Village Hall News

Don't miss the great *GRAFTY GREEN FROG RACE MEETING on March 3rd!* Yes, the next evening of fun and nonsense at the Village Hall is on the **first Saturday of March** (so this could be the first and last chance I get to tell you about it). Please be sure to note the date while it's in your mind.

It's a bit like the traditional horse race evening (where you bet on the outcome of filmed races) but it's more fun - because we don't have filmed races, we have live racing in the Hall. Grafty Green Water Supply

Since the fire at The Barn which revealed shortcomings in the water supply for the purposes of fire fighting in the village the Parish Council has been in discussion with South East Water to try to improve the situation.

The main problem stems from the fact that the same water main system supplies fire hydrants and households.

Whilst there are recommendations in National Guidance Documents for providing adequate supplies of water to fire hydrants they are not a legal requirement and there is no obligation upon South East Water to follow them. It is the opinion of the Parish Council, based upon the failure of the system to supply sufficient water to fire hydrants during the fire that all properties are at an unnecessarily high risk unless the supply is upgraded to meet National Guidance.

To date South East Water say that the water pressure is controlled at a level to minimise the possibility of leaks and burst pipes and to increase it substantially to provide more fire fighting capability would cause failures in the system. However, there are possible solutions to explore and discussion will continue.

In parallel with the problems of water for fire fighting the Parish Council has also discussed the numerous complaints of insufficient pressure at properties with South East Water and we have obtained agreement that, if we submit a list of properties which suffer from low pressure, they will be investigated with a view to improvement, provided that the pressure is below the minimum legal requirement.

Unfortunately, based upon experience during the fire, the minimum legal requirement for households is inadequate for the effective use of fire hydrants fed off the same water main.

If anyone believes their water pressure is inadequate, a very rough check can be done at a time when you think the pressure will be at it's lowest by simply filling a 1 gallon (4.5 litres) container at your kitchen tap. If it fills in less than 30 seconds then there is no point in pursuing a complaint but if it takes longer then please note the date, time, and number of seconds to fill the container. Please leave the information on the prepared list in the shop together with your name and address, alternatively you can email me at galtonweeks@gmail.com or telephone me on 850369 before the end of February.

The information will be given to South East Water who will then investigate.

It may take a long time to resolve these problems and there are no guarantees so please be patient. Further reports will be published in due course.

Fire Update

This article is necessarily written before our fire prevention meeting in the village hall on Tuesday 31st January albeit you will not receive the magazine until after the meeting. Further meetings have taken place with Kent Fire Service and they are working with us in a pro-active way with a number of initiatives such that our village is to be used as a 'pilot' for rural areas generally.

As a result of a survey we have carried out regarding fire hydrants throughout the village and shortcomings noted a maintenance team will this week bring all hydrants up to standard and additionally be permanently marking road surfaces with a yellow 'H' to much improve hydrant visibility. We in the village will be regularly visually checking hydrants to ensure they will always be in a state of operational readiness if the unfortunate need arises.

On the fire prevention front KFRS have confirmed their willingness to visit homes and premises to advise on fire safety (free), and in appropriate cases fit smoke alarms without charge. It is worth noting there are many types of alarm e.g. for the hard of hearing they have one with a 'vibrate pad' which goes under the pillow.

KFRS general message is about safely storing flammable substances and materials, exercising care with open fires, log burners and other forms of heating, having the chimney swept yearly, having a periodic electrical safety check by a properly qualified electrician. Consider smoke alarms in loft areas where a fire could start and burn for sometime before being apparent. Similarly additionally consider a carbon monoxide alarm – carbon monoxide a deadly smell-less and colourless gas which can kill in minutes and is produced by burning numerous fuels and materials including wood for which the chimney or flue must be in good condition and properly ventilated.

Think fire safety at all times and don't delay calling the fire brigade even if initially a fire seems small. Contrary to the belief of many KFRS do not make a charge for attending any fire including false alarms. Finally we say again our first on scene fire appliance for large parts of the day and night will come from Maidstone or Ashford and not Headcorn or Lenham.

Finally KFRS request please always be aware of, and keep, fire hydrants clear at all times particularly do not park over them at any time of day or night. A yellow 'H' in the road will easily denote a hydrant position.

Last minute stop press:

KFRS have today (Wednesday 25th January) been busy in the Parish regarding our fire hydrants. They have confirmed 11 of 13 are fully operational albeit some require further remedial work which will be done soon. Of the other two, one is buried, and

the other totally 'lost'. Both will be rectified soon. You will notice they are a lot more visible with bright yellow covers and a permanently marked 'H' in the road.

If you are very worried about someone knocking on your door and they are still in the area call 999. If you would like to inform us after, to give a description or vehicle number then please call the Police non emergency number 101. Do not be afraid to say no to someone, you are the important one and the safety of you or your property is paramount to us.

Pet's Corner!

AN ITCHY PROBLEM ...

It is not unusual for dogs to develop an itch, and the first possible cause to eliminate is always the flea.

The Busy Life Of The Flea!

Remember that, because of central heating, the flea can happily live and reproduce all year round, whether you have carpets or wooden flooring.

The most common flea is the cat flea, but it is at home on your dog or cat!

The adult flea does not leave its host, but drops hundreds of eggs into the environment during its short life span. These eggs hatch into a larval form which is nearly invisible to the naked eye. The larvae remain in your carpet until they have fed sufficiently on carpet debris, and then form a cocoon in which to develop into an adult. No treatment is able to penetrate this cocoon, and the immature flea can remain in this stage for 18 months or more.



When conditions are ideal plenty of carbon dioxide,
warm and humid and lots of
vibrations (the trampling feet
of a potential host) - the
cocoon hatches out into a
hungry young flea, which
jumps straight back on its new
host and repeats the cycle.

How To Beat The Flea!

Ensure that all your pets, cats and dogs, are treated with an effective flea treatment. Spot-on preparations are the easiest, most effective and safest to apply (e.g. Stronghold, Frontline. Advocate) and some even include a worming preparation, too! Use these monthly or as directed.



Next, treat the environment!

For every ONE flea seen on your pet, there are about another ninetynine in the carpets and bedding as eggs, larvae and cocoons!

Create the ideal 'hatching' conditions - crank up your heating, close all the windows and vacuum thoroughly - the cocooned will think vibrations are hosts! Use a household flea spray - try and buy one that has a growth regulator in it, as this will also kill the larval stage as well as adults and hatchlings.

Ensure that all food, water bowls and fish tanks are either well covered or removed. Spray as per instructions.

If you have a severe flea infestation, speak to your vet first about a treatment protocol!

The Grafty Gourmet

This is something that I created using left over turkey at Christmas. Its very easy to make, and the result was mouth watering. Spaghetti can be used in place of tagliatelle, but I prefer the latter, as it coats with the sauce so much better.

Chicken Tagliatelle with Creamy Stilton Sauce

Serves 2

1 x Onion -chopped 2 x Cloves of Garlic - finely chopped 25g Butter

2 x Chicken Breasts - sliced

8 x Mushrooms - sliced

300ml double cream 80g Stilton Cheese - crumbled 200g Dried Tagliatelle Pasta Black Pepper to season

- 1. Melt the butter slowly in a sauce pan and add the chopped onion & garlic. Simmer for about 2 minutes until onion has softened. Whilst the onions are simmering, bring a sauce pan of water to the boil. Once boiling, place in the Tagliatelle, and turn the heat down, but still keeping the water bubbling. This helps prevent the pasta sticking together. Stir the pasta occasionally whilst cooking.
- 2. Once the onions are soft, add the sliced chicken breasts and simmer. Half way through frying the chicken, add the sliced mushrooms stirring occasionally.
- 3. When the chicken is cooked through, turn the heat to a low simmer and add the cream, followed by the crumbled stilton. Season with a little black pepper. (No salt is required, as the stilton substitutes for this). Stir until the stilton has melted.
- 4. After approximately 10 minutes, the pasta should be cooked al dente. Drain, and stir into the chicken and cream mixture, until all the pasta is evenly coated. Serve immediately.

Road Closure

The closure is on 13th February and this is scheduled to be for 3 days. The location for the closure is essentially the road that runs alongside Boughton Malherbe Church and will be approx 150 meters long. This closure is for BT to replace a Telegraph Pole. The suggested diversion route is via Liverton Hill and Park Lane!!

News From Ulcombe Village School

This is the first time I have written in 2012. This promises to be a wonderful year with the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and the Olympics to name just two of the highlights in store for us all. This is also the year that the building of our extension will finally get under way. The library has been many years in the planning, but finally we can feel like we are getting there. The land where our adventure trail used to be will be sold in the coming weeks. Building work on the extension will start as soon as possible after the money has been received, to include a library, disabled toilet and small kitchen area. If there are enough funds, we will improve the entrance and office areas, too. To now be so close to starting work is very exciting for us all.

During the last two months thousands of pounds have been spent to upgrade our ICT equipment and so improve the quality of the children's learning. Although we are still waiting for all of the equipment to be fully installed, it is now just a matter of days before we are 'up and running'. The FUS and School Council are working together to improve the outside area, which is fantastic.

NOW MOVING FROM GOOD TO OUTSTANDING

As a school we are making good strides all the time, which was reflected in our recent Ofsted and Church Inspections. The last week of term started with our Statutory Inspection of Anglican Schools. This is an inspection conducted by the Diocese following an Ofsted Inspection.

The three areas of focus for the inspection are how well we meet the needs of all learners as a Church of England school, the impact of collective worship and the effectiveness of leadership and management. In all of these areas the inspector judged us to be good. There were three particular strengths which he identified. The first was our clear understanding of how the school's distinctive Christian character is used to nurture all of the children it serves. The second strength was our link with the church and a drive to expand the range of activities provided to enhance the life of the community. The third strength that was singled out for special mention was the use of worship to inspire the spiritual growth of those in the school family.

We were delighted that our work in these areas was recognized and praised. Indeed, with regard to collective worship we need only to increase the number of monitoring visits conducted by Governors to be rated as outstanding. Increasing monitoring forms two of our three action points, with the third being about Christian values. This is something which we started to look at with the children with our focus this term being on friendship. The full report will be available on the school web-site soon. TEAM OF THE YEAR

After an incredible season, our footballers have been nominated for the Maidstone Youth Sports Achievement Award, as Team of the Year. Several of the squad are

thoroughly looking forward to the ceremony at Mote Park which takes place at the end of January.

The Youth Sport Achievement Awards are the biggest celebration of sport in Maidstone. Family, friends, sports coaches and teachers had to nominate individuals, teams and schools that showed dedication, improvement and sporting success, over the last year. The awards are not just about celebrating high level achievers but also those that have shown extraordinary effort and dedication throughout 2011. Hugh Robertson, MP, will be the guest speaker.

CELEBRATING MOTHERING SUNDAY

The next Ulcombe School Friends' Dinner will again be during the week before Mothering Sunday. 

WHATS NEW IN WINDOWS® 7

DESKTOP - New features on the Windows desktop make it easier to organize and manage multiple windows, and switch easily between open windows so that you can focus on important programs and files. Other new features help you add a personal touch to your desktop.

SNAP - You can use Snap to arrange and resize windows on the desktop with a flick of the mouse. Using Snap, you can quickly align windows at the side of the desktop, expand them vertically to the entire height of the screen, or maximize them to completely fill the desktop. Snap can be especially helpful when comparing two documents, copying or moving files between two windows, maximizing the window you're currently working on, or expanding long documents so they're easier to read and require less scrolling.

The February Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Capricornus at beginning of February, and moves into Aquarius on the 16^{th} .

Full Moon occurs on Tuesday 7^{th} February when bordering the constellations of Cancer and Leo, and **New Moon** is on Tuesday 21^{st} January.

Mercury is in **superior conjunction** (almost directly behind the Sun) on 7th February, so it will not be possible to get any reasonable views of this elusive planet until early next month.

Venus is visible in the south western sky just after sunset, and again it is difficult to miss the "Evening Star" as it is the brightest object in the sky.

Mars is rising in the east in the middle of the evening, and is high in the southern sky at dawn. Relative to the stars it is moving steadily north eastwards in the constellation of Leo. Through a telescope it may be possible to see the dark and light patches on the surface, together with the white North Polar Cap.

Jupiter is again well placed for viewing in the evenings this month. It is high in the south western sky at dusk and is brighter than any of the stars. Though a telescope you should be able to see the dark and light bands together with the **Great Red Spot**. It may also be possible to see, even through binoculars, Jupiter's four major moons.

Saturn is rising in the east shortly before midnight, and is well up in the southern western sky just before dawn. Relative to the stars it is almost stationary in the constellation of Virgo. Through a telescope you should be able to see the famous rings together with many of its moons.

Some of you may have read a few weeks ago that scientists have found a way to make an event "disappear" in time. We already know that it is possible to bend light around objects to make them invisible, but a team at Cornell University in New York State has now taken the concept a step further by creating a hole in time rather than space. By speeding up some parts of a light beam while slowing down others, and then immediately restoring the light beam to its normal state, they created a gap in time measuring 40 trillionths of a second. So in theory, anything which happened during this gap, could not be detected and would not exist in our perception of time. However, the technique could probably only produce a gap of 0.00012 seconds, which would be of very little practical use.


