Get cooking!

The **OFFICIAL PLATINUM PUDDING RECIPE** will take some pluck! But if mine looks anything like this I'll be more than happy.



For this recipe you will need 2 Swiss roll tins, measuring approximately 24cmx34cm/9½inx13½in and a trifle dish with capacity of approximately 3.5 litres/6 pints.

20 servings, however, you could always halve the recipe to serve 10.

Preparation time over 2 hours

Cooking time 30 mins to 1 hour

Ingredients

For the Swiss rolls

- 4 large free-range eggs
- 100g/3½oz caster sugar, plus extra for dusting
- 100g/3½oz self-raising flour, sieved
- butter, for greasing

For the lemon curd

- 4 large free-range egg yolks
- 135g/4¾oz granulated sugar
- 85g/3oz salted butter, softened
- 1 lemon, zest only
- 80ml/2½fl oz fresh lemon juice

For the St Clement's jelly

- 6 gelatine leaves
- 4 unwaxed lemons
- 3 oranges
- 150g/5½oz golden caster sugar

For the custard

- 425ml/15fl oz double cream
- 3 large free-range egg yolks
- 25g/1oz golden caster sugar
- 1 tbsp cornflour
- 1 tsp lemon extract

For the amaretti biscuits

- 2 free-range egg whites
- 170g/6oz caster sugar
- 170g/6oz ground almonds
- 1 tbsp amaretto
- butter or oil, for greasing

For the chunky mandarin coulis

- 4x tins mandarins, around 300g each
- 45g/1¾oz caster sugar
- 16g/½oz arrowroot (2 sachets)
- ½ lemon, juice only

For the jewelled chocolate bark

- 50g/1¾oz mixed peel
- 1 tbsp caster sugar (optional)
- 200g/7oz white chocolate, broken into pieces

To assemble

- 600ml/20fl oz double cream

Method

1. To make the Swiss rolls, preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4. Grease and line the 2 Swiss roll tins with baking paper. In a large bowl, beat the egg and sugar together with an electric hand whisk for approximately 5 minutes or until light and pale. Using a metal spoon, gently fold in the flour. Divide between the two tins and bake for 10–12 minutes or until the sponges are lightly golden and cooked through.
2. Sprinkle some extra caster sugar on two sheets of baking paper then turn the sponges out onto the sugared paper. Peel off the paper from the underside and, while still warm, roll them both up from

the short end into a tight spiral using the paper to help. Leave to cool.

3. To make the lemon curd, place the egg yolks, granulated sugar, butter, lemon zest and lemon juice in a glass bowl over a saucepan of simmering water (don't let the bowl touch the water). Whisk until combined and whisk continuously as the curd cooks until thickened. This should take about 15 minutes. Pour into a clean bowl and set aside to cool.
4. To make the St Clement's jelly, soak the gelatine leaves in cold water for 5 minutes to soften. Using a vegetable peeler, peel 6 strips from a lemon and 6 strips from an orange and put these into a saucepan with the sugar and 400ml/14fl oz water. Bring to a simmer over a medium heat, stirring occasionally until the sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat and discard the peel. Squeeze the water out of the gelatine and stir into the pan until dissolved then leave to cool. Squeeze the lemons and oranges, so you have 150ml/5fl oz of both lemon and orange juice. Stir into the pan then strain the jelly through a fine sieve into a jug and chill until cool but not set.
5. To make the custard, place the cream in a saucepan over a gentle heat and bring it up to simmer, stirring occasionally with a wooden spoon. In a bowl, whisk together the egg yolks, sugar, cornflour and lemon extract, then gradually pour the hot cream into the bowl whilst whisking continuously. Immediately return the whole lot back to the saucepan and continue whisking over a gentle heat until the custard is thick and smooth. Pour the custard into a jug or bowl, cover the surface with greaseproof paper and leave to cool.
6. To make the amaretti biscuits, preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4. In a large bowl, beat the egg whites until firm. Mix the sugar and almonds gently into it. Add the amaretto and fold in gently until you have a smooth paste.
7. Place some baking paper on a baking tray and lightly brush with butter or oil. Using a teaspoon, place small heaps of the mixture approximately 2cm/¾in apart, as

they will expand during cooking. Bake for approximately 15–20 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from the oven and set aside to cool.

8. To make the chunky mandarin coulis, strain two tins of mandarins. Discard the juice and put the fruit into a saucepan with the sugar and heat gently until broken down. Remove from the heat. In a small bowl, slake the arrowroot with 2 tablespoons cold water then add to the warm mandarins. Add the lemon juice and mix well before pouring into a large bowl. Strain the remaining two tins of mandarins and add the fruit to the bowl then leave to cool completely.
9. To make the jewelled chocolate bark, if the peel feels wet or sticky, roll in the caster sugar to absorb any moisture. Melt the white chocolate in a bowl sitting over a saucepan of gently simmering water. Pour the white chocolate onto a baking tray lined with baking paper and scatter over the mixed peel. Leave to set then break into shards.
10. To assemble, unroll the cooled Swiss rolls and spread with the lemon curd. Roll back up again and slice one into 2.5cm/1in slices and place upright around the bottom edge of the trifle dish so the swirl is visible. Slice the other Swiss roll into thicker pieces and use these to fill the bottom of the dish, ensuring the top is roughly the same level as the slices that line the edge. Use off-cuts of sponge to fill any gaps.
11. Pour the St Clement's jelly over the Swiss roll layer and set aside in the fridge to completely set. This will take approximately 3 hours. Once set, pour over the custard then arrange a single layer of amaretti biscuits, keeping a few back for the top. Pour over the mandarin coulis. In a large bowl, whip the double cream until soft peaks form then spoon this over the coulis. Crumble over the reserved amaretti biscuits and decorate with the chocolate bark shards.

Recipe Tips

As a shortcut for this recipe, you can use ready-made versions for most of the components and just make the Swiss rolls and mandarin coulis from scratch.

For the lemon curd, use 300g/10½oz ready-made lemon curd. Instead of the St Clement's jelly, use 1 packet of lemon-flavoured jelly and follow the packet instructions to make 568ml/1 pint.

For the custard, use 500ml/18fl oz ready-made custard.

For the biscuits, use 100g/3½oz ready-made amaretti biscuits.

Instead of making the jewelled chocolate bark, you can finish this trifle by scattering over the reserved amaretti biscuits, mixed peel and 50g/1¾oz white chocolate chunks.

MEMORIES. By Brenda Davies (nee Jones)

I am now in my nineties
A lifetime ago
The years have passed quickly -
Tho' at the time they seemed slow.
The war years seemed endless,
And hard to endure.
No sweets for the children
No sugars or fat.
No petrol for shopping ,
For the few who had cars,
Just "Owens Motor Buses"
Knighton could have been on Mars !

After schooldays were ended at
The age of fourteen,
School friendships vanished as friends
Were never seen.
They may have met briefly in Chapel or Church,
Or at Harvest time in the hayfield,
As the hay cocks were dispersed.

Life was boring for teenagers then,
Mainly "work and no play" was the
Order for each day.
Then " out of the blue" -
A ray of sunshine shone thro'.
Some ones great idea became a fact

And lessened the boredom which,
Was then so intact.
Someone, somehow and somewhere,
In our countryside, took the view ,
That countryside teenagers -if only a few -
Deserved to "meet up" and have fun days and nights,
Whilst together they lived, learnt and laughed.

LLANFAIR-WATERDINE YFC was formed.

In Llanfair our meeting place was always the school.
Used for concerts, whist drives, wedding parties and pool.
Meeting were always alternate Tuesdays.
Our first meeting, I think, was in summer 1944.
I was sixteen and Jocelyn was fourteen, with
"Exams looming at our door".
We were both now pupils at Presteigne Grammar School,
Having passed the "Eleven Plus" a few years before.

Our first elected "Chairman" was a Land-Girl , who had
Been posted to Cwm-Brain. Miss Dorothy Tyldesley, who
Understood the ritual a Chairman needed.
The Vice-Chairman was a farmer from Pentrusco, Heyope.
Westall Price, who poor boy, had to take over the "Chair" as
The war ended in 1945 and the Land Army ceased to exist.
I was elected Club Secretary, to my mother's disapproval, as
I was due to sit my school certificate that year, and should be
"Swotting". Not arranging YFC affairs, including many YFC
Dances , with our local Dance Bands. A Mr Wilf Gough ,
(Panpwnton) and his "Scarlet Troubadours" , also
Miss Nesta Price and "The Bucknell Dance Band".

We met for Carol Singing evenings, when we walked from Llanfair to
Lloyney singing - not always very melodiously - at most households.
We gave the money collected to Cancer Research.
We attended County Meetings of Shropshire YFC.
Us Girls cooked, stitched and sewed , whilst the Boys judged, shored or mowed.
Our talents were judged highly.
We also had lessons in Country Dancing, and because we were so good,
We were asked to dance before the now Queen, in Shrewsbury, at the

West Midland Show in 1950.

We had a good tutor, who came from Shrewsbury and a highly graded pianist,
Who helped us perform before the then Princess Elizabeth.

Our boys had days of hedging and many other farming tracts, whilst us
Girls had days of cooking and other kitchen facts.
Food and petrol were still rationed, and so was clothing too.
But most people walked or cycled and most each other knew.
Every-one was friendly and very helpful too.
No water piped to houses - unless your house was new.
Some villages had a water pump, from which water could be got,
Then used sparingly, with not too much in the pot.
Radios were fuelled by batteries, which needed charging each week.
TVs were unheard of, for electricity came much later or it was new.
Our Churches and our Chapels had two services each Sunday.
Each had a large congregation, some from several miles away.

New inhabitants made us famous,
Have only just thought of that
John and Joy moved to our parish
And "put us on the map".
John was in the Army and so
"For safety's sake" Joy moved from London
With "four toddlers still in her lap".

She joined our YFC and became a leader too,
Got us involved in acting, which to us was very new.
We put on plays and danced and sang
In neighbouring villages too.
Llanfair became quite famous. which to us was very new.

Yes, to-day life is much easier in so many ways.
Most people live longer,
Their prescriptions rule their days.
In my nineties I can look back to teenage happy years.
Many friends have departed,
But we will meet again one day.. and reminisce.
We were all country people, in the Teme Valley ,born and bred
Who knew and helped each other
And so .. what more can be said.

Easter Day saw us welcome the former Archbishop of Wales, Bishop John Davies, to take our service. We were pleased to welcome him although sadness had been expressed that we couldn't have our own Vicar for our Easter Day service. However, Martin was already at two other churches that morning and we did have him with us at Christmas. In addition, Martin has been more than generous with his time since then.



Bishop John conducted a wonderful service. It was attended by 67 local people: more than on Easter Day for some time. Llanfair Singers contains many who are churchwardens where they live. It also has five organists, so, it being a special day which could not be missed in people's 'home' church, Llanfair Singers was a smaller group than usual. However, the performance of 'Hallelujah Chorus' at the end of the service, with a spell-binding accompaniment from Sean Farrell, made the service far from ordinary (and also his 'going out' voluntary at the end, except no-one went out: everyone listened). Afterwards, and after the applause, we all had coffee and cake outside, it being a lovely spring day. Our three Holy Week services were attended by a total of 134 people, which must be a record.

Sadly, for some, the 'thinking' was lost, possibly through lack of imagination or discussion. So, the photo loaned by Sarah Stainthorpe, nee Cummins, could be an illustration of a 'lost opportunity'? : a wedding in 1987 with, as guests will recall, Rev. Martin Davies instrumental in the proceedings. Some will remember that it was not the only service or wedding he conducted in Llanfair Waterdine. Now, some thirty years plus later, possibly with our church under threat, should the congregation of St Mary's Church and the parish of Llanfair Waterdine revisit the discussion of aligning with Beguildy and the Church in Wales?

Seasonal Tips for the Gardener's Year

Summer is on its way. With the risk of frost now less likely it is time to put out tender plants.

It is time to plant out lettuce seedlings, courgette plants and runner and French bean plants, pumpkins and butternut squash.

Sow radishes and spring onions. If you do not have a greenhouse try planting ridge cucumbers.

Continue to deadhead daffodils and tulips unless you wish them to seed themselves around.

Plant out dahlias which have been growing on indoors. Put supports around tall dahlias and if you see pieces have been nibbled out of the

flower petals put a small flowerpot stuffed with straw on one of the supports. This problem is probably caused by earwigs which can be removed from the flowerpots and destroyed.



Hanging baskets can now go outside if you have been growing them on in the greenhouse. Tender bedding can also be planted out now. Keep an eye out for slugs and perhaps make a slug trap with a basin buried to within one cm or half an inch of the rim and filled with a mixture of beer and water. Put a raised cover of perhaps a tile over the top supported on stones just over the basin. Check frequently and empty and refresh contents regularly. Do not use slug pellets if at all possible because a hedgehog could eat the dead slugs which could possibly kill the hedgehog.

If you have not done so, it is time to pot on your tomato plants and sweet peppers.

Earth up your potatoes to prevent those near the surface from going green.



June is the time to plant out brassica plants such as sprout, kale, cauliflower and broccoli, also leeks.

Plant sweetcorn in a block to help the windblown pollen to set the seeds in the cobs.

Sow wallflower seeds for putting into pots for next spring's displays.

Keep on top of weeding which competes with your plants for nutrients.

Sow more radishes, spring onions, lettuce etc. as soon as the first sowing is up and growing well.

Cut back whippy shoots on wisteria in July and prune properly in February next year.

Sow hardy biennial seeds like foxgloves for planting out in the autumn.

In August, keep cutting sweetpeas to keep them flowering for longer. Cut back lavender after it has flowered. Keep pots and hanging baskets well-watered and deadheaded regularly to keep them going.

Enjoy your garden.

- 4.** Sponsorship of projects that will be of sustainable benefit to the community.

With regard to the land management, we are pleased to say all grazier's agreements have been signed and also the payment schemes have been submitted for this year. With the reduction in traditional payments the Trust have applied for and been successful in receiving a conservation grant for 'The Triangle.' This is a well-loved piece of land that can be enjoyed by all, it is situated next to the Offa's Dyke Path, The Turbary and is in situated near to nesting locations for Lapwings and Curlews.

The aim is to enrich the area creating a more biodiverse land parcel, which is not jeopardising existing habitats. The Trust are pleased to report that Shropshire Hills AONB have provided a grant of £1,000 to aid improvements and a professional assessment of this area by an Ecologist to provide a mini-management plan. The Trust are looking to involve as many of the local community in the project and would ask anyone interested to get in touch via our Trust email address:

There are still some ongoing developments as we hope to further support the Management committee with the improvements at the Community pavilion. A new children's play area is now built with a picket fence surround and is being enjoyed by many of the local families in the community. There is now also Wi-Fi available in

the Pavilion, this is a huge asset for the community and will allow a wider range of events to be held here as well as allowing the methods of communication to be improved in a rural area.

Finally, we look forward to the many Jubilee celebrations that are being hosted by our community groups, we encourage everyone to get involved and support the events and we hope to catch up with you there.
