Minutes from last month's meeting

UR speaker this month was Melanie Gibson-Barton who spoke to us about the life of Edith Cavell.

Miss Cavell grew up in Norfolk where her father was a parson. She was born in 1865, and in 1888 went abroad with her family to Belgium.

Eventually she got a job as a governess there, and after starting training as a nurse at 30 she returned to work in the country. When World War I broke out she worked for the Red Cross.

As well as helping the wounded of both sides in the war she became a cog in the escape network, smuggling soldiers and civilians to the Dutch border.

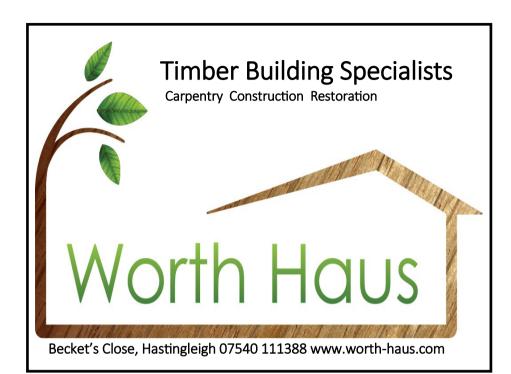
Eventually she was caught, charged with treason and sentenced to death on October 12th 1915. She said, 'Think of me as a nurse who

tried to do her duty.' She admitted being instrumental in conveying about 60 British and 15 French soldiers as well as about 100 French and Belgian civilians of military age to the frontier and had sheltered most of them in her house.

She was executed by firing squad and her body was brought home in 1919 and buried in Norwich Cathedral. One of her pall bearers was one of the men she helped.

After our speaker, we covered items of business, including our meal our for our May meeting as the hall will be used for the elections. Mrs Helmer won the competition and Mrs Bowes won the flower of the month.

One from the archives...

In 1885 justice played a harsh tune for an Italian job that ended in Hastingleigh

Cutting from a Kent newspaper of 29 Aug 1885

ICHELE Morgi and Cushini Ciccoritti, Italian organ grinders, were charged with stealing eleven eggs. Giovanni Bonough (Ashford) was sworn as interpreter.

A police constable stationed at Petham said that on Thursday afternoon he went in search of the prisoners and overtook them in the parish of **Hastingleigh**.

After they had finished playing their tune, he asked them where they had come from.


They said they came from Canterbury, and he found in Morgi's pocket eleven eggs.

Ciccoritti said a lady gave them to him. Witness took prisoners to the lady (Mrs Sutton) who said she had given them four pence and a pint of beer. Ciccoritti eventually said they took the eggs from a hedge in Petham, and offered witness 15 shillings to let them go.

He took prisoners to Mr Marchant's farm at Petham, and they showed him the hedge they had taken the eggs from.

The eggs were taken from the field side of the hedge. The interpreter said that in Italy anything found in the hedge by the side of a road was considered lost.

Superintendent Wood said defendants had been in custody since Thursday.

Gardeners are told to prune and burn

PORMER lecturer at Hadlow College Caroline Halfpenny gave a talk to the Gardeners' Society, inspiring an audience of nearly the full membership to get out into their gardens.

We were told to prune, prune and prune again. Unknown samples were passed round with the advice that we should be cutting our winter flowering plants such as Winter Jasmine right down ready for next year's growth.

Roses, being pruned in the winter, need feeding in April. We should also prune Azaleas and Rhododendrons after flowering.

Derek's Fig needs its suckers removed to stop the branches crossing over the main stem.

She reminded us that Garden Centres are now selling lots of tender plants. Perhaps they hope they will get caught by frost and you will buy more! She advised us to cut them back and mulch them. Continuing on the theme she told us to cut the black leaves off hellebores AND BURN THEM, after which we sterilise the secateurs.

Snowdrops can be moved in flower or not quite safely, but NEVER TAMPER with your daffodils until seed boxes are mature.

If you are buying-in summer bedding, we were advised to place them against a warm wall and fleece on a cold night.

Meanwhile you could split up your perennial geraniums and plant out in 3s or 5s. Dogwood/willow need to be pruned in the Spring to acquire red stems. The prunings could be used immediately for hardwood cuttings.

Caroline reminded us to take back Hebe/Buddleia Davidii to 3-4" in March. She suggested that if you wanted differential flowering you could prune to different heights.

Camellias can be pruned after flowering, but needs to be well watered in July.

Of course the subject of weeds came up. The big secrets were recognising the young specimens and dealing with them.

Caroline favoured the hand-collection of slugs and snails. Members had their questions answered and many went home with cuttings of their own.

Timing is all in the spring garden

NE of the most important aspects of gardening is timing. By timing I mean doing the jobs when the weather and the opportunity coincide.

This year the fine weather in early March has offset the earlier wet period. It has stimulated plant growth and the few frosts have allowed some plants to survive the winter when they would normally not do so.

It has also allowed many weeds to germinate, develop and seed again. Weeding early is therefore crucial at this time of year to prevent a build-up of weeds later in the season.

While the weather is fine digging the vegetable patch is easier in the dry periods; this opens the soil allowing more air in providing oxygen for the plant roots and soil organisms allowing them to be more active. Spreading organic

material such as compost opens the texture of the soil and and releases fertilizer. It is therefore a good time to introduce inorganic fertilizer to the soil, particularly those that contain nitrogen such as Growmore because the winter rains will have washed away much nitrogen.

Digging around perennials to loosen the soil will improve their development. Adding slow release fertilizer like hoof and horn will encourage healthier plants.

It is important to remember when you cut and remove plant material you are removing nutrients (fertilizer) and this should be replaced. This is particularly important with the lawn. Now is the time to weed and feed the lawn.

There is still time to move shrubs and perennials taking care to cut back soft growth. Make sure they are firmly in the ground and where necessary give support.

Plants control their temperature by evaporating water from their leaves.

To do this they must get a supply from the soil through their roots, so cutting back the top of a plant when replanting compensates for the inability of the roots to supply water and gives time for new roots to develop as the plant develops.

Tidy up now and make the summer more enjoyable.

The Parish upon the Hills

EMEMBRANCE Sunday last year happened just a couple of days after the surprise election of Donald Trump as the 45th President of the United States.

This was the second major political earthquake to hit the Western World in 2016 – the other being Brexit, obviously – and, arguably, both were/are manifestations of the same tectonic shift: namely, widespread dissatisfaction with the liberal hegemony that has held sway for the last however many years.

Well, I don't know about that but, as I said in my Remembrance Day sermon, I am painfully aware that both our country and the USA are deeply divided and in a really destructive way with both 'sides' looking at the other with a mixture of contempt and non-comprehension, thinking that their 'opponents' are stupid at best if not downright evil!

That sort of attitude is never helpful. And I would like to think that the late Jo Cox MP who was tragically murdered around the time of the Brexit vote was right when she said that we 'have far more in common

with each other than things that divide us'.

And the Remembrance Sunday service was proof of that for me: people from all across the political spectrum, regular churchgoers and non-churchgoers alike gathered together to remember both those who died in the two world wars and those for whom war is a present day reality.

I found it inspiring, and a vision of the kind of unity that is possible even in our increasingly diverse society.

So, when I heard that Jo Cox's family were inviting the nation to a weekend of celebration – the Great Get Together – to affirm this idea that we are one nation, in spite of all our differences, I wanted to get involved.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has already pledged his support (along with the Chief Rabbi and other religious leaders) and everyone in the church community I've spoken to has been similarly enthusiastic. But this is much more than a church



SUTHERLAND in the Great Karoo was a great surprise. It was only a tiny desert town, but it is also home to the biggest telescope in the Southern Hemisphere.

A mini industry has grown up around star gazing and the guy that owns the campsite where we stayed runs star-gazing sessions, using his four satellite controlled telescopes.

Sutherland was chosen for the SALT (Southern African Long range Telescope) project due to its location, at high altitude and almost zero light pollution.

We had a great evening with Jurg, showing us stars and constellations, then the following day we drove to SALT and had a guided tour. Much of what was said went straight over our heads, but it was a great couple of days.

It's a friendly town, with guesthouses, restaurants and coffee shops. very dry area of desert), and was given a burial complete with headstone by the townspeople.

During a few days just outside the Northern Cape town of Uppington, we booked our camping in the Kgalagadi Transfrontier Park.

We had heard good things about Kgalagadi and it didn't disappoint. It is famous for the Kalahari black-maned Lions and we were hoping to see these and maybe our first wild Cheetahs of this trip.

We were self-driving in our Daf lorry, and unlike many parks that we have visited on this trip (especially Tanzania, and Kenya), self-driving is the norm and there were no 'safari vehicles' in the park at all, which leads to a much more relaxed and friendly experience.

There are also no Tarmac roads in the park (unlike the zoo-like Kruger) with all the tracks being either gravel or sand (mostly sand).

We ended up staying in Kgalagadi for seven nights, and absolutely loved the place. We ended



Oh, and Cheetah. We saw many of these beautiful elegant cats, including many mothers with youngsters, and again watched some stalking their prey in the long green grass.

It is the height of the summer here at the moment and is the wet season. This year there has been plentiful rain, which is fantastic for the wildlife but not so good for game spotting. That is unless you are in the cab of Colonel K.

We had a massive advantage over the Land Cruisers and Land Rovers due to our height and we could actually see over the high grass.

We crossed into Namibia at Mata Mata and as commercial traffic is forbidden this is probably the quickest and easiest land border that we have done on the trip, actually a pleasant experience, especially once Jac gave the Head Policeman's toddler son a cuddly soft dinosaur. We then spent about a week at various places on our way to Windhoek, the capital of Namibia. We are currently camped right in the city centre at the appropriately named Urban Camp, where we are preparing the truck before storing it near the airport.

Yup, we are coming back to the UK, flights are booked. The plan is that we will return to Namibia in approx August or September and stay in Southern Africa for a further five or six months before shipping Colonel K back to the UK in 2018 from South Africa.

So, this will be my last entry for the Community News from lorrywaydown here in Africa. I hope you have enjoyed reading about our trip and our mini adventures en route.

For us it is just a pause on this trip and will look forward to returning, but we will be covering areas that we have been to before over those six months.

A study in healthier lifestyles

PAPER I reviewed recently showed that a healthy lifestyle, defined as 'not smoking, eating large quantities of fruit and vegetables, physical activity and a body/mass index of less than 30' reduced the risk of heart disease by 50% when compared with an 'unhealthy' group based on the same criteria.

Another study, reported by the Guardian, this time from Imperial College suggesting that 'Eating up to 800g of fruit and vegetables – equivalent to 10 portions and double the recommended amount in the UK – was associated with a 24% reduced risk of heart disease, a 33% reduced risk of stroke, a 28% reduced risk of cardiovascular disease, a 13% reduced risk of total cancer, and a 31% reduction in premature deaths.

Those are serious numbers, if we were all to adopt such a diet, it would have a massive impact on mortality and morbidity in this country. Another interesting article reported that vitamin D reduced the

risk of colds and flu by boosting an anti-microbial substance, cathelicidin. The impact is small, reducing the numbers infected by about 2%, but given that there are millions of people affected each year, the actual number of infections avoided would be large.

Vitamin D is also recommended in children under 5, pregnant and breast-feeding mums and the elderly as well as those who cover their skin.

Vitamin D is activated by exposure to the sun, so in the winter we often become mildly deficient.

You can buy Vitamin D in the supermarket and it is found in most vitamin pills. Find more information on the nhs choices website.

On an unrelated topic, The University of Bristol led a trial looking at the impact of statins in reducing the risk of thrombosis, blood clots that can lead to fatal lung clots.

In 23 randomised controlled trials, involving 100,000 patients, there was a 15% reduced risk of venous thrombosis in those taking statins compared to a placebo group.

There may now be a role for prescribing statins in those at high risk of venous thrombosis. It is thought that statins 'downregulate the coagulation cascade' which is a series of reactions occurring in the blood that eventually lead to a blot clot being formed.


