Mary Caroline Hope 1921-2014 a former resident of Grafty Green has died.

Mary Caroline Hope (nee Caporn) passed away peaceful in her sleep at her home in Maidstone on 16^{th} January aged 92 years. She leaves a widow Eric, son David and a daughter Paula and five grand children.

Mary was born at St. Catherines, Canada in 1921. She was the second child of Walter and Lilian Caporn. In 1926, the family returned to England and settled at Stream Farm, Grafty Green where Walter farmed until his death in 1941. Mary was one of five children and attended school at Boughton Malherbe (next to the Church) and subsequently Maidstone Girls Grammar School. The family took an active part in village life and Mary was voted May Queen on one occasion. During the War, Mary became a VAD like her mother and was actively nursing injured servicemen at military hospitals in the Kent. After the War she was employed in secretarial work.

Mary remained at Stream Farm with her widowed Mother until marrying Eric at St. Nicholas Boughton Malherbe in 1962. Mary and Eric lived in Maidstone. Mary was a kind, caring and much loved wife and mother. She enjoyed the countryside and gardening and was good with injured animals and birds nursing them back to health. She also had a great sense of fun.

Mary had a deep affection for Stream farm until it was sold and Boughton Malherbe Church, where she was a regular worshipper with her sister Ella until recently. It is hoped that Mary's funeral service will take place at Boughton Church, followed by private cremation at Charing. Anyone wishing to attend the funeral will be most welcome. There will be a notice in the Shop in due course.



Emergency Plan - Update

It was hoped that we would be in a position to have the plan in place sometime in February but there have been delays and after attending a recent conference at which our proposals were discussed it became clear that more work was needed to ensure compliance with updated guidelines before final presentation to the authorities. Furthermore, the feedback following the subsequent power failure emergency over Christmas which affected many residents has provided much food for thought and prompted a review of the plan.

Several people have asked why the plan was not in place and why those affected were not contacted to offer assistance if needed. These questions should be answered and the following highlights may help to demonstrate the difficulties.

- 1) Initially we advertised the intention to produce a plan and asked for volunteers to join the Emergency Committee which due to little interest was formed of only three members. We are now down to two and progress has been slow.
- 2) The additional work involved is considerable which will delay the plan being put in place further, at the moment we cannot give an estimated completion date.
- 3) When the power failed the village turned to self help between neighbours, where possible, but there was confusion because many people were away or going, some had no telephone service, the number of properties affected was not known, those people unaffected often found out much later, misunderstandings occurred, nobody contacted any member of the Parish Council or where possible telephoned the emergency plan number in the Parish magazine for assistance and whilst some members did offer help to those they understood might need it the task of contacting every household was simply not manageable. If anyone suffered as a result, particularly the vulnerable, we are sorry but we did advertise for nominations to go on our vulnerable persons list to cater for these types of emergencies and no one came forward. These are all factors to be taken into account before the plan is finalised.
- 4) Several residents helped others by running extension leads from an unaffected house to one without power or by loaning small generators. Just something to bear in mind in future is that mistakes with these set ups can prove lethal and doing so without proper knowledge is not worth the risk.

The committee would still welcome suggestions for inclusion in the emergency plan and once again we would appreciate receipt of nominations for inclusion in our list of vulnerable people such as the elderly, disabled or infirm to ensure that in emergency situations such as heavy snow, extended power failure or other circumstances that might render them house bound or in danger we can give them immediate offers of help. This is the last call.

Tackling Potholes

The dreadful weather over the Christmas period has caused considerable damage to Kent's roads. A new "Find and Fix" programme is now underway to repair damage on a priority basis. In a number of cases, work can only begin when the water table levels have subsided. For instance, asphalt pavement and block-paving repairs can only be carried out when water has drained away and the sub-surface is strong enough.

The Cabinet Member for Kent Highways, David Brazier, stated "the extreme wet weather will cause potholes and we have geared up to tackle this, making permanent, first-time fixes as

the first choice repair process. On occasion we will make a temporary repair until a permanent one can be programmed in. We are committed to repairing these within our service standard of 28 days. Our approach to maintenance, though, has meant at the close of the year, we reduced the average time to fix a pothole down to just 14 days. Our drainage systems and footpaths have been damaged where trees have been torn out by their roots. This work is also being programmed in for repair."

Leeds Road

The ongoing Leeds Road closure following collapse of part of Upper Street in early November continues to cause considerable inconvenience for local residents both in Leeds and in the surrounding parishes, but it is a very complex problem to fix. At the time of going to press, a ground radar survey was completed in Milners to determine whether there were any further voids within 2m of the road surface. The ground here is still very soft but the survey confirmed that there were no further voids near to the surface of the road and that is was safe to operate a third rig on this part of the site, and the information collected here informed the remediation works for the larger drilling and grouting rig that arrived on site on 27 January.

The two rigs working to the south of the site (outside 3 Milners and to the rear of 5 Churchill Cottages) have made good progress and are currently slightly ahead of schedule. Unfortunately, they discovered voids up to 27m deep. This is twice as deep as was previously found and will have an impact on the time it takes to complete the remediation work. Kent Highways staff and contractors are continuing to work seven days a week to keep this to a minimum and are meeting with the affected properties' loss adjustors once a week to ensure that the programme progresses as in a timely manner.

Supporting Older People

Statistics suggest between 13,855 and 44,336 people aged over 65 in Kent could be suffering from loneliness and 33,525 over-65s could be socially isolated. During the cold, wet winter months, vulnerable people can feel even more cut off from those around

them. People do not need to suffer in silence and information on KCC's Adult Social Care services can be found on www.kent.gov.uk or call 03000 41 61 61. Among the services available are:

- Befriending: Volunteer befrienders have been recruited across Kent to visit elderly
 people. It aims to help people live more fulfilled lives, reduce social exclusion,
 increase access to community resources, information and advice, improve health and
 wellbeing, and to help people become more independent.
- **Dementia support services**: There are dementia cafes and peer support groups across the county. KCC's Shared Lives adult placement scheme, which offers long-and short-term fostering for vulnerable adults, has also been extended to include people with dementia. There are Read Aloud sessions for people living with dementia as part of the Dementia Friendly Libraries project. Twelve dementia-friendly communities are being developed to increase awareness, reduce stigma of the disease and encourage communities to support people living with dementia.
- Carer Support: More than 150,000 people in Kent are carers for a sick, elderly and disabled relative and this can take a huge emotional and physical toll. The carer assessment and support service offers advice, guidance and information as well as practical and emotional support. The Carers Short Breaks service also offers the opportunity to get respite from their caring role.
- **The Good Day Programme**: Offers adults with learning disabilities the opportunity to take part in activities, to learn new skills and get involved in the community.
- **The Care Navigator Service**: this service is run by voluntary agencies across Kent and offers free and impartial advice to over-50s who feel they may need extra support to stay independent in their own home.
- Support for deaf blind people: The Kent Dual Sensory team's main aim is to increase independence. This includes provision of specialist equipment, one-to-one communication and guiding support and learning new communication skills. The Kent Association for the Blind has a Guide Communicator service with one-to-one specialist support workers to help reduce isolation by supporting deaf blind people to remain independent, access the community, maintain social contact and minimise reliance on friends and family. KAB also provides a befriending scheme for visually impaired people. Other services are also available.

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Grafty Gourmet

Yet another very simply recipe for you to try. This is a great alternative to seafood risotto. Long-grain rice can be used instead of risotto rice, but it won't give you the traditional, creamy texture that is typical of Italian risottos. I usually use unsalted cashew nuts, instead of peanuts, but either will do.

Italian Chicken Risotto - Serves 4

2 tbsp sunflower oil
15 g (1/2 oz)1 tbsp butter or
margarine
1 medium leek, thinly sliced
1 large yellow pepper, diced
3 skinless, boneless chicken breasts,
diced
350 g (12 oz) risotto rice

A few strands of saffron 1.5 litres (2 3/4 pints) chicken stock 200 g (7 oz) can sweet corn (drained) 60 g (2 oz) 1/2 cup toasted unsalted peanuts or cashew nuts 60 g (2 oz) 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese Salt and Pepper

- 1. Heat the sunflower oil and butter or margarine in a large saucepan. Fry the leek and pepper for 1 minute, then stir in the chicken and cook, stirring until golden brown.
- 2. Stir in the risotto rice and cook for 2 3 minutes.
- 3. Stir in the saffron strands and salt and pepper to taste. Add the chicken stock, a little at a time, cover and cook over a low heat, stirring occasionally, for about 20 minutes, or until the rice is tender and most of the liquid has been absorbed. Do not let the risotto dry out add more stock if necessary.
- 4. Stir in the sweet corn, peanuts or cashew nuts and Parmesan cheese. Then season with salt and pepper to taste and stir for a further 2 minutes.



Community First Responder Scheme

At the time of writing a further meeting is to take place and an updated result will have been given at the Parish Council meeting (28th January) - also Lenham CFR (and CFR Trainer/Mentor) will have given a short presentation to the Council.

I have to report that the recruitment process with South east Coast Ambulance is painfully slow, lacking any structured timescale right through to operational readiness. Two other prospective local volunteers have been in the process I understand for approaching a year and have yet to do the training course. I applied in August and despite attending several meetings as required have yet to receive an official application form! Realistically we have to assume we are many months away from seeing a local scheme off the ground; even after training there is no guide to the level of and availability of kit.

Given the situation and that CFR training is little different from conventional first aid training I have implemented a temporary help scheme for emergencies the main difference is rather than being alerted by the 999 call centre it will be necessary to phone the mobile number given on the emergency contacts sheet elsewhere in the magazine. At this stage a defibrillator nor oxygen is available, however although important, in a cardiac arrest this is secondary to starting immediate CPR (resuscitation) and maintain it until paramedics arrive. CPR and other life saving skills are easy to learn and hopefully this training will be on offer in the village very soon. It is also hoped to provide a 'public access' defibrillator - this will be at a key location in a locked weather proof cabinet, the ambulance 999 control centre holding the key combination which they would give to relevant local 999 callers.

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Two Maidstone Borough Council news releases

Pyramidion of Wedjahor Display at Maidstone Museum

Prior to the redevelopment of the Museum's Egyptian Gallery, a taste of ancient Egypt comes to Maidstone in the form of a Spotlight loan from the British Museum. The Pyramidion of Wedjahor will be on display at Maidstone Museum from 14th February to 14th June 2014.



This Pyramidion capstone of a small Egyptian pyramid, which stood over the tomb of a wealthy official named Wedjahor. It dates from the 7th century BC and is carved with scenes mummification and the afterlife. In one of them, the deceased kneels in worship before the god Osiris, king of the underworld, his consort and four gods protected the deceased's vital organs. On two other sides he worships aspects of the sun god, seated on solar barques. fourth side the deceased's corpse is shown embalmed being

jackal-headed god Anubis, with his organs placed in jars beneath the bier, and with the goddesses Isis and Nephthys mourning his death. Each side also shows Anubis as a jackal recumbent on top of a chest.

Maidstone Museum's own Egyptian collection includes a number of fascinating artefacts, including the mummy of a lady named Ta-kesh, daughter of the Doorkeeper of Osiris, Pa-muta (25th – early 26th Dynasty). The mummy was brought to England in the 1820s and purchased at a customs house sale by Sir William Geary of Hadlow, who presented it to a local philosophical society in about 1835. It was opened in 1843 by Samuel Birch, of the British Museum, and a local physician, H. W. Diamond, who made the cuts in the skull and abdomen. Subsequently it was presented to the Thomas Charles Museum, housed in this building, and was bequeathed to the town of Maidstone with the rest of his collection in 1855.

Lions on track to help keep Air Ambulance flying at night

Night-flying Kent, Surrey & Sussex Air Ambulance is appealing for runners, swimmers and cyclists to sign up for this year's Tonbridge Lions Triathlon and help save lives 24 hours a day.

Lions Clubs across the South East have pledged to raise £250,000 for the Mardenbased charity over the next 10 years.

The funds will be a significant contribution towards the additional £1million-a-year needed to provide a 24-hour service which was launched last month (December 18th).

The triathlon is to be held on May 5th at Tonbridge School's sports complex which was used by the Australian Olympic team as a training base for the London 2012 games.

Competitors can choose a sprint consisting of a 400-metre swim, 25km ride and 5km run or the standard route which is double the distance.

Triathlon chairman Tom Simmons said: "This is the second year the Tonbridge Lions Club has arranged for the Tonbridge Triathlon to be linked up with Kent, Surrey & Sussex Air Ambulance.

"We once again welcome the opportunity to be able to offer the means for the general public to take part in the triathlon and also raise funds for this much-loved and vital charity.

"The Air Ambulance needs approximately £6m each year to maintain their service in the counties and provide 24- hour cover. The pilots, doctors and paramedics are extremely dedicated to their task and deserve all our support."

Tonbridge was the first Lions club launched in the UK in 1949 and has raised more than £275,000 for charity in the last 10 years. The triathlon alone has raised more than £125,000 over 24 years and organisers are aiming to raise a total of £13,000 from this year's event.

Streams In The Desert

Women's World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world; their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is extensive. An international committee works from New York and each participating country has its own national committee. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at St. Mary's Church, Lenham and at All Saints' Church, Ulcombe a service will be held on Friday, March 7th. Women and men will gather to celebrate using a programme of worship offered this year by women in Egypt.

The theme of our service is 'Streams in the Desert' and we are asked to reflect on our Christian role of being a 'stream in the desert'.

One of the oldest civilisations in the world, Egypt has long been home to Coptic Christians. Since the uprising in 2011 there has been conflict between religious groupings. Political changes affects individual lives and we pray with the women of Egypt for peace.

We envisage a great annual wave of prayer, rising with the sun over the island of Samoa and then sweeping across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas, coming to rest in American Samoa some 36 hours later. By then services will have taken place in over 170 countries.

Christian Message - February 2014

As I write this, at the beginning of the New Year, the country is being battered by storms, and thousands of people are coping with floods, loss of electricity, the devastation of their homes, and loss of their livelihoods. Christmas was spoilt for many – though some say that coping by candlelight, wrapped in blankets, and cooking sausages on barbecues instead of eating the Christmas turkey, led to a lot of laughter and camaraderie.

But it's not just here that there are problems. At the moment, parts of the USA are suffering from unprecedented weather conditions, and we cannot forget that the many peoples across the world who suffered from earthquakes, tsunami's,

tornados and storms last year, are still living in tents and waiting to be housed properly. We tend to forget the ongoing consequences of such events once the immediate crisis is over.

We cannot do a great deal about the weather, but if there were greater love and tolerance in the world, we would not see countries torn apart by internal strife such as in Syria, Sudan, and the Central African Republic, nor the many countries where there is civil unrest and strife such as in Afghanistan, Pakistan, Libya, Somalia, Iraq and South Sudan — to name just a few. Sadly, there are thousands of displaced persons, refugees, living in horrific conditions with little chance of returning to their homeland.

In the birthplace of our Saviour, Jesus Christ, Bethlehem is partitioned off by a huge concrete wall, 8 metres high, which is planned to cover 442 miles round the city, separating the Palestinians from the Israelis. A replica of this has now been built at St James Church in Piccadilly, as a witness to the injustice that is happening to the Palestinians. People who visit St. James are being invited to write prayers and messages of hope on the wall.

Just looking at the state of the world makes one realise how very fortunate we are here in this country. We have a stable state, we can disagree with government through the ballot box rather than through bloodshed, we can walk the streets in safety, we receive medical care as and when we need it, and most of us have a roof over our heads. We have much to thank God for - though we don't always acknowledge it.

But, and there is a big but, though we are a comparatively affluent society, there are many in our society who are still sleeping rough, and many more who are having to resort to food banks to survive. Over Christmas, 350,000 people were fed by food banks – largely the initiative of Christian churches.

So what can we do about all this sadness and injustice in the world? The answer, surely, is that we can do nothing in our own strength. But we can pray both individually and corporately, and we can try and live as Jesus taught.

Many of the parables of Jesus are about generosity, love and forgiveness.

He said that if someone asked you to give him your cloak, you should give your coat also. He talked about the generosity of the Good Samaritan, and he warned people not to store their riches in barns because one knows not when one's time on earth is over.

When a young man asked Jesus what was the most important commandment, He replied, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind ... and the second is to love your neighbour as yourself.' When the disciples asked Jesus if they should forgive seven times, He replied, not seven but seven times seventy. He said people should be reconciled with their enemies before going up to the altar. And in his parable about the prodigal son, the father forgave his son unreservedly even though he didn't deserve it. On the Cross, Jesus asked God to forgive those who were crucifying Him 'because they know not what they do.'

As Christians, we, too, will receive forgiveness if we believe that Jesus Christ died for us – even though we don't deserve it.

So, what can we do about the world's problems? Individually, we can do very little. But we can start by putting into practice Our Lord's commandments to love our neighbours, and be generous and forgiving — and maybe that ripple of love, accompanied by prayer, may gradually permeate the world.
