SUMMARY FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS HELD ON WEDNESDAY 10th MAY 2023

Below is a summary of some of the topics and discussions which took place at the Parish Council meeting held in May, including the Annual Meeting of the Council

Annual Meeting of the Council

Being the first meeting since the May elections Members of the newly formed Parish Council each duly signed the Declaration of Acceptance Office as a Parish Councillor in the presence of the Clerk and those present.

Cllr Francois van der Merwe was duly elected as Chairman for the year. The election of a Vice Chairman was deferred to future meeting.

Cllr Edward Horwell was welcomed to his first meeting as a parish councillor following the elections.

Councillor Responsibilities agreed as follows:

Cllr Wakeling - Play area and planning

Cllr Harrison – Recreation ground and open green spaces

Cllr Horwell - Communications

Cllr Denby – Liaison with Village hall, village shop, Orchard Nursery, Little Milton School, St James' Church

Cllr Sheppard - Utilities / highways

Parish Council Meeting

Matters Arising

It was agreed that the Clerk contact local parishes who have recently installed Speed Indicator Device Signs (SIDs). Cllr Sheppard will contact Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) Highways for advice on purchasing and installing SIDs.

Discussion took place on the Council's priorities over the next four years. It was agreed to continue to focus on HGV traffic through the village and the refurbishment of the MUGA. This is not an exhaustive list and councillors were encouraged to give thought to further projects.

Planning

P23/S0554/LB – Spring & We<u>ll Cottage, Haseley Road, Little Milton, OX44 7PP</u> Installation of full fibre by BT

Resolved to Fully Support the application.

Land at Warren Farm Barn

The owner of the above land has submitted a Highways Declaration (Ref: 2068) which prevents unrecorded public rights of way from being legally recorded based on presumed dedication in the future. Cllr Wakeling had contacted the Ramblers Association and circulated their response. All agreed a phased approach as follows:

- Identify pieces of the footpath that are missing from the Definitive Map.
- Gather evidence the paths have been used for over 30 years. Declarations from users (item in newsletter, personal contact, social media)
- Cllr Horwell to contact Lucy Ireland, local Footpath Warden.

Village AEDs

The Signage Assessment Report for the village AEDs was noted. The survey and report have been undertaken in response to South Central Ambulance Service's 2022 report.

Thanks was expressed to the volunteers who regularly check the village and manage the servicing of the village AEDs.

Resolved to approve the recommendations within the report.

Reports from Councillor Representatives

Recreation Ground / Open Green Spaces

Verges within the 20mph limit are due to be cut at the end of May. Two bags of stone chippings have been spread along the edge of the Gold Street slip road to minimise muddy conditions. This action was approved by OCC Highways.

Planters have been replanted with new plants by Carol Turner who has offered to maintain the planters on behalf of the Council. A new single slab has been placed inside the pedestrian gateway to the recreation ground. Further slabs have been placed in front of the gate to the play area.

The owner of the pathway alongside the church has given permission for the Council to lay bark chippings along the pathway. **Resolved** to purchase a tonne bag of bark chippings.

<u>Utilities and Highways</u>

Orders for pothole repairs have been raised on Fix My Street but OCC has a backlog of work.

Playground

Following a report of bees nesting, the play area has been checked but no evidence found. It is proposed to replace the small bin in the MUGA, which fills up quickly and is not easy to empty, with one of the blue bins originally located at the entrance of the play area.

Next Meeting

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on **Wednesday 14th June 2023**, in Pine Lodge, commencing at 7.30pm. This meeting has been delayed due to the election on 4th May and the necessary notice period required by Statute

The minimum charge is £4 for up to 3 items and £9 for each additional item. There is a maximum of six items per collection day: if you have more than six, you'll need to

book another collection day. Please note that a bed and mattress counts as 2 items and a three piece suite (consisting of 1 settee and 2 chairs) counts as 3 items.

Before you contact us to book your bulky waste collection, have a good think about whether you have any other big items to dispose of. Once we have processed your booking, we are unable to make any alterations or add any other items – even if you have only booked one or two items.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

Councillor priority fund: Applications to the councillor priority fund have reopened. The application process has slightly changed, requiring an online application and an email/letter of support of the councillor. Eligible organisations include, registered charities, not for profit companies, community or voluntary groups, and parish councils/meetings. Grants cannot be made to individuals, profit making organisations and private limited companies. Projects seeking funding must be deliverable by March 2025.

Electric Vehicle Chargers: OCC is set to receive £3.6 million to rollout EV charging points across the county. The priority will be to provide charging points in rural areas and where off-street home charging is not possible. Community organisations (e.g., parishes, village halls) may be able to take ownership of the charging points to provide them as a community asset and deliver a revenue stream. Further details will follow.

Air Quality Strategy: An OCC air quality strategy (long term) and 'route map' (short term) has been developed. While monitoring of air quality is a district responsibility, the Environment Act 2021 places a responsibility on the County Council to support districts and reduce air pollution. An information campaign will follow, which will include information on indoor pollution and log burning fires.

Social care: OCC runs a 'shared lives' carer scheme whereby approved Oxfordshire residents, with space in their own home, care for a person with learning difficulties, mental health problems or other needs that make independent living difficult. Carers can offer to provide one-off respite care, or longer-term care and everything in between. The scheme has been running successfully since 2020. More information for anyone interested can be found here. A scheme to match older residents with a spare room with younger people looking for alternative accommodation called Homeshare also runs as

a way to provide older people with additional support / company. Both schemes are examples of the 'Oxfordshire Way' to allow people to live independently in their communities.

Verge cutting and 'no mow May': Oxfordshire County Council is again supporting 'no mow May' and encouraging participation. Due to the amount of verge cutting required, OCC has an updated maintenance schedule to prioritise biodiversity. However, OCC is not able to put away its mowers for a full month and still meet its schedule of work, meaning some areas will be cut in May. Verges that need to be cut to maintain public safety will be cut back multiple times if necessary.

Household waste strategy: Consultation closed on HWRC strategy 2023-2043. The strategy replaces the 2015 Conservative HWRC strategy which aimed to close local sites and deliver 3 or 4 super sites. The new strategy aims to retain the current 7 sites. The strategy encourages re-use and repair, rather than disposal in the first instance.

Hydrogen powered fire engines: Oxfordshire is taking part in a pioneering project to develop hydrogen powered fire engines

Sustainable Warmth Grants: Funding for residents without mains gas, and household incomes of less than £30,000 (or in receipt of means-tested benefits) is still available.

Grants for care workers: Cost of living grants remain available for care workers.

RECTOR'S PINT

I have mentioned the theme of 'ordinary' time before, in 2018 and then very briefly only two years ago, but I believe it's worth revisiting.

The Church's major festivals are not spread regularly throughout the year, but in a way that's a good thing. Following Christmas, there is a gallop through Epiphany to Lent, and then on to Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter, the heartland of the Christian year. Then follow Ascension and Pentecost, but after that we enter 'Ordinary time' in the Church's year, the two parts of the year that fall outside the great seasons of Advent and Lent. The second period of Ordinary time begins after Pentecost (this year on 28 May) and ends with the first Sunday of Advent, so it is by far the longest season of the Christian year.

Of course, plenty of things do happen during this time. We are entering the wedding season, and we have quite a few in the Benefice this year. In June there will be two church and village fetes, one in Great Milton, on the 10th of June, and the other in Little Milton on the 17th of June.

The inter-village tug of war on 24th June, and this year it's in Little Milton. It's always a lively event, and the prize is hotly contested! The Open Gardens Day in Great Haseley was hugely popular last year, and will return on the 25th of July. Sadly, I will miss both of these as I had already booked my summer break before the dates were decided. In the autumn, we will celebrate our Harvest Festivals and Remembrance Sunday, and although these are not 'official' festivals of the Church they are much loved features of the calendar for many of us.

Whilst the great Festivals are a tremendous focus, for a minister like me, Ordinary time is a bit of a relief! There is plenty to do of course, but there is a break from the big 'extras' alongside the day-to-day responsibilities. As I have reflected before, although the word 'ordinary' actually stems from the Latin *ordinalis*, from which we get the word 'order', 'ordinary' can also be understood as 'everyday,' those times when nothing big or significant happens. Although the big festivals which fill our churches are really uplifting, it is perhaps in this 'ordinary' or day-to-day life when we see God most at work in our lives. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops puts it in rather more colourful terms: 'Ordinary time is a time of growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are caught up in Christ'.

Either way, it is, in fact, an important season, albeit more a paced spiritual marathon, rather than a hasty sprint!

I wish you God's blessing, however 'ordinary' that might seem.

June sees the emergence of more butterflies so keep an eye out when walking around the reserve. Last month I recorded a Painted Lady butterfly on the bridle path. These butterflies can be a good climate change indicator species.

The grass is growing really fast so there will be places that will be a bit overgrown so mind how you go in these areas. Look out for the hares. There are quite a few leverets about although the crops will be hiding them well so you may just see the tips of the ears poking through.

Last month the sheep were shorn and without their heavy wool they will be much happier in the hot weather. Please keep your dogs on a lead through the fields with sheep in.

I have not planned a work party in June yet due to the fete and surveying priorities. Keep an eye out for the work party signs for the next date.

VIEW FROM VIEWS

What a wonderful time of year this is everything bursting to life, as I write the "May" some 2 weeks late is a picture in full bloom as, is the case for most flowering trees bushes etc. and, with the dawn chorus such a wonderful way to wake up, the birds all busy doing their thing Swallows swooping around after insects with, the incessant sounds of larks arising, plus the snatches of fragrant scents as you walk or drive past certain plants that are in flower, makes you feel the world is at last waking up.

Here we go again me moaning about the weather after rain over the coronation weekend believe it or not, we have floods again, interestingly though in spite of having 15mm rain on coronation day it was not until we had 12mm 2 days later that the river burst its banks. Now the river meadows will once again be of no use. I think although the wet at the start of May is extremely tiresome, I do not believe it will do any harm just, as long as it does not continue until early June. Due to this extra wet in early May and, the cold spring, it is amazing now to see the resultant growth, it makes me think this is not so bad after all, as hopefully it will be helping things catch up.

We decided to plant our Lupins a little earlier this year into an excellent seed bed, this allowed them to come though the ground within a fortnight and, at the time of writing look quite promising, somewhat different to last year. The conditions were almost perfect as it has been for most other crops which seem to have recovered from the conditions they had to put up with through the winter. This is with the exception of the damage inflicted by pigeons where there is no plant at all, I think about 2/3 of the area is going to be as good as any other year, with the rest being about ½ a crop with about 1/3 of that producing next to nothing. In future we will have to plan to plant the most affected area of rape with an alternative that the pigeons don't like and see what happens. The prospects for next year's harvest look promising, I will not predict any further than that, it is after all early, next month's weather will be critical but, with the winter barley now in ear the current "sweet refreshing rain will help fill the grain", on the other hand if we have continual rain and some wind many crops will be beaten to the ground and unsalvageable then that's the farming gamble!

Times are difficult not just the general market but to get things done, our telescopic loader (jack of all trades on farms these days with the lack of affordable labour) has been out of action for some 8 weeks weighting for engineers to diagnose the problem and, then to get the spare part. As this is a machine we rely on for the myriad of little daily tasks that just have not been done, not to mention sometimes important ones like feeding of livestock on a daily basis, it is a vital part of everyday the tasks that we rely on. This is most frustrating as no one seems able or prepared to help with a diagnosis or to speed up delivery of vital parts, as I write I understand it is now running and we can have it back. I mention this as it seems that no one seems to care about anything important any more, plus it is impossible to get hold of anyone to talk to.

I feel I must pay tribute to our recently retired local councillor Caroline Newton to me she has been everything we would want from our local representative, always there to support us in any appropriate way an excellent councillor who will be missed by us all. Whilst on the subject I wish somehow, we could be informed before an election who was standing, as I had not a clue until I saw the names on the ballot paper, there must, another time be a mechanism by which we are informed, local paper or even the council.

I recently read that, the Herefordshire farmer who dredged the river Lugg, I would not condone this action but, it does illustrate the frustration we can sometimes feel when it

appears no one is listening to us. As a result of this and the support from the local population he acted, now he has to pay the consequences, jailed for 12 Months and ordered to pay £600,000. (I thought the case had been forgotten) I too am feed up with the flooding we have to put up with, caused mainly I believe by all the development that is going on in our area without, the precautions that the developer, I thought had to take. It seems the authorities are either powerless or just useless, so nothing happens, which makes the River systems, more like drainage ditches than, natural water courses. Then if this is the case would need periodic maintenance, destroying all the good works that the Rivers Trusts and, we farmers, are trying to do, to conserve nature. This though pails into insignificance while water authorities are allowed release sewage into the rivers as they do! Please someone get a grip.

Over here in Henley we've had a heavy spate of thefts of vehicles with keyless entry. The Henley Neighbourhood Team asked me if I could message our local residents but I hope this will be of use to many across the South and Vale area so I'm spreading the message wider.

"Thames Valley Police is aware and incredibly concerned about the rise in thefts of vehicles in the Henley area recently. We have seen a number of vehicles that have 'stop/start' button ignitions stolen, whereby offenders have been able to relay the key signal from inside the house using a specially-made device. Because of this method offenders are often able to make their escape without disturbing owners.

The rise in this type of crime is something many forces nationwide are seeing, and something TVP is taking very seriously. We have coordinated a multi-disciplinary approach to tackling these offenders, and residents can expect to see a rise in police presence around Henley, especially in the early hours when these offences are typically taking place. Rest assured we are doing everything we can to prevent this type of crime, and to catch offenders responsible.

If residents own a vehicle that can be started without physically inserting a key into the ignition, there are a few things we can advise to help prevent this type of theft happening to you. Firstly keep keys as far from the car as is practicable, to help reduce the chance of the signal being relayed. Secondly 'Faraday' pouches or boxes are specifically designed to block the key signal. Keeping your keys in one of these will reduce the risk of the signal being relayed to start the ignition. More robust defences can also be applied, for example a steering lock or a bollard on a driveway will reduce the chances of offenders being able to drive the vehicle away, should they gain access.

WELLS FARM ALLOTMENTS

It looks like SSEN are planning to cut back some of the trees that the power lines pass through at some point if not soon then in the Autumn. They will need to take the lines down to do the work and this will mean a planned power cut. I understand they send letters out at least 10 days in advance of such work. This should mean the willow that has caused so much trouble will be sorted out finally.

The pump still needs priming so leave a can of water in the shed for the next person. It is primed by having the handle fully down, pouring water into the top until it gushes out of the spout then swiftly pulling the handle up and down a couple of times to get the water flowing.

Please keep the grass around your allotment nicely mowed and remove the brambles before they really get growing. You can put squashes, outdoor tomatoes and more beans in the ground now, but water well once a week to keep rather than every day to encourage them to get their roots down.

REFLECTION ON VILLAGE CELEBRATION FOR THE CORONATION



May 2023

This month with the local elections we have seen people come and people go as councillors. Firstly my thanks to all those who have worked as local councillors, at parish and district in the last four years or more. Having been a councillor myself I know very well the work that is involved and that sometimes it can be a thankless task. You can never please everyone and there are always more people ready to complain than to compliment. Welcome too to new councillors. I look forward to working with you in the future.

Turnout figures for local elections are generally low. I think this may be that they do not appreciate the work that is done at a local level. Issues are often raised with me that I have to defer to local councils as the councils are fully autonomous and responsible for their own decisions. So perhaps it is timely to remind people what the different councils do and how elected representatives can help on the relevant issues.

Let me start with the most local level of democracy, the parish council. This the elected body closest to the community. Probably the most common topics that parish councils get involved with are planning matters and working for better services and facilities for the community. As a formal body parish councils have the ability to influence other organisations that make decisions affecting the community such as the district and county councils, health authorities, police. As such parish councils have an important role in local democracy and can be a great resource to support a thriving community. Some smaller communities do not have a parish council but instead have a parish meeting. These have fewer powers and are not required to meet as frequently as a parish council. However they are still formal bodies with a representative role for the community and can often help with relevant issues in the same way that a parish council can.

The next tier of local government in this area is the district council. The constituency is served by two district councils, Cherwell District Council and South Oxfordshire District Council. They are responsible for local services, including planning, housing

and associated benefits, rubbish collection. environmental services, leisure services, some car parks and council tax collection.

Finally we have the County Council. This is a much larger council which is responsible for services across the whole of a county including education, social services, transport, roads (except trunk roads and motorways), public rights of way, libraries, the fire service, culture, trading standards, bus subsidies, minerals, waste and recycling (disposal) and the environment.

Each of these council has elected representatives who take decisions on the relevant issues and are there to help residents in the areas of their responsibility. These people should be the first port of call to raise concerns with as they have direct access to information and, in the case of the larger councils, the officers employed to assist. From my own experience as a local councillor, and working alongside many other councillors, I know that most people who put themselves forward for these roles do it because they want to help and support their community. I would therefore encourage residents to take an interest in what they do and seek their support if necessary. Just as I can sometimes help with issues relating to central government departments, so local councillors can help with issues relating to their councils' areas of responsibility.
