There was a great turnout for that too, and what a lovely Christmas occasion it was, being in the Bell with friends and family from Moulsford sharing some time, chat and the classic atmosphere of one of Britain's finest traditional pubs.

Looking ahead for 2025, we really do need help for our Friday nights and other events to carry on as usual, whether it be joining the committee or volunteering to do a bar shift or two. One thing that did work very well last year were the excellent offerings provided by volunteer cooks bringing a dish-of-the-day. Sitting down with a lovely paella, a pizza or a proper curry was brilliant. We're keen to try this again, so think of your speciality and let us know; the schedule will be organised again by our very own Jo Haywood. Also as important is people turning up and supporting our Friday nights and indeed helping introduce friends and neighbours to the Pavilion on these evenings. It all comes together to make our Moulsford Friday Nights special.

At the moment we have not set the calendar yet; we have a meeting in late January to discuss a plan, but it is dependent on what time we have as a committee to set up all the Friday nights. We have a smaller team this year, so without additional support especially to set up and close up, we suspect we won't be able to run as many nights as usual, as we're all busy elsewhere too and only have so much spare time. Many hands do make light work though, so please do call me if you want join the events committee or join the rota to help with setting up the bar for example. We have already decided not to organise a river boat trip this year, as we are both short of people to organise it and there's an additional difficulty of not getting enough advance bookings to cover the hire cost, particularly with concerns about inclement weather as we discovered last time.

Please do watch this space and the village Facebook page for the Events updates and calendar as it develops. Please do give me a call if you are in a position to help or contribute (07831 152900). The Friday nights are so important to the social fabric of Moulsford for both young and old, and spreading a bit the work between us makes a big difference. I forgot to mention, most importantly if you do a bar shift you get a free pint or glass of wine. Let's hope we have a warm, balmy summer to look forward to as well.

New Clerk

Once the budget for 2025/26 is complete and the precept applied for, December and January are quiet months for the council. However, this year we have had to re-advertise and interview for a new clerk, as the previous appointment made in December 2024 had to step down due to unforeseen reasons. We hope to make an announcement about our new hire shortly. In the meantime, we are fortunate to be able to continue with our temporary clerk, Helen Broughton.

Planning

A couple of minor planning applications went through during January; see the following section for more details. We are also expecting revised plans for a proposed Cranford School expansion. Once these plans are available, I would like to set up a meeting in which we can review the revised plans and get your input. We hope to have a representative from Cranford School at that meeting.

Playground

Play equipment is currently slippery owing to wet weather and a build up of moss. We are cleaning the equipment off and will also be getting expert advice through the tree survey we are commissioning, on cutting back any overhanding branches above the equipment. February is also the month in which we are due the annual playground safety inspection.

Pavilion car park

This is in regular use and is looking a bit rough round the edges now! We have had discussions with a local company re. donating new materials and are in the process of getting quotes for the labour involved in resurfacing and replacing the gravel. No plans to tarmac though.

Verges

Again, we are in the process of getting quotes. Initial activities suggest that this is likely to go up significantly and we are hampered by the fact that OCC request that we use a contractor with the correct level of liability insurance. For this reason, it is unlikely we will be able to afford more than one or two cuts a year (as we had this last year); meaning that in the growing seasons things will sometimes look a little wild!

Parish Councillors

We continue to operate in Moulsford with only 4 councillors and urgently need to appoint another to bring us up to full complement. Should we not be able to recruit, it is likely that next council term we will have to request to join with Cholsey Council as we cannot continue as we are. The most frequent comment we get when discussing with people about coming onto the parish council is that they do not have the time. I completely understand this, but the fewer the councillors we have, the more work there is on those currently doing the role – and conversely if we are at full complement it is less onerous on all councillors. Please, if you think you might be able to help, contact one of the councillors to find out more, or speak directly to myself.

Annual Village Parish Meeting 2025

A date for this will be confirmed shortly. This year, with it being 80 years since Victory in Europe was declared (VE Day), we are thinking of holding the APM on 8th May and having an exhibition outlining Moulsford's history, including the role villagers played in World War 2. All ideas welcome!

Donations from 100 Club and MEC

At time of writing these two sub committees are finalising the donations they will give to the Parish Council this year. More information to follow but I would just like to take this opportunity to thank everyone involved on these committees for their time and commitment – it is much appreciated. Cutting rural crime

Rural crime - specifically defined as things like the theft of farm machinery, equipment, damage to crops and offences such as hare coursing - can have a huge impact on farming businesses, not to mention the real issues of safety for individuals. Thankfully rural crime is falling locally. Across Thames Valley it is down 24% over the last 12 months and in southern Oxfordshire it's down 33% but that's not by accident.

Last year I secured additional funding from the Home Office for work focused specifically in Oxfordshire. Thames Valley Police have teamed up with local District Councils, forming a Rural Crime Partnership and delivering the following:

- Using undercover cameras and off-road bikes, officers can now better monitor remote areas and track down offenders who think they can't be reached.
- Farmers have received free security reviews and DNA marking kits for their equipment, making it much harder for thieves to get away and easier to return stolen items if something happens.
- Rural Crime Advisor: A dedicated advisor was recruited, to be out in the community, offering helpful advice, meeting with local farmers and businesses, and keeping rural industries safer.
- Tackling Fly-Tipping: New surveillance tools are helping councils catch and prosecute those who dump waste, keeping rural areas cleaner and more beautiful.

More officers have been recruited to the Rural Crime Taskforce, making it one of the largest and certainly one of the most effective in the country. They recognise that many of these offences are part of organised crime. The taskforce are identifying and focusing on the most dangerous and prolific offenders. In fact they have been so successful that whilst there have been reduction in crime here, other police areas have seen increases as criminals target other places. None of us are safe, unless we're all safe; so we've now established a South East Partnership Against Rural Crime - joining together neighbouring police forces so that we can target criminals all the way from the farms they target to the ports where they try to export stolen goods.

With these measures, our rural areas are becoming safer places thanks to the hard work and dedication of Thames Valley Police officers.



From the Vicar Rebecca Peters

Dear Friends,

"Why does God allow suffering?"

This is a frequently asked question of Christians, because we believe in a God who is both good and powerful and it is explored in the book of Job. This book is part of the wisdom literature, along with Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

Job was both wealthy and righteous, yet he experienced catastrophic suffering, losing all his wealth, children and health. This is portrayed as a result of Satan's challenge to God, testing whether Job's devotion to God was dependent on his circumstances or not.

The main body of the book (3:1-42:6) consists of dialogues between Job, his friends (Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar) and God. Job and his friends assume that God is almighty and just, and that no human being is wholly innocent. In the three cycles of speeches they wrestle with the reasons for Job's suffering, remembering his morally upright character.

Finally, all are silenced by God, as He speaks Himself (chs 38-42). He points out that Job knows very little about the universe when he reflects on God's power. Job confesses his lack of understanding and weakness, but then goes on to confess his confidence and trust in God. This puts suffering in a right perspective. Job is not condemned, and the book ends with the restoration of his family and possessions.

The importance of this book is that it realistically addresses the painful questions of life, without offering simplistic answers. It focuses on how we should respond to suffering, rather than on why God allows suffering: 'Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I shall depart. The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; may the name of the LORD be praised.' (1:21)

Refuge Toys


Thank you all for your generous donations for the Toys for the Refuge children in South Africa.



Wallingford Local Producers Market

Wallingford Local Producers Market (WLPM) is held every Saturday morning from 10am to 12:30pm.

Markets are held in St Mary's Church in the centre of Wallingford. Usually, our food stalls can be found outside with our craft stalls inside.


