


I am the proper Bird for this season -Not blessed St Turkey, Born to be eaten

As promised, this is a short update from behind the scenes of the "Save the Middleton Oaks & Stop our Heritage Coastline from becoming a rat-run" Campaign ... snappy huh?!

I am incredibly pleased by our amazing success, having now saved at least five within the line of seven Middleton Oaks from the jaws of Sizewell C's relentless machinery. The campaign has segued into a mission to **stop** SZC from building an extension of the B1125 to join directly into the Sizewell Link Road (SLR) - thereby saving the remaining 2 oaks, preserving the B1125 as our Heritage Coast Road (reducing speeding and improving safety) and not enabling its use as a RAT RUN - both during the lengthy construction of SZC and as its legacy.

Our 150+ year old oaks are indeed the majestic sentinels and carbon capture saviours along this rural B-road and if this campaign is to continue to be successful, it needs to focus on stopping the B1125 from turning into an impossible rat-run (way worse than it ever was for SZB or indeed A) along this heritage coastline.

Unfortunately I have to confess to burnout from spearheading this campaign up to now, so I've had to make some difficult decisions about how we can be more strategically effective; maximum impact from minimum effort - so I will be cutting back on certain things. However, together with a couple of determined locals, we are working away behind the scenes, looking into the detail of what has had most success (in terms of forcing SZC and SCC Highways to listen to our community's concerns).

We plan to call on as many people as possible to join another event with press attendance to make our voices heard before it is too late and construction of the extension of the B1125 to join the SLR together with felling of the 2 oaks still in their sights, starts. Details will follow in the New Year.

Middleton Dark Skies





December Highlights



<u>Planets on View.</u> Only a couple of planets of note are on view this month, as both **Venus** and **Mars** are lost in the glare of the Sun. **Jupiter** rises into the eastern sky at around 6.00pm, sitting almost directly below the stars Castor and Pollux in the constellation of Gemini. Jupiter is always worth a look at through a pair of binoculars, as it is often possible to pick out up to four of its main moons, Europa, Io, Ganymede and Callisto. A small telescope might also reveal Jupiter's cloud belts. **Saturn** sits out towards the southwest after sunset, binoculars will reveal the planet to be slightly elliptical in shape, this effect being caused by Saturn's rings.

Constellations With the winter constellations now well in place and darker skies, it's worth just spending 10 minutes or so taking a look out for the more observable ones. Looking north at around 10.00pm the most obvious one will be The Plough, although it is actually part of the constellation Ursa Major (The Great Bear). The seven stars that make up The Plough shine brighter than the dozen or so stars that make up the rest of the constellation. The Plough resembles a large saucepan, which this month will be seen with the 'handle' hanging down below the 'pan'. Slightly to the west of The Plough is The Little Bear (Ursa Minor), which contains the star Polaris, otherwise known as the Pole Star, around which all the other stars appear to rotate. To locate Polaris and therefore The Little Bear, use the two 'pointer' stars in the 'pan' of The Plough. Moving further west, and more overhead is Cassiopeia, which is usually described as looking like a large W, but at this time of year it is upside down, so look for a large M. The Milky Way runs through the length of Cassiopeia, and if you follow it down towards the NW horizon, you will come to four bright stars that make up a large triangle. These stars are part of the constellation of Cygnus, and form the wings and tail of the swan, the head now being below the horizon. Directly west is the square of Pegasus, although in its current position it's more of a diamond than a square. The square is big, taking up a large area of the sky, so should be fairly easy to spot. Dominating the southern skies are the constellations of Orion and Taurus, both of which are worth a look through binoculars. The top left star of the 'body' of Orion is the red supergiant Betelgeuse, its red colour being visible to the naked eye. This star is pulsating, constantly changing shape and size, leading to speculation that its core is close to collapsing, which will eventually lead to the star imploding and then immediately exploding to become a Supernova (although if and when seen from Earth, it will be 500 years after the actual event!). The three stars that make up Orion's Belt are easy to locate, all three being of a similar brightness, as well as forming an almost straight line. Just below the belt are a group of stars that make up Orion's Sword, although binoculars will reveal one of these stars to be a misty patch, which is in fact the Orion Nebula. The head of Taurus (The Bull) is made up of stars forming a distinct triangle, although binoculars will reveal this area to be one large star cluster made up of over a hundred stars. The Pleiades star cluster sits just to the west of the head of Taurus and does not require binoculars to be seen, although binoculars will reveal that the cluster is made up of over a thousand stars. Moving to the east can be found the constellation of Gemini, which conveniently has a very bright Jupiter for company. Immediately above Jupiter, and as the month progresses forming an obvious line with it, are the two main stars of Gemini, Castor and Pollux. The remaining stars of the constellation are a little indistinct, but can still be made out with the naked eye.







Orion







The Moon. Known as the Cold Moon or Long Night Moon this month, with the Full Moon occurring on the 4th. It's the 3rd and final Supermoon of the year, so if the skies are fairly clear, torches will not be needed walking home from this month's Squit Night. **Moon Trivia**....27 Apollo crew (Missions 8,10,11-17) have travelled to the Moon, although only 24 individuals (3 went twice), with 12 astronauts walking on the surface. (11,12,14-17)

<u>Meteors.</u> The <u>Geminids</u> occur on the night of the 13th, and with the Moon not rising until around 1.00am, it will be a good night to see the best shower of the year. If you locate **Jupiter** shining brightly in the eastern night sky, that is where the meteors will appear to originate from.

<u>Santa Claus</u> The late evening of the 24th will be the best time to try and observe a fast-moving Santa, as the Moon will have set well before midnight making viewing conditions ideal this year. Leaving out a sherry and some mince pies should increase your chances of catching a glimpse of Santa. (Oh, and a carrot or two).

December Nature Notes



Of all the owls, tawny owls are the most likely to be seen or heard in your garden. They are particularly vocal during the winter months, when they are busy defending their territories in readiness for their early start to the breeding season. Tawny owls are a reasonably large owl, brown in colour with black eyes and lacking the ear tufts seen on some other owl species. During the daylight hours they remain in cover up against a tree trunk and only occasionally pestered by scolding songbirds. The commonly heard female contact call is a shrill, 'keewik' but the male also has a quavering hoo...ho, ho, hoo-hoo-hoo-hoo song.

Although it is believed tawny owls have exceptional night vision, its retina is no more sensitive than a human's. Rather, it is the asymmetrically placed ears that give the tawny owl excellent directional hearing. A passage through the skull links the eardrums and small differences in the time of arrival of a sound at each ear enables its source to be pinpointed. The tawny owl's hearing is ten times better than a humans, and it can hunt using this sense alone in dark woodland on an overcast night. The beating of raindrops makes it difficult to detect faint sounds, and prolonged wet weather can lead to starvation if the owl cannot hunt effectively.



Tawny owls pair off from the age of one year, and stay together in a usually monogamous relationship for life. They are very early nesters, and having established breeding territories from November onwards, and will start to lay eggs from late February. The nest is typically in a tree hole where it can protect its eggs and young against predators. An established pair's territory is defended year-round and maintained with little, if any, boundary change from year to year. Young birds often starve if they cannot find a vacant territory once parental care ceases. The fluffy young can sometimes be found on the ground below the nest site; unless the chicks are actually under threat from a predator it is best to leave them be. They are surprisingly agile and are able to climb back up the trunk to reach the nest hole. Tawny owls are fearless in defence of its nest and young and will strike for the intruder's head with its sharp talons. Because its flight is silent, it may not be detected until it is too late to avoid the danger. Dogs, cats and humans have been attacked, sometimes without provocation. The tawny owl hunts almost entirely at night, watching from a perch before dropping or gliding silently down to its victim, but very occasionally it will hunt in daylight when it has young to feed. This species takes a wide range of prey, mainly woodland rodents, but can take mammals up to the size of a squirrel or young rabbit, birds, and even earthworms and beetles. The tawny owl is associated with wisdom due to its nocturnal nature, which symbolizes knowledge and insight, and its role in folklore and literature is as a symbol of intelligence. Its silent, observant, and thoughtful behaviour has led to it being seen as a wise, quiet guardian of the night.




