that had accumulated over the years and a dipping platform was installed to allow safe access to the water.

The length of the pond was reduced by the installation of a permeable barrier at one end to allow the material removed from the pond to be deposited on the ground as removing it from site would have been very expensive particularly given the difficult access.

The very invasive Himalayan Balsam has been removed (we hope) and some native planting around the edges of the pond has taken place. Two small seats have been installed to encourage people to take a few minutes to enjoy what we hope will become a pleasant spot once the planting matures.

This area is still a work in progress with additional planting being planned once the ground conditions allow. Bird and bat boxes are being installed to provide additional habitat and the pond already has attracted frogs and newts.

Funding for this project has largely come from a grant from North Northamptonshire Council and money provided by Redrow Homes as a community contribution when the Cransley Street estate was built.





WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

<u>Traffic Issues in the Village</u>

Over recent years there has been increasing concern about the speed of traffic in the village.

For the last 18 months the Parish Council has been monitoring the four main roads in the village with the use of a speed camera which has been recording speed and traffic flow.

The data from the speed camera has been analysed and the main areas of concern have been identified, these being Northampton Road and Kettering Road.

We are now in consultation with North Northamptonshire Council to obtain costings and plans for traffic calming measures in order to determine how best to use the funds we have available.

In addition we are in consultation with the Council regarding a number of issues relating to the A43 junction at the exit from the village towards Kettering. Further updates will follow on both issues once we have a response from the Council.

Long Service

Broughton Parish Council recently said farewell to Roy Baxter - Roy has served Broughton Community as Councillor for 35 years and we are very grateful to him for this - Roy has been involved in very many projects during his service and more recently, was a Steering Group member and key contributor to the Broughton Neighbourhood Plan where his knowledge and vast experience of the community played a key part in delivering this blueprint for the Parish. We wish Roy a very happy and active retirement from the Council.





Outdoor Gym

Do you fancy a bit of exercise with a difference? Broughton Parish Council supported the Village Hall Committee to secure the installation of a new Outdoor Gym with multiple units designed to give the opportunity to do anything from a gentle stretch to a proper work out. Please do try it, there is something for everyone and best of all, it is completely free of charge!

WHAT'S COMING UP

Memorial Garden - Revisited

Those of you who have been in the village for a while will know the garden at the bottom of the High Street Playing field as the Memorial Garden. The memorial has since moved to the corner of Wellingborough Road and Northampton Road.

The Parish Council are about to refurbish this area to make it a pleasant space for remembrance and reflection.

Our plan is to replant it with bulbs for springtime which will naturalise with a variety of fragrant plants for the rest of the year. We will plant the edges with herbs of all types, so that you can walk past them and run your hands through them to release the fragrance. There should be enough herbs that if you need a sprig of thyme or a bay leaf you can harvest it from the garden.

Thanks to a very kind donation in memory of Broughton resident Malc Darlow, who was also a previous Chair of Broughton Parish Council, there will be an ornamental crab apple tree which will have abundant blossom in the spring and tiny apples for the birds in the Autumn.

The centre square is planned to be planted with camomile, which can be walked on and release a delicious scent. However, we have been told that it is not easy to grow, so watch this space. (Or watch the centre square which will be more interesting.)

A large bug hotel is in the plans to encourage insect life to the area. Those of you who have been driving for a few years will remember that when driving at dusk you would have had to clear your windscreen of bugs that had been splattered on it. The insect population has dwindled so much that you no longer have to do this. This garden will hopefully be the start of insect repopulation in this area.

Your local council is looking into the possibility of naturalising the bank opposite and it is going to be very interesting to see the change in insect activity in the area.

We hope that parents will visit the garden and let the children feel and taste the herbs, learn their names and what you could use them for.






USEFUL INFO

How to Report Faulty Street Lighting and Potholes

You can report potholes and follow the progress and other highways maintenance issues to Northamptonshire County Council Street Doctor service using this link https://www3.northamptonshire.gov.uk/councilservices/northamptonshire-highways/roads-and-streets/Pages/report-highway-problem.aspx.

For Street Lighting, there are two reporting routes - the first one relates to streetlights that are managed by Highways and Street Doctor can be used. The second route is for all other lights and these can be reported to North Northants Council (Kettering) via email: streetlighting.kbc@northnorthants.gov.uk. Each lamp post carries a sticker with a number and the location of these are indicated on the map below. Broughton is one of just a few villages where this dual reporting operates and this is a legacy from having had the main A43 and other main routes passing through the village.

We will always share any consultations that are available and reporting can be via 999 for immediate and urgent help, 101 for general reporting and via Crime Stoppers for anonymous reporting
