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Letter from the Vicarage

Hello,

Global celebrations for June include World Bicycle Day on the 2nd and the 3rd is World Running Day. If that sounds a bit too energetic a start to the month how can we forget that 9th June is World Sauntering Day! The longest 'day' on the 21st can be celebrated as Go Skateboarding Day and it's also World Music Day so plug in your ears and get on your board. (oh come on, you know you've always wanted to try it!)

June offers us the longest days and the occupations for June in Books of Hours make the most of them. The occupations were haying, also called mowing, and sheep shearing – and in cooler climates like ours here in England, additionally as 'weeding'. We'll get on to weeding in a minute but pictures in the books show peasants wielding scythes used to mow, ideally on sunny mornings, and then rakes to turn and dry and then pyramidal piles of the mown and dried grass being erected in fields. All laboriously undertaken to serve future needs for animal fodder and bedding, as well as in some areas for fuel and some forms of it for thatching.

We don't see sheep shearing as these days it goes on in an 'industrial' context. However England the activity was central to the medieval and dark ages economy as wool was the major export and money earner and held up both the local and the national economy. It is emblematic that it was to the wool merchants that English kings turned to to finance their wars. So for hundreds of years sheep shearing was as essential to the well-being of the nation as the olive crop to the Greeks or the grape harvest to the French.

How about weeding? For us weeding is a necessary chore but for the medieval farmer it carried a different and useful function. Many of the plants we might today describe as weeds and remove and discard from a garden were often secondary crops to the medieval peasant. Many 'weeds' were useful as food, for medicinal purposes or animal bedding or feed. So rather than uproot weeds, weed hooks were used to cut the top of the plant off, and leave the roots behind. These hooks were a pair of poles, one ended in a blade and the other ended in a fork. There are lots of illustrations of their construction and use in the art of the period.

So the activities of June were an investment for future seasons and activities and essential underpinnings for both the economic and cultural life and wellbeing of the nation and so to the prosperity of communities and individuals. And now? Well, 'make hay while the sun shines' which was a literal instruction hundreds of years ago has become an aphorism we all understand to mean to make the most of our opportunities. I would venture to suggest that this idea is particularly relevant to our relationships as well as our activities. Our wellbeing and health are as dependent on the relationships we make, hold and grow as they are our physical activities. The giving and receiving of love and friendship is not just central to who we are but also offers us an opportunity to be much bigger and fuller as a person than we would be without them.

Jesus said he came to give the fullest life possible. June is a month of sunshine and growth and we can use it (and every month) well to invest in growing our relationships with each other and with God as we grow our experience of that full life. And that time and effort with others and with God will prove the best investment of all.

Peter Madeley and Scilla Greenall from the Magistrates' Association used a 12 point quiz to answer all our questions. This highly effective approach provided us with a very interesting and informative talk. The Magistrates' Association members go out into the community (schools, clubs etc) and have materials provided for them in order to educate the public. Peter has served for 4 years, post retirement and Scilla has just retired after 17 years' service. We think we might know what magistrates do but there were some surprising insights. Just a few of their facts - there are currently no courts in Oxfordshire (the one in Oxford is out of use due to repairs); magistrates are unpaid volunteers (excepts for expenses); are DBS checked and vetted and usually between 18 and 74 years of age; three magistrates will sit together for 26 half days per year except if an urgent case is heard on a Saturday when they will stay until 6pm; sentencing can be a fine, probation or prison; 57% of magistrates are women (81% over 50). There were many more interesting facts, all so pleasantly related and questions followed.

We have enjoyed our well tutored bowling session, an equally well tutored craft afternoon, all taking home a watercolour painting and we had a well resourced produce table on the 5th May.

Elaine explained the resolutions and two will go forward to the NFWI AM. A new Spring walk is scheduled for the 22nd May.

Our 2nd June meeting will be the Ox-Files - Folklore and Ghost stories across the County from Mike White. There will be another produce stall plus a list for those wishing to go on the outing in August.

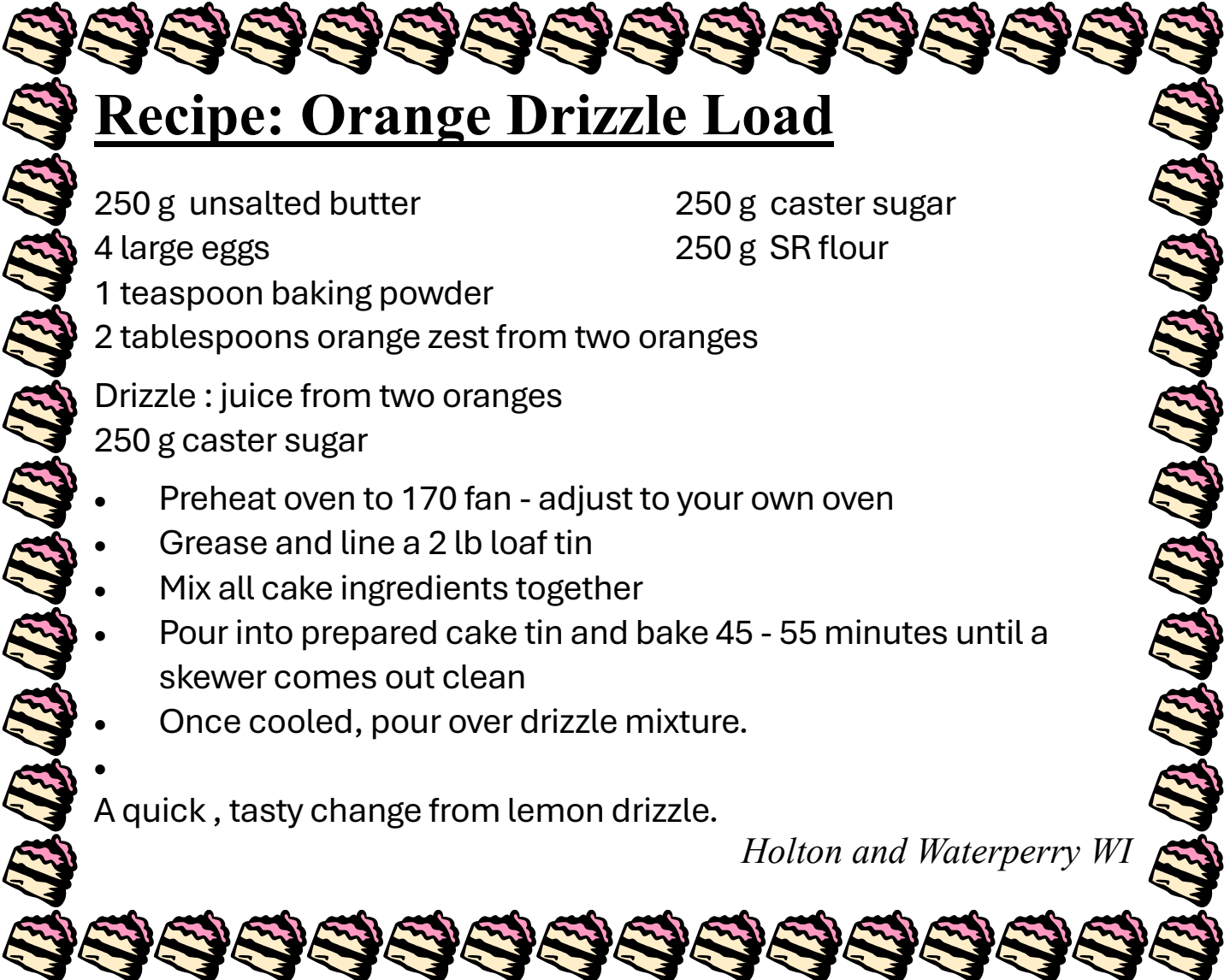

This year we have a number of urgent repairs including a broken fourteenth century window, blown lime plasterwork and carpentry required to our rotten medieval oak belfry posts. Parish Council Chairman's Annual Report 2026

In Parish Council terms, we are closing the year 2025-26 and embarking upon a new after the annual meetings, so it's a good time to recap on news, events and things arising in PC meetings.

Firstly, on purely procedural matters, we welcomed two 'new' people onto the team: not new at all as we all know them, but it's great to have their input to the council. Richard Marshall joined as a councillor in May to fill a casual vacancy that had arisen and Lawrence Wootten officially became pretty much a full-time parish clerk. After retiring from his army life Lawrence had far too much spare time on his hands so decided to build on his experience as our clerk and to expand his activities to take in two or three other villages as well. Waterperry alone would not keep him occupied! He has taken lots of financial and procedural training and is a huge asset to the PC and the village now in advising and ensuring we keep to the rules in our meetings and activities. He continues to edit and produce the parish magazine.

You may have noticed that the parish councillors all now have new 'official' email addresses with the ".gov.uk" suffix. This is following new council rules that reinforce that even small parish council like ours are proper parts of local government. Please use these email addresses if you want to bring anything to parish council attention.

You may have noticed a small increase in the parish precept element of your new council tax bills. Based on a Band D property this was an increase of approx. £2.93 per household, as the parish council budget for 2026/27 was agreed at just over £8000. This essentially covers our day to day expenses such as insurances and financial audits, mowing of the verge, the churchyard and the Rec, maintenance of the play equipment, clerk's salary, our contribution to the printing of the parish magazine and allowances for emergency work and contributions to village events. Don't forget that all parish council documents can be found on our website. We made a small grant donation to the local Citizens Advice Bureau who approached us for funding help. Any organization can do this but they have to demonstrate they meet certain criteria as, essentially, being potentially useful to the community.

We made a contribution to the cost of items purchased for the village Autumn Feast, which was a popular success as ever and have earmarked funds going forward for this year's event. The old phone box was stripped and repainted and with the newly painted post box (that has to be done by a Royal Mail 'engineer'!) these now make a striking feature again in the village landscape. I'm sure you've all noticed the smart new noticeboard that gives Lawrence space for all the statutory documents he has to publish plus any incidental posters. The old noticeboard is in the throes of being refurbished and repurposed as a bug hotel to be installed in the churchyard.

Around the village there were a few new initiatives that arose out of discussions at meetings. The new (old!) trough by the white gate was planted with largely native or insect-friendly plants, with enthusiastic help from a number of children and was watered and maintained by volunteers through the summer. Thanks again to Will for donating the trough and to Caroline and Dawn for instigating this and for maintaining it – it makes an attractive feature in keeping with the agricultural heritage of the village. We finally

managed to distribute roosting pouches and bug hotel prizes to all the children that came up with their ideas for sustainable nature projects. As this spring started there was a great combined effort by volunteers to tidy up throughout the village and as a result graves and monuments in the churchyard emerged from brambles and ivy, bags of litter were collected from along the footpaths to Waterstock and up Smith's Lane to the Common and the Millennium pear trees were cleared of a lot of ivy and sucker shoots that had overtaken their shape and growth. There was some work done in the Rec to remove a potentially dangerous broken limb from the willow and to clear some low-hanging branches.

Looking forward, we have already identified that the horse chestnuts on Green Ground are probably in need of some maintenance work and will be getting advice from the council's Tree Service on what surveys or work should be undertaken. The trees were bought by the parish council back in the 1970s and have preservation orders (TPOs) on them as an important natural feature of the village, so any work has to be approved and monitored by the council.

Ongoing issues raised to the parish council continue to focus largely on the volume and speed of traffic through the village and the state of the road and verges. We will publicising details of how you might want to volunteer as a 'Super User', trained by Highways to monitor road conditions and to fast-track the repair process by ordering the defect repairs directly with our contractor. Cans of multi-coloured spray paint provided! There is also a Speedwatch group newly set up and we will need volunteers to have a bit of training enabling them to conduct roadside speed surveys – you may already have seen small groups of hi-viz volunteers doing this in other villages.

As ever, as a parish council we act as far as we can on requests and information from residents in the village and throughout the parish, so please do come along to meetings to talk to us. We like to see you!

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Waterstock News

With Oxfordshire's "Secret Garden" no longer a secret, newcomers have been passing the Mill-- thankfully friendly and positive about the episode-- with the occasional stranger greeting us with "Hello Henry" or "Hello Sara". Soon after the programme was aired, a mysterious parcel arrived in the post which, on opening, contained a small wooden duck, with a label around its neck reading, "My name is Doris"--a surprise present from the Duck Company <https://www.druk.com>.

Connie Dyson adds her own duck news from Draycott: "Richard Ilbery kindly donated some duck eggs he found in his tractor to us, and we have been incubating them - they are now hatching! Two so far, two more on the way and six more of uncertain fertilisation". Alas, tragedy then struck when an invader, thought to be a weasel, finished them off. On a much more positive note, Connie reveals that "all our six sheep had twins! Plus, we have adopted 15 orphan lambs, so if anyone wants to come and feed some lambs, they are very welcome. One of the orphan lambs, christened Mango, has been sharing sleeping arrangements with the Dyson dogs in the kitchen. Connie adds, "and If anyone wants to get rid of any chickens, we are very happy to give them a good home in our new coop, otherwise we will get some rescue ones, which will also be exciting". It can surely only be a matter of time before Connie embarks on writing an updated version of "My Family and other Animals", Gerald Durrell's famous book, in which the author recounts his childhood home shared with pet dogs, tortoises, scorpions, owls, magpies, toads, and snakes.

Gill Spencer, Waterstock's Hedgehog Champion, reports that "the hedgehog that befriended Sarah Godowski, following her around the yard and attacking her feet, eventually found its way into Park Farm House garden where it was discovered wandering around the garden in broad daylight, following Mike everywhere. As this is very uncharacteristic behaviour, I took it into Tiggywinkles. As to date, it is still there undergoing observation and tests.. We hope nothing serious is wrong with it and I'll be following its progress over the next few weeks."

Edward de Rivera has goldfinches and greenfinches visiting daily, who seem on cordial terms with each other. They love his sunflower seeds but don't take to the great spotted woodpecker that is also a daily visitor. Although the bird food is quite expensive, Edward says it's worth it for the pleasure that it gives him.

Perhaps spurred on by Secret Garden—as Waterstock's Local Wildlife Site (LWS) was singled out for special mention in its Press Release-- SODC has made some funding available to improve habitats in South Oxfordshire's LWS's . The River Thame Conservation Trust (RTCT) is investigating how to claim these funds.

Leaving wildlife, Sarah Bell has exciting news that she is expecting to hold another July 4 celebration at Kimmeridge to follow on from her much-enjoyed event last year. She also reports that Ash and Henry, who attended last year's July 4th event, moved in with her in April and were married recently in Sussex. Sarah adds that both are wonderful creative woodworkers, focusing on local, sustainably harvested wood, and they build furniture. Ash specializes in carving, while Henry also does ceramics. She says they are really enjoying the village as a peaceful place after living on a houseboat in central London.

Waterperry Opera has made a plea for accommodation to house their singers, musicians and others during the opera festival. We have done this a couple of times and can thoroughly recommend it. Anyone who might consider this should please contact philip@waterperryoperafestival.co.uk.

Finally, after all the great work that recently went into cleaning up the interior of St Leonards, it was heartbreaking to see that more plaster has fallen from the ceiling in the chancel, depositing debris on the chancel floor. Discussions are now in progress on carrying out repairs.
