News from the Bell Tower

August has been a busy month and September will not have been much less so. We had three lots of visitors, one of the best parts of bell ringing, visiting other towers, particularly for the first time, particularly for a "Tower Grabber" like me. Some of our visitors didn't have to come very far, the Malmesbury band had not had an Outing since before Covid, and they decided to start them up again, and not too ambitiously to begin with. We also had a visit, arranged by a lady who rings at Littleton Drew, who has moved full time to there, having previously been living in Richmond, Surrey whose band came down for the Bank Holiday weekend. They also came to the Dauntsey Festival of Transport & Country Show, where we had a Mobile Belfry to encourage visitors to have a go, as a way of recruiting new ringers, which was very successful with 20 signing up to be put in touch with their local tower. We have gained one, possibly two potential recruits, which I will report on next time.

That exercise at Dauntsey, was also for the purpose of making people aware of bell ringing. Here at Charlton, everyone who comes into the Church when we are ringing, see people on the end of a rope, and when we have the CCTV camera on, they get to see the bells and wheels rotating 360 degrees and back again. The majority of towers, the ringers are hidden up in a Ringing Room,

like at Minety, so it is not surprising that plenty of people can be forgiven for thinking that it is a recording, and those that go to Services at Hankerton will hear a wonderful recording of 12 bells pealing out, when they have in fact an unringable 4. And I gather Crudwell will now have the same, but there are 5 bells there that were only ever hung for chiming, and interestingly, they were cast at Whitechapel on the same day as Big Ben, using up the extra bell metal that was in reserve.

The most important visitors we had, were members of the Gloucester & Bristol Diocesan Association of Church Ringers Youth Team, who came on an Outing, but it was more of a continual training opportunity, as they visited another three towers that day. Getting young people to realise the positives to learning to ring bells, is the most important task we have at present. If we do not address this soon, we are in future, likely to not have a critical mass that provides the competent ringers to teach anyone. Bell ringing is best and easiest learnt, when you are still at the stage of your life when you can learn cognitive skills. Please help by encouraging young people to at least have a look at something that if they go off to University, are likely to find a social group that they can join on Fresher's Day.

October's Message from the Ministry

The sun is setting sooner, jumpers are coming out of the wardrobe, and evenings are more likely to be spent in front of the fire than on the patio. As I write this, it's a beautiful, sunny day, but I can already feel autumn nipping the air. I love this season, because it feels like anything could happen. It's a season of change, not just in nature, but in so much in our lives. Many of our young people have moved on to the next step in their lives — new schools, university, the 'real world'. A visit to any supermarket will tell you that Christmas is on the horizon, and approaching fast. The summer holidays are fast becoming a distant memory, and thoughts focus on harvest and the end of growing season for many crops.

Change is something that, as humans, we can struggle with. For some of us there's the excitement of new challenges and adventures, but for many there is a sense of trepidation entering into the unknown, especially if change is thrust upon us. In my role as church warden, I'm in the privileged position to be involved in many of the services that mark key events in people's lives. Christenings, marriages and funerals all represent big changes, not just for the individuals concerned, but for family and friends too. Whether it is a beginning or an ending, we can feel overwhelmed by the possibility of change. I've been involved in several meetings in the last few weeks, with both adults and young people, where we have focused on what has been happening over the summer. The sheer volume and magnitude of variety in those answers has really struck me. From the big events, fancy holidays and community projects to loss of someone close, the upheaval of moving house, or mundane everyday life, these experiences all share one thing in common – God is there in all of them. I am reminded of the poem, Footprints (based on a poem by Mary Stevenson)

One night I dreamed a dream.
As I was walking along the beach with my Lord.
Across the dark sky flashed scenes from my life.
For each scene, I noticed two sets of footprints in the sand,
One belonging to me and one to my Lord.

After the last scene of my life flashed before me,
I looked back at the footprints in the sand.
I noticed that at many times along the path of my life,
Especially at the very lowest and saddest times,
There was only one set of footprints.

This really troubled me, so I asked the Lord about it. "Lord, you said once I decided to follow you, You'd walk with me all the way.

But I noticed that during the saddest and most troublesome times of my life, There was only one set of footprints.

I don't understand why, when I needed You the most, You would leave me."

He whispered, "My precious child, I love you and will never leave you especially during your most difficult times.

When you saw only one set of footprints,

It was then that I carried you."

Whatever life throws at us, whatever changes come our way, and however we feel about them, God knows what's in our hearts and he understands how we feel. He longs to be there for us, to clear our minds and bring us his peace and comfort, to strengthen us for the fight or to sooth us to rest – he is our ultimate cheerleader, perfect parent, and all-knowing Lord. We can rely on him completely – he carries us.



Wiltshire Connect - Connecting Wiltshire

Since April there has been a valuable new bookable and flexible bus service in our area - Wiltshire Connect.

To use it you can download the app - or telephone the booking team if you prefer on <u>01225 712900</u>. It is an on-demand service where you book your ride up to 7 days in advance or on the day with 30 minutes notice (subject to vehicle availability).

I understand that in general you can book a ride between any two locations (usually existing bus stops) within the shaded area shown on the map. While the maximum journey length that can be booked is about 15 miles, some journeys, for example to GWH, will be longer and these can be arranged through the booking team. However where a timetabled bus service is already available for your journey it will direct you to that (as I found when trying to book a lift to GWH recently!)



In addition, flexible pick-up and drop-off options can be arranged for passengers with mobility problems or for those living in isolated locations, and I have already arranged for two new stops to be set up for residents.

Please do send me any feedback as there will be some hiccups and I want to hear how you have got on and to help the service to improve. It really should be an asset to our communities.



Malmesbury Branch of the Wiltshire Farming Club

On the second Tuesday of the month, the Malmesbury Branch of the Wiltshire Farming Club meet mainly in Charlton Village Hall, unless there is a visit that takes us out to farms, or as recently, Alvan Blanch Developments Ltd at Chelworth. and we are making plans for future visits.

In August, Dee Molton talked about her and the Rev. Bob's time in West Africa, including worryingly, the start of a Civil War! starting a Village Chicken Project to make funds for the Community. We have just had farmer's wife and Authoress, Sue Andrews, talk about building their pedigree flock of predominantly Texels, with international sales and visits, and also Sue's time as a groom for Pat Smythe, a leading Showjumper in the 60's & 70's.

The speaker for our October meeting on the 14th. is John Tuck, who farms between Brinkworth and Royal Wootton Bassett, whose going to talk about the 5 generations before him, since the late 18th century. Currently, he and his son Stephen, press a lot of apples as a diversification. In November, Joe Collingborn from Brinkworth, is going to show us a film (That apparently was shown at the Cannes Film Festival!) called 'The siege of Hill End farm', which was about Joe's father standing up against paying the ATB Levy. He will also tell us about their farming business, which has for a number of years been processing their milk into dairy products, mainly cheese.

You do not have to be a farmer to come to our meetings, in fact the only other clubs left, Marlborough and Poulshott, have changed their name to the Wiltshire Countryside Club, but we are keeping the farming connection, in our name. Everyone welcome.

Situated on the Lower Moor nature reserve overlooking Cottage Lake is the newly built but already becoming firmly established Dragonfly Café and Nature Centre.


Since 2007 the reserve has been home to a plethora of wildlife from insects to otters and offers the opportunity to get lost in the nature we endeavour to protect.

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
