SIX PARISHES FRIENDSHIP CLUB

A full coach of members and friends left Beckbury promptly at 9am en-route to Llangollen. After an uneventful ride our destination was reached and we were all ready for a welcoming and refreshing drink, then for a wander round the delightful town before lunch. It was interesting to find out later in the day how different our interests were, a couple of members headed for the railway station with a picnic lunch, then settled down to watch the steam trains and chat to passengers as they alighted. Other members walked round the antique shops, including one male member heard to say that he was trying to lose his three female companions, but as we saw them all together later on they were all declared too young to be antiques. One member entered a church to find herself in the middle of a service and was warmly invited to stay for the service and refreshments afterwards.

What can we say about the lunch other than wherever we went they were huge, looking through one window we saw four members tackling the biggest fish and chips I have ever seen. We carried on to another café where my wife had a jacket potato filled with cheese and coleslaw (enormous) and after munching away for several minutes she found the potato, then the huge filling collapsed again and excavation operations were renewed yet again. On returning to our coach the one thing we could not understand, having sampled the meals we chose, was how do the Welsh stay so slim.

So, 2pm and time for our coach to head for Froncysyllte to meet with the Thomas Telford motorised barge skippered by Nicky. We were given quite a lot of information during our trip, it was interesting that the Llangollen Canal is an offshoot of the Shropshire Canal at Harleston and unusual for a canal has a flow of water during its length with water entering the Canal at the Horseshoe Falls and exiting at Harleston Reservoir, to be used as the water supply by Nantwich and surrounding areas. During the trip we saw where Thomas Telford lived whilst supervising the building of the Aqueduct with its 980ft length and height of 126ft, which incorporated 19 stone arches, each with a 45ft span, and we wondered, without the miracles of modern science that we have now, how on earth they built this fantastic edifice in 1800.

.....FROM the RECTORY

Dear Friends

Congratulations to two local churches - Tong and Boningale – who have received grants for roof repairs from the government scheme. Only 10 churches out of 37 who applied from the Diocese of Lichfield received grants, so to have two in our local area is remarkable.

Sadly Stockton Church was one of the 27 which did not receive a grant. This is the third time that St Chad's Church has been unsuccessful with funding requests for its £100,000 roof repairs project, despite the hard work put into the application by Lord Hamilton and our architect. Ryton Church received a grant from English Heritage four years ago, and the fund raising team ("FOSACRAG" = Friends of St Andrew's Church Ryton and Grindle) have just organised a very successful *Open Gardens* afternoon last month.

We now wait to see what the 'new' government offer by way of grants and funding for historic buildings. All of our six church buildings are 'listed' and therefore deemed to be of historical interest. But there is only so much money available with government cut-backs. Of the Church of England's 16,200 parish churches and 43 cathedrals, 12,500 of these are listed; nearly half of all the country's Grade 1 listed historic buildings are churches or cathedrals. Tong Church and Shifnal Church are both Grade 1 listed, and compared with them our local six parish churches are not so grand nor full of historical features as them.

It is a huge challenge for our small congregations to raise the funds for building repairs. Indeed they are now beginning to struggle with paying all the annual running costs which I outlined in the June newsletter. While there are discussions about toilets and/or kitchenettes being put into our churches (Kemberton is the only one to have a kitchenette, and that was only because it was generously funded by the Eric Lea Trust), the cost of installing such facilities in a listed historic building are high.

Guests for weddings, baptisms and funerals at our churches sometimes need a toilet if they have travelled a distance. So it is understandable that, for other reasons as well, the Church now has fewer special services than in previous years.

This in turn reduces church income, so regular annual costs fall even more heavily on the Sunday service congregations.
