Parish Council Update

Dog Fouling

There is increasing concern within the village that this problem is occurring again. In particular since the cricket season has finished,

it is evident that the recreation ground has become a regular exercise area for dogs; the footpath along Main Street also seems to be a problem area, with a number of residents stating that as the nights have drawn in the problem has increased.

The Dog Fouling Act of Land Act 1996 makes it an offence not to clean up dog faeces in designated public areas, parks and footpaths (except woodland, rural common land and agricultural land).

Toxocariasis is the disease caused by roundworm eggs found in dog faeces that may potentially result in eye problems or blindness, and children are particularly at risk. About 100 cases a year are diagnosed in the UK each year.

Would all dog owners please ensure that they clear up if their dog fouls anywhere within the built-up area of the village or on the recreation ground.

Drains

Residents may have not been aware that during late October/ early November as a result of heavy rainfall the Parish Council alerted West Berkshire Council about flooding and the potential of flooding in the village if the drains on Main Street and at the bottom of Bury Lane were not cleaned. The resulting phone call certainly had its results as tankers were directed to the village and the drains were promptly cleaned. It later emerged in conversation with one of the drivers that the two drains at the bottom of Bury Lane and Main Street were completely blocked and several tanker loads of sediment were removed (he could not remember when they were last cleaned out).

They have flushed all the main drains and we are reliably informed that the drainage system from the pond to the Old Post Office is now clear. One piece of advice that was given was to ask residents wherever possible to try and ensure that where there is a main drain outside their drive entrance on Main Street or Bury Lane, it would be helpful if they could periodically check the overlying grid and make sure it is clear of leaves or any soil/mud/stones. This will allow the rain and surface water to easily find its way into the drainage system.

West Berkshire Council has informed the Parish Council that the tankers will clean the drains twice a year.

Road Safety in West Isley

Parish Council Campaign 2007

As those who were at the last Parish Council Meeting will know, one of your council's 2007 objectives is to focus on Road Safety in West Isley.

The subject of road safety is regularly raised with councillors and as a consequence the council has, over the past couple of years, pursued a number of initiatives including the resiting of the 30 mph limit signs, using the West Berkshire District Council (WBDC) speed indicator device to carry out a vehicle speed survey and the recent submission of a proposal to WBDC for the siting of a permanent speed indicator sign.

For 2007 we want to make an even more concerted effort to address the issue and the intention is to adopt a formal campaign strategy at the next Parish Council Meeting in January.

In case there is any doubt about the importance of road safety I think it is valuable to bear in mind a few salutary facts (principal source: www.brake.org.uk):

- The UK has one of the worst child pedestrian death rates in Western Europe.
- 3,425 children were killed or seriously injured on the roads in the UK in 2005, that's 66 a week.

- **Traffic is the biggest killer of 15-19 year-olds, and the second biggest killer of children aged 5-14, after cancer**, many due to children taking risks when out walking and cycling on their own or with friends, particularly at the age when parents have to – despite their fears – allow their children to walk unaccompanied.
- **75% of non-medical deaths of 10-19 year olds are as a result of road accidents.**
- The **number of cyclists killed or seriously injured** in the UK in 2005 was 2,360, that's **45 a week**.
- In West Berkshire in 2004 there were 284 road casualties of which 55 were killed or seriously injured. There were 16 pedestrian casualties aged 15 or under.
- **Over half of road deaths and serious injuries** occur in 30 mph limits
- **If a car hits you doing 20 mph** you have a 95% chance of surviving, at 30 mph it is 55% and if you get struck at **40 mph then you have a 15% chance of living.**
- If you hit a pedestrian **at 35mph** you are more than **twice as likely to kill them than** if you hit them **at 30mph**.
- Nearly 90% of pedestrians who survive being hit by a car doing 30 mph will sustain serious injuries.
- **It takes about a minute and a half to drive through West Ilsley at 30 mph and a lifetime to recover from the death of a loved one.**

Clearly the speed of vehicles driving through the village is a primary source of accident danger and this will be the focus of the campaign. However there are a plethora of other influences on road safety and we want to ensure that we address them all.

What can you do?

Firstly as preparation for the campaign, we would like to capture your ideas, thoughts and comments about road safety in West Ilsley.


Please email your ideas and comments to roadsafety.20.rattlebox@spamgourmet.com or use old fashioned pen and paper and the letterbox of Somerdown, Main Street.

Some of the ideas we have generated to date are:

- What evidence do we have that the roads are dangerous? Please let us know about any specific incidents so that we can see if there are any common factors.
- Who is driving dangerously? Residents, visitors, local businesses, lost drivers (espec HGVs), diverted drivers when the A34 is closed.....
- How are they driving dangerously? Speeding, using a mobile phone, not taking care near horse riders.....
- Who can help us collect data? WBDC, police, ROSPA....

- A system for centrally recording dangerous incidents.
- Changes to speed limit signs
- Changes to the entrances to the village
- Traffic calming – perhaps removable during harvest time
- Speed Indicators signs
- Speed cameras or just dummy speed cameras
- Leafleting the village to remind everybody about road safety
- Regular articles in WIN
- Involve local schools and other organisations to make sure everybody takes the issue seriously whether they be drivers or pedestrians
- Contacting local businesses to encourage their employees to take care when driving through the village
- Contact Thames Valley Police – sad to say that the council has recently had to contact the police in order to express our dismay at the recent dangerous driving by a police car through the village; not the sort of contact we had at first envisaged we would have with them on the subject of road safety....
- Contact West Berkshire District Council Road Safety Team
- Start a *20s Plenty Campaign* – a campaign to encourage residents to drive at 20 mph through the village. Not all are practical, or indeed necessary, but they hopefully give a flavour of the intended scope of the campaign.

NEW RESIDENTS!

For those people who have seen me out and about with the latest additions to my menagerie, Story and Transit, I thought I would write a little article for the WIN. They are two Bloodhound puppies belonging to the Southern Shires Bloodhounds, which is the pack that I help out with and hunt with. We are a small, friendly pack based at Park Farm, Wherwell, near Andover and have been established since 1994. We are members of the Masters of Bloodhounds Association (MBHA) and hunt what is known as the "clean boot" - in other words, the hounds hunt purely the scent of the "quarry" (human runner) with no artificial scent used in any way. This is different to Draghound packs, who use foxhounds to hunt an enhanced or artificial scent.

A day's hunting usually consists of between 3 - 6 lines varying in length from 1 - 5 miles, with the length and distance of each line being determined by the layout of the land that is going to be hunted across, and the landowner's wishes. The sport is reliant on the goodwill and co-operation of the landowners and farmers, and Masters of Bloodhounds will always defer to their wishes when arranging a day's hunting, and they and the "field" (mounted followers) will follow a strict code of conduct when crossing their land. It is an enormous testimony to the generosity of the UK's

landowners and farmers that so many are willing to share their property with other people in this way.

Some of you may know that I had Chorus (Story and Transit's mother) here in the summer to have her puppies - she produced an incredible litter of 14 puppies and only lost one, which is something of a record for a Bloodhound, they are not the best mothers! Many Bloodhound packs, especially those who are members of the MBHA, have a great interest in the work and breed development of the hunting bloodhound; the bloodhound is currently on the Vulnerable Breeds List and the MBHA is keen to encourage responsible breeding with the hope that in time our efforts will help to secure the breeds' future and enable it to be removed from this register. Chorus's litter will be assessed to be registered with the Kennel Club.

As with most packs of hunting hounds, the puppies get sent out to "puppy walkers" for a few months once they are old enough. This is all part of their education, enabling them to get some individual attention, learn their names and some basic commands, and see a little of the Big Wide World. They will go back to the kennels in the spring to spend the summer being walked with the rest of the pack as "unentered" hounds, (an entered hound is one which has hunted a full season) moving onto mounted exercise in the Autumn ready to be "entered" (or hunted) next season.

Richard Gore and the Carlisle family have kindly agreed to let us hold a meet in the village, and Peter and Jackie at the Harrow have kindly agreed to host it. It will (hopefully, weather permitting!) be held on 7th January at 12 noon, so for anyone interested in meeting us and following to see what it is all about, do come along and join us, or have a look on our website for more information - www.southernshiresbloodhounds.co.uk (Kennel Chat is a particularly good page, especially Rogan's Diary!!)





Wow! What a wonderful start to the new academic year we've had. The first half term has whizzed by and the children have come back with a real desire to learn and achieve their best. But don't take my word for, if you want to see the school in action for yourself, give me a ring to arrange a tour.

That said, the school is not resting on its laurels after its excellent OFSTED, and has started to work through a new development plan 'Seizing our Moment (Going from good to outstanding)'. This builds on past success and takes us even further.

You may have noticed we have new gates at the school entrance. They include a new pedestrian gate and a walkway to the reception; this makes the entrance safer and, I believe, more attractive.

Also, you can't have helped to notice the new colourful 'The Ilsleys' letters which are bold and beautiful.
