30mph to 20mph sounding

Thank you to all residents who responded to the Parish Council's 30mph to 20mph survey and shared their views. At its December meeting, the Council considered the results of the survey and whether to progress the proposal to the next stage of a county-wide consultation. Although a majority of councillors support a 20mph limit, the Council voted not to proceed at this time, as 49% of respondents were opposed and 45% were in favour. It is also worth noting that 51% of respondents did not oppose a 20mph limit (with 6% expressing a neutral view), and that a majority of respondents living along the main road supported the proposal. Attitudes to speeding and 20mph limits continue to evolve, and the issue of speeding through Moulsoford will therefore remain on the Parish Council's agenda during 2026 and 2027.

Green Spaces

Playground

A new stretch of fencing has been installed behind the picnic table area, replacing vegetation that had been worn away by use as a cut-through. Walkers can use the public right of way at the north-west corner of the recreation ground, and there is also access at the south-west corner. This new fencing is intended to help keep dogs away from the picnic tables and playground, making the area feel safer and cleaner, particularly for young children. Our thanks go to the 100 Club for funding the new fence line.

Recreation Ground – rules of use

The Council has agreed to update the Recreation Ground rules to clarify that no planting or removal of vegetation may take place without prior permission from the Parish Council, agreed as a minuted agenda item.

Basketball court

We are aware that the surface of the basketball court is worn and hope to refurbish it in the next financial year.

Village noticeboard

The village noticeboard has now been reinstated following much-needed renovation.

4th Anniversary of the Russian-Ukraine War - A reflection

As 24th February approaches, the statistics are grim for the fourth anniversary of the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

Massive displacement: 6.9 million refugees have fled Ukraine, with a further 3.7million internally displaced.

Significant casualties: Russia has hit one million casualties in all, including 250,000 soldiers killed. Ukraine has had about 53,000 casualties, including about 15,000 deaths.

Immense destruction of Ukraine's infrastructure, medical facilities and educational facilities.

Impact: Russia now occupies about 20% of Ukraine, including Crimea. Worldwide, a weakened global economy, threatened food security, and documented war crimes, including chemical weapons used by Russia.

Expense: Billions of dollars have been given in aid to Ukraine. (About \$175bn from the US, and \$197bn from EU since 2022.)

The future is unclear, but here are some memorable quotes of two leading Ukrainians:

At the start of the war, when offered evacuation from Kyiv by the U.S. government, **President Volodymyr Zelenskyy** famously stated, **"I need ammunition, not a ride"**. The following day, on 25th February he emphasised Ukraine's determination, stating: **"We will be defending our country, because our weapon is truth, and our truth is that this is our land, our country, our children, and we will defend all of this"**.

The head of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC), **Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk** focuses on themes of resilience, freedom, and hope. **"Ukraine is wounded, but it is not defeated! Ukraine is exhausted, but it is standing and will remain standing! Believe me, no one thinks of giving up."**

A recurring theme in Zelenskyy's speeches is that **"Life will win over death, and the light will win over darkness"**.

We live in trying times, and as Christians we are called to pray for peace in our world. You are more than welcome to join us in praying for peace at our services, 9am at St John the Baptist Moulsoford.

The Street

As mentioned in an earlier column, our main village road, The Street, now labelled the A329, began as a turnpike in 1764 when the Shillingford Bridge to Reading Turnpike Trust was created. This toll road continued operating until 1874. The road included a new bridge at Shillingford and 4 tollgates. The Shillingford Bridge was built at a cost of £7000 and remains in use today.



The turnpike forming part of the current A417 was set up in similar fashion.

Prior to the Turnpike Trusts, road maintenance was mainly a local chore carried out by requiring Parishioners to give 6 days 'statute' or free labour per year. With the increase in interregional demand for goods, the roads became very busy and with no government funding fell into disrepair. Acts of Parliament set up non-profit trusts with maintenance responsibility and authorised collection of a regulated fee, or toll, to use the road and to pay for its upkeep.

Originally, 'turnpike' meant the gate blocking the road. A defensive frame of pikes would block travellers until payment was made, then 'turned' open. The term was adopted into the names of some of the major highways in the USA – The New Jersey Turnpike for example – a toll road with 14 lanes at its widest point.

Much of the A329 is thought to lie on or next to a Roman road from Streatley to Dorchester. Roman coins were found in Moulsford in the 19th century but location is not known. A house on Ferry Lane and St. John the Baptist church are said to use the solid road as part of their foundations. The Roman Road appears to head straight to the high ground vantage point at Sowberry Court from Streatley Farm.

Before the Roman occupation, natural features such as ridgeways were often the path used by generations of travellers. Ancient fording places may have changed names, but Moulsford, with a firm riverbed, was likely a convenient river crossing for travellers on the Great Ridgeway. The local path was sometimes called The Fair Mile, a name adopted by the Moulsford Asylum.

Making best use of technology to help cut crime and catch criminals

Just before Christmas, Thames Valley Police rolled out a live facial recognition operation in Oxford, aimed as much at explaining the technology to the public as well as catching criminals.

The use of live facial-recognition technology can bring great benefits to help cut crime and catch criminals.

Whilst the use of this technology is widely welcomed by most people, there are understandable concerns by some. I have worked closely with the police to ensure that all the necessary safeguards are put in place to protect privacy and the only people who should have anything to fear from the use of live facial-recognition are criminals seeking to target people and property in our community.

The system does not - and cannot - identify everyone that it sees, but instead is looking for those on a specific watchlist. Those who are either wanted by the police or have a warrant issued for them by the courts. Essentially it is very much like the screenlock that many of us will use on our mobile phones. It recognises the people the police are looking for, but simply doesn't recognise the rest of us.

It is important that the police explain the use of this tactic and ensure widespread consent from the public. The use of any technology just provides a tool to the police. It is still the men and women of Thames Valley Police who will use their professional judgment and put themselves in harm's way to protect the public.

The effectiveness of these operations will continually be evaluated, alongside other tactics the police use. With more officers in neighbourhood policing roles and overall crime falling, it remains important that the police are able to address the issues that matter most to the public. You can play your part by reporting any crimes or suspicious activity you see in your community on thamesvalley.police.uk or by calling 101.

On the first operation in Oxford, eight arrests were made, several for domestic abuse offences. Dangerous people being taken off the streets to prevent crime.


Everyone is welcome to come and join us and please bring along your friends, relations and neighbours. If you work from home come along for your coffee break and have some cake and a chat.



Wallingford Accessible Boat Club Seeks Volunteers to Help Make the Thames Accessible for All
