Grafty Garden Cuttings - April

Abandoning our garden for almost 3 months, even though it was over the winter months, has meant much catching up to be done in a very short time. The weeds and lawn edges revelled in their freedom and I am only now up tight with the spring pruning - autumn fruiting raspberries, buddleias, roses etc. All the digging that should have been done has not, neither has the spreading of the compost heap and I shall be interested to see how late sowings of sweet pea, onion and brussel sprout seed come along. If the wet and chilly spring continues it's probably better than early sowings. Cloches, fleece, cold frames and black plastic will help enormously.

Many jobs to do this month, for if there is warm spring sunshine, the ground should warm up nicely ready for other sowings. No sun? Cover the ground with black plastic instead. Two weeks should suffice, and then such goodies as peas, broad beans, parsnips and onion sets and salad leaves can go in. Protect with fleece or environmesh to stop birds, cats and squirrels digging them out. Early potatoes should be planted and even in the smallest garden, some can go into large pots or even old compost bags. Roll the sides down, cut slits in the bottom for drainage, then place a layer of compost in the bag and plant 2 or 3 tubers (or 1 if the bag is small). Cover with another layer of compost and water regularly without water logging or allowing them to dry out completely. Add more compost as the plants shoot, unrolling the bag to accommodate the ever taller foliage, which needs this 'earthing-up' to produce a heavier crop.

Summer flowering bulbs can be planted this month, either into containers for positioning in blank-spaces in the border, or straight into the ground where a good layer of grit in the bottom of the planting hole helps to stop any rot. Houseplants needing rejuvenation can be pruned back and re-potted into a container of a size that allows easy access for the fingers round the root ball, to firm-in the new soil, i.e.: around half an inch. If house space is limited, many plants can be carefully root pruned and potted back into new compost in their original containers (take no more than about a third of the roots away).

Hanging baskets and containers will need planting-up next month, so do come along to the Grafty Green Garden Club plant sale, on the village green (the hall if wet) on Saturday 3rd May at 10 am. There will be tea and coffee and a cake stall, so it will also be a pleasant social occasion as well.

ON THE BUSES

FREE NATIONAL BUS TRAVEL

From April 1st, everyone aged 60 or over is entitled to free off peak **local** bus travel anywhere in England. It does not include National Express or other coach services, so you might have to change a few times if you want to get to Lands End!

The national scheme replaces the Kent Countywide scheme and there is one important change. The Kent scheme allowed free travel from 9am on Mondays to Fridays but the national scheme has a starting time of 9.30am and a finishing time of 11pm on Mondays to Fridays. However, free travel continues to be permitted at any time on Saturdays, Sundays, and Bank Holidays.

If you have previously had a Kent Countywide Pass, you should by the time you read this have automatically received a National Bus Concession Pass. If you previously opted to receive vouchers rather than a free travel pass, you are probably aware that the voucher scheme is being discontinued by Maidstone Borough Council, and if you now want a free travel pass, you will have to apply for one, as does anyone else on reaching the age of 60. For full details of how to apply and to get an application form, go to www.maidstone.gov.uk, click on 'c' at 'A-Z of Services', and then follow the link to 'Concessionary Fares'. SERVICE 59

To enable those eligible to make use of the new national free travel pass, the 9.15am departure from Grafty Green to Maidstone on Mondays to Fridays is being retimed to depart at 9.30am from Monday 7th April. A revised timetable is not yet available but arrival time in Maidstone is presumed also to be 15 minutes later, i.e. at 10.20am. There are not thought to be any other changes being made to the timetable although confirmation is still awaited. In the meantime, the existing timetable is being reproduced again in Malherbe Monthly – just bear in mind the one known alteration from April 7th.

SERVICE 331

The Thursday only return journey, introduced last September as a temporary replacement for the withdrawn Postbus, is still operating and is expected to continue for a few more weeks yet. It departs from Grafty Green Post Office at 9.50am, Platts Heath at 10.00am, Sandway at 10.02am, Lenham Square at 10.10am, and is due to arrive in Maidstone at 10.25am. It returns from Maidstone at 12.45pm from King Street outside Somerfields, and is due to arrive in Lenham Square at 1.05pm, and Grafty Green at 1.15pm.

KENT FREEDOM PASS FOR STUDENTS

Already introduced in some parts of the county, this pass is being extended from June to students at schools in the Maidstone Borough area. For an annual fee of £50, the pass will allow students who will be in academic Years 7 to 11 in September 2008 to travel free on virtually all bus services in Kent at anytime. Application packs are to be distributed through schools in April and passes will be distributed from 2nd June (passes for new Year 7 students will be available in school in September 2008).

Heaths Corridor Walk

Spend a day enjoying the countryside around Charing Heath, Lenham Heath and Sandway on Sunday 18th May 2008 10:30am to 4pm. The event is funded by the Heaths Countryside Corridor and Rail Link Countryside Initiative and promises to be a fun day for the whole family.

The Heaths Countryside Corridor (HCC) is providing a free bus from Sandway to Charing Heath throughout the day (from 10:15am to 4pm) to enable local people to visit the three sites owned by HCC. The bus will stop regularly along the route and will ensure everyone gets home at the end of the day. There will be trustees at Hurst Wood, Hurst Lane, between 10:30am and 12 noon providing information and a quiz about the route for the Walk at Hurst Wood. The Walk is 3.2 miles long, for the most part, public rights of way, but the cycle route along the country roads will also be well marked.

There will be free refreshments along the way and the walk finishes at Chilston Ponds, where there will be a variety of free activities including Animal model making, Desk top pond dipping, Tree investigation, Mini beast Hunt, Nature treasure Hunt. The April Night Sky

In my magazine articles I haven't yet mentioned the Sun. During the course of last month the Sun began a new cycle. Every solar cycle lasts approximately eleven years, ranging from the present minimum, when the Sun is comparatively inactive, to a violent maximum, when flares and sunspots are almost constant. Between 1645 and 1715 there was almost a complete absence of sunspots and solar activity. This period, now known as the Maunder minimum, was named after (yes I'm going to name drop) my great grandfather, E W Maunder, who was an astronomer at the Royal Observatory at Greenwich, and was famous for his research into the eleven year solar cycle.

Now for the Moon, New moon occurs on Sunday April 6th, and Full Moon on Sunday April 20th.

Again it is not the best month to view both Mercury and Venus, as Mercury is at superior conjunction (behind the Sun), and Venus rises only a few minutes before sunrise.

Mars is well up in the south-western sky at dusk and sets in the northwest in the early hours. It moves across the constellation of Gemini, and is a little brighter than the twin stars Castor and Pollux, and shines with a steadier light and a distinctly orange colour.

Jupiter rises in the southeast about three hours before sunrise, and is not easy to observe as it remains near the horizon.

Saturn is high in the southern sky at dusk, and sets shortly before sunrise. It is in the constellation of Leo, moving slowly north-westwards; close to the bright star Regulus. Through a telescope, Saturn's rings can clearly be seen, together with many of its moon, the largest of which is Titan.

According to astronomers from the Applied Physics in Maryland, alien life may exist on Titan. By analysing spacecraft radar observations, the team has identified an ocean beneath the moon's surface where life may be able to develop.

Finally, there is yet another meteor shower this month, known as the Lyrid meteor shower. This is active during the third week in April, and will peak in the early hours of Tuesday 22nd April. The meteors will appear to radiate from a point in the constellation of Lyra, close to the bright star, Vega.
