### HOWARD GODFREY - 5th October 1950 – 4th November 2025

Very many thanks to all those who have supported me during the last few difficult months of Howard's life and since he died. To Mary and all at St Michael's, to neighbours, friends and all in Halam who have visited, sat with me, sent cards, letters, messages and flowers you have brought me much comfort. A huge thank you.

Howard was brought up on the Family Nursery on Mapperley Plains where he spent a happy childhood and teenage years with his parents Margaret and Harry and surrounded by aunts, uncles, cousins and friends. From school he went to Leeds University where he made friends which as from his earlier years, he kept throughout his life. For over 20 years he taught Housing Finance at Salford University an incomprehensible subject to many but one he made his own and understandable to many of his students and as I have heard from many of his colleagues he was held in great respect.

He had many interests, which sadly for Howard during the last 10 years of his life, were gradually curtailed by the onset and development of Parkinsons. He was a fanatical gardener growing bedding plants not just for our own garden but for friends and neighbours too. He was a keen walker; most holidays and weekends were spent walking. He enjoyed listening to music of all kinds and going to concerts. He had a keen sense of humour and was a master of spoof letters. In retirement he joined U3A and for a while was their treasurer.

Above all Howard was the best Husband, relative and friend. He was always very generous with his time for others, often driving many miles and spending hours on the road to visit and support his family and friends. Howard had deep resources of love and friendship which he gave unconditionally. I was so blessed to have been his wife for over 51 years. **Anne Godfrey**



# Report for Halam News: Halam Parish Council Meeting - 7.30pm on Thursday 11th December 2025 held at Halam Village Hall

**Present:** Chris Denyer (in the Chair), Simon Bust, Andrew Paris, Ganesh Subramanian and Charlie Wright

## **Matters from Previous Meeting**

Andrew Paris expressed his surprise at the previous parish meeting's planning decision to support a "planning in principle" application. He stated that all previous in principle and outline applications had been rejected because of lack of information, in particular lack of detail. He said that he thought that this had become a policy of the parish council. The Chair replied that this was not a formal policy and that each application was judged on its own merit.

## **Open Meeting**

A parishioner also expressed the view that they thought that rejecting applications without full details had been a policy of the parish council in the past. They also stated that they felt that if this particular application in the open countryside, outside of the built-up area of the village, went ahead, then it could set a precedent for other potential developments outside of the village. The Chair explained that the parish council had no firm policies regarding planning, and that each application was decided individually.

## **Update from District Councillor**

Cllr Penny Rainbow told the meeting that the application in principle for two new dwellings on Radley Road would be going to the Planning Committee, as the proposal represented a departure from the district council's plan.

She also stated that there was an application pending for 70 houses off Allenby Road (on the Halam Hill side), and she felt that this was likely to be passed.

The district council was currently setting its 2006-27 budget, likely to be the last before the implementation of the unitary authority scheme. The final scheme will be agreed in the New Year.

The district's food waste collection scheme is progressing and is like to start in the first quarter of 2026.

Cllr Rainbow informed the meeting that there are currently 34 complaints of breach of the Code of Conduct being investigated by the monitoring officer – these are complaints against both district and parish councils/councillors. Central government are looking at introducing more strict sanction against councillors.

## **Finance** - agreed to pay:

1. flyers for the harvest tea
2. village hall cleaners
3. cost of the Christmas tree and lights
4. mince pies, mulled wine etc. for the tractor run event
5. replacement light in the male toilets
6. village hall fire safety check

After discussion, it was resolved unanimously to keep the village precept the same as last year at £8,000. The precept is the amount of money which goes directly to the parish council. It is added to householders' council tax bills across the parish. It has remained at £8,000 for the last two years, which means a real terms reduction in cost to the village.

## **Village Hall**

Ongoing work includes weeding the carpark and refreshing the village planters. The Christmas tree and decorations will be taken down very early in January.

It was agreed that the light fitting in the female toilets should be changed to match the new one in the male toilets.

Clerk will obtain quotes for the January meeting for the redecoration throughout of the hall interior.

Clerk is getting costings for legionella testing, and the water lead testing is in hand.

The Events Team will be asked to see to the clutter that has accumulated in the committee room/store room.

## **Village Christmas Tree Lights Switch On/Tractor Run**

The event was a very happy, inclusive free event that all the village could enjoy. It was well attended, and all there seemed to enjoy the mince pies and mulled wine. Thank you to all involved, and a special thanks to Jax Thornewill for decorating the village hall – it looked most festive. Thank you also to Fran Critchley for the wonderful Christmas cupcakes, and to Don & Ann Reid for the loan of the wine glasses.

**Allotments:** Nothing further to report this month.



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## **Roads & Hedges**

Replacement finger-post at the cross roads – the possibility of having an old-fashioned style finger-post is being investigated. Further information and costings are required.

## **Lengthsman Scheme**

There is a small amount of funding left in this year's budget. The firm that cleared the weeds under the railings will be approached to see if this money can be put to removing some of the moss and weeds from pavements/gutters in the village. It was agreed to apply for Lengthsman funding again for the coming year. The HR Committee to look at the costs and implications of employing our own Lengthsman rather than using contractors.

## **Biodiversity**

This needs reviewing annually at the Annual Parish Council Meeting in May 2026. Chris Denyer to circulate suggested biodiversity actions to form an overall biodiversity action plan for the parish council.

## **Planning**

1 Radley Terrace, Radley Road: Single storey side extension and replacement wall  
Agreed unanimously to support the application.

# **District Cllrs Karen Roberts and Peter Harris Report for December 2025**

Details are on the Council's website - see The Council - Calendar of Meetings for links to each of the papers and reports. There have been few meetings since our last report in November



December is another month with only one meeting of the Council and Planning Committee. The next Council meeting will be held later this month. In January there will be a meeting of the Policy and Performance Improvement Committee on which Karen Roberts sits. It will have a presentation from Cllr Claire Penny on her view of sustainable economic development in the District. Following Peter's question in September relating to the allocation of Government funds to support bus service infrastructure in Southwell and the villages, there still has not been a full response from the Leader of the Council - who has a key role on the East Midlands Mayor's scrutiny. At the December meeting Peter asked about how the Mayor is challenging the Government's decision to end electrification of the Midlands Main Line from Nottingham to London after major expenditure on the bridges to allow it to have already taken place. Having faster electric trains will significantly improve choice for residents here - and its very recent decision to 'suspend' the improvements of the line to Birmingham in the Midlands Hub that is now entirely focussed on west of Birmingham do not bode well for the Government's interest in the East Midlands transport system. No full response was made but a written answer is expected.

The Council agreed to fly the Union Flag outside Castle House every day except when other occasions warrant flying a different flag - such as flying the Nottinghamshire flag

The ending of the District and County Councils in 2028 has taken a huge amount of officer time and energy. Despite being opposed by the majority of residents, the Government insisted that a scheme was put forward last month. The new Councils will be decided by the Government from a range of options but most of which split the county into two halves, north and south. Southwell and the village's representation and voice will be made by one or possibly two councillors with a large number of villages and the town to support. At present there are four. Again, this will be decided by the Government and election to this post[s] will be in 2027. Karen and Peter have challenged the huge costs of this - and the likelihood of a deterioration in service as a consequence too.

The Government seems keen to increase centralisation with decisions taken in Whitehall and by the East Midlands Mayor rather than allowing decisions that affect residents at the closest to the people in the villages and towns.
