### The Park in August

August is generally a less colourful time in the park but the circular beds maintained by the council are looking spectacular at the minute.

The Penstemons and Stachys in the Woodend Tower bed are in full bloom and obviously producing a lot of nectar. Every morning it has been alive with bees, particularly the White tailed Bumble Bee, so I presume there is a nest near-by. They are social bees living in colonies of up to 200 workers often in abandoned mouse holes in walls and banks.

The Hydrangeas around the gardens are coming into flower and will look particularly good in the shrub borders with the Osteospermums, Verbena and Penstemons.

Keep an eye open for the Yellow Wagtail that has taken up residence near the pond. This is a summer visitor from Africa that inhabits meadowland and damp grassland where it feeds on insects.


