Pet's Corner!

What Is Canine Separation Anxiety Disorder?

This disorder is commonly seen in puppies, adolescents, rescue dogs and elderly dogs as part of ageing process, It is described as an inability to cope with being left alone, resulting in varying degrees of stress to the dog. This may be mild anxiety right through destruction of vocalisation, floors, doors, windows and walls in an attempt to reunite itself with its owner, and loss of control of the bladder and bowels and even self-mutilation in severe cases



Why does it occur?
Dogs are social animals, like us, and rely on their family for security, safety and companionship. If the dog is separated from us before it has learnt effective coping strategies for being alone, it can result in anxiety and even panic.

They attempt, through vocalising and trying to get out of the house, to reunite themselves with their family.



Other possible causes

Young puppies between 4-6 months of age, and again at about 9 months of age, need to relieve their aching gums by chewing suitable chew toys. Anxious dogs will also chew, but with teething puppies the anxiety is not present before the owner leaves the house, and the puppy is happy to have quiet periods alone, separated by a child gate or indoor crate, when the owner is present.

If your dog suddenly exhibits anxiety when alone, consider that it may be linked with an unusual and frightening event that may have happened when your dog was alone in a particular room (e.g. fireworks, boilers suddenly clicking on/off, illness etc.

Elderly dogs may gradually experience a decline in their sight and hearing, leaving them in a bit of a 'sensory void'. This can lead to anxiety and even panic when left alone, seeking out the owner's reassuring presence, particularly at night time.

Owner-absent behaviours!

If your dog is frequently reprimanded for 'misbehaving' when you are present, with little or no re-direction for the dog's natural behaviours (chewing, toileting, foraging, digging), then they can simply learn to save those behaviours for when you are not around!

Jenny Whittle - News from County Hall



As the newly appointed Cabinet Member for Specialist Children's Services, I was recently questioned by the budding young politicians who sit on Kent's **Primary School Children's Council. Platts Heath Primary School** was represented among the 70 Year Six (aged 10-11) children who spent the day in the County Council Chamber debating important issues including child abuse, as well as keeping young people safe on

the road and in the water. It was more nerve wracking being grilled by these pint sized politicians than those of my own age!

Kent County Council has just launched another 'Find and Fix' programme designed to repair a wide range of road surface defects on minor routes, such as rural and estate roads in the county. This follows a government announcement that Kent will receive a special grant of around £2.5 million to help repair the county's 5,000-mile road network in the wake of one of the coldest and most damaging Decembers on record. Early in the New Year Kent Highway Services brought in extra gangs to tackle the increase in potholes. This concentrated programme is aimed at fixing potholes and defects that might cause a hazard or safety issue for motorists and other road users. Additional specialist tarmac firms will be drafted in as part of this latest million pounds plus blitz to fix potholes. Please continue to report potholes to KCC's hotline (08458 247 800) or on the KCC website (www.kent.gov.uk) so that we can ensure that local roads in this parish are prioritised for treatment.

New signage will be installed on the top of Liverton Hill in the coming weeks to improve safety for motorists and pedestrians. I would like to thank Parish Clerk Pat Anderson for her constant lobbying on behalf of residents to get this done - we have done a double act but most of the credit must go to Pat!

The Grafty Gourmet

I had some left over Feta cheese at home and thought I would try it with chicken. It worked wonderfully. This is yet another very simple recipe, with a slight Greek influence. Its great served with rice, pasta or just a simple cucumber and tomato salad.

Chicken Stuffed with Feta Cheese & Bacon - Serves 2

8 tablespoons olive oil 2 teaspoons lemon juice 4 cloves crushed garlic 1 tablespoon dried oregano salt and pepper to taste 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts 4 slices feta cheese 4 slices bacon, fried and drained (or grilled)

- 1. Preheat oven 175 degrees C.
- 2. In a small bowl combine the oil, lemon juice, garlic, oregano, salt and pepper. Mix together.
- 3. Cut a slit in each chicken breast, place chicken in a baking dish and pour oil mixture over chicken.
- 4. Stuff each chicken breast with 1 slice feta cheese and 1 slice bacon. Secure open sides with toothpicks.
- 5. Bake uncovered at 175 degrees C for 30 to 35 minutes.

Top 10 keyboard shortcuts you should know!

Are you spending too much time moving your cursor, pointing and clicking just to accomplish simple tasks on your PC? Did you know that you can use your keyboard to work more efficiently?

Below is a list of 10 keyboard shortcuts that will help you increase your productivity by eliminating the need to reach for the mouse.



Copy text after it has been highlighted
Paste text that has been copied
Undo any change that has been done
Brings up the Start Menu
Turns all capitalized text into lowercase
Delete an item immediately without placing it in the Recycle Bin
Brings up a Window with a list of icons representing programs which are currently running on the computer. While holding the ALT key, press and depress the TAB button to cycle between each icon task
Switch to the next task running on the computer. Hold down the ALT before pressing and depressing the ESC key to cycle to the next task
Brings up Task Manager and allows you to end a process (terminate a program) if has crashed or has stopped responding. Select the process which has stopped responding, and then press "END PROCESS".
Paste any text that is in your clipboard. The cursor must also be placed in an area that will accept keyboard input for this to work



Don't forget F1 - the Help key F1 which will take you to the Help function of any application you are running

The April Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Pisces at beginning of April, and moves into Aries on the 19th.

New Moon occurs on Sunday 3rd April, and **Full Moon** is on Monday 18th April, in the constellation of Virgo.

Mercury is at inferior conjunction (almost directly in front of the Sun) on 9th April, so it is unlikely we will be able to see this elusive planet this month.

Venus is again a brilliant "Morning Star" this month, low in the eastern sky just before sunrise, but it is getting increasingly difficult to see. By the end of the month we will not be able to observe it.

Mars rises only a few minutes before the Sun, so again we will not be able to see the "Red Planet" this month.

Jupiter is at superior conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun) on 6th April. So the giant planet will also be invisible this month.

Saturn is in opposition to the Sun on 4th April, and therefore, rises as the Sun sets. It is moving very slowly north-westwards in the constellation of Virgo. It should be possible to see the famous rings through a telescope.

This month is the turn of the **Lyrid** meteor-shower, which will probably peak around midnight on 22nd April. The meteors will appear to radiate from a point in the constellation of Lyra, close to the bright star Vega.

You may have read recently that scientist at the Arizona State University are suggesting that meteorites, that bombarded the Earth four billion years ago, could have kick-started life rather than wiping it out. They have taken fragments from a meteorite in the Antarctic, and have found that, under primordial conditions, they emitted ammonia, an essential compound in the production of amino acids, the so-called building blocks of life.



Christian Message April 2011

Christians across the world are celebrating the season of Lent: six weeks that began on Ash Wednesday which help us prepare for Easter. Some of you will have taken up the Lenten challenge to try and live life differently. Others may be wondering what it is all about: doesn't it sound rather gloomy and negative? What's the big deal about 'giving up' things, especially if they're not particularly bad anyway? Has what some people been doing got more to do with improving our physical wellbeing than with growing as a Christian – like drinking or smoking less?

Anyone can make Lent something superficial, of course. But it's really about 'refocusing' our lives on what matters, living our everyday lives in ways that are more open to God. From time to time, most of us feel a need to clear out clutter from our homes or our lives, or to sharpen up by dieting or taking up exercise. We need this in our spiritual lives as well, and Lent is the time for it.

Jesus taught his followers three particular ways to do this: fasting, prayer, and almsgiving (if you have a bible, look at what he says in St Matthew's Gospel, chapter 6, 1-18).

Fasting is the one we instinctively associate with Lent. Why fast? Not to feel miserable if we go without, but to discover deeper gratitude for all the good we so easily receive at God's hands. When we miss something, we often appreciate it all the more.

Prayer is central. When we give more time to prayer, we become attentive to God and gain a fresh perspective —we are not the 'be all and end all', our lives are a gift from God, we are actually made for Christ and for his love.

And 'almsgiving'? It's about seeing others' needs and being ready to share when we have so much, often more than we need. When we have been praying and fasting, this can become clearer – our fasting may provide the wherewithal to respond more generously to the needs of others; we may discover a deeper sense of how God loves us and a desire to share this with others.

How does Lent prepare for those Easter feasts which we celebrate shortly? On Good Friday Christians will be celebrating Jesus' crucifixion and, on Easter Sunday, his resurrection from the dead. On the cross Jesus died showing a love that was totally for others, totally for us. In his risen life, Jesus calls us to a life richer than anything this world alone can give.

'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you' (John 15: 12-14). That's Jesus' vision of what life is ultimately about; and our Lenten prayer, fasting and almsgiving may free us up to see this. There's still time to make a start.

The Christian churches in our area will celebrate that love this Easter. Why not come and join us?

And when the Saints.....

Some months ago a headline in the Ulcombe parish magazine caught my eye. 'Ulcombe's First Saint,' I read. I was puzzled. 'First', I thought? ' But I know many saints in Ulcombe.'

Even among mature Christians there is still a tendency to reserve the word 'saint' for the big names, the famous and glitzy believers seen in stained glass windows. But, I insist, I do know many saints in Ulcombe. How can I be so sure? My authority is the Bible.

This year the 400th anniversary of the Authorised (King James) version is being celebrated. Those who revere and choose to read this much loved translation discover that 62 times Christ's followers are called 'saints' and the same word is used in more recent translations.

Jesus has many followers in different denominations in the Len Valley villages. All for whom Jesus is the Lord of their lives are saints.

This truth should not cause Christians to sit back and relax. The famous glitzy stained glass window saints were not complacent. They were men and women who, in modern parlance, 'walked the talk' to the end of their lives looking forward to the greeting, 'Well done! Good and faithful servant.' In hostile situations and in great danger they were faithful to their Lord.

The challenge to modern saints living in a society apathetic to Christianity and often hostile to it is to 'walk the talk.' We need to be motivated to live holy lives, to be faithful to Christ through thick and thin just as his first disciples were.

It seems a formidable task but help is available in the form of an exciting challenge from the Bishop of Dover, Trevor Wilmott. He has launched a course entitled 24/7 CONFIDENT DISCIPLESHIP. It is designed to equip modern saints to be more effective for Jesus by witnessing to him in words and work wherever we live.

So...saints in Ulcombe and the other villages are already attending this course and learning from it. They may not end up in a stained glass window (no idle promises here) but they will become more confident disciples of Jesus Christ.


