Oyez! Oyez! Oyez!

Come all ye *Lords, Ladies, Freemen, and Villeins* of the Parish of Stockbury, hear ye this:

In celebration of the crowning of our new king, King Charles III, on the 6th May, in the year of our Lord 2023, 3 days of celebrations have been decreed.

You are cordially invited to join us for said celebratory events:

Our celebrations will commence on Saturday evening with a BBQ at The Harrow pub between 6pm and 8pm; tickets for the BBQ will be available from the bar for a minimum donation of £5 per person. The BBQ will consist a choice of either beef or pig on a trencher with salad, other tastes will be catered for. This will be followed by live music from the ever-popular Chicory (Son of My Father) Tip where you can make merry until the first owl hoots (or Sarah calls 'last orders').

Our village landlady will not unlock and unbolt the hostelry doors until 3pm on Coronation Day.

Our bountiful Sunday celebrations will begin with the opportunity to traverse ye olde village on a lavishly furnished trailer pulled by a many horse powered pulling machine starting from The Green. This will be free of charge but we are unable to accommodate children under 5, children between the ages of 5 and 12 must be accompanied by an adult. (This is entirely due to Health & Safety and insurance reasons). Any person found flaunting these local feudal laws will be publicly pilloried on The Green.

Following this, our popular local hostelry, The Harrow, will be hosting 'The Big Lunch'; this will consist of a buffet style banquet. Tickets will be available in advance for a minimum contribution of £5 per head over the bar, a limited number of tickets may still be available on the day. You are therefore encouraged to purchase your tickets in advance. If, however this is not to your taste then you are invited to join us on The Green with your own fare and refreshments.

As part of 'The Big Lunch' we invite you to participate in our Coronation Cake Competition. There will be a main prize for the best coronation themed decorated creation and a secondary prize for the most flavoursome entry. Entry forms should be obtained from Sarah at The Harrow in advance. (Completed entry forms will aid in allergen identification and staging requirements). All entries must be received by 11am at The Harrow, ready for judging. All cakes will then be available for consumption after judging as part of the buffet lunch, where the victor will be proclaimed to great fanfare.

Children's activities and games will be freely available but parental supervision must be maintained at all times. (Please see previous reference to pillory and The Green!) For the adults there will be an opportunity to partake in Pétanque, Smite and Jenga.

Tickets for the Coronation Hamper Raffle are available now and throughout the celebrations from The Harrow and will be drawn (not hung and quartered too!) on the Monday at 2.30pm.


In the event of flood, some activities may move to the Village Hall.

Our festivities will continue into the Monday with the Sponsor a Stockbury Orchard Tree event at Stockbury Community Orchard. For this event, you are encouraged to sponsor an orchard tree by purchasing in advance a personalised metal plaque for a minimum donation of £5 which can then be placed on the guard of your chosen orchard tree. (This may help stave off famine in the future, and thus prevent the villeins revolting). A sponsorship form can be found on the back of The Observer or obtained from The Harrow. It would be helpful if completed sponsorship forms are returned with their donation as soon as possible to enable your plaque to be prepared in advance. Plaques will then be available for collection and installation on the tree guard at the orchard on the day, or from The Harrow at a later date. There will also be an opportunity on the day to purchase a plaque at the orchard but as engraving time will be limited on the morning, we strongly recommend purchasing your plaque in advance.

Running alongside, there will be a tantalising Treasure Hunt set by one of our Village Elders'. This will be focused around our beautiful village and will require you to solve clues in order to lead you 'home'; the victorious team will be presented with their prize at The Harrow. Luncheon can be purchased between 12 and 2.30 pm where drinks will also be available.

M2 junction 5 Stockbury interchange improvement scheme

On Monday 24 April, we closed the section of Maidstone Road that links to the Stockbury roundabout, south of Wormdale Hill. While we're working on the new link to Oad Street there will be no access to the roundabout from Maidstone Road.

We're currently due to open the new link on Monday 19 June 2023.

To access to properties and businesses on Chestnut Street and Maidstone Road, please use the Key Street roundabout.

Replacement bus service with Kent Karrier

This closure means the Arriva 334 bus service now operates on the A249 between Key Street and the Stockbury Roundabout, rather than using Chestnut Street and Maidstone Road.

The Country Eye App




For anyone wishing to report road issues such potholes, flooding, missing or damaged signs etc., then the Country Eye phone app is a quick and easy way to do so

Update on the Demise of the 332 Bus Route

The Background - It's old news now that Kent County Council withdrew the subsidy for the 332 that served as the school bus from Stockbury and the surrounding area to most of the Sittingbourne schools, resulting in the operator binning the route. This means that, in simple terms, any child attending what KCC deem to be their 'nearest appropriate school' and living far enough away will have school transport provided. If the child attends any other school, it is down to the parents to get them there. As I said, this is the simplistic view, as some in the village have found. The cancellation of the 332 has left at least 6 children with no means of getting to school and others with difficult journeys. (We can't take them ourselves as we may be working, caring for others in the family, could be posted away on military service, working shifts for the NHS ...)

A big thank you to all those that helped lobbing KCC to retain the 332, with some very valid / reasoned arguments, but there is no point dwelling on it - we lost the bus. What's done is done and we need to move on ...

So What has Been Happening Since the 332 was

Binned? - Some of the parents have got together and formed the School Transport Club so that we could obtain a KCC Community Transport Grant to fund a private means of getting the children to school. As part of this, we asked various taxi / private hire companies in the area for prices and availability and had Catley Cars lined up to operate the service. The grant application is proving a little more tricky than anticipated, but we are still hopeful and in the interim KCC have been funding Catley Cars directly. The service has been running very well and once secured, it is hoped that this grant will be ongoing.

So if anyone out there has a child that will be starting Secondary School in September and will, in all likelihood have KCC home to school transport refused, it might be worth your getting in touch to see if the School Transport Club can help. The more of us there are, the stronger the voice we have. As the saying goes 'together we are stronger'.

Countryside Matters Bats (part one)

What do you know about bats?

For instance which of the following statements are true?

- BATS spend many hours grooming themselves and are very clean.
- BATS are not likely to attack people or pets.
- BAT droppings are neither unpleasant nor unhealthy as they consist of insect remains.
- BATS often choose to hang up in modern buildings.

They are all true, so the question is why are some people nervous of them? Perhaps we should try to understand them better and then our fears would disappear!

Bats, being nocturnal, are seen only dimly in the dusk and their wings are rather big; as a result the animals appear larger than they really are. They have a swooping motion whilst catching insects which might also make people feel uneasy.

However bats are just small, warm-blooded mammals with hair or fur on them, much like many of our pets and us come to that! Admittedly they are the only mammals that can fly. Like all mammals, a baby bat feeds from its mother's milk for a few weeks after it is born. Its wing has very similar bones to the hand and arm of a human, the difference being that there is skin stretched between the very long finger bones and the body to form the wing membrane.

There are 16 species of bat living in Britain, but the one you are most likely to see is a **pipistrelle**.



Stockbury Book Club

Middlesex by Jeffrey Eugenides:

Middlesex was published in 2002 and is a bestseller, with more than four million copies sold since its publication. Its characters and events are loosely based on aspects of Eugenides' life and observations of his Greek heritage. It is not an autobiography.

Primarily a coming-of-age story and family saga, the 21st century gender novel chronicles the effect of a mutated gene on three generations of a Greek family, causing momentous changes in the protagonist's life. The novel's main themes are nature versus nurture, rebirth, and the differing experiences of what society constructs as polar opposites such as those found between men and women. It discusses the pursuit of the American Dream, explores gender identity, and contains many allusions to Greek mythology.

Well as usual the opinions of those in the book club varied enormously. Most found it a bit difficult to begin with but persevered and then opinions began to diverge!

One member said they couldn't understand what it was about but found the some of the exploration of the gender identity and intersex issues interesting.

Three of the group found it long winded and lacking in focus, got bored with the historical background, didn't want to get into the authors head and just felt the story didn't resonate with them, so gave up before finishing it.

Two members of the group completed the book and enjoyed the fact that it was different. Both liked the historical context in portraying its Greek immigrant drama and felt they had learned something from it. They enjoyed the descriptions and depiction of hometown Detroit and his social commentary on the immigrant experience and lifestyle as second-class citizens. Comment was also made about the sympathetic way the gender identity issues were handled in the book.

Varied opinions led to very varied scores with the overall total of 5/10.

This is not to say that things don't happen in the background, although not always obvious even to insiders. I note a great achievement, which was announced in the press as theirs by one of Maidstone's MPs, although the footwork was done by the MBC Executive. Ah well, as long as we are all pulling together in the same direction for the good of Maidstone ...

Councillor Declares Herself a Wo

Full Council meetings are usually as exciting as watching grass grow. A lot of it is ceremonial procedure and committee work being ratified. This month was not much different. We thanked many members who won't stand again in this year's election and remembered one of our longest serving members and former Mayor Dan Daly who sadly passed away. Then we proceeded to ratify a few constitutional amendments. A Borough's constitution is basically a rule-book of procedure and has a slightly different meaning to a Country's Constitution where you would find some wonderful things mentioned like Human Rights, free speech and equality.

You may remember that the Maidstone constitution was rewritten a year ago, when we moved from a committee to an executive system. So a few minor tweaks were needed to sort out the teething problems. A routine ratification you would imagine, as this was previously agreed by all parties in Committee; except some lefty councillors found it necessary to request an amendment and debate whether the position of Chairman should be referred to as 'Chair';in a gender neutral manner.

Councillors mused about the Latin origin of the word Chairman, others quoted a former female Councillor and Mayor who once insisted that she was a Chairman and not a piece of furniture until Independent Councillor Fay Gooch got up and insisted that if the 'man' reference in the word 'chairman' should be abolished then the man reference in the word woman ought to be too: "I therefore declare myself a Wo!"

The 'chair-amendment' was lost, with a huge majority of members across the party spectrum voting against it.

Sewage Overflow

I previously mentioned, we are in the process of drafting a Design and Sustainability Development Plan Document whereby we also seek local solutions to deal with surface/rain water. SUDS are local drainage systems that are considered to be environmentally beneficial, causing minimal or no long-term detrimental damage. Those solutions are not free from trouble though. Often the SuDs are not properly managed. This may be down to new developments being overseen by a property maintenance contractor, where often the commercial relationship between the home-owners and the maintenance company breaks down.

In the past surface water was being dealt with by the local sewers, which in most cases carry both sewage and relatively clean surface water. When sudden torrential rainfall happens, even or especially after a long period of draught, like last summer, too much water very suddenly enters the treatment system. The sewage treatment plants simply cannot deal with the vast sudden amount of clean surface water entering the sewage system. There are no storage buffers. This causes the release of untreated raw sewage into the rivers and the sea, a problem which gets regularly reported in the press these days. This article explains the problem very well:

And Finally ...

... an example of very bad democracy: An Oxfordshire County Council spokesperson claimed that "too much technical detail can reduce response rates" at public consultations. Oxfordshire Council has been accused of 'hiding crucial figures' from residents during a consultation, which show its 'climate zones' scheme could actually increase traffic. Six traffic filters, described as 'bus-gates' will close off Oxford's arterial roads to cars in an attempt to relieve congestion and promote cycling in a trial starting next year. Conservative councillors have brought a motion to re-run the consultation and find the true scale of opposition.
