

Dinga Rings Out on a High Note

Moulsford's postie Brian 'Dinga' Bell got the surprise of his life when he dropped in to the village's coffee morning in October. Not suspecting a thing, he walked into a pavilion packed with well-wishers who had assembled to bid him a happy retirement.



On the Moulsford post walk for the last five years, Brian was clearly moved by the experience as he was presented by host Gail Slinger with retirement presents and a cash gift donated by grateful residents.

A postie for 20 years Brian was previously an engineer, working first at British Aerospace and then for the Williams Grand Prix team. Moving into the Royal Mail delivery role, he remembers it fondly when it was a public service before various changes led it to becoming the business it is today.



With no firm plans yet for retirement except for 'not going in to work any more' his postal career includes one incident he'd probably rather forget: "I was carrying gold in two special delivery packages and was robbed in the High Street in Wallingford," he admits.

A happier memory came during his last day in the job: he was given flowers to deliver to a 'Usain Bolt' apparently living in Glebe Close, Moulsford. A prank perhaps?

Known for his generosity to the four-legged friends on his route, no doubt sparing him a few nips and snarls on the way, he did once consider buying shares in Pedigree Petfoods. But he was equally well known to all the people to whom he delivered post.

"The one thing I will miss is seeing all my friends on a regular basis. I really do mean that," he says.

The last few weeks saw your Parish Council involved in several highways matters.

Firstly was securing a County Council refresh of the white lines, road safety markers (aka dragons' teeth) and road surface 30mph markings throughout the village.

We've also been working with Cranford House school in a bid to ease access for residents of Willow Court Lane.

Those who may be leaving or arriving home during the busiest times of the school day, when pupils are dropped off and collected, have been experiencing difficulties. The school is keen to cooperate and measures are underway.



Also under the heading of highways, we recently met with the Oxfordshire highways traffic and road safety technical officer on site in Ferry Lane.

Parking around and near to the junction at the bottom of the road has sometimes created some access problems for residents.

The recommendation was to paint a single white line around the south eastern corner of the junction, as far as the point where the Ferry Lane extension meets the principal road (see the diagram).

The hope is that this will serve to keep clear several drop-kerb entrances to properties as well as making access easier for larger vehicles.

We have written directly to all residents of Ferry Lane to advise of our plans and have already received some encouraging early feedback.

Plans for the refresh of the recreation ground continue. Please see the separate article from Cllr Jo Baker.

Closer to home the Parish Council itself is currently down one member following the resignation of Cllr Bernadette Sachse.

Bernie's particular brand of tireless energy will be missed but we hope to co-opt a fifth member soon.

Woodland Work and Tree Planting Events at the Recreation Ground, 6th & 13th November

Any day now, over 100 trees will be arriving in the village courtesy of the Woodland Trust, ready to be settled in as hopefully very long-term residents of our Recreation Ground. We will be working with Peter Greathead of PWG Tree Surgery to make sure our trees get the best possible start in their new home. If you'd like to come along to our family-friendly events and help with the planting or some other woody jobs, while having fun and finding out more about our trees and village wildlife to boot, here's how you can do it:

Dead Wood Work Day, Saturday 6th November, Recreation Ground from 10am

Dead wood is nearly as important as live trees in a woodland! Come and join the team to help prepare the Rec's woody boundaries for the new trees. We will be making dead wood piles and hedges to benefit wildlife, including the threatened Stag Beetle and also our much loved Hedgehogs. We will also be clearing back some ivy and starting the creation of a forest play area. You will need sturdy footwear and gloves.

Tree Planting Day, Saturday 13th November, Recreation Ground from 10am

Join the team to plant our new trees in the woodland areas. You will be able to find out how best to plant a tree; making sure it's not too shallow, not too deep, but just right. Refreshments will be available from the Pavilion after 11am thanks to our hardworking Events Committee, to make sure our tree-mendous volunteers are well looked after. For this event, you will need sturdy footwear and gloves and if you can bring your own spade (border size fine), that would be very helpful.

My dear friends,

The 2021 United Nations Climate Change Conference, otherwise known as COP26 will be taking place in Glasgow from Sunday, 31st October until Friday, 12th November. It is the 26th annual conference of those parties which signed up to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change in 1994. It is considered to be an absolutely crucial conference, providing a last chance for Governments to take the radical action that is needed to preserve our beautiful planet. It seems that almost every month there is another extreme weather event – floods, or storm or drought or forest fires due a prolonged spell of exceptionally hot weather.

Jesus famously told the story of the wise builder and the foolish builder. Both had heard the same message, which no doubt included dire warnings about building on the sand; both probably appeared to agree that what was being said made a lot of sense. However, when it came down to it, whilst the wise man took the harder, more costly option of building his house on the rock, the foolish man could not resist the temptation to go for the quick, cheap and easy option of building on the sand. For a while, it didn't seem to make any difference, both houses looked very similar – until the storms came. And then whilst the house on the rock stood firm, the house built on sand was washed away by the floods.

Jesus told this story about those who responded differently to hearing the message of God. We might think that Jesus didn't give any specific message about climate change or conservation of nature - after all, they were not burning issues 2000 years ago. However, He did say that the second most important principle by which to live our lives was to love our neighbours as ourselves. If "my neighbour" is anyone who is affected by my actions, these days we are increasingly aware that our actions and consuming lifestyles have a global impact - whether it is the plastics we use ending up in the ocean or forests being cut down to provide us with beef or palm-oil, or the fuel we burn adding to the dangerous levels of CO2. We are also becoming aware that our levels of consumption not only have such a destructive effect on nature but that in turn affects the climate (for instance the huge reduction in the world's forests). We are also called to take particular care of the most vulnerable; and whenever there is flood, storm or drought it is always the poorest and most vulnerable who suffer the most.

If you are wondering what Jesus said was the *most* important principle by which to live our lives, it is:

to love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength. And if we truly love someone, we will take care of those things that are most precious to them. So loving God means taking care of our fellow human beings but also of the beautiful planet created by God for us and entrusted to our care.

Whilst we might acknowledge that it is vital that we take personal stock of our carbon footprints and personal lifestyles, we might also think that as individuals we can have very little impact on the world around us and that it is only governments that can take the big decisions that need to be made in order to preserve our planet. That is of course true, but at least in this country, governments need the support of the people and that includes you and me. And so, the more concerned we are as individuals about the issues of global warming and conservation of our planet, the more trouble that we take to understand the issues, the more likely we are to call to account those who represent us in government and the more likely they are to heed our voice.

So, when you find the news filled with the issues raised by COP26, don't switch off, but be spurred on to think about what changes you can make and what actions you can take to preserve our beautiful planet for our children, grandchildren and future generations.

Gardening diary:

Hello everyone! As it is becoming more wintery, we turn our attention to getting things ready for our next year of gardening. Me and my dad recently went to a nearby horse field where the nice lady who lives there let us take some manure. We shovelled it into old compost bags and took it back home. Now the manure is spread on the beds and we will leave it there for the rest of the winter, and we do this because then it decomposes in all of the rain, frost and (hopefully) snow. Manure is a good source of nutrients and it improves soil fertility.

A few weeks ago, I planted some Salad Leaves, Spinach and Pak Choi in a bed in the greenhouse. They have all started germinating nicely- the salad in particular. See photo here.



We also got a small bird feeder from the garden centre but unfortunately we can only put peanuts in it because of the size of the holes. Although many birds like peanuts, me and my dad are going to build a wooden bird table where we can put many other seed sizes for other birds that don't eat peanuts. Gardening tip

Don't just throw away your pumpkin once you've used it as a jack o'lantern on Halloween! You can cut it into small pieces and add it to the soil in your garden. It will decompose over the winter and add nutrients to your garden soil, which will help next year's plants grow faster and stronger. Or you can make a bird feeder by simply filling up your pumpkin with bird seeds and hanging it up with twine; the eyes, mouth and nose of your jack o'lantern will make lots of places for the birds to eat the seeds out of, although you may want to make a few extra holes so that more birds can eat out of it.

Philately (stamp collecting) is fun if you do it with other collectors and will certainly increase your knowledge of all kinds of things such as Art, history, geography, design etc.


If you collect on a theme or postcards your interest in the subject will widen considerably, as you research into it, to write up your collection.

Remember... Fireworks safety on November 5th

- * Only buy CE marked fireworks from reputable and licensed shops.
- * Keep fireworks in a closed, metal box.
- * Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- * Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- * Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.
- * Never return to a firework that has not gone off, and never throw used or unused fireworks onto a bonfire.
- * Never drink alcohol while lighting a bonfire or setting off fireworks.
- * Always supervise children and don't give sparklers to a child under five.
- * Keep your bonfire at least 18 metres away from houses, trees and hedges. There should be a barrier around the bonfire to keep spectators five metres away. Before lighting a bonfire, check it is stable and that there are no children or animals inside.
- * Only burn dry wood, never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire and think about the direction of smoke travel.
- * Keep some buckets of water nearby.
- * Have consideration for those around you, including notifying neighbours who may have pets or farm animals.
- * Consider where fireworks and debris might fall, ensuring safety distances are provided for people to keep safe. Safety distances are provided on each firework label or package
