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Nature notes about Bees curtesy of Daisy Meadows

BEE FACT; on average in its lifetime, a single bee will produce just half a teaspoon of honey

BEE FACT -To make one pound of honey, bees fly 90,000miles ...equivalent to flying three times around the world

BEE FRIENDLY Bees are foraging for two things when they visit our plants

- **1. Nectar** which is loaded with sugars; the main source of energy for a bee
- **2. Pollen** which provides the fats and proteins to ensure bees have a balanced diet.

To attract bees, it is important when planting flowers to plant native species that would grow naturally in your area as F1hybrids and exotic species are usually sterile and sometimes harmful to them. Also try to avoid using any pesticides in the garden as this will make it a healthier place for bees as opposed to areas with commercial crops. It is important to provide plants that flower at different times throughout the year so that there is an available source of nectar for overwintering queens and workers who may emerge on warmer days in winter to forage.

While there are many flowers to choose from, here is a list of some pollinators which have gained recognition from the RHS and look lovely in the garden Jan/Feb - Hellebores, Snowdrops, Winter Aconites Feb/March /April - Crocuses particularly purple varieties, Lungwort, Perennial Wallflower March/May - Apples/fruit trees, Euphorbias, Hawthorn June / July /August - Salvias, Rudbeckia, Echinacea, Lavender, Verbena Bonariensis Sept/Oct - Sedum Nov/Dec - Ivy/Mahonia

BEE FACT; Bees have been pollinating plants and producing honey for at least 150 million years *So plant a bee friendly garden and help ensure they are around to keep up the good work!*

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

Minutes of the Extraordinary Parish Council on Monday 20th October 2020, 7.30pm held by teleconference

Cllr Galton opened meeting at 7.30pm

- 1. Anybody filming or recording this meeting to declare it. none
- 2. Apologies no apologies for absence received
- 3. Declarations:

- 4. Public Session Chris Wheal was in attendance but did not speak to the meeting Mike Hitchins, who was unable to attend, had submitted two questions in advance which were read out and answers were provided as follows:
 - 1. Has the Parish Council ever received any **assurance or otherwise** from Kent County Council that the proposed Traffic Calming Scheme for Grafty Green will be effective in slowing down the traffic. **The answer agreed was No.**

However, Councillor Eastwood reminded the Council that KCC had said that. "I also wanted to reiterate that all 3 options being over-runnable will not be very effective in slowing vehicle speeds". The Clerk pointed out that this statement was intended to indicate that our scheme does not provide any physical structures which raise the road level which, in turn, guarantee that traffic slows down to navigate them.

2. Does the Parish Council believe that this scheme is **value for money** in the light that the Parish Council does not know the exact cost of the scheme or of the ongoing maintenance and does it think it is **prudent** to approve a scheme where the true costs are unknown.

Answer - It is not possible to measure Value for Money, for example using Cost Benefit Analysis, when the benefits are not quantifiable. There is no numerical evidence available of the benefits of such schemes according to KCC.

- 5. Traffic Calming it was agreed that:
 - (i) The Independent Internal Auditor will be commissioned to review the decision to commence the traffic calming scheme based on the KCC estimate and advise whether the decision is financially prudent and consistent with sound risk management
 - (ii) It was agreed that the Council will create a "Repairs Fund" to finance future maintenance of the traffic calming features and this will be funded by an annual budget contribution and potentially a contribution from the Quinn donation. The Independent Internal Auditor will be asked to advise how the Repairs Fund should best be financed.
 - (iii) A draft response to the Malherbe Monthly editorial, previously circulated, was agreed subject to the following amendments and clarifications:
 - · Remove the second paragraph
 - Add reference to granite sets in the answer to point 3.

- · Remove the reference to the Doddington scheme in the answer to point 4
- Seek clarification from KCC regarding (a) the final payment and whether this is, in effect, a fixed price
 (b) whether any costs have been incurred above the payment of £3,815 already made up to the
 point of the final payment
- 6. Further information none

Boughton Malherbe Parish Council Traffic Calming Scheme

The October edition of Malherbe Monthly contains an Editorial expressing the views of the editor. The Editor did not ask the Parish Council for comment before publication. Please read our response below before you react to the Editorial.

3rd Para. The £71,495 cost includes all design & planning costs to date. The £61,870 is to implement the scheme. Hence there is no increase in the overall estimated cost. With regard to the **six** specific points made:

1. As the Parish Council are proposing to spend this large sum of money which in effect is all our money, would it not be diligent for the parishioners to be consulted on this expenditure. It involves spending well in excess of 70% of the Quinn money on one project.

Answer - In 2018 the Parish Council invited residents to suggest how they would like the council to spend the Quinn Estates donation. Traffic Calming was suggested by several residents in this exercise. The Parish Council has addressed all the suggestions made in this exercise except the purchase of the Village Green, which is not currently an option, and may never be so. The Parish Council has consulted extensively on the scheme and various options have been discussed at length at Parish Council meetings - with large numbers of resident's present. This process has led to a comprehensive scheme with wide support which can be funded from The Quinn Donation. If we now decide to spend less money we will have a less ambitious scheme, which may not have the same level of support. Members of the public are invited to write to the Clerk with their views on whether they support spending 70% of the Quinn donation on this scheme or not. If an overwhelming majority are against spending this much the Council will reconsider.

2. Does it seem right that the Parish Council has agreed to proceed with this project in the light of the costs being estimated and may well increase as the project is undertaken. This exposes the Parish Council to unknown

expenditure which may be unaffordable. Would any of the us undertake a project where we do not know how much it is going to cost?

Answer - KCC is unable to provide a fixed price at this stage as there are a few more design actions, and a road safety audit, to be completed. However, they assure us that the final price will only vary slightly from this estimate. In any event, the council can re-think in the unlikely event that the final price is greatly changed. The Council has been asked to pay in advance, therefore there is no risk of the price changing once the scheme has commenced.

3. In addition to the initial cost of the project it is understood that any future maintenance of the scheme would be the responsibility of the Parish Council. As this is an unknown figure how will the council fund this?

Answer -The Council has agreed to establish a repairs fund which will comprise the remaining £11K of the Quinn donation plus an annual contribution from the budget. KCC say the features should not require replacement or maintenance for 5-10 years. The Council has opted for the hardest wearing red tarmac surface and granite setts to prolong their lifespan. It should be noted that accidents resulting from the scheme design and construction will be KCC responsibility

4. Has the Parish Council sought assurance from Kent County Council and the Highways authority on whether this proposed scheme will have the desired effect of actually slowing down the speed of traffic passing through the village? Does it have any evidence this type of scheme actually works and has the council been advised on the viability or not of the scheme?

Answer - KCC has little research evidence on the effectiveness of such schemes. East Farleigh has recently introduced a scheme with red tarmac strips and traffic surveys show a modest decline in speeds. However, it is fair to say that there is little research evidence to suggest the impact of our scheme either way. However, as we are unable to have speed bumps or physical chicanes in our scheme, as we have no street lights, there is very little alternative, except to do nothing. This is clearly not supported within the village on the basis of consultation.

5. The scheme also brings to the village a lot of Red coloured road markings which to some may seem to be unsightly in a rural village.

Answer - Red tarmac has been on the drawings of the first and final schemes during consultation. No adverse comments were received. In addition, the council has chosen a scheme which majors on the granite set "chicanes" which are more in keeping with the village and have been mentioned by people in the village in the context of the Doddington scheme as a desirable approach.

6. This scheme also raises the question of spending a large sum of money on one project that will have no material effect for the parishioners that do not live in the village and will not benefit from it. To them it may seem unfair that a majority of the money received from Quinn is being spent on a project that they personally derive no benefit from and in addition may not have the desired effect of it actual slowing down the traffic.

Answer - No adverse comment was received from residents living outside the village during consultation. They nearly all use Headcorn Road. When developments are finished in Lenham/Headcorn it will be too late to do anything and we will not have a scheme to build on as circumstances change. The Parish Council asked the views of all residents of the Parish in 2018 regarding priorities for the use of the Quinn donation. Traffic Calming was one of the priorities identified in this survey. Other suggestions have either been implemented – village hall improvements, Platts Heath School Improvements, Lighting the passage by the Kings Head, or reviewed and deemed unviable.

Traffic Calming Editorial - October Issue Malherbe Monthly

Living at the end of the village where 60mph should become 30mph, and regularly walking Headcorn Road I am both very aware of the speeding issues and have been equally supportive of initiatives to bring about improvement.

Having seen the Parish Council announcement to go ahead with a scheme with a now announced estimated at £72,000 I do now share the reservations expressed in the October Malherbe Monthly editorial.

- * Rural traffic calming measures, of the type planned for Grafty, are well documented for often not resulting in desired benefits leading to total disappointment amongst villagers wherever.
- * £72,000 estimated cost, with the potential for extras, for me is questionable being a high-stake gamble which may not deliver much, if any benefit average speeds may drop by as little as 2 or 3mph, will do nothing regarding the real speeders, nor traffic volumes or lorries.
- *A fairly similar scheme in East Farleigh also costing £72,000 introduced a year ago is about to be evaluated. Not wanting to pre-judge but there are indications that the novelty of the virtual humps quickly passed so is this to be another scheme delivering very marginal benefits, if any?
- * The Parish Council will be responsible for ongoing maintenance costs walking Headcorn Road between Woodcock Lane and the speed limit signs at the southern end of the village (in fact down to Eastwood Road, visually the road and surface is showing varying levels of degradation (some potentially serious) therefore the Parish could end up bearing costs which should be KCC's. Historically Headcorn Road was resurfaced to just beyond Woodcock Lane, and from Eastwood Road all the way to Headcorn but the gap between the two simply left deteriorate. Much of the proposed calming is to be done on this stretch of road.

Whilst previously backing proposals in principle, that was very much without a published cost, and now a cost of £72,000 and perhaps somewhat more, plus ongoing maintenance costs I do now have serious reservations as there is so much uncertainty about potential benefits - if it was say £25,000 probably worth a punt.

Clearly within the Parish Council the decision has not been unanimous with 3 in favour, 1 against and 1 abstaining. Given the previous consultation was about a scheme in principle, the amount of public money now at stake and potential dubious end benefits should there not be a final a simple village wide vote, not to revisit any scheme details but to mandate the initial cost of £72,000 or more together with future maintenance costs with a simple yes / no majority decision?

Whatever the decision, implementation will need the closest scrutiny to avoid spiralling or runaway costs which the contracting industry is renowned for.

Grafty Geeks - Transferring Photos from your Phone to a PC

There are many ways to move your photos from your phone to a computer, organise them so you can find them later and get them backed-up in case your computer fails.



Well, all of this can be done by using one of the online cloud storage services. Cloud storage is a service model i

cloud storage services. Cloud storage is a service model in which data is transmitted and stored on remote storage systems, where it is maintained, managed, backed up and made available to users over the internet. Users generally pay for their cloud data storage on a per-consumption, monthly rate. Depending on the devices you have, you may have been offered different services for example, Google Drive, OneDrive (Microsoft), iDrive (Apple), Dropbox. There are many, so you might wish to do some research to find the best one for you.

Once you have selected a Cloud Storage provider

On your phone go to the Photo Gallery, and select settings. There are different options available for different phones, but you are looking for options to Synchronise photos. You will be asked to confirm the provider of your choice. Once you have completed this synchronisation, all the photos in your phone's Gallery will be uploaded to the Cloud storage. They are instantly available on your computer as soon as you have taken them. You can synchronise phone photos, as well as your photos received via Whatsapp. The albums in your phone gallery are available in your Cloud storage application. When you first do this synchronisation, ensure you are doing it when you are on the WiFi, as it will cost you to do this via Mobile Data. It may also take some time if you have many photos.

There are more options available for organising your photos in the Photo App, than are available in the phone's Gallery, you can also select to set the system to the phones into an order by people in the Search feature.

There are two really good reasons to use Cloud Storage.

- You can access your photos from any device connected to the internet, this
 means that you no longer need to copy your photos from you phone to the
 computer before you can print them for example. It also means that you and
 view them on a bigger screen.
- 2) The best-known cloud storage services offer a secure online alternative to backing up data to a hard drive, so you will no longer need to copy your photos to a disc, and also means that do not have to worry if your computer fails, because your photos can be accessed from any device connected to the internet.

MAIDSTONE BOROUGH COUNCIL'S PROPOSED GARDEN COMMUNITY AT LENHAM HEATH: YOU WILL BE AFFECTED!

It is 'crunch time' in November as Maidstone Borough councillors will be making their decisions on which submissions for potential new housing sites across the borough will be included in their next Local Plan.

SOHL has been gearing up its campaign to lobby councillors. This is a final push to persuade them to 'throw out' the Garden Community proposal before Maidstone's next spatial strategy is approved by the Strategic Planning and Infrastructure Committee.

How will it affect you?

This development will affect everyone - it is not just the residents to the east of Lenham who will be affected, but all those living in the surrounding villages will feel the impact of the scheme with increased traffic on the roads and pressures on local facilities. The development will start just 0.6km from the edge of Lenham village.

Gridlocked roads – the A20 will see a 700% increase in traffic. Small country lanes will be used by heavy vehicles.

Junction 8 access at peak hours will be at a standstill – with no new motorway junction, traffic on the Leeds Castle roundabouts and surrounding roads will become more congested at peak times.

Overcrowded secondary school – MBC's proposal does not include building another secondary school.

Local health services – no new surgery is planned in the development. With another 8,000 people (at the minimum) living in the area, it will put more pressure on already overstretched GP services and increase waiting times.

Environment/climate change – this would be a car-dependent development. Car emissions and pollution will increase to unhealthy levels.

Our local countryside will be destroyed – once it is gone, it is gone forever.

Our communities will never be the same - once development starts, we could be looking at 10,000 houses being built.

30 years of building – if the proposal is approved, the building may start as early as 2027 and continue past 2050.

If Heathlands goes through, we need everyone to respond to the public consultation in December 2020.

Public consultation on the Local Plan will take place in December and will focus on the Council's preferred strategy (Regulation 18b). This means the Council will be asking for residents' views on whether future developments should be built close to towns or in more rural areas across the borough.

If the Heathlands Garden Community is still in the Local Plan Review, we need you to stand up and make your voice heard. This will be the time to put your letter writing skills into practise and make sure the Council knows your views on the scheme.

These are simple to make and can be quite addictive. Choose the strength of the hot sauce in the dip to suit your own taste. I would add a little at a time until you get the spice that is right for you. These are also perfect to make in an air fryer, as the outside becomes nice and crispy.

Spicey Chicken Meatballs with Spicy Mayo Dip

For the Meatballs:

1 tablespoon of vegetable oil

1 lb of minced chicken

1 large egg

1/2 cup of freshly grated Parmesan

1/4 cup of panko breadcrumbs

2 tablespoons of soy sauce

3 cloves of garlic, minced

1 teaspoon of ground cumin

A pinch of salt

Freshly ground black pepper Crushed red pepper flakes

For the Dipping Sauce:

½ cup of mayonnaise
2 tablespoons of hot sauce (such as Nando's Piri Piri)
2 teaspoons of clear honey
½ teaspoon of ground cumin

Oven Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 180° and grease a large baking sheet with vegetable oil.
- **2.** In a large bowl, combine the chicken, egg, Parmesan, breadcrumbs, soy sauce, garlic, and cumin. Season with salt, pepper, and a pinch of red pepper flakes. Roll mixture into 16 meatballs and place on prepared baking sheet.
- 3. Bake until golden and cooked through, about 15 minutes.

Air Fryer Method:

- **1.** In a large bowl, combine chicken, egg, Parmesan, panko, soy sauce, garlic, and cumin. Season with salt, pepper, and a pinch of red pepper flakes. Roll mixture into 16 meatballs.
- **2.** Working in batches, place the meatballs in the basket of the air fryer in a single layer. Bake at 180° until golden and cooked through, 12 minutes, flipping halfway through.

For the Dipping Sauce:-

- **1.** In a medium bowl, combine the mayonnaise, hot sauce, honey, and cumin and mix well
- **2.** Serve meatballs with spicy mayo for dipping.

Music Notes for November 2020

As I write this at the very beginning of October the only local concerts in sight are the u-tube performances put on by Sutton Valence Music Society. The second in the series, which I publicised last month, has not yet taken place. The third, for November, is not yet publicised. I hope it will happen because the one I have seen and heard – the September concert - was superb. The Sutton Valence School concert hall sounded a bit echo-ey without a significant audience, but the playing was excellent.

My recommendation for November is a concert from Milton Court, London, broadcast on radio 3 on 5^{th} November at 7.30pm. If you are not too busy with fireworks this looks to be a varied and interesting programme which includes Brahms Requiem and works by Amy Bryce and Bernstein.

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
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Quiet Time at the Computer Centre

Following the stringent measures of the Government's lockdown in March, the Egerton Computer Centre's Saturday morning computer clinic came to an abrupt halt, and since then the Computer Centre has been closed.

The committee agreed that the popular Saturday morning sessions would not re-start until the pandemic crisis has passed and things return to normal. As the pandemic lockdown and subsequent measures continue, some of the volunteers involved have growing concerns about what might happen in the future. Currently, the Computer Centre doubles as the Parish Council office, with the Parish Clerk working there on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The 'pop-up' Post Office uses the lobby of the Centre two days each week (Tuesday morning and Friday afternoon, to coincide with the Farmers' Market). Occasionally, small meetings also take place using the room, but its original use as a computer training centre ceased some time ago.

At present, the future of the Saturday morning computer clinic is uncertain, and depends very much on the ongoing support of computer-literate volunteers. As stated above, there will be no further sessions until the current restrictions are finally lifted, but the continued use of the Computer Centre in its present form will very much depend on the circumstances prevailing when things finally return to normal, whenever that might be.

Christian Message November 2020 - Testing Times

One of the hardest verses in the Bible for me has often been 1 Corinthians 10:13. In the New English Bible version it reads: No temptation has overtaken you except what is common to mankind. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can endure it." He will not allow the temptation to be more than you can stand.

I realise that it has seemed hard because it is so often miss-quoted as God not letting us <u>suffer</u> more than we can bear. It's a lovely thought but with colleagues, students, friends and relatives who have suffered depression, been suicidal or actually taken their lives, it certainly doesn't always seem that way.

Context is everything: The verse is about avoiding sin and that being a Christian does not exempt us from temptation. There is evil out there to avoid and there are consequences to the way in which we behave. The desire to give in and do wrong can be very great indeed but in response the Bible offers reassurance that overcoming-temptation is entirely possible. This is quite different from finding ourselves in bad situations. This doesn't mean we will never suffer or that people who are facing huge difficulties are necessarily doing wrong.

When too many things need doing at once, I know that I can feel panic just when I need to remain calm. My coping mechanism is to write a list, make a timetable and organise things into small manageable chunks, just as I encourage my students to do: "Don't try to conquer the world, just do the one thing you are doing at that moment."

Why didn't God save my university friend or my husband's cousin from suicide? Well, he <u>did</u> save my university friend many, many times in the help and support he received from friends and professionals over the years, but we all have free will and ultimately this meant that he did the one thing that he had been feeling for many years, was the only real route left open to him.

Many are the times I have thought 'If only he had rung and talked that night as he had done so many times before' but his suffering was such that he didn't want anyone to stop him. When another friend recently rang me to say he had tried to take his own life and failed, I literally ached at the thought of how much he, too, must have been suffering lately, but then leapt for joy that the Lord sent an elderly couple to his rescue just at the right moment.

The phrase '**No man is an island'**, made famous by John Donne, may be a cliché but it's a jolly good one. Our humanity is about relationships and we all need each other. Jesus taught us, simply, to love each other.

God does intervene if we let him. We can turn to him at any time and in any place and, generally people do want to be there for us. Whatever you are feeling or thinking during this very unusual and difficult year, please don't suffer in silence, or alone. Please pick up a phone and contact a family member, a friend, someone from Church, a local helpline of professional services.


