Moulsford News: September 2023

July/Aug 2023 has been a busy period for your new council, including:

- Submitting the annual Parish Council audit
- Completing the Neighbourhood Priority Statement
- Catching up with Oxfordshire Highways team
- Setting update meetings with Moulsford Prep and Cranford House
- Feeding back on new planning applications
- Inputting into the Department for Levelling up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) research, regarding potential changes to land registry and information available when considering development opportunities.

Changes at Moulsford Parish Council

We are delighted to welcome Melanie Mousley Jones, who joined the council in July and has already been a great help with various planning applications.

Owing to family reasons, Sinead Archer, our parish clerk, has stepped down. In the near term, the council are sharing out some of her duties between us, but we are also actively looking for a replacement. See separate advertisement in this newsletter.

Future plans

Sept – Dec will see the new council undertaking formal training in specific councillor duties.

In addition, over the next 6-12 months, we hope to focus on:

- Improving how we share information with the village via social media, printed media, and online. This includes returning to our plans to redevelop the village website, which got derailed last year by the Neighbourhood Priorities Statement!
- Looking at what we can do to reduce speeding and congestion in the village see separate article "Update on All Things Traffic Related"
- Revisiting allotments and securing a formal agreement regarding this with South Oxfordshire District Council.
- Building closer links with other parish councils including sharing information about how we handle common problems and formalising common processes and procedures so that we can become more streamlined.
- Looking at what budget we will require looking out over the next few years, to continue to maintain the pavilion and to build a degree of contingency as required by local government.

From Your Parish Council continued

Update on all things traffic related!!

At the end of June, two individuals from the Oxfordshire County Council Highways team came over to visit Moulsford and meet with Cllr Ben Partridge and myself.

We discussed various topics including:

- Potential speeding issues (and traffic calming measures)
- · Congestion on the main road
- · Parking near river
- General wear and tear to roads

1. Speeding

Walking northwards from the pavilion car park, the team observed passing traffic.

At this time (10am) there was little evidence of speeding. However, as this has been raised by several villagers as an issue, we requested speeding measurement in the village at three points -1) up near Moulsford Pre-prep (where mobile speed camera often located), 2) in the centre of the village near the pavilion, and 3) near the Ferry Lane/ Underhill junction.

OCC Highways are able to cover the costs for this. It will be scheduled for when the schools are back – likely to be late Sept/early Oct.

2. Road signage

There was evidence of road signs being covered by trees/hedges/other vegetation, including the school warning sign to the south of Cranford, and the speed repeater signs. Some signs were also caked in dirt, making them hard to read, e.g. the 30mph speed sign on the corner of A329/Ferry Lane.

As villagers, it's important that we help ensure traffic signs are kept clear, by cutting back any trees or hedges which may be obscuring the signs; either on or adjacent to our properties.

3. Road condition

We had received complaints about the main road condition, particularly on the stretch of the A329 coming down the hill, and abutting Underhill/Ferry Lane.

We were advised to photograph any potholes greater than 40mm depth, then report each individually online on FixMyStreet. However, this only needs to be done once (reporting same pothole five times won't get it fixed quicker!) so anyone reporting problems is advised to check whether the problem has already been logged.

It was noted that the gullies either side of the A329 in the same downhill section are completely blocked. Again, this should be reported, each individually, on FIxMyStreet; **villagers should not attempt to clear these for themselves**.

Reviewing the condition of Ferry Lane, there are two potholes at the top – one of which is over 40mm and can be reported, one of which we simply need to keep an eye on. Again, the gully at the very top of Ferry Lane (on LHS as approach A329) is blocked and needs to be reported so it can be cleared.

4. Footpaths

Ben and Sue raised the issue of narrow paths, particularly from Moulsford Prep School up to the garage, as well as near Grange Cottage. Some of the difficulties were caused by grass and hedge vegetation covering the asphalt; later that same day the verges were cut back and resolved some of the problem!

We also raised the issue of narrow pavements – particularly at Grange Cottage and bus stop on edge of Underhill. We were advised that there were several things that might help:

For bus stops, the repositioning of bins and removal of guard rails would make it easier to keep area clear and passable and ensure drivers had clear line of sight at entrance to Underhill when turning onto A329:

- Guard rails are no longer fitted in front of bus stops as a matter of routine, as they are not thought to offer any significant benefit. MPC should contact SODC if we wish these to be removed. However, note in subsequent discussions with people in Underhill, those with children felt there was a benefit in retaining them.
- Bins could be removed from posts and repositioned e.g. a round bin could be put on ground by Underhill road sign and the one on the lamp post that blocks the line of sight could be removed. Note that the bin by A329/ Underhill had 8 dog poo bags in when checked and no actual rubbish; this may strengthen case for poo bin near river.

Narrow paths themselves e.g. by Grange Cottage, are more difficult to deal with. We discussed a couple of options: chicanes or offset/single island into road. Chicanes would slow traffic and allow widening of path; the disadvantage is that it would cost our village around £30,000. The second option of single island/offset into road would also widen path but have a limited effect on traffic going north in village and would interrupt traffic flow. Cost of second option is thought to be around £18K; again would need to be funded by our village.

It's worth noting that if the village moves to 20mph speed limit through village (see later section), this should not only bring the speed of passing traffic down but also make it safer for pedestrians using narrow paths and help reduce environmental pollution.

5. Congestion around school area

MPC advised Highways of actions taken by schools, including dedicated staff to direct traffic, use of staggered start and end times, and commissioning of school buses. Highways felt there was probably little more that could be done.

We mentioned use of central Moulsford car park during pick up/drop off times by, in particular, Cranford parents. On balance, both MPC and Highways thought this is probably the most pragmatic option to help avoid excessive congestion in the centre of the village at peak periods.

6. Parking

We primarily reviewed parking around the Beetle & Wedge and Ferry Lane. At time of visit, there were about 4 vehicles parked at least partially on the pavement; we were advised that unless the car was considered to be actively blocking the passage of pedestrians we were unlikely to get much help from police.

We also discussed briefly the yellow line option but, as when previously discussed reviewed, it was felt that this would simply move the problem elsewhere in the village, where it might cause even more problems. Also discussed was the use of land recently sold to B&W and its potential redevelopment as parking. It was felt again, this might be the least bad option, even though Ferry Lane residents have some reservations about the land being developed in this way.

Highways failed to see problem with pavement/parking on RHS of Ferry Lane as you go up to Victoria House/Albert House – only a few houses using this section of road need to gain access to their properties. Concerns that emergency vehicles would not be able to make it up were dismissed as unfounded (even though in the process a few wing mirrors might go missing!).

7. Follow up

The Parish Council will be following up with villagers regarding your views on speeding and on the potential of moving to a 20mph zone in the village, in line with Cholsey and many other Oxfordshire villages. If you have a strong view, one way or the other, or would like to be involved in this project, please speak to ClIr Hilary Shaw.

From the Vicar Rebecca Peters

Dear Friends,

As summer draws to a close, and shorts and t-shirts are put away for another year, the usual rhythm of life returns with children heading back to school, youngsters packing up for university or college, and the TV is full with ads for all the new programmes about to begin. In the church, we look towards all that lies ahead in the next few months – Creation celebration, Remembrance Sunday, Advent and then, of course, the culmination of it all, Christmas!

But before we get to Christmas, we enter the season of Autumn, a time of thanksgiving. Maybe you want to give thanks to God for a lovely summer holiday, for weddings, for friends and family or for new beginnings.

This month in our church we give thanks for creation with a special service on Sunday 24th September 9:30 am. Do join us as we say thank you for all that creation provides us.

In his letter to the Ephesians St. Paul encourages us all to live our lives in an attitude of thankfulness. It is hard and takes a lot of discipline and requires effort. If you're feeling grouchy for no good reason, try smiling - the physical act of smiling makes you feel more cheerful whether you want to or not.

But living lives of thankfulness doesn't mean that we should just ignore our sufferings or the suffering of others and say they don't matter, because they do matter. There is a time to laugh and a time to cry. So many people say they mustn't grumble and imply that their sufferings are too small to be of value compared to other people's, " there are so many worse off than me". That is not true. All of our struggles and sufferings matter to God, however small they are. But St. Paul understood that if we can learn to be positive and thankful during the good times, then that will help to sustain us through the bad times. He was in prison when he wrote to the Ephesians. Being thankful didn't diminish his hardship, but it did help him to endure it.

Each new day brings with it a new beginning and a challenge. So how about a challenge, a challenge to be thankful! To make the effort to see the positive in a situation rather than the downside. To stop us when we start moaning and give thanks instead. And I think that if we can do that, we'll discover that whatever life may bring, it will be the better for having consciously tried to live it in an attitude of thankfulness.



Countryfile's Tom Heap joins Earth Trust supporters in championing access and engagement with natural green space - June 2023

The vital importance of championing access to green spaces for everyone is marked next week as Oxfordshire based environmental charity – Earth Trust – meets with its supporter community. The event will focus on the active role Earth Trust's growing community can play in green spaces by putting people at the heart of change to enable better access, engagement and nature recovery.

Special guest speakers will include BBC Countryfile's Tom Heap, Leader of South Oxfordshire District Council, David Rouane and Richard Benwell, Chief Executive of Wildlife and Countryside Link. The event includes the annual Rose Ceremony, a tradition dating back several decades during which the Chair of Oxfordshire County Council (currently Councillor Felix Bloomfield) presents a rose to Earth Trust as a peppercorn rent for public access to Wittenham Clumps – the largest freely accessible natural green space landscape in Oxfordshire.

This year's event marks the launch of a new membership scheme to connect more people to Earth Trust's purpose of inspiring people to address biodiversity, climate and wellbeing with the power of natural green spaces.

Jayne Manley, CEO explains: "Our Supporters Day this year is an important opportunity for us to talk about the impact of our community and what we have achieved together – from supporting disadvantaged communities to access green space, to helping children engage with the natural world around them; from reintroducing wetlands along the Thames, to generating new evidence on nature based solutions to climate change – we're working tirelessly to enable nature and people to thrive in balance, while using this work to inspire change at a national level too.

We are delighted to have such a fantastic variety of different voices and perspectives so that we can explore ideas for our future direction together – and to recognise and celebrate this wonderful community and all the many different ways that we work together.

Earth Trust needs support from our community to transform more lives. That's why we are launching a brand new membership scheme, so that we can become an even stronger voice for championing green spaces for everyone."

Tom Heap says: "We all have an active role to play in enabling change and recovering what we have lost of our nature. We have seen significant progress and change in the global, national and regional nature recovery policy sphere. But, little on what this means locally for people and community engagement with their places.

It is vital that we embed social engagement of people with nature into our futures – ensuring that nature recovery is also actively building nature in to people's lives. I'm delighted to be joining the Earth Trust community as they discuss what more can be done."

With Oxfordshire being one of most rapidly developing counties in the UK – Earth Trust is positioned at the sharp edge of creating and managing spaces that enable both people and nature to thrive in balance.

In addition to the iconic Wittenham Clumps (500 hectares of woodland, farmland, wildflower meadows and wetlands), the Trust also cares for a growing number of smaller community reserves – special places for both nature and people within urban areas and towns. These places receive 200,000 plus visits a year.

Earth Trust feels passionate about using people power to address the triple threat we currently face as a society in terms of climate change, loss of biodiversity, and health and equality. It has never been more critical to provide access to green space and to engage people deeply with nature - both for their own wellbeing and to inspire action to protect the natural world for our future.

Wallingford Castle Meadows celebrates 16 years consecutive Green Flag Award - July 2023

The results of the annual Green Flag Awards are officially released today, and Wallingford Castle Meadows has once again been officially recognised as one of the country's best parks, marking an impressive 16th consecutive year of receiving this prestigious award. This is also the 10th consecutive year that Wallingford Castle Meadows has attained Green Heritage Site accreditation for the care of the remains of one of the greatest medieval castles in England.

Working together for nature and heritage

Earth Trust, and their team of devoted volunteers, manages Wallingford Castle Meadows on behalf of South Oxfordshire District Council - ensuring the preservation and enhancement of this cherished local natural space. Together, the team cares for and nurtures the biodiversity and beauty of these vibrant meadows for people to relish and appreciate.

Volunteer warden and butterfly surveyor, Steve Nixon, comments: "Wallingford is so lucky to have such a historic and beautiful site, available to all, close to the centre of town. The meadows reflect the changing seasons from the flooded lower fields in late winter to the carpets of yellow buttercups and cowslips in spring, to the swaying swathes of grass in summer and the vibrant colours of autumn. At least 21 species of butterfly have been found here. Red kites, wren, green woodpecker, nuthatch, goldfinch and greenfinch are a constant presence. Blackcap, chiffchaff, reed warbler and whitethroat add to the dawn chorus during spring and summer. Fox and deer are regularly seen, and even otter along the Thames adjacent to the meadows. My family find the meadows a place of tranquillity and calm. It is a magical place."

Archaeologists discover remains of tiny Roman 'lap dog' in Oxfordshire

An archaeological dig in Oxfordshire, UK, has uncovered the 1,800 year-old remains of a tiny Roman dog.

At just 20 cm (7.8 inches) tall at the shoulder, researchers say that the ancient pooch is one of the five smallest Roman dogs ever discovered in the UK, and that its unusually small size means it is likely to have been a much-loved pet.

The little dog, which is thought to have been female with bowed legs, would probably have had a similar stature to a dachshund, but been closer in size to a chihuahua.

The animal's remains were unearthed during an archaeological dig at the headquarters of environmental charity Earth Trust in Oxfordshire by a team of archaeologists from DigVentures, and later identified by zooarchaeologists examining the bones in the lab.

The excavation took place downslope from one of South Oxfordshire's most iconic landmarks - Wittenham Clumps. Affectionately known locally as 'The Clumps', the site is owned and managed by Earth Trust, and features the ancient hillfort Castle Hill, which is registered as a scheduled ancient monument overlooking the River Thames, approximately 15 miles from Oxford and 50 miles from London. Much-loved by modern day dog owners and walkers near and far, it is the most highly visited free to access greenspace in the region.

During the excavations, archaeologists discovered a large Roman villa, as well as the earlier remains of an earlier Iron Age settlement.

The animal's remains were found within one of the 42 Roman burials associated with the villa, but it's unclear whether the dog was buried with its owner or buried separately, say the researchers.

In total, the remains of at least 15 small-medium sized dogs (including the tiny lapdog) were recovered from the Roman villa, which was occupied for around 150 years between the 3rd and 4th centuries AD.

Among many other discoveries at the villa, archaeologists found domestic items such as cooking utensils including a ladle, colander or strainer, cleaver, and storage jars, as well as personal items like brooches, bracelet, a ring, leather-working tools, hair combs, medical spatula, and even the hobnails from a pair of Roman shoes.

"This site provides a snapshot of domestic life in Roman Britain; it's like peering into someone's home. The villa would have been occupied by a relatively wealthy Roman family, who ran a farm with an assortment of working animals, including hunting or herding dogs — as well as this tiny canine" said Maiya Pina-Dacier from DigVentures.

Archaeologists found that the villa's residents were also keeping chickens, geese, pigs, cattle, sheep or goats, and horses, donkeys or mules for food and farming. But not all animals were kept for practical purposes; several ravens and crows were also discovered which may have been used in ritual or ceremonial activities rather than for food. In the Iron Age part of the site, the team also discovered the remains of a decapitated dog, similar to a greyhound, buried in a pit along with a cow skull.

While most of us probably think of small dogs as a modern trend associated with a certain kind of luxury lifestyle, discoveries like this make it clear that the companionship of small dogs has been enjoyed in Britain for at least 1,800 years.

The presence of small dogs in Britain first appears with the arrival of the Romans. Until then, archaeologists typically only find medium-large sized dogs, which are generally thought to have been kept by Iron Age for practical purposes like hunting, herding, killed for fur, or sometimes sacrificed. But once the Romans arrive, smaller dogs become increasingly popular.

Once the Romans arrive, archaeologists begin to see at least two types of small dog in Britain, including miniature or toy dogs, which are the same shape as larger dogs but smaller; and dwarf dogs, arising when a puppy is born with chondrodysplasia, which results in short and bowed legs, and are then bred to produce bowed-legged dwarf breeds, like the modern dachshund.

"While it's possible that this dog was used for hunting, we know that Romans in other parts of the empire had begun to breed and keep small dogs as pets. In the UK, most of the small dogs we find measure between 22-37 cm in shoulder height, making this individual particularly small" said Hannah Russ and Sarah Everett, the zooarchaeologists who analysed the animal remains.

"The fact that this dog was so small and had bowed legs suggests that she probably wasn't bred for hunting. This, along with the fact that she might have even been buried with her owner, makes it far more likely that she was kept as a house dog, lap dog, or pet" they said.

These have been great for making pasta sauces! We have also had lots of courgettes and spring onions which we also use in sauce. There has also been quite a lot of cucumber, which my family enjoyed (even though I don't like it). From the herb garden we have gathered lots

of mint to dry and use for tea. But best of all have been the runner beans from my bed. We have enjoyed so many dinners with them, and they just keep on coming! They also look really pretty, climbing up the bamboo poles arranged in the shape of a teepee, and the white and red flowers look really nice. The Omega Pumpkin is also growing nicely, it is the second biggest one! I also love the roast beetroot which we have occasionally. Either eat it warm or put it in a jar and into the fridge. It is really nice warm, but also quite refreshing when it is cold, as it is a bit tart as well. You can have it on its own or on porridge or yogurt to give it a fruity kick!
