The work is varied because you are dealing ont only with cars, but lawn-mowers, boat engines, outboard motors TV aerials and anything else a villager needs mending. You learn that boats can be unstable and, if you remove the starting battery and place it on the side deck, it could end up at the bottom of the river. Then when the job is done, you clean your hands with paraffin. The way Dave told it, in those days life in Hamble was fun!
