

Ward Councillor's Report

Caroline Gladwin was unable to attend our monthly Parish Council meeting but provided a report.

After the Reform UK victory last month at Lake North where we retained our seat, we were able to reinstate the Reform UK Group on the Council with Cllr Nigh. The ABC Group has been dissolved for now, but we will still be working closely with our friend and colleague Cllr Adams.

The Central Rural focus for me this month has been Rookley and the intended development of 38 houses off Main Road. I have had residents contact me with their objections about it and I advised them to make sure these objections were put on the planning application. The Parish Council met for a planning meeting on the 16th of October and agreed to object under the following grounds, flooding, access, pavement, crossing and speeding. This is a Green Field site which is also concerning along with over development potential for Rookley. A decision from the Planners is expected in December regarding the initial part of the application. I am monitoring developments closely and will inform the Parish Council of any updates. The Godshill Guisers

The 'new' Godshill Guisers will be making their presence felt in the village this Christmas season, delighting residents and visitors alike with their traditional Christmas Mummers play. This cherished folk performance is open for all to enjoy!



What Is a Mummers Play?

A Mummers Play is a traditional folk play with roots going back to medieval times. Typically, these plays are performed by amateur actors—local people rather than professionals. The plays often revolve around a storyline featuring death and resurrection, with a hero figure such as St George facing an antagonist like the Turkish Knight. In the course of the action, the defeated character is brought back to life by a quack doctor. Mummers Plays were traditionally staged around festive times like Christmas, Boxing Day, or Easter, and could be seen in pubs, homes, or town squares, often in exchange for money, beer, or food.

The Origin of 'Guiser'

The term 'Guiser' comes from the tradition of disguise or masking. In earlier times, this would have concealed the performers' identities, allowing them to deliver satire or social commentary with greater freedom.

The Godshill Script and Its Creators

This year's Godshill script has been carefully assembled by local resident Frankie Goldspink. Frankie, along with her partner Chris, has a history of performing Mummers plays in villages on the mainland. With a

background as a Morris Dancer, Frankie has long been fascinated by the rich history surrounding Mummers plays. She is the proud owner of over 30 different scripts from across the country, including one from the Isle of Wight, each with its own local variation on the central theme. The new Godshill play remains true to the traditional format but has been adapted—streamlined and simplified—to suit family audiences. The performance lasts approximately 15 minutes.

This production features seven adult volunteers from Godshill, all of whom are currently hard at work rehearsing their roles.

Central Mead Groundwork

The worn-out, badly damaged and dangerous synthetic surface in the centre of Central Mead has been removed and the area repaired.



Parish Councillors have combined to tackle this significant and urgent task. The initial removal of the old surface was no mean feat. We didn't think we were going to manage to get much further as much top soil and grass was needed to complete the job. But Cllrs Suzette and Russell came to the rescue by securing free top soil from the Captiva development site in Lily Cross and free turf from Hillcroft Turf, just up the road.

Our powerhouse of Cllrs Carl and Keith, admittedly, with some paid help, and ably assisted by Martin (Cllr Suzette's other half) repaired and dressed the area before laying the whole area with new turf.



All of this was achieved at virtually no cost to the Parish or the Charity.

This is the sort of team work that the Parish Council thrives on.....it's hard work, but improves the environment that we all live in – Well done team!.

Children's and Young People's Playground and Parish Recreation Ground Charity

Notes from the recent Trustee Meeting of the Charity.

The Wildlife Trust is carrying out a free assessment of May Close and it will be used to plan the way forward.

A complete overhaul of the May Close equipment including the goalposts will be carried out.

An assessment is to be made regarding the modernisation of the old Cricket Pavilion in Central Mead. This will include estimates of costs and a proposed business plan aimed at showing how it could be run without financially burdening the village.

It is recognised that over a number of years there has been significant encroachment by hedges and trees both in May Close and Central Mead and money will need to be spent on that.

The dangerous and badly damaged matting strip in the middle of Central Mead has been removed and the area will have top soil added and be reseeded/returfed.
