The Council meets on the second Monday of the month in the Thomas Hughes Memorial Hall, at 7.30pm. All residents are welcome to attend these meetings and raise any issues; we will make it easy for you by having an "open forum" session early in the meeting (normally 8.00 pm) at which issues may be raised and discussed. The agenda is published on the Parish Council website and notice board at least three clear days before the meeting. We particularly welcome residents with planning applications that are to be considered at the meeting, to come and tell us about the application and explain any specific points which they may wish to make.

As will be seen, Karen Pilcher and Paul Coad have stood down; the Council and the village owes both of them a vote of thanks for all their efforts.

Paul was co-opted onto the Council 2 years ago and we would like to thank him for his regular attendance at all meetings and his contributions to our discussions and projects during that time.

Karen was on the Council for 15 years and has been a wonderful source of support, wise advice and personal hard graft, in many ways – as councillor and as Vice Chair for the last 12 months. She took the lead on the village trail project and on replacing the playground equipments – both very successful projects to improve the facilities available to the village, which were funded by the S106 contributions from the Jacksmeadow development. She was also key to the restoration of the Old School Room - to mention but three major projects in the last year or so. She will be much missed by the Parish Council, although she has agreed to retain a role in a number of matters. We are pleased that she will continue as Curator of the Tom Brown's School Museum and a member of the Uffington Museum Trustees. She took on the role of Curator in 2016, and she has chaired the Uffington Museum Trustees since 2008. The success of the exhibitions to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the construction of the Old School Room in 2017 and the 100th anniversary of the end of World War 1 last year, owed much to Karen's imagination, enthusiasm and personal hard work.

In place of Karen and Paul, we welcome Dale Pilchowski and Nigel Puddicombe to the Parish Council; we would like to thank them for putting themselves forward and we look forward to working with them.

District Council

We would like to thank Robert Sharp, who has stood down from the Vale District Council after many years' service, and recently as our representative on the Vale District Council, as member for the Stanford ward. Despite other commitments, Robert has attended almost all of our meetings and offered much sound advice. In his place, we welcome Nathan Boyd who was elected on 2 May.

Communications Survey April 2019

Background

1. With one of the Parish Council's objectives for 2019 being to improve communications with our parishioners, it was decided to conduct a short survey to establish a baseline and identify areas for improvement.
2. The survey was carried out on paper and on line during the month of April. There were 54 respondents with approximately a third replying on line.

Summary of Findings

1. The number of respondents (54) was disappointing, but probably representative of those most interested in the events and affairs of the village.
2. 85% felt that the amount of information from the Parish Council was 'about right'.
3. The most popular (88%) form of communication was the Weekly Email followed by The Courier, Website and Nextdoor.
4. 84% read The Courier and 80% wish to retain it and there was a wide range of suggestions for changes to the content.
5. There was general support for advertising in The Courier with many wanting 'local tradesman' advertisements and agreeing that advertisements should be charged for to help defray the cost.
6. Most responses were positive and supportive. There was one particularly negative response, which also contained some constructive suggestions.

Way Ahead. Generally, the Parish Council is pleased that we seem to have got it 'about right'. We will shortly be considering the more detailed responses and suggestions, and identify those which should be followed up, and how. We will report on this in due course.

Parking on Broad Street by the School

Please do NOT park, for however short a period of time, on the yellow zig zag lines outside the School, or on the white line which runs from the Church gate back towards the Museum. Both are there for an important purpose - which is to make it possible for children to enter and leave the playground safely. Despite repeated reminders, this request is still ignored by some users of the school. It is a parking offence to park on these lines and you may be liable for penalties.

Referendum on the Uffington and Baulking Neighbourhood Plan

On Thursday 4 July residents voted FOR the adoption of the Uffington and Baulking neighbourhood plan. The official results were as follows:

- Votes in favour of adopting the neighbourhood plan (YES vote): 193 (87.7%)
- Votes against adopting the neighbourhood plan (No vote): 27 (12.3%)
- Turnout: 29.9%

Uffington Parish Council and Baulking Parish Meeting are very pleased with this outcome and thank all those who voted in the referendum. This is the culmination of more than 3 years' work and we would like to thank all members of the NP Steering Group, under the chairmanship of Rob Hart, very much for all the time, effort and dedication which has been put in to achieve this result. We also wish to thank all residents who turned out for the Steering Group's consultation meetings; your enthusiasm, comments and feedback were crucial to the drafting and eventual adoption of the NP, which will be used to inform future planning decisions in our two villages.

Once the NP passes referendum it holds weight in planning terms - Section 3 of the Neighbourhood Planning Act 2017 gives neighbourhood plans full legal effect once they have passed their local referendum.

The Vale's actions now are to take a report to cabinet and council on the 12th and 17th July (respectively) which recommends they approve the making of the Uffington and Baulking Neighbourhood Plan. They have to base their decision on two aspects; whether the plan has had a positive result at referendum and whether making the plan will breach EU regulations. There is a 6 week legal challenge period.

Planning applications in Uffington (with Vale reference number) – since the last edition of the Courier:

- The following have been **approved** by the Vale District Council:
- P18/V2632/FUL (formerly P18/V2632/RM) - Land adjacent to Dragon Hill. Reserved matters application following on from previous outline planning

approval P15/V2017/O for erection of a single dwelling (all matters reserved apart from access). (Revised application).

- P19/V2073/HH – Meadowbrook, 4 Fawler Road. Demolish existing garage and construct new drive and outbuilding.
- P19/V0429/HH – Cuckoo Cottage, High Street. Proposed single storey rear extension.
- P19/V0450/HH – Symes Cottage, Broad Street. Proposed single storey rear extension.
- P19/V0546/FUL - The Hawthorns, Lower Common. Development work.

The following has been **refused**:

- P18/V2199/O - Outline application with all matters reserved bar access, for erection of 20 dwellings, provision of allotment parking, drainage, public open space and ancillary works, on Land east of Fernham Road Uffington.

The following are **awaiting determination**:

- P19/V1075/HH - Little Thatch, Broad Street. Alterations to access, driveway and front garden.
- P19/V1077/HH - Packers Forge, High Street. Two storey rear extension, internal remodelling, removal of outbuilding and erection of three-bay garage.

Appeal

- The appeal against the refusal of planning permission for 2 self-build dwellings at land to the southwest of Dragon Hill, Uffington, has been allowed; planning permission has been granted in accordance with the terms of the application, Ref P18/V0003/O.

New planning applications

We have said this before, but we encourage those intending to submit an application to the Planning department at The Vale District Council to discuss them with the Parish Council at an early stage. We may be able to help you to avoid unnecessary errors which serve to downgrade the quality of the application. There is an opportunity to do this in the Open Forum at every monthly meeting – usually at 8.00pm. If in doubt, please contact any member of the Council.

Jacksmeadow – Section 106 Contributions

As part of the planning approval for the development of Jacksmeadow, certain sums of money were required to be paid to the parish, district and county councils as contributions towards the additional infrastructure and facilities required to support additional residents. These facilities may be located within Uffington parish (e.g. Public Art) or further afield if shared (e.g. Secondary Schools or Swimming Pools).

The project to install more seating and two picnic tables on the Jubilee Field has been completed; we are very pleased to see these improvements to community facilities in frequent use.

There is some money left and we would welcome fresh ideas or applications for grants towards projects which would be of benefit to the Uffington community. Please contact any member of the Parish Council to discuss an idea.

NOTICES

The countryside. At the Parish Council meeting on 10 June, two important points were made for the attention of all those who walk through local fields with their dogs:

1. Dogs should be kept on leads on footpaths through fields housing livestock. If sheep are chased by a dog, the owner has the right to shoot it. If cattle threaten you with a dog on the lead, let the dog go – the cattle will be more interested in the dog than its owner!
2. Please always pick up and dispose of dog poo responsibly – in a bin, and never to be left dangling in a hedge. This includes when going through pastures; dog faeces contain Neospora. Neospora is a protozoan parasite (i.e. a microscopic, unicellular parasite organism) that can invade, live and multiply inside animal cells. It is one of the most frequently diagnosed infectious causes of abortion in cattle worldwide.

Universal Credit being used in new scam – Citizens Advice

Universal Credit has well and truly arrived - but now scammers are using the benefit as a pivotal part of a new sting to target vulnerable people.

Citizens Advice says scammers are offering loans to their victims and then using their personal banking details to apply for Universal Credit in their names.

The scam is usually carried out by telephone, so do not accept a loan if you have been contacted by cold calling. If you are contacted in this way, just hang up. In general, personal details should not be divulged on the telephone or in an email.

The Universal Credit scam is also being carried out in public places. As victims leave job centres and pubs, they are approached by smartly dressed people claiming to be from the Department of Work and Pensions, who then offer "government loans". Instead, the victim is signed up for Universal Credit. The scammers then apply for an advance payment of the benefit. This payment goes to the victim's bank account but the scammers then charge a huge fee, around 50 per cent, for this unnecessary "service".

Citizens Advice has its own free service to help those applying for Universal Credit for the first time. "Help to Claim" is available over the telephone, face to face, and online through "webchat" and Internet content.

The national Freephone number for Help to Claim is **0800 144 8444**. Telephone and webchat services are available from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. (Monday-Friday)

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse district councils' new anti-idling campaign

Councils are asking drivers to 'Turn it off' if they are stopped for a minute or more

Just one minute of sitting with your car engine running and the vehicle not moving produces the equivalent of 150 balloons of harmful pollutants into the air. This is why South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse district councils have launched a joint campaign to help improve air quality across southern Oxfordshire.

The campaign called 'Turn it Off' - www.southandvale.gov.uk/turnitoff - which has been endorsed by Public Health England - is aimed at drivers who leave their engines 'idling' - still running even when the vehicle is not moving.

Air pollution has been identified by a number of organisations including the World Health Organisation, United Nations and the Royal College of Physicians as the biggest environmental risk to health. A recent report from Public Health England estimated that within the UK, air pollution is linked to up to 36,000 deaths each year.

Older people and children are most sensitive to air pollutants. Keeping the engine running while parked contributes to an increase of air pollutant levels. Schools, traffic lights and bus stops are most likely locations for idling. The councils' new campaign 'Turn it off' aims to educate people about air pollution and the links to engine idling and promoting cleaner ways to drive, as follows:

- Switch off when the car is likely to be stopped for more than 1 minute
- 1 minute of idling produces twice as many emissions as a moving vehicle
- 1 minute of idling produces the equivalent of 150 balloons of harmful pollutants
- Excessive idling is a waste of fuel (and money)
- People inside cars are exposed to high levels of air pollution, with children especially at risk of harmful effects

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UFFINGTON BAULKING AND WOOLSTONE MINIBUS ASSOCIATION

Our community minibus, which seats 16 people plus a driver, exists for use by all within our villages and the surrounding area, for social and recreational activities. A team of volunteer drivers operates regular shopping trips, and the minibus may also be reserved by local groups and individual members of the community for their own purposes.

It is necessary for villagers and local groups to join the UBW Minibus Association in order to use the minibus. Membership is available to all, and there is no charge to join.

The shopping trips are to Faringdon every Tuesday and Wantage every Wednesday and Friday. We leave Patricks Orchard, Uffington at 9.30, picking up and setting down members where convenient for them.

The Association is run on a 'not for profit' basis. There is a modest fare for the shopping trips, and Bus Passes may be used.

Group and individual private bookings are charged a flat fee of £20, plus 80p per mile driven, plus VAT. Insurance and fuel are included.

The Association has an ongoing need for new volunteers to drive or assist with administration, in order to sustain our activities. The driving commitment is about one morning a month. A full car licence is required, and training is provided.
